### Threat to Forests Is Called Grave

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—The threat to the nation's forests is being called "grave" by the U. S. Forest Service, which today announced that it has received reports from its field offices that the "fastest moving and most serious" forest fire in the country's history is now active in the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument in southern Utah.

The fire, which started on April 19, is now burning in an area of 10,000 acres and is threatening 100,000 acres of forest. The fire is being fought by 1,000 men and 100 pieces of equipment.

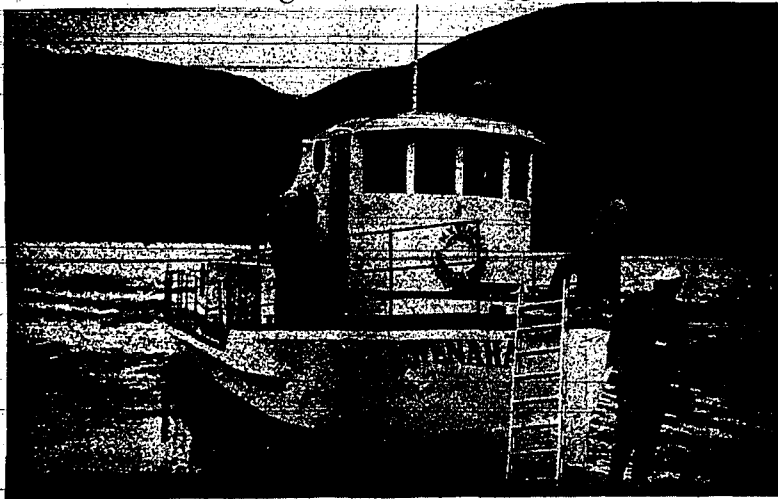

### Boat Carries Passengers, Mail Into Rugged Hells Canyon

### Famed Hells Canyon Ranks High in Gem State's List of Scenic Attractions

Lewiston, April 22 (AP)—Boat trips on Snake river from Lewiston offer a thrilling overnight journey of approximately 25 miles through Hells canyon area to Johnson's bar and the head of navigation.

This is the time of year the boatmen consider the trip the most spectacular for sightseers because the Snake ordinarily is at flood stage during April and May, although regular trips are made weekly the year around. And, nine out of 10 persons at the Lewiston Chamber of Commerce ask for information about the boat trip.

The excursion is one of the few of its kind in the United States and certainly one of Idaho's most attractive adventures for anyone who has not seen this winding section of Snake river.

Records have not been kept to determine the extent of annual travel but demand increases each year for passenger service on the scenic route. Some people from distant points may not seem exactly sure about Idaho's location, but they are fully aware of the fact that Snake river runs through the state and that Hells canyon is "something to see."

The river gorge, laced with limestone bluffs and monumental pinnacles, is almost 2,000 feet between Lewiston where the elevation is 725 feet, and the site of the proposed Hells canyon dam, elevation 3,075 feet.

Wild life is abundant along the rugged, primitive canyon walls. Elk, deer, bear, Canadian ronzor geese and other game are frequently seen. As higher elevations are reached, mountain goats stand watch on craggy peaks or feed in grassy ravines high above the shoreline.

Table lands reach down to the river here the gorge widens enough to provide scattered ranches for sheep and cattle ranches. Miners' claims and cabins dot the shoreline in the higher elevations where deposits of zinc, lead and copper are known to exist and the color of precious metals is occasionally seen.

Steep walls of the canyon rise higher above the river than the famous Grand canyon of Colorado. To the east are the Seven Devils mountains, a precipitous group of snow-capped peaks. Beyond the west bank lie the Wallowa mountains of Oregon, another imposing range that towers more than 4,000 feet above the river bed.

Since the area is so steep and difficult to travel, ranchers and prospectors depend on river boat service from Lewiston or chartered plane flights. Only a few pack trails lead out of the area of the gorge above the mouth of the Grand Ronde, Imnaha and Salmon rivers, which the boat passes on its trips.

For weeks at a time, the only contact with the outside world for those living there is a brief visit with the river boat pilot carrying their mail and freight.

Travel upstream at this time of the year is made at a speed of about six miles an hour. Daylight hours are not long enough for a night's sleep about 20 miles short of reaching Johnson's bar, is like a toboggan ride downstream.

Boats come back to Lewiston at a rate of about 25 miles an hour. Where the trip up the river requires from 12 to 20 hours, depending on the river level, the return trip is made in six or eight hours.

