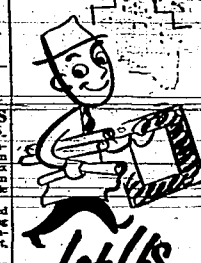
Action Filed Over Farm Machinery

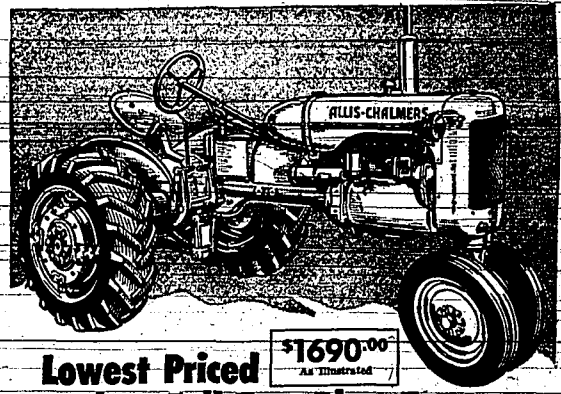
