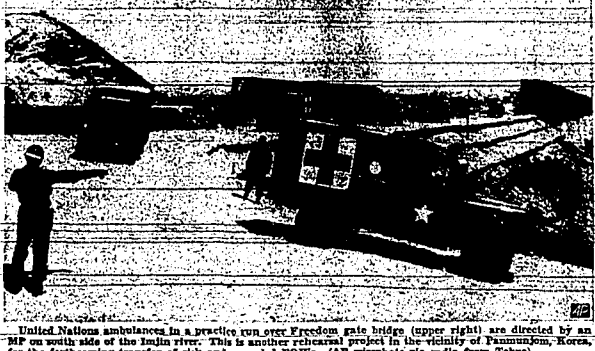
# Drop in Wheat Crop Expected

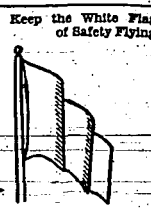

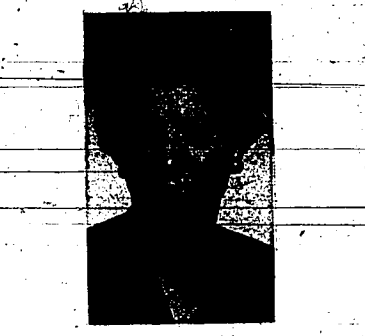

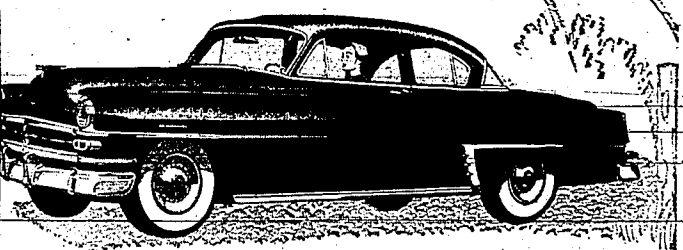

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The first three months of the 82nd Congress have seen only 12 measures enacted by law. Only one of these was included in the President's list of 11 measures he is expected to sign on the 1st of July. Proposed cuts made in the Truman-prepared budget for the fiscal year aren't big enough to satisfy congressional economists. Elia Eisenhower cabinet officers have now submitted estimates on how much they would be able to save.

For these six departments the budget would save over \$4 billion dollars. The revised estimates cut this by \$180 million—dollars which is a lot of money—but only a little over 10 per cent of the total.

A similar cut all across the board on the "79 billion-dollar" budget would mean savings of around 8 billion dollars.

Rep. John Taber, chairman of the House appropriations committee, is now talking about a cut of 12.5 billion—or 80 per cent more than the department heads are recommending. The civilian departments aren't able to cut more, it will mean the military will have the largest per cent cut. This is the indicated cut to date.

### ADENAUER'S PLEA

West German Chancellor Adenauer, the newest of our European visitors, is one of the staunchest advocates of unity for Europe.

This concern for this goal is not wholly surprising, though Adenauer is widely regarded as one of the most "European-minded" of all statesmen in the free world today. He greatly fears for the future of his country if it should be allowed to slide back into isolation from the west.

Though Adenauer's trip here was long planned, it takes on added meaning for Germany in the light of the fast-developing Soviet peace offensive. For he is alarmed at the prospect West Germany might suffer from a possible new agreement between Russia and the western powers.

A hard-headed statesman, Adenauer believes that Germany's only road back to strength and dignity on the continent lies in its close linking with France, Britain and the United States.

He knows a restored German unity on Russian terms would mean not fruitful partnership with Moscow but domination by the Kremlin.

He is distrustful as well of more disarming Soviet proposals for German unity which would seemingly preserve his country's independence. For he sees as the inevitable end to the European armistice pact (already approved by the lower houses of the Bonn parliament) and the withdrawal of allied forces from German soil.

It would be no comfort that Russian troops also would be taken out, since they would be stationed on the Polish-German and Czech-German borders. On the other hand, the urge would strengthen for American forces back across the Atlantic and British armies across the channel.

The net result, as Adenauer sees it, would be a perilous kind of solitary independence that would be no spur to the needed growth of freedom-loving elements in Germany.