The whitewater have occurred at boats in recent years, although the Lower Cottonwood rapids is ever-threatening to even the most experienced pilots. This is one of the narrowest passes the boat must make in the gorge between the neck of the Imnaha river and Hells canyon lodge.

Lower Cottonwood rises about five feet in less than 200 yards when the river is at its highest flood stage. Powerful diesel motors have power to spare but it takes skillful "reading" and quick hands at the wheel for the pilot to keep the prow of his boat precisely where he wants it in order to climb the great, glassy sweep of billowing water faced at this point.

Four boats are now berthed at Lewiston for the freight, passenger and mail trips.

The Wenaha and Imnaha are operated on the mail contract and carry passengers. The Wenaha is a 22-foot, diesel-powered vessel with a well-equipped galley and sleeping accommodations aboard for the overnight stay. The Wenaha, operated by Inland Navigation company, leaves Lewiston each Wednesday at 6 a. m. It returns at about 4 p. m. Thursday. The Imnaha, an inboard "sea sled," is operated by the same company.

A river packet, the Idaho, is operated by John Olney, Lewiston. This boat is chartered often by groups of passengers and also hauls freight in and out for ranchers.

The Flier, speedy cabin cruiser, also is available for charter to the Hells canyon lodge.

Fishing in creeks and rivers tributary to Snake is good in many places. Steadhead are still running and sturgeon are caught frequently in this area.

## Answer Filed In Death Suit

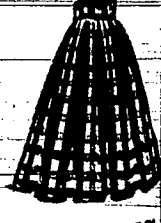

### Photography Use In Snow Surveys Cited at Meeting

BOISE, April 22.—Snow surveys have come a long way since the days of Gray Eagle, the horse that was snowed out.

Now, it's a matter of how close you can fly by a mountain to photograph a snow depth.

Edward F. Nelson, regional director of the bureau of reclamation, told the winter snow conference here Monday that Gray Eagle, a horse that was fitted with snowshoes for surveys made on the Yakima, Wash. project around 1910.

The two-foot square wooden blocks enabled him to carry his riders over the mountain in the winter. They estimated the next spring's water supplies by scooping snow in a bucket and melting it to determine the water content.

Now, he told the snow surveyors, meteorologists, hydrographers and others attending the conference, they must determine not only how much water the snow will produce, but, he said, the huge reservoirs can be used to control the rivers.

### Wooley Going Into Federal Post With Good State Mark

The new direction as to any changes in the administration of some 186 million acres of federal land, most of it in the 11 western states, under the BLM. The BLM has a heavy backlog of various kinds of applications. In Idaho alone more than 900 desert entry applications are awaiting adjudication. Increased irrigation by wells has made it feasible to farm land previously used only for grazing. Wooley is certain to look into the situation to see whether the backlog could be cut down by having more men in the district offices and fewer on the regional staffs.

Wooley is a "middle-of-the-road" man when it comes to turning over public lands to private ownership. Revenue from Idaho's state lands is \$1.5 million a year. He is 60 years old and operates an 800-acre farm in southeastern Idaho, part of it irrigated and the dryland planted to wheat. Federal officials working with him on the land subcommittee of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee rate him a top administrator. ### Former POW Promotes Self To U. S. Rolls

**FREEDOM VILLAGER**, April 22 (AP)—Pfc. Tibor Rubin, Long Beach, Calif., promoted himself to be an American citizen while he was a prisoner of the Reds. He hopes Uncle Sam will confirm the promotion when he gets home.

Survivor of 14 months in a hard concentration camp in Hungary during World War II, Rubin had been in the United States 15 months when he entered the American army.

“He was serving with the first cavalry division when he was captured.

**Kids Found Out**

The communists found out he was a native Hungarian, he said, and urged him to write on prison rosters that he is one. He always wrote “American,” he said.

“They even asked me if I wanted to go back to Hungary,” he said. “But I told them, no.”

He made a swiping gesture with his arm from the stretcher on which he lay and explained:

“If I ever went back to Hungary the communists would hang me to the nearest cherry tree.”

**Hopes for Citizenship**

“Funny thing,” he said in his heavily accented English. “You know, I don’t think I going to be released because I really am a Hungarian. But I hope I’m going to be American soon.”

Rubin said he is a stretcher patient because of over-exposure to the weather after his capture.
