Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

There is an old saying, "No house can hold two families." There is more than a grain of truth in it. No two women have the same ideas about running a house and managing children. When there are two mothers in one house, both trying to "make" people comfortable and happy, they are apt to quarrel, and all their good intentions go for naught. The situation reaches an intolerable stage.

The children bear the brunt of the debate. They have no real home. Home is far more than a shelter; it is a place for spiritual peace, a place where love and assurance can be depended on.

The house in which a constant feeling of doubt, where an atmosphere of worry and friction prevails, does not fulfill its chief function. It does not have that welcome atmosphere of security.

During the last war and, for that matter ever since, there has been a premium. Many young married people had to move into homes with their in-laws. Children were born and began life under crowded conditions. Though the younger family might have been welcome, their continued stay in many instances resulted in harsh relations. The affection the grandparents had for their grandchildren often caused differences of opinion, ending in friction and bickering.

Once a family has settled down to life with others, certain lines are formed. Nobody wants to hurt anybody else, especially older people who have been kind and have sacrificed their own comforts to help the younger people. But the children have to be considered, and also the association of the younger couple. It might be better in some cases for the young people to break away. The older people would do well to make it easy for them to go out on their own. For a time the separation may be felt, but soon the benefits of the break will show in the peace of both houses and the contentment of all concerned.

Grandparents will find that the young parents are able to manage their children successfully and the younger people may decide that the grandparents' experience has been worth their while. And strangely enough, it has happened that the separation of the families has brought about harmony. The young people are big enough to hold two families.

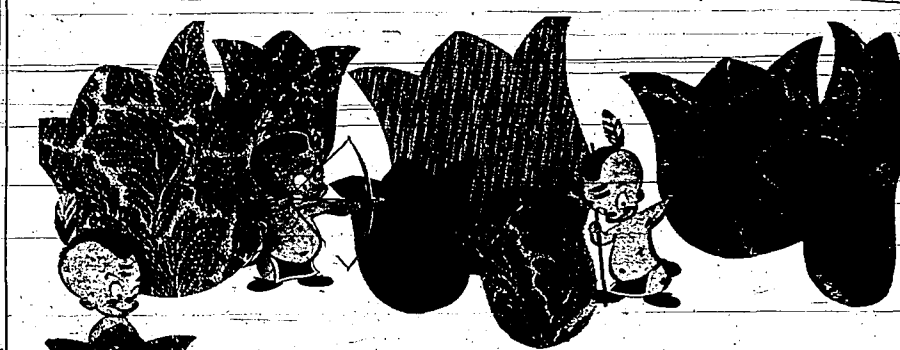



School Board Studies Budget, Sets Public Hearing April 27

(From Page One)

Plans for 1936-37 for the school board are to be discussed at a public hearing to be held at the end of the 1935-36 school year.

Budgeted expenses total \$1,000,888. As usual, instructional service is the largest single item in the budget. A total of \$537,815 is budgeted with \$453,515 allocated to pay teachers' salaries. For principal salaries, the budget totaled \$201,256.44 and increased to \$240,000 in the current budget. Pay for principals, supervisors, supplies and books complete the instructional service total.

A total of \$150,000 is allotted for general control which concerns the superintendent's office and administration.

These operations, with a new line school going into operation next fall, increases from \$39,500 to \$77,000. This includes fuel, power, water and janitors. Plant maintenance will take another \$38,500, a drop from \$70,000. The big difference is a decrease from \$13,500 to \$2,000 for repair of buildings. Insurance charges will take another \$6,253. Interest on bonds and payment of bonds will take an estimated \$62,100.

Transportation and miscellaneous expenses will take \$64,500 in the new budget. Principal salaries of that amount is \$47,000 for transportation, an increase of \$2,500 from the current year.

Capital outlays for heating, plumbing, electrical, furniture, building and Leon Penwick, Pocatello, physical education.

The board approved salaries for principals, supervisors, coaches and special instructors. Their pay was not covered in previous action acting a salary schedule.

