After administering first aid he summoned the Shoshone ambulance and Mrs. Fields was taken to St. Benedict's hospital in Jerome. Her condition Saturday night was reported "serious."

Solon Answers Forum Letter Concerning Politics and REA

Editor, Times-News: My attention has been called to a letter written by C. M. Shriver of Twin Falls asking for a Public Forum of the Times-News of Sunday, April 8.

In his letter, Mr. Shriver takes to task my colleague, Senator Walker, and me, for certain remarks we made on the floor of the senate March 11 concerning the question of political activity by members of rural co-ops. This letter alleges that we told the senate that "farmers who are members of rural co-ops should be barred from taking any part in political campaigns." His statement is obviously a distortion in which I engaged with Sen. Walter Hill on the appointment of a new administrator for the REA.

Mr. Shriver, as does any citizen, has a perfect right to criticize statements or actions of their senators. It is a right and even a responsibility of citizenship. But it is equally his responsibility to state the facts accurately. I am sure that Mr. Shriver received his information but it certainly does not conform with the record. It is like a man who goes to a doctor and tells him that he has a headache and all those who may have read his letter. The facts are clearly and indisputably before the REA in the Congressional Record for March 11, starting on page 2180. Senator Walker, I am sure, would be equally able to do this for himself. So, I will confine myself in this letter to my own remarks.

First, the record will establish that I did not refer to members of rural co-ops, but only to the rural electrification administration and REA co-ops.

Second, the record will show that I made these remarks, and although they were not intended to be inflammatory, they remain unmodified by anything else in the record. "I think the senator from Alabama recognizes, as does every other member of this body, that in the past we have scrupulously refrained from involving the REA in political matters. Whether it be on the local level, the regional level, or the national level, I am sure the senator from Alabama will agree with me that there is little, if any, justification for playing partisan politics. Certainly it would be perfectly proper for members of the REA cooperative to engage in political activities as individuals, but not as a group as an organization."

I am an ardent supporter of the REA, but I do not want to see REA members using their office as a political football. "Most assuredly, I do not take umbrage over the fact that certain farmers who band themselves together to provide themselves with electricity through REA. But I want to emphasize that my objection is not to individual political activity on the part of REA members. That is their prerogative, and even their responsibility. But I would say this should be done on a personal level. I am sure that the rank and file of the REA membership would take this same position.

Efforts have been made in the past by persons using the REA as a political instrument to advance my position which has always been wholeheartedly in support of the REA program. I feel confident that Mr. Shriver would want to be fair and not permit himself to become unwittingly a party to such kind of misrepresentation.

Finally, Mr. Shriver makes certain statements concerning my position on the Idaho issue, particularly as it relates to the Douglas bill. I have not to this moment stated my position on the Douglas bill or on

Idaho's Newest Recreational Offering Is in Making as Palisades Dam Rises

PALISADES, April 10.—Idaho's newest recreational offering, now being planned in the mountains of the Idaho-Wyoming border, is in the making.

Where cattle now low in the pastured vales rimming the South park of the Snake river in southeastern Idaho, a 20-mile-long lake will rise sometime in 1937. The lake will be the great water reservoir of the Palisades dam, a multipurpose project now under construction near Irwin.

The new reservoir is a boon for boating enthusiasts of the region, and will provide a new fishing center. The lake will be flanked on the west by the Caribou mountains and on the east by the Snake river range. Now the heavily timbered mountains look down on bay fields along by the ponderosa snake, a picturesque mountain retreat where east Idahoans drive during the winter to watch an elk herd.

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Wildlife management refuge at Gray's lake. The lake extends from Bonanza into Caribou county in southeastern Idaho and offers an unusual opportunity for waterfowl conservation especially. Under the plan, 45,000 acre feet of storage for the Palisades reservoir would be set aside for replacement of Gray's lake storage now used in part by the Ft. Hall Indian reservation.

Actually, Palisades reservoir will raise Jackson lake and more appealing scenic spot. In the past the Wyoming lake, which contains an important share of Idaho's irrigation water, has fluctuated during the summer, sometimes revealing unsightly shores. Storage at Palisades reservoir will not only eliminate this most year. Palisades will take the brunt of the fluctuation now.

Although a sizeable portion of the shore will be sheer, bathing patrons particularly expect to find Palisades lake an accessible and effective spring board for their sport.

