McCarthy Goes Too Far

Last year Senator McCarthy won renomination to the senate by a tremendous margin. Through less skillful, rather than less intelligent, he still will die.

The best-trained observers in Wisconsin concluded unanimously that McCarthy triumphed because he was identified in the public mind as the nation's prime foe of communism in government. They felt that he gained the support of the Democratic administration's evident indifference and slowness in handling the problem.

The sharp Wisconsin verdict naturally translated itself into heavy backing in congress. Equipped at last with the authority of an important committee chairmanship, McCarthy entered 1953 with a great reservoir of strength to draw upon.

But now, a little more than two months since President Eisenhower and the Republicans took office, McCarthy seems well on the way to emptying that reservoir. Through his conduct in the case of Charles E. Bohlen, the President's choice for ambassador to Moscow, McCarthy has brought the senate's most powerful Republicans into an unyielding line against him.

At first he was merely one among several Republican senators who questioned Bohlen's fitness on the ground he was too closely linked with past events and policies of which the GOP has been steadily critical, especially the Yalta-Potsdam meetings.

McCarthy began to isolate himself from his party's leadership, however, when he jointly introduced the Senate Resolution of Nevada in casting doubt on Bohlen's security status.

In a series of statements, McCarthy said the FBI report on Bohlen contained 16 pages of derogatory material, that the state department's own security man, Scott-McClellan, had disapproved Bohlen's nomination, and that State Dept. had concealed this disapproval and also the true nature of the information on Bohlen when the secretary summarized the FBI report for the senate foreign relations committee.

McCarthy asked that Dulles be recalled and asked to testify under oath as to what he imputed to the secretary had lied—and sought to bring McClellan before his own committee, which does not have jurisdiction over foreign policy matters. He also suggested Bohlen submit to a lie detector test.

To Senator Taft's question why Republicans have not taken any direct challenge to the President himself, since they saw his judgment and the honesty and good faith of his secretary of state under fire.

They responded with a loud and vigorous defense of both Mr. Eisenhower and Dulles, and to the charge that he was a Communist Democratic member of the foreign relations committee themselves read the FBI's summary on Bohlen and declared to the senate he was a thoroughly good security risk.

At the height of this clamor, McCarthy told newsmen in response to a question: "To say Bohlen is a security risk is to say I am a top weakly." That was March 20. Next day, March 21, he was widely quoted as telling newsmen: "In our opinion, he (Bohlen) is a bad security risk."

March 23, the day senate debate opened on the case, McCarthy said on the floor: "The senator from Nevada (McCarran) stated here that Mr. Bohlen was so turned down (by McClellan) on security grounds, and I have every reason to know that this is true." Later he said he could not discuss Bohlen's security status without himself "violating secret procedure."

Then, on March 24, McCarthy reversed himself and denied to reporters he ever had called Bohlen a "security risk."

The security case against Bohlen collapsed because in the judgment of such responsible Republicans as Taft there never was anything to it.

It is this fact, plus his blunt challenge to the authority and competence of President Eisenhower, that has isolated McCarthy from people who up to now have tolerated his methods because of the goals he sought.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen's first major mission to Moscow will be to try to arrange for the most important and lateral meeting of world statesmen since Potsdam, where the cold war involving the west and east really began.

Bohlen will seek to do the rounds of a conference of President Eisenhower, Prime Minister Churchill and Premier Stalin, and to arrange for a meeting of the three delegations. Even if his preliminary moment should fall, the mere effort would clarify the "mystery" atmosphere that surrounds Moscow. Although no definite plans in the domestic or foreign news without more information on the new Russian signals.

Bohlen's task will be to ascertain whether Malenkov's recent promises of peaceful intent were sincere, or whether they were designed only for home-consumption in a shaky, nervous government.

DELICATE PROBLEMS—The personal presence of Bohlen at Moscow to execute this assignment lay behind Eisenhower-Dulles' impatience over the "diplomatic" detour. It would be a psychological. Were it not for Stalin's death and the Malenkov succession, the most important event behind the "iron curtain" since the passing of Lenin, were the "iron curtain" still in place, the Kremlin.

If Eisenhower appears too anxious, he could nullify the non-hostile, peaceful start to build a European peace front. It would weaken domestic and congressional support of huge military appropriations for Europe, Korea, Indo-China, etc. The faint prospect of long-deferred peace could make faint hearts of all.

Bohlen can discover whether there is any sense in such a detour. He will see whether the west will settle, and whether these terms can be reconciled to the west's honor and security needs.

Eisenhower is hopeful, but skeptical. However, recent dispatches from 10 Downing street indicate the normally pessimistic Churchill is more sanguine. The secretary of state, Acheson, and the secretary were sent after the prime minister's talks with Marshal Tito, the Yugoslavian communist.

Plan for U. N. 'Leapfrog' Bid Is Considered

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—An ambitious attack behind Communist lines in Korea similar to that which Gen. James A. Van Fleet has forbidden to undertake in 1951 now has the qualified approval of the joint chiefs of staff.

The joint chiefs' most recent composition of alternate strategies was part of a continuing study. There is no reason to believe either the Truman or Eisenhower administrations ever asked the chiefs specifically for a plan to end the war by military force as quickly as possible.

ROK Troops Block Attack By 750 Reds

SEOUL, April 2 (AP)—A Chinese Communist battalion—about 750 men—hit the South Korean capital division on the central front early today, but the sharpshooting ROKs drove off the reds with deadly accuracy.