It was voted to change the home economics course next year to a vocational setup in which the state will participate. Board members discussed the proposal thoroughly, and voted to try the new plan for one year.

Long lists of equipment, totaling some \$1,100 in value, were purchased for the agricultural farm shop. The items include hardware from Sears to power equipment. Recent lists for library shelving for use in the new building were rejected.

Action was taken on two matters pertaining to the Twin Falls Dental association. The group was granted permission to make a dental survey in Twin Falls schools in the near future for research purposes. The dentists will be working with the state department of public health. In the other matter, the board voted to ban candy sales in public schools. The dental group proposed the ban, pointing out that

... items are blessed for most dental decay.

Mrs. Beverly Cook was hired as new secretary by Arthur M. Kitching, assistant superintendent and director of curriculum.

The board voted to open the 1935-36 school year on Sept. 8, the day after Labor day. Registration will be conducted the previous week.

Supt. Ernest H. Haglund urged board members to participate in the education-business day in the schools April 21. The board also voted to change schools at noon that day.

Little-Known Air Research Base Next Door-by Jet Plane-From A-Test Area

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., April 14 (AP)—Right next door to Nevada's Yucca Flats—the jet bombers fly in this atomic age—the supersecret, superhighly classified, U. S. air force.

While the atom scientists in Nevada test the A-bomb again and again, at this sprawling base here in the heart of the Nevada desert are the scientists and military men are testing and perfecting a companion weapon, the high-speed flying jet bombers that some day may make possible plane speeds of 20,000 miles per hour or better.

Operations at this, the air force's most secret base, necessarily are cloaked under the strictest security. "This is the home of the air force flight test center (AFFTC). Its mission is to insure that America's planes and equipment, not only equal but exceed the effectiveness of any enemy in this time of jets and atom. Prototype models of every air force plane now in operation have been proved here before being mass-produced.

Each morning in this clear air, five hours after sunrise planes after planes soar up from the seven smooth miles of sunbaked clay making Rogers dry lake the world's longest natural runway. Soon the sky is criss-crossed with chummy, low trails as the aircraft, many of which they are invisible, are put through their paces.

Although testing aircraft is the main business, Edwards conducts nearly a score of collateral-test projects. It takes some \$500 per month—half million per month, half-million—to make the big base hum. Since the war it has become a city, with housing projects, a postoffice, shops—a bank, doctors—and gymnasiums.

Before World War II this place was wasteland. The only installation was a small army air operation camp on the edge of Rogers dry lake. Sometimes called "Rogers dry lake," it was used occasionally as a bombing range, came to life on week-ends when hot rod enthusiasts made the 100-mile trek from Los Angeles to conduct speed trials on the matchless lake bed. Later, when the need for a testing place for the hot planes needed

to fight World War II became apparent, the area was chosen as the most suitable.

Prime considerations were: weather, 95 per cent of the days suitable for flight; (2) absence of radioactivity, for security reasons; (3) access to transportation (Santa Fe railway tracks, soon to be rerouted, across the lake); (4) proximity to Los Angeles area aircraft plants, and suitability to terrain. The last is by far the most important.

Col. Fred J. Acand, deputy for operations at the base, describes the 13 by 8 miles lakes bed as a "God-given thing that would take many years and at least a billion dollars to duplicate."

It is not only the world's longest natural runway, but the 12 imperious clay surface is absolutely smooth and capable of bearing aircraft at any gross weight. And that's only half of it. Nature rearsures Rogers annually for free—by means of a migrating mud puddle.

There have been 300 emergency landings on the strip in the last five years. Annual himself has made three. He says several lives and 200 million dollars worth of aircraft have been saved in emergency landings which, attempted on a level field, might have ended in tragedy.

There have been fatal crashes, though. The base is named for Capt. Glen W. Edwards, Lincoln, Calif., fatally injured in the 1948 crash of a YB-49 flying wing.