And already inquiries are mounting over cabin sites at or near the shore. The bureau of reclamation likely will turn over the area immediately around the shores to the U. S. forest service which will lease properties on the reservoir for summer home sites. The forest service

also likely will develop some public grounds around the sprawling lake. The south fork of the Snake is one of southeastern Idaho's most popular fishing streams in late summer and fall. With the beautiful north fork of the Snake for the angler's prize, Palisades lake will offer another new lake fishing hub and fishing on the south fork will improve because of less fluctuation in releases from upstream Jackson lake.

The fish and wildlife service has said there is little doubt that Palisades reservoir will produce some trout fishing, but it is believed that fluctuation of water level will be inimical to the maximum production of fish.

There will be some stocking of Palisades reservoir. The service also said releases from Palisades reservoir downstream likely will be the same as that now by Jackson lake and fish have been pleasantly prosperous under the Jackson lake system.

Convicts Fire Cells as Fight Is Continued

STILLWATER, Minn., April 11.—Small fires burned in cell blocks at Stillwater prison today as convicts smashed windows and shouted profanities at prison officials.

The prisoners had been locked in their cells before the rioting started at 9:15 a.m. Edwin T. Swanson, Maryland state penitentiary warden who accepted the job of Stillwater warden and took command of the riot-fighting prison at noon, told observers: "We're not going to be driven into a corner."

Swanson said the rioting was apparently being kept alive by a hard core of about 100 anti-social inmates, mostly psychopathic cases and sexual deviates.

Prison officials indicated they planned to move the rioting to the main cell block to solitary confinement. Rioting broke out when the prisoners were told they would be no further negotiations on a list of "grievances" such as requests for a prison commissary, better food, breakfast and bath twice a week.

Unrest began within the gray stone walls of the big prison on Tuesday, when the inmates refused to eat liver patties served at their noon meal.

The prisoners' "sit down" on their jobs in prison shops Tuesday afternoon but agreed to return to work the next morning after Acting Warden Carl Jackson promised to meet with a committee of 60 prisoner representatives to hear their "grievances."

Jackson, warden at Minnesota's St. Cloud reformatory, had taken over direction of Stillwater prison a few weeks earlier when Warden Leo Drecht quit. Drecht said he was "fed up with the way this institution is being pushed into state politics."

Commissioner Estimates \$83,000 Cost Of Public Health, Outlines His Stand

An estimated \$83,000 is spent by taxpayers for county public health service, according to Commissioner Chairman W. W. Hawkins. He says the commissioners are not trying to do away with public health service, but wish to eliminate unnecessary expenses, especially where the patient is capable of paying for himself.

Hawkins said the state legislature appropriated about \$900,000 for public health for two years. He said the county's share through its ad valorem tax would be one percent, or \$83,000 for the two years.

He said the federal appropriation for the taxpayers of the county, making a total of \$120,000 for two years, \$63,000 for one year.

Added to this \$83,000, one section of the county budget is \$125,000 for health, including salaries, plus another \$700 which covers other expenses. In addition, the county of Twin Falls has budgeted \$3,646 for its share in its agreement with the state health department. This money is for the sanitation, but it covers all health services for the county.

"This brings the total output by the taxpayers to \$208,646. To this the Twin Falls school district adds \$100,000 for its share during 1952. The money was placed in the health unit trust fund. The Twin Falls school district has budgeted \$1,100 for health service, including a part-time nurse. This makes a total of \$311,746, Hawkins says.

Hawkins noted about \$400,000 was sent to the state last year for salaries, however, such items as heat, light, electricity, telephone, janitor services and free rent are not specifically noted.

Hawkins pointed out that the health unit plans to move from the county building where it gets free rent. At the city hall, it will pay \$1,000 for its quarters, plus the cost of remodeling. He said the county did receive \$400,000 in cash from laboratory fees last year.

"Getting back in the 1953 budget for health service, the county lists \$1,500 or salaries, \$1,700 for other expenses, not including janitor, light, heat and free rent.

In 1952, the salary budget was \$12,500 and other expenses were \$2,700. The latter included janitor services and other items which could be eliminated. He said he would like to see a move to the old maternity building.

