

# N. Envoys Seek To Extend POW Trading; 40 Freed

TWIN FALLS, April 24 (AP)—The United Nations sought continuation of the exchange of sick and wounded members of the Korean war today as 40 more Americans returned to freedom.

Through the total of 120 Americans liberated in the past two weeks, the 115—now a short of the 120 promised originally—returned to freedom.

The U. N. is keeping with a promise made Thursday, that 100 more Americans would be included in the 115 troops returned Saturday. The redees said four more British, four Turks and 17 South Koreans also would be exchanged then.

The allies told the redees they were grateful and said the U. N. would send back more Communist prisoners than the 5,800 originally pledged.

**On Schedule**

The redees have returned 500 allied prisoners, as scheduled. They have received 2,499 Koreans also who included 700 Chinese at a rate of 500 a day except for today, when only 100 were returned. The U. N. will return 500 more redees Saturday.

In another tent at this neutral zone Nations officers met for the second time this week. The committee asked a one-day postponement of the resumption of full-scale armistice negotiations slated for Saturday.

The redees said that administrative messengers and Rear Adm. John C. Danaher, chief U. N. liaison officer, met to discuss the redees they could expect to be returned.

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# Merge of 2 U. S. Forests Reported; Chief Hosen

Consolidation of the Minidoka and Sawtooth national forests as of June 1 with Charles I. Daugherty, supervisor of the Sawtooth forest, as head, was announced in Twin Falls Friday by Regional Forester G. J. Olsen.

Offices for the new forest will be located in Twin Falls, Olsen said. It is the hope of the forest service to have the Twin Falls office established before the end of May and bids will be sought within a week to obtain office space.

The new unit, which will be known as the Sawtooth national forest, will contain 1,738,017 acres. This corresponds to the 1,410,000 acres of the Minidoka forest and the 328,017 acres of the other intermountain national forest. The 110 ranger stations will make it the largest unit in this respect in the region. The Boise and Payette forests have 10 rangers each.

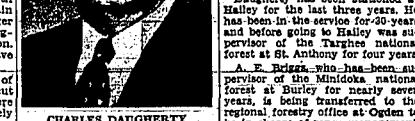
Olsen said the move is a part of the forest service's program to cut administrative costs. He said there were 2,499 Koreans also who included 700 Chinese at a rate of \$15,000 a year in travel and administration expenses. Consolidation of the two forests will save \$200,000 a year, he said. The history of the forest service. It is the fifth such unit to have taken place in recent years.

The forest service offices at Burley and Hatley, which have been headquarters for the Minidoka and Sawtooth national forests, respectively, will be reduced to the status of ranger offices as soon as the supervisory office is established in Twin Falls. Clark, district ranger, will remain in Twin Falls. In addition, two staff men, W. J. Locks, Hatley, and G. H. Taylor, Burley, will be transferred to Twin Falls. A. S. Schor, office manager at Hatley, also will be transferred to Twin Falls.

Olsen said a clerical staff of four to work in the Twin Falls office will be selected later.

Daugherty has been stationed at Hatley for the last three years. He has been in the service for 30 years and has been assigned to the supervisory office of the Targhee national forest at St. Anthony for four years.

A. F. Pridgen, who has been supervisor of the Minidoka national forest at Burley for nearly seven years, is being transferred to the Twin Falls office. He has been in charge of range management. He also has been in the service for 23 years and has been assigned to the supervisory office of the Nevada national forest at Ely.

# MacArthur Says Threat to Bomb Red China Could Stop Disputes

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur declared today a threat to bomb-red China might force Russia to "settle the Korean war and all pending global issues on equitable terms."

"A warning of action of this sort provides the leverage," he said, "to induce the Soviet to bring the Korean struggle to an end without further bloodshed."

The former supreme allied commander in the far east made his proposal in a 1,500-word letter to Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D., Va., Byrd being the only member of the Senate to endorse the plan for nuclear armistice and made the letter public.