Fundamentally, Adenauer seeks reassurance from America that the work which will make no agreements with Russia which will put Germany under Moscow's long shadow.

### SOUTH CONSERVATIVE

With respect to 1950, however, influential southern leaders admit their attitude will be one of watchful waiting. The political leadership includes almost all the governors and the majority of congressmen who are running for re-election in 1950. The anti-Smitheans, Russell and George, Glenn, Byrd, Virginia; Kennon, Kentucky; and others.

Assuming Eisenhower has a fairly successful four years, and in view of his friendships and patronage favors toward this section, he may have an excellent chance of duplicating the success of Truman.

Dixie is definitely hostile to the dominant liberal wing of the Democratic organization—namely, the New Deal. It is becoming more industrialized and urbanized every day. It is conservative territory.

### SCIENTIFIC OBJECTIVES

In the dawn hours, a citizen of Las Vegas may be awakened by the rattling windows, or a quick, bright flash in the sky is now the shattering power of the atom bomb, exploding 40 miles away, intrudes itself upon him.

The bomb is the terrifying product of intense searching by the greatest scientific brains in the world. And that the work still uses war, the scientists could not escape the compulsions of this quest. They had to make the bomb if they could.

No windows rattle in Pittsburgh. There is no bright flash, followed by streaming black heavens proclaiming the event.

Still, the scientist is working there, too. In a different way, a quieter way. Tucked away in a college laboratory amid the masculine clamor of steel-making, he is patiently hunting the elusive chemical combinations that may cure or ease some of man's most troublesome diseases. And he is finding them.

Two weeks ago Dr. Jonas Salk, 38, a University of Pittsburgh scientist, announced a new experimental vaccine that appears to be highly effective in preventing all three major kinds of the dreaded polio.

Now Dr. Salk speaks again, telling us he has found a potent vaccine that gives long-lasting protection against influenza, one of the worst epidemic diseases medical men must battle.

Work remains to be done before these vaccines may be safely mass-produced for the general public. But Dr. Salk and his associates seem headed down the right path.

What they are doing may not rouse the Pittsburgher from his sleep. But it might shake the world.

### THE PULPIT AND THE PRESS

The general uproar which followed Rep. Harold Velde's speech in the House on the un-American activities would investigate possible subversion among the clergy apparently has not been in the Velde's mind. In a speech delivered Saturday at Cleveland, Velde said he is just as interested as ever in looking for communists in the nation's pulpits and he said the "my" question is not far off.

Velde acknowledged that his committee—which is now busily occupied at ferreting out communist sympathizers in the schools—does not have the authority to investigate freedom of thought in the pulpit. He neglected to delineate the point at which the investigation of subversion ends and the investigation of religious freedom begins, but we will assume, and hope, that he has marked out such a point and will not go beyond it.

In the same speech, Rep. Velde made a rather interesting statement which he called the "left wing" press for allegedly twisting his March 9 announcement of church probes. He was asked by a reporter if he planned to investigate the newspapers. No, Velde replied, the press did not offer a good field for investigation.

The readers are capable of judging their "mis" and "misquotations," he said, and his committee wouldn't have to.

### Road Burden Explained to Club Meeting

Problems and limitations hampering state and city highway departments were explained at meeting of the Twin Falls Exchange club by Norman Crowley, city engineer, Tuesday night.

Crowley, making a recent state highway report, said 90 per cent of roads in the Idaho highway system are in good condition. 73 per cent are in fair shape, 21 per cent are in bad shape and 6 per cent bad.

About 200 million dollars will be needed in the next 10 years to correct existing and expected highway deficiencies. However, only about 40 million dollars will be available for highway purposes. Crowley pointed out only 60 cents per capita is spent on Idaho highways while surrounding states spend from 87 to 90 per cent on their highways. He said the Idaho highway situation is no worse than many other states, but increased revenues must be found to meet increasing highway needs.

Crowley concluded by saying the present financing method is all that the state can ever expect to raise enough money to meet highway needs.

### Troubles and Boon Seen in Usage of Gas

McCALL, April 15—A public health task force predicted Thursday that proposed bringing of natural gas to the Pacific northwest will speed industrial development and increase production of air pollution.