Kidney Slow-Down May Bring Restless Nights

When kidney function slows down, many feel a sense of fatigue, headache, dizziness and loss of pep and energy. This is because the kidneys are the body's filter. Rogers dry lake was the scene of the first flights of the nation's early jet aircraft. The P-80 Shooting Star, the P-84 Thunderjet and the P-56 Mustang, many of MIGs in Korea, all had their trials here. So did the Interccontinental bomber, and the B-45 and the B-47, new jet bombers.

The three American planes cracked the speed of sound to level flight all turned the trick here.

In 1941 Maj. Charles Yeager, piloting the rocket-powered Bell X-1, made history by becoming the first human to fly at well above the speed of sound. Last year test pilot Bill Bridgman, at the controls of the Douglas F-106-II, flew 1,238 miles per hour to 79,494 feet to set speed and altitude records. Performance

details of the third space-age craft, Republic's combat-type XP-51, have not been released.

After initial testing by their makers, all such research craft are turned over to the national advisory committee for aeronautics (NACA), a federal agency coordinating airplane research for all the armed services. The NACA has its own hangar and facilities at Edwards where it conducts the flying laboratories with nearly a ton of special instruments to obtain flight data.

Speed for speed's sake is not the aim of the men who test. They're interested in getting information about such things as:

Turbulence and drag through the sonic wall; the relative merits of straight, swept and delta wings; the merits of thick versus thin wings; aerodynamic loading; stability; power systems for controls; and the problem of re-energizing against heat at high speeds.

The X-1, still being tested after

five years, was designed to obtain aerodynamic information about the problem of cracking the sonic barrier. Next the NACA wanted a ship which would fly for long periods near the speed of sound. The result was the Douglas D-558-1 Skyrocket, with straight, stubby wings and turbo-prop engines. It was flown extensively before a successor, the D-558-II Skyrocket, with swept wings, came along.

Besides the big job, testing planes, nearly a score of collateral activities are conducted at Edwards.

"My man in tests is the pilot. Once he's assigned to a plane it's his baby throughout all phases. His responsibility is heavy. The pilot study calculus, engines and aerodynamics among other subjects during a six-month course at the air force test pilot school on the base.

The pilots, already blessed with the world's longest runway, soon will have one even better. An expansion program currently under way will ultimately give Edwards nearly three miles north of the present operations center and increasing the base's holdings from 24,000 to 30,000 acres.

Construction on the biggest project, a new strip, begins this month. When completed it will give the flyers and engineers a dream field—12 unobstructed miles in length.

Hunters Nab Rattlesnakes In Oklahoma

WAYNOKA, Okla., April 14 (AP)—An estimated 10,000 snake hunters gathered in the hills around Waynoka and brought back over a thousand alive.

The hunt kicked off the "rattlesnake season" in Oklahoma and was followed next week by the annual Snake Creek round-up in Okemah, Okla., rather than round-up considered the daddy of them all.

As certain as the coming of spring, each year thousands of hunters and expert snake handlers from all over the nation pack the hills north of western Oklahoma communities to western Oklahoma hills and capture the rattlesnakes. Dangerous? Yes, but not as bad as they may sound.

Hunters who wouldn't come within a country mile of their fangs in summer and fall know they can battle it out on even terms in April and come out ahead, alive, and usually unharmed.

The snakes are emerging from a wintering sleep and are groggy. As Merlin Camp, secretary of the Waynoka Snake Club, which sponsors the annual event, put it: "How would you feel after a good, long sleep? Like pretty much of a dead head?"

So the hunters stalk the dens with their little forked sticks—snake-bite shields and suction cups are standard equipment with every group—and catch the reptiles nibbling their hands.

Snakes are not injured, because hunt officials will pay only for the live variety—50 cents a pound.

Snakes Sold

The Waynoka group then sells the snakes for the same prices to Arthur Shedd, L. A., who resells them to zoos and animal parks. A few are sold to the rare delicacies in the "caviar set."

Camp admitted frankly his digestion and rattlesnake steak don't get along.

"It wouldn't be bad if you didn't know what you were eating," he confided. "Tastes like shrimp. But I guess I'm mentally allergic to them."