The proposals, obviously, represent a "clear and definite offer" to the United States, he said. "MacArthur said that in his famous Dec. 8 speech in New York and other prominent places he has urged that the United States should use its atomic power to force the Russians to bring the Korean war to a halt. He indicated that a threat of this sort would be the only way to settle the Korean war and all other pending global issues on equitable terms."

# Land Bureau OKs Irrigation Plan for Desert Near Buhl

BUHL, April 24—Approval of the Blue Gulch Irrigation company, Buhl, as a source of irrigation water for desert land entries in Twin Falls county was announced Friday by Boise by Karl Landstrom, chief-of-lands and minerals division of the bureau of land management regional office in Portland.

The Blue Gulch project, when constructed, will divert water from Clover Creek (East Fork Brunstater river) below Three Creek in Owyhee county. The water will be carried in natural channels and by canals to a reservoir six miles south of west of Buhl and then by a canal to irrigate 12,000 acres of desert lands eight miles west of Buhl.

The project lands are located between Salmon Falls Creek and the east boundary of the Taylor Creek aerial quarry range. The project is privately owned and has 55 stockholders, mostly Buhl area farmers.

Landstrom said the lands to be reclaimed have been described as number one and number 2 medium to heavy textured soils of good agricultural extension service. From the standpoint of topography and soil depth the lands are desirable for irrigation. # Idaho Paid U.S. Tax Of 120 Million in '52

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Idahoans paid \$120,065,510 in federal taxes in 1952, compared with \$101,839,811 in 1951, the U. S. bureau of internal revenue announced today.

The nation's total tax collections increased from \$6 billion to \$8 billion last year.

Idaho residents paid out \$111,956,457 for individual and corporation income taxes, old-age insurance and unemployment insurance. The bill for federal excise and alcohol tax was \$8,109,053.

The total paid by Idahoans in 1952 was less than 1951 in only three categories—excise taxes on tires, fuel preparations and tobacco. Gas state residents paid \$33,900-excise tax on tires in 1952, up from \$32,475 in 1951. # Total in U.S. Levy Income Sets Record

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—The government collected a record \$68,802,642,268 in taxes last year, the bureau of internal revenue reported today.

The figures for the calendar year 1952 showed a 17.6-billion-dollar increase over 1951—8.6 billion in corporate income taxes, almost six billion in personal income taxes and small increases in most others.

Higher tax rates coupled with better business and higher incomes accounted for the increase.

**All States Gain**

Every state showed an increase in over-all collections. New York state had the biggest total, \$15,837,430, and Wyoming the smallest, \$67,603,430.

Individual individual income and employment tax collections for the year were \$35,955,828,651, compared to \$30,048,311,400 in 1951.

The total increase in corporate and personal income tax collections for 1952 was \$17,000,000,000, compared to \$15,000,000,000 in 1951.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson told a meeting of the Newspaper-Farm-Editors Association that many livestock feeders are being caught in a squeeze between declining animal prices and feed-grain prices held at inflexible levels by government price supports.

# Hog Prices Drop In Shipment Gain

CHICAGO, April 24 (AP)—Hog prices dropped from 24¢ higher today as larger shipments reached the Chicago stockyards.

At the largest shipment, prices were off as much as 20 cents a hundred pounds with shipments about 1,000 animals.

The U. S. department of agriculture estimated receipts at the Chicago stockyards today at 7,500, the largest Friday shipment in 10 years. Only 6,000 head arrived last Friday.

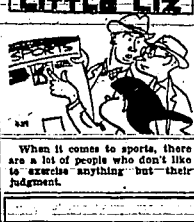

**College of Idaho Starts Novel Plan for Training in Business**

CALDWELL, April 24—College of Idaho announced today a graduate educational plan to train students for business by substituting a year's or-the-job training for their senior-year-in-college.

When they then completed the first of two years at a graduate school of business, they will be awarded an A.B. degree from College of Idaho. They will receive a master of business administration on completion of the second year.

President Paul M. Pitman said six of the nation's leading graduate schools of business administration had joined in the cooperative program with College of Idaho. They are Harvard, Northwestern, Washington, Oregon, California and University of California at Los Angeles.

He said that although agreements worked out to date include only business firms, the plan could be used to train students in agriculture, government and the professions as well.