The report was heard at the seventh semi-annual meeting of the association of Oregon sanitary engineers, in control of the Columbia health agency committee.

Curtis M. Swartz, chief engineer of the Oregon sanitary engineers, led the discussion on air pollution.

The group heard a report of a leak in gas on watered pipes and voted to have the unit certified and notified to domestic water supply.

Following discussion of the sewage disposal problems of Grand Coulee, Washington, was a report of U. K. public health service and Washington state health department officials would meet with officials of the city.

John D. Walker of the county corps of engineers discussed the use of backwater from Albert Falls dam in north Idaho affecting the Bunker Point sewage system. Idaho Public Health Engineer, H. C. Glavin said the state would attempt to arbitrate differences between the city and the corps of engineers so that some compensation should be paid.

Glavin said he thought Priest River also would be affected seriously.

The group recommended that the city and sanitary engineers study to determine what causes the death of salmon, game and ducks at the mouth of the Clearwater river in Lake Coeur d'Alene.

The next meeting will be held Nov. 3 and 4 in Yakima, Wash.

### Waking up Is True Shock; Study Shows

**SALT LAKE CITY, April 13 (U.P.)**—You feel that just as you wake up you may be shocked? Science finds you may be right.

The evidence comes from a brilliant new method of measuring the amount of potent hormones turned out by your adrenal glands.

It finds the glands put out a surge of hormones when people wake up to face a new day.

And, a kind of stress or shock-like cold, fear, anger or the invasion by germs—does exactly the same thing to these glands, which lie above the kidneys. They turn out more cortisone and some other hormones to help you meet the stress. At the same time your number of white blood cells, which fight infection, drop for awhile.

**Not Yet Proved**  
It isn't proved that just waking up is a stress that kicks up hormones. There may be some other reason for the higher level of hormones when the alarm clock goes off or you naturally come awake.

This is just a slight, though, to the deeper significance of the new method of measuring these vital hormones in the blood. The test was developed by Dr. Leo T. Samuels and Don Nelson of the University of Utah medical school, and described Tuesday to science writers visiting research centers in a tour organized by the American Cancer society.

**New Test**  
It is a good new test to detect borderline cases of Addison's disease, caused by worn-out or withdrawn adrenal glands. This can be traced by giving extra cortisone.

It also gives a way of measuring differences in adrenal hormones in health and sickness, including cancer of the adrenals. It also shows that the cortex or outer layer of the adrenals produces only a few hormones, not 25 as had been thought.

**Dr. Samuels also reported** finding three out of five cases of chemical organizers—necessary for manufacture of adrenal-cortical and male sex hormones out of simpler substances. This knowledge may provide anti-chemicals useful in stopping overproduction of some hormones. There is evidence that too much of some hormones is involved in bringing on some cancerable cells—either a preventive or treatment.

During four months of route surveying and driving, 15 trucks and 187 officially designated cars traveled 424,871 miles without an accident or even a scratch or a dent of any kind. This is the equivalent of one car driving an average of 1000 miles per year for 42 1/2 years without an accident."

### Disturbed Years Lie Ahead for Unions, Industry, Management Consultant Says

MONTECLAIR, N. J., April 23 (AP)—Disturbed years lie ahead for big unions and big management alike, says F. Drucker, chief of the American management consultant firm.

Replying to questions about the future of labor-management outlook, Drucker predicted unrest within the labor movement itself and a general decline in the demand for more-skilled and -trained workers.

He vented his 10-year forecast: "A complete labor-management leadership. The fight for succession to the old-guard leadership now being won by young men who are not in a group in which politics is more personal, intense and vigorous than in the union. The new leaders, to prove themselves, will be aggressive and militant."

2. Barring further major inflation, unions will not gain much in wage rates. They will meet stiff resistance from management and from public opinion. Unions will be left out of the picture, but they will turn on the pressure for the guaranteed annual wage, pending health insurance, health insurance, and unless a depression occurs, the big unions will make gains in their status.

3. Management will operate in a labor shortage. One reason is the low birth rate of the 1930's. Because of that, twice as many men will leave the country's labor force by retirement each year of the next six years as enter it by reaching working age.