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Malenkov's First Purge Now Under Way, Reporter Asserts

By LEON DENNEN

NEW YORK (NEA)—The first purge of the Malenkov government is under way in Russia.

It seems so far to be directed at followers and policies of the late Joseph Stalin.

Latest Stalinist to be reported to have "disappeared" is Alexander N. Pokrovsky, who was the dictator's personal secretary.

It seems likely that he has been purged like Sergey D. Ignatiev, the godfather in the fantastic plot of the "doctors." Ignatiev—a faithful follower of Stalin, chief of the ministry of state security, is charged with concealing "false charges against Jewish doctors to inflame nationalistic hostilities."

I wrote immediately following the

death of Stalin that we must look to the first purge to give us a clue to the direction Russia would take. Doubtless there are no less than victims of the initial "cleansing" but already certain policy lines are appearing.

1. The followers and policy of Stalin are being treated by the new rulers of Russia with something less than reverence—there appears almost a pattern to cut Stalin down to mortal size.

2. Lavrenti Beria, chief of the secret police, is emerging as a strong man—perhaps, the strongest man in the new setup.

Beria's rise is all the more astonishing when it is recalled that he was on the decline when Stalin died. "Some close associates of Sta-

lin's history are already saying that Beria died just in time to save Beria's skin."

Beria had been marked originally as the goat in the doctors' plot. His police were castigated by Stalin's press for failing to apprehend the doctors who were allegedly plotting to kill Soviet leaders.

Recent events even put a question mark on Stalin's death for some observers. Did Stalin die a natural death or did Beria have a hand in his sudden passing?

Fantastic? Not if you know the history of red Russia. The late Beria, in his ruthless climb to power, actually poisoned the ailing Lenin. Trotsky was assassinated in Mexico at Stalin's behest.

Beria seems to have put the finger on Ignatiev, who had acquired enormous power in Russia under the guidance of Stalin. Ignatiev was chief of the MVD, ministry of state security, which was closely

connected with the red army. Officially he was Beria's subordinate but actually, with the help of the army and Vyacheslav M. Molotov, he had begun to challenge Beria's power.

Now he stands accused of "political blindness and gullibility," serious offences in the Soviet lexicon.

And now come information that Pokrovsky has not been seen publicly since Stalin died. He was the only man Stalin trusted completely. He handled Stalin's secret promises.

He worked closely with Molotov and Nikolai Yezhov in planning the great purges of 1936-38. At the congress of the Russian Communist party last October he was re-elected to the party central committee.

Ignatiev, once a high official in the Soviet hierarchy, told me that every detail of Yezhov's rise to the top was planned by Stalin personally. After the purge

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New "Voice of America" Chief Charts Tough Course in Work

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Robert H. Johnson, the general manager who led the nation's largest radio network into the new world of the Voice of America, has charted a course for the new chief of the national broadcast.

"We must give our fundamental belief in the worth of the individual. We must stress the importance of religion in our national life. We are now going to tell the people behind the iron curtain about the wonders of our democratic institutions and standards of living."

Johnson, who has been chief of the Voice of America since 1938, has given many an interview during his career. He has been a speaker at many of the national conferences of the Voice of America, and he has been a member of the board of directors of the Voice of America since its inception.

Johnson is no stranger to government organization. He headed the Citizens Committee for the Hoover Report, a nation-wide organization of average citizens who backed the sweeping federal reorganization program advanced by former President Hoover.

In his new post Johnson has some pretty strong ideas about what the VOA should do.

"I must reach the minds of the peoples of the world," he said, "and teach them the difference between the VOA and the rest of the world and the way people live behind the iron curtain."

"It's a very difficult job," he conceded. "For one thing, he pointed out, there is no way for Americans to know just how effective the Voice of America can be in the battle for the world's mind."

The VOA, most widely publicized but not the most important part of the VOA operation, was set up in 1940 along with the other functions of the VOA.

"I'm going to make the VOA a newspaper, magazine, book and motion picture organization plus an educational exchange program."

The VOA's main task is to create a better understanding of the United States in other countries, and to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries.
