BOHLEN'S HONEST OPINIONS
This country was unfortunate in not having an expert top-level observer on the Moscow scene in the critical days immediately after the death of Joseph Stalin. Consequently, the remaining formalities to the induction of Charles E. Bohlen as ambassador to Russia should be speeded so he may get to his vital post quickly.

Bohlen is one of the genuine professionals on the subject of the Soviet Union. On top of that he is a superb diplomat, not one pulled out of a coat-filled campaign hat, in the old American custom.

The long delay by the senate foreign relations committee in approving Bohlen was ostensibly due to feelings among some Republicans that he had been "too closely identified" with the policies of the former Democratic secretary of state, Dean Acheson.

Bohlen had served as an interpreter for President Roosevelt at Yalta in 1945, and he was also present at the Potsdam Big Three meeting later that year.

But, this argument was not the real one, since any career diplomat worth his salt would be expected to show loyalty to the regime in power, as Secretary of State Dulles pointed out. Furthermore, in his valuable service in Paris during the early days of NATO in 1941, Bohlen had been very close to President Eisenhower, then NATO commander.

The real sore point was Bohlen's failure to agree with the contention of some Republicans that Yalta and Potsdam were total disasters for America and "sell-outs" for the Poles, the Nationalist Chinese, and others.

In the end, however, most Republicans supported the President. But the most evident conviction that Bohlen's qualifications for the Moscow post outweighed any possible handicaps from past associations or other factors.

One thing Bohlen established unmistakably in the senate hearings: his basic honesty. He knew in his heart it would have been right to please some senators by saying the right thing. Instead he spoke his mind at risk of falling to win confirmation.

Within the limitations always imposed by Russia on foreign diplomats, Bohlen now may treat the U. S. government to the same kind of honest reporting from Moscow, attuning his special attention to the most critical spot on earth for determining the issue of war or peace.

WASHINGTON COLUMN PETER EDSON

WASHINGTON (G.E.A.)—Atomic energy commission's announcement that on Feb. 28 it produced electric power from nuclear energy through a new reactor at Oak Ridge, Tenn., has not yet allowed power for commercial use is just around the corner.

People permitted to see the new Oak Ridge reactor describe it as a terrific complex contraption of pipes, pumps and valves. It is in a building that has been built for the purpose of housing the reactor.

The location is something like a moonshiner's still down in a "hole." It is in a ravine at the Oak Ridge national laboratory. The reactor is a sheet-iron box.

With only 15 per cent of the available energy being converted into electricity, the Oak Ridge reactor is not very efficient. On a cost basis, it is prohibitive as a commercial power producer. The cost appears to be about one million dollars and took two years to build. Three million dollars more for two years of research went into its design.

Four million dollars is obviously a prohibitive capital investment for the production of electricity to supply 60 families. Nobody is going to make any money that way, and no modern power company is going to be put out of business by this competition.

The new Oak Ridge reactor—developed by Union Carbide and Chemical company, which operates the laboratory under contract to the government—will run for a year on experimental basis before any decisions are made on what to do next. Tests will be made on how much heat such reactors will stand, how fluidized fuels can be handled, and so on.

The producer heat. The hot solution is then pumped through a heat exchanger. The heat exchanger is the equivalent of a boiler. Circulating in the heat exchanger is another liquid which can be water, sodium or some other liquid metal. This liquid in the heat exchanger is turned into steam by the heat from the uranium solution. This steam is then piped into a turbine which drives the electric generator that produces the power. The uranium solution which generated the heat does not remain static in the firebox or in the heat exchanger, producing energy indefinitely.

to keep the operation in a relation of arrangement of the uranium solution is pumped out of the firebox and the heat exchanger, then cooled in smaller containers of less than the critical mass, the solution stops producing energy. It is pumped back into the firebox to produce more heat.

It is this complete and continuous circulation and recycling of the uranium solution that is the new development in this Oak Ridge power reactor.

The amount of heat produced in this reactor is announced as the equivalent of 1,000 kilowatts of energy. The amount of electric energy produced, however, is only 150 kilowatts. This is enough electricity to supply 50 small houses for ordinary lighting and small appliances.

SEVEN YEARS FOR MURDER?
In advocating stiffer maximum penalties for drug peddlers, X in his appeal for the drug trade with public opinion. Most of us are convinced that if the profit is taken out of the drug traffic the drug traffic would dry up.

At present the maximum penalty of imprisonment for those convicted of distributing or selling drugs is seven years. The criminal code of Canada provides, in the case of drug peddlers, a maximum of 14 years.

In urging stiffer penalties for peddlers the court drew a clear line of distinction between those engaged in drug traffic as a business, for profit, and others who are trafficking in drugs because they are addicted to a habit.

Moderate penalties, of course, is turning away from the emphasis on punishing crime and toward the rehabilitation of criminals. This is what we should be doing. There is not much point in society re-venting itself on wrongdoers.

It has often been said that these harpies are worse than murderers. If we examine their activities we can see why. They are engaged in a business that is a direct cause of the death of a human being.

Yet we hang men for committing one murder and allow a maximum penalty of seven years for dope peddlers. It is in the course of their careers, may destroy dozens of lives.

Society can't revenge itself on these men. One man can't explain the crime of torturing and killing a dozen human beings.

But we can punish these men so severely that their trade will be shunned. We can set so severe an example that even the fat profits of the drug trade will no longer be attractive.—Vancouver (C. O.) Province.

WASHINGTON, March 30 (Special)—Sen. Wayne Morse, Ind. Ore., has decided to keep his seat with the Republicans to prove that Sen. Herman Welker hasn't been calling him names.

Morse defended the Idahoan's reputation on the floor Friday after a column reported that Welker and Sen. Irving Jevs had been making unkind remarks about Morse from their seats directly to the rear.

"At no time did I ever hear either of these men say the things mentioned in this article," the Oregonian declared.

House columnist George Nixon wrote that the real reason Morse had asked to move to the Democratic side of the chamber, because Welker and Jevs had started a whispering campaign within earshot of the victim.

According to Dixon, Welker's part was as follows:

"You stupid ass," he would hiss at Morse's back. "Everybody knows you're a dope. Do you even have the faintest idea what you're yapping about?"

A few days of this were supposed to have driven Morse to ask for a transfer. Although he admitted he had wanted to change, he told the senate he would remain in his old seat for the present to disprove the report.

Welker commented on the incident, "While Senator Morse and I may differ and do so frequently, it is certainly not on the level suggested by this columnist."

LAS VEGAS, Nev., March 30 (AP)—Two atomic age infantry officers want to sit out an atomic test blast from a distance of only 2,000 yards, 500 yards closer than they were in last Tuesday's explosion.

Lieut.-Col. Don Davis, Shell Beach, Calif., and Capt. Robert R. Collier, Battle Creek, Mich., said yesterday they are "very anxious" to undergo more test blasts, possibly an air drop or an atomic artillery shell.

At the time of their statement, however, there was no indication from the atomic energy commission as to when the next tests will be held.

The two officers, training as specialists in nuclear warfare, witnessed last week's test from six-foot deep trenches 2,500 yards from ground zero. They believe that depth would be the maximum necessary if they observed a blast from 2,000 yards.

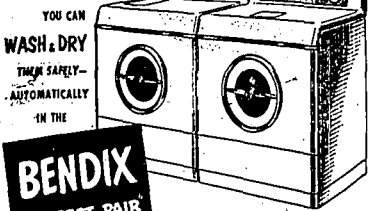