Get this writing business is about to get up. The boys at the T.V. have shown up for work on Monday from 12 noon Friday to Wednesday noon. We write our copy in long hand and they tell us to take their word for it. At least 38 hours to decipher our scribbling. If we want to have our TV set up and installed, we work we're tempted to entell with Sterling Larson at the Big college for a typing course—that is, if an eighth grade education would qualify us. (P. S. Still didn't get the copy 'til 5 p.m. Friday—T.N.)

The funny thing in this TV business—the more we realize that the grass is not as green as we once thought. Instead of 12- to 14-hour days, it's now 10 to 12. Our hair is getting greyer (what hair?) and our ulcers are getting larger; but if it takes 10 hours a day to get the job done—you can depend on us. It'll be done to the best of our ability. Our sack order for TV surveys and installations is piling up daily. I guess we've had our sleep.

After all this is supposed to be a question and answer so maybe we'd better take off on that tangent.

Q—What about writing distances from a TV screen?

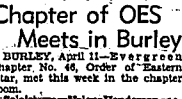

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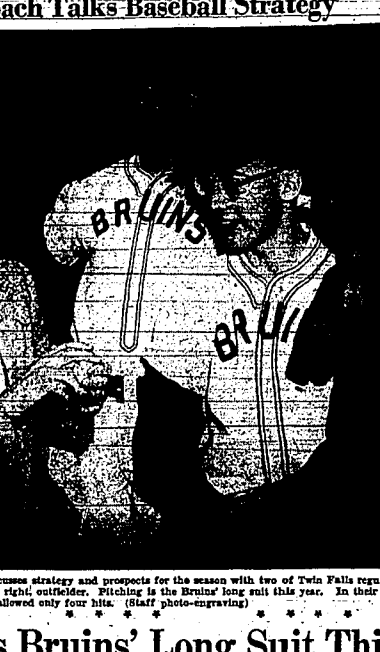

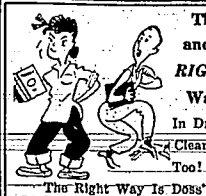

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

In the history of the settlement of Magic Valley, particularly the southern portion, members of the Mormon church have played leading parts. They were among the first settlers in the area, coming to what is now Cassia county from Tooele county, Utah, in 1870. The first organized church was at BAELEN, six miles south of OAKLEY. The church was formed in April, 1880, with W. C. Martindale as the presiding elder.

By the spring of 1881, there were 68 Mormon families, mostly from Tooele, residing in the part of Cassia county.

During 1881 Elder Herton D. Haight, Farmington, Utah, a pioneer, came to Oakley with his family. The Oakley first ward was organized with him as bishop. His jurisdiction was as broad as the boundaries of Cassia county. In April, 1887, at a conference in Oakley, the Cassia stake was organized with Haight as president, and Marston Fickert and William H. Hays as counselors. Also at this time wards were organized at ALBION with W. T. Hays as bishop, Elba Thomas Taylor, bishop; ALMO, Thomas K. G. bishop, and MARION, Asahel G. Smith, bishop.

In the spring of 1900, Haight, who had died in November, 1890, was replaced by William T. Coker, who was retained as a missionary in the center's states mission. The Cassia stake then included the territory from ALBION to OAKLEY, from Snake Lake county, Utah, and from the east-north line of Cassia county to the Idaho-Oregon boundary, and out to SIOGHONE and an Idaho prairie.

Under later 1899 Cassia county was an inland desert with the exception of the Mormon wards and settlements. All but one of them, Albion, had been settled and built by the Mormons.

After the advent of the railroad, new land was opened up south and north of Snake river. The TWIN FALLS tract and the TWIN FALLS North Side projects were formed. Both were a part of Cassia county as were the lands to the west in what is now Owyhee county. The Minidoka project on the south side had CROCKETT as its chief, and the North Side tract had RUFFERT.

Many of the first Burley settlers came from around Oakley, Elba and Almo. Lorenzo W. Robinson, then bishop of the Burley ward; Lawrence G. Kirkman, the Twin Falls; Joseph S. Swensen, the Burley; Lyman J. Johnson, Almo; MURTAUGH, and David E. Langston, ACCOITA. Increased population in the Burley ward called for additional wards so that the VIEW ward was organized with A. C. Woodbury as bishop; the PELLA ward with C. H. Smith as bishop; SPRINGDALE ward with J. H. Johnson as bishop; the UNITY ward with Lawrence G. Hays as bishop; and the SPARKS ward with a man by the name of Tilly as bishop.