4. Another cause of the impending labor shortage is the tremendous productivity of technological change. New methods are bursting upon industry every month. They require highly trained and educated people, thousands more than schools can supply.

5. There is a revolutionary change in the requirements for skill and training," Drucker said. "In those areas in which industry really needs people most, the man who has completed just look at the newspaper want ads. No unskilled people needed."

"The labor force is being pulled out of the unemployment lines by the hard for management to resist the union pressure for benefits other than wages," Drucker said.

"During the last 20 years the average wage rate has not increased very much faster than the cost of living," he said. "But unskilled people have been getting ahead and wage rates for unskilled people proportionately have been falling behind."

"The labor force has today the lowest differential between skilled and unskilled wage rates of any industrial country. But over the next 10 years this is to be reversed—and fairly rapidly."

"Asked what advice he would give to management, Drucker said: "To management—start work right away on the difficult job of getting the facts and figures needed to develop a predictable employment and income plan to satisfy the unions' guaranteed annual wage demands. But such a plan must not leave the company so much bound financially it cannot adapt to changes in technology and business conditions."

"This is one area where management can't afford to handle labor relations the way it usually handles them—that is, without any real relations of facts and figures, by first saying no to whatever the union demands and then coming in and accepting some compromise."

learned something about running a union. The locals, for instance, have an extremely short officer tenure; and this is encouraged by the top leadership. Drucker said he often is surprised by business friends who think the unions have scored great gains in recent years.

"The labor movement has not been advancing since about the latter part of the war," he said. "Actually it has been losing ground because our work force has increased about one-fifth and union membership has not increased."

"Neither the public nor management understands that there has been a shift in the center of gravity from the CIO to the AFL. The AFL is twice as large as the CIO. The CIO makes the headlines; the AFL makes the gains. The CIO worker is where he was. The AFL worker has significantly improved his lot. There is every indication that this will continue."

Drucker is skeptical on possible amalgamation of the two big union groups.

### Big Veterans Groups Aroused Over Proposals for VA Trims

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The big veterans organizations are hitting the lobbying over congressional proposals to cut some economic benefits from the multi-million-dollar veterans benefits program.

They are striking especially for a fight against moves by Rep. John Phillips, R.-Calif., and Ohio Sen. Thomas D. Egan, to put more strict limits on free hospital care for veterans with ailments not due to military service.

Phillips, chairman of an appropriations subcommittee handling funds for the veterans administration, has charged that hundreds of such veterans who could pay for private medical care are getting it free, instead, at VA hospitals.

House members, ever anxious to save on the tax year for veterans and other economic advocates. "They are not anti-veteran," said Rufus Wilson, Amvets legislative director. "Sure, they are looking for ways to balance the budget. They want the fat and the frills cut-out of

the veterans program. So do we." The National Veterans 135,000 members, sounded the GI battle cry in its current issue, calling Phillips for "every interference and misstatement" in a speech to the house.

In an editorial the paper also warned congressmen they will commit "political suicide" if they support a proposal by Texas Rep. Oscar Cox to cut off free hospital care for veterans whose ailments aren't service-connected and who amass \$4,000 yearly or more.

"The veterans administration is over-investigated and under-financed," the paper said. "What it needs is enough money from congress to do what the American people want it to do."

Reichum said VFW will correct abuses of the veterans hospital privileges wherever found. But he said Phillips, in calling attention to the house to a number of specific cases, "may have let the cat out of the bag as the next logical step by the congress group—to shut off compensation for men disabled in service who nevertheless are able to earn some income."

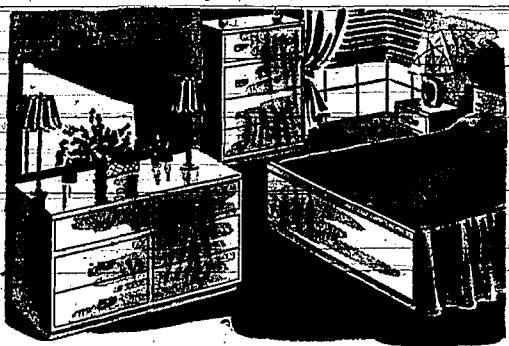
