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FRENCH ARE DREAMERS

The French people may only dimly perceive it, but in the eyes of other world nations they have arrived at a crucial crossroads in their history.

By any strict measure, France is not a great industrial nation nor a first-rank military power. Yet the French are desperately fighting to maintain the posture of a great power.

Almost petulantly, they are demanding of other free countries that France be accorded the influence of a great nation, though they are not demonstrating it has the substance.

This dream world cannot endure. Either the French must develop the substance of greatness, or they must expect to see their world influence drop off until it more nearly matches their present moderate power.

Many students of modern France concur in this: The French never really embraced the industrial revolution.

In many ways, French industry and agriculture are antiquated. The French economy is saddled with incredible numbers of middlemen who add to the price of goods without performing much useful service. Labor unions block technical progress.

The French evidently were happier as an artisan people. Their golden age was the 19th century, before the French intrusion of the machine interrupted the sunny felicity of French living. They appear to resent all that has happened since. They dwell longingly upon the past; their faces are turned toward it.

Yet the circumstances of history cast the French in a powerful role in the modern world. Their vast empire, their vast lands and sapped their manpower. Somehow, though, the illusion of strength remained. Only when the Nazis poured through the Sedan gap in World War II did the world come to understand how weakly founded was French power.

Since that conflict ended, the French have clung hard to the outward signs and symbols of their former position. America and the other free lands have generously encouraged French influence in high councils in the hope of setting France on the path to greater strength.

Fundamentally, the problem has not changed in 50 years. The French still are not acting to make themselves a truly modern industrial power. They go on savoring the past, striving for the simple life of pleasure in a world apart from clanking machines and grimy soot.

Complacency is chilling the warmth of this life. Today, France's trust funds, America and Britain, are not so eager to lend aid any more; they have watched the French put off their test too long. Germany, hated and feared, has risen from war to new strength and once again casts the French in shadow.

No longer can they muster the power that goes with their might. Their only hope of solid greatness lies in partnership with all the free lands, including Germany itself.

If the French now shrink from this, if they shrink again at this late hour from the industrialism they have shunned, they may awake one day not far distant to see that they are no longer the power they once were, as an old orange dries and cracks. The reckoning for France cannot be put aside forever.

ROBERTSON'S BACKGROUND

The appointments involved selection of men to be the general communications commissions. It is generally recognized that the personnel and philosophy of the members of the organization will determine future administration policies quite as effectively as legislation enacted on Capitol Hill. Their everyday decisions affect industry operations.

The opposing candidates for FCC had been Jeff Robertson, the president of the Kansas corporations commission, and Willard W. Gatchell, New York, now counsel to the FCC.

Robertson had the backing of Senator Carlrom, Kansas, an original "lib" roter, and of C. Wesley Roberts, a former Republican national chairman. Gatchell had the backing of Senator Charles McNary, New York. An outside entry was John C. Doerfer, Wisconsin, a member of the Wisconsin public utilities commission.

Robertson's first problem was political. The Roberts scandal, which forced his resignation as national chairman, made it embarrassing to honor his protégé, McNary. The latter's conservative views on federal regulation of gas rates and his opposition to the St. Lawrence seaway and power development antagonized the Albany dynasty.

CRITICISM OF PARTY - But Dewey's supposed influence at Washington has provoked sharp criticism within the party, especially among the labor faction. Former Rep. Leonard W. Hall, New York, at Robertson's successor, figuring him to be a Dewey man, also economically.

So, rejecting both Robertson and Gatchell, Eisenhower picked a man from the power-and-gas-conscious northwest, pre-eminently the former Secretary McNary. McNary's former governor of Oregon; he knew of Robertson's work on the Washington public service commission. Doerfer was named to the FCC.

ONE WAYWARD STAR

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One star failed to appear as expected in an astronomical observation more than two years ago and calculations about the universe have been almost revolutionized as a result.

The new evidence in the wayward star was reported yesterday from Pasadena, Calif., home of the California Institute of Technology, owner of the famous 200-inch Palomar telescope. Walter Baade, Palomar astronomer, said the failure of the star to appear on schedule proved that there are two species of "yardstick" stars - dim ones and bright ones. Previously, scientists had thought there was only one kind of yardstick star to measure the movements and distances of the partly-comprehended universe.

Using their revised tools of calculations, scientists have decided:

"That the universe is four billion years old, not two billion as previously supposed.

"That astronomers can observe eight times as much of the universe as they previously thought possible.

"That the Palomar telescope has penetrated one billion, not one hundred million, light years into space and has yet to reach the outer limits of creation."

"That the universe is expanding only half as fast as previously thought."

These and other conclusions, forcing science into new channels of investigation and hypothesis, resulted from the unexpected behavior of one tiny speck of light in the vast, unfathomed universe.

The giant lens of Mount Palomar continues a hunt to probe through space. No doubt it will find new discrepancies to baffle the calculation of men. And when it has probed as far as it can reach, this tremendously useful tool of science will come to the end of its utility - but not to the end of the mystery that every uninitiated child sees in the limitless sky. - Lewiston Tribune.