Eight army headquarters said 28 Communist bodies were left on the battlefield and another 75 reds probably were wounded.

When reporting the attack, the eighth army said it was made by only 750 reds.

The Chinese crossed the ROKS highway at midnight and stormed ROK positions south of Kumong. After 40 minutes of savage fighting the reds broke off the battle and were driven back across the road by counter-attacking South Koreans.

No MIGs. For the second straight day Communist bombers were over North Korea without spotting a Communist MIG.

Fighter-bombers broke through Communist lines in an air-land supply and troop area and hit bridges in North Korea and to attack and demolish power plants.

Elsewhere along the 150-mile front there were scattered patrol clashes.

Overcast skies limited aerial action to a few fighter-bomber strikes and some close air support missions Thursday.

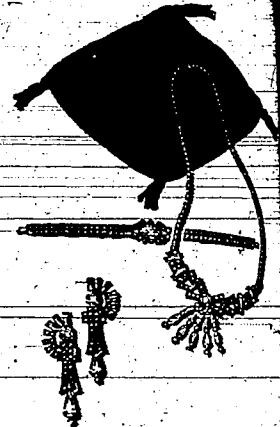

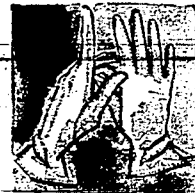

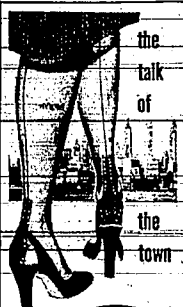

The people who diet—Bernard Padden as a health fanatic because he carries five extra pounds in his pockets now try to find out where he buys them.

The empty stomach has replaced the full-dinner pail as an American success symbol. But, of course, it has to be fashionably empty.

A hungry man used to be a financial failure. Today a man of wealth who gets fat is regarded as an antisocial wretch who is deliberately plotting to make his wife a widow.

This is odd, because for centuries in China a middle-aged man's weight was measured by the size of his paunch. And he remained remarkably free of the heart ail-



ments that ambush the chubby executives in this country. Maybe one reason is that the chilled Orientals found out long ago that lying on a couch and munching rice while listening to a little music didn't wear the heart out as fast as chasing a golf ball.

But millions of Americans, rich or poor, male or female, now seem to feel that less food, rather than less tension, is the formula for a long life. They no longer count sheep while trying to cure insomnia; they count calories jumping over a fence—the calories they plan to eat next day.

As a matter of fact, a zealous dieter hardly can mention food any more without a twinge of conscience. When one meets another, he boasts, "CHUCK WALKER EATS FIFTY-FOUR HUNDRED—350 CALORIES AND FIVE MINERAL. YOU SHOULD BE JEALOUS."

If he finds that he has exceeded his calorie quota, he starts worrying—and sooms his high blood pressure.

It used to be said that it was easier for a camel to go through the eye of the needle than for a rich man to enter the gates of heaven. Many a "die-hard" rich man now dreams fondly of galloping through that needle on his back.

a piece of upright spaghetti as he scans his ticker tape. The working man is going in just as much for calorie-nibbling. He no longer carries a toothpick. He is one.

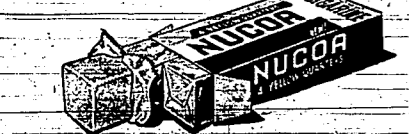

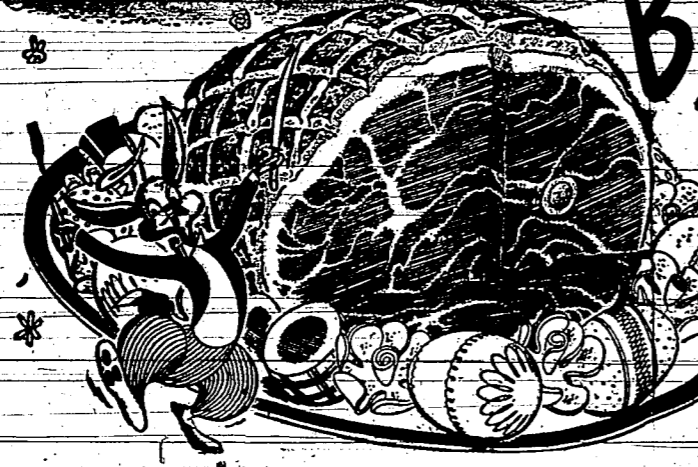

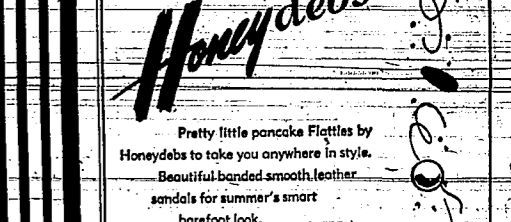

New Vaccine On Influenza Is Developed

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—A new type influenza vaccine that at least could be chosen today by the same scientist who recently announced promising steps toward a polio vaccine.

Dr. Jonas E. Salk, Philadelphia, said the new vaccine gives protection for at least two years and may make it possible to give immunity against more strains of the disease. He said, however, further study is necessary before it can be produced for general application.

Salk is associated with the virus research laboratory, department of bacteriology, at the University of Pittsburgh school of medicine.

Last week he disclosed great strides toward a possible vaccine against infantile paralysis.

Present influenza vaccines only give protection for about a year. Preliminary studies have shown that the new vaccine at least could protect for two years.

Salk reported his findings in the Journal of the American Medical Association.