The Cassia stake contained the same number of members in 1928 as it had in 1920 after the Boise, Salt River, Twin Falls, Blaine, Blaine and Minidoka stakes had been carved from the former territory.

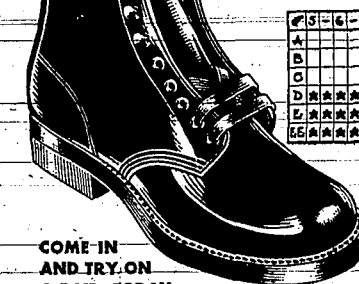

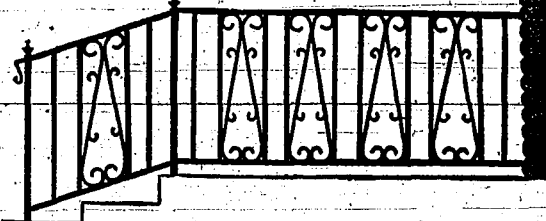

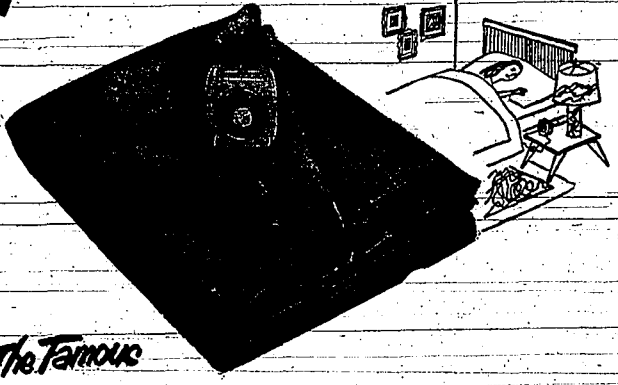

"To Have or to Be"

(Pastor of Methodist Church in
Lloyd Douglas' book, "The Robe")
The slave, Demetrius, pushed his way
through the crowd on Palm Sunday,
trying to see who was the center of
attention. He got close enough to
look upon the face of Jesus. Later
he was drunk. "Did you see
him? Close up!"
Demetrius nod-
ded.
"Close up!"
Demetrius shook
his head emphati-
cally.
"Close up!"
Demetrius, "Not a
king."
"What is he
then?" demanded
the other man.
"I don't know," Mr. MacArthur
summarized, "but he is
something more than a king!"
The whole philosophy of Jesus, as
summarized by the Palm Sunday
and entire Easter experience, is
philosophy of "something more."
Jesus is something more than a baby
in a manger; something more than
a boy in a temple; something more
than a carpenter in an obscure vil-
lage; something more than a "travel-
ing" teacher; something more
than a king.

He lay down; He was flogged and
he died; He was crucified and He
died—BUT MORE!
There was not a human emotion
in that stillness which Jesus did not
feel. Hunger, thirst, weariness; all
of the daily discomforts of life as
well as the anguish and pain of
crucifixion. Yet after almost 2,000
years, His life continues to exercise
entirely upon our lives. The calen-
dar under which we live is predi-
cated on His birth; the message
which He taught in provincial towns
and remote villages has reached the "utmost
parts" of the earth; and the fellow-
ship of believers which was so small
and apparently weak, now has to be
numbered in untold millions of
every race and nation.

Why should this be? Why to Him
and not to some of the other noble
religious men of the ages? He was
born of obscure parents in a tiny,
almost unknown village, and a de-
spised village at that. Why to Him
and not to any other boy of His own
city and time? The answer is to be
found in those characteristic words
of the Apostle Paul: "Some-
thing more!"
Wherever Jesus went; wherever
He ministered; wherever He found

human need, He was always "some-
thing more" than the ordinary, the
perfunctory, the expected. His whole
life was wrapped up in the business
of being, truth, beauty, good-
ness, holiness.

As against the tremendous pro-
gram of the Roman empire, that of
acquiring and possessing land and
power; as against the intricate sys-
tem of having a legal code and
system of religious belief; Jesus
lived His life of deeds and service.
For Him it was better to die than
to just talk about it; it was
better to BE love than to simply
practise about it.
When the Apostle Paul declared,
"For me to live is Christ!" he was
simply saying, to live is to BE the
qualities of life that Jesus was and
is. The deathless story of Jesus and
His death though He was crucified, dead
and buried. He lives and is alive
forevermore—"And because I live
ye too shall live!"