The primary objective is to select and develop leaders through the combination of the best in liberal arts education with the finest in graduate school experience as illuminated by an intervening year of supervised employment," he said.

Juniors with a record well above average at the college will be invited to apply for the program. After approval by the faculty they will work for a participating firm for a year, making monthly reports. The employer will make semi-annual appraisals. After a year or two, by mutual agreement—the student will enter one of the six business schools.

Pitman said the program had the enthusiastic support of business. Among those endorsing it, he said, was Julius D. Glex, chairman of the board of Continental Can company, who wired Pitman that it "promotes to the development of leadership."

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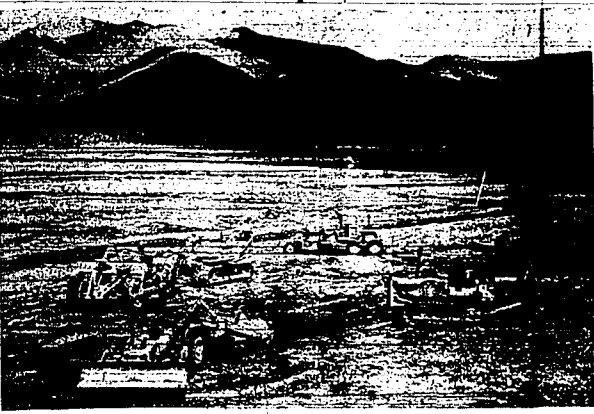

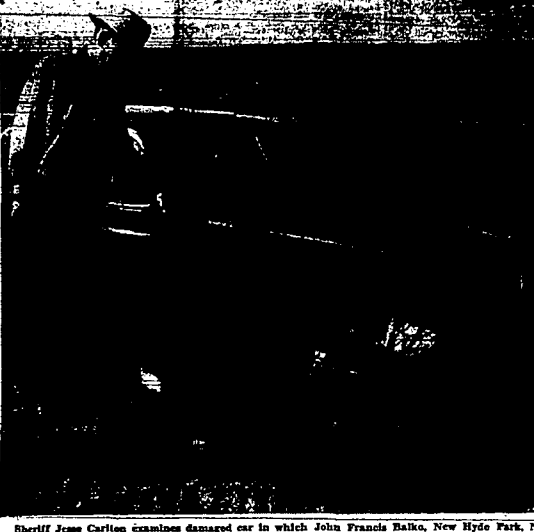

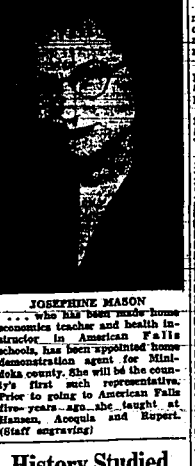

The Philadelphia Athletics overcame a 4-0 deficit to turn back the Washington Senators Thursday night in a game that was a classic for the city's fans.

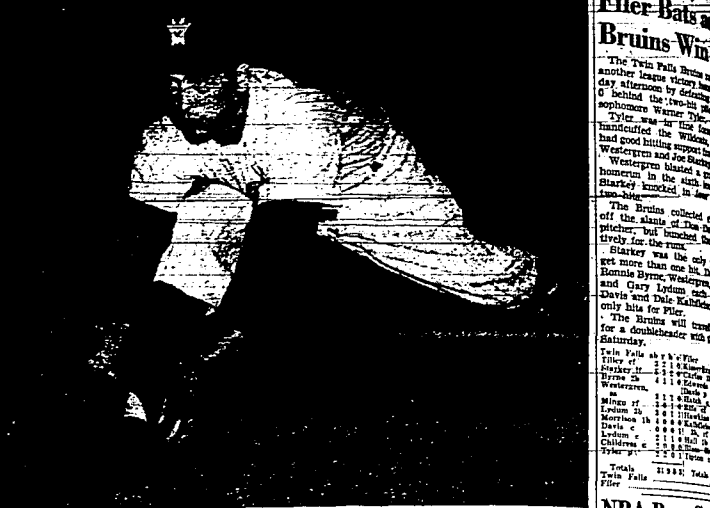
