Major valley villages and cities elected municipal officials in elections Tuesday which ranged all the way from extremely light to heavy. In most communities voting was light. Balloting was heavy at Halley where Tony Crook won the mayorship by a slim 18-vote margin over George Allen. The totals were 238 for Crook and 220 for Allen. Burley came up with probably the heaviest vote in the valley with a 1,278-

On the top race there were 1,278 votes for Crook and 220 for Allen. In other communities the vote was much lighter. In some cases only a few voters showed up. The election was held on Tuesday, April 22, and the results were announced on Wednesday, April 23.

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Reds Give Ground For First Time in Korea Peace Talks

PANMUNJON, Korea, April 22 (UP)—The communists gave ground for the first time today in the resumed armistice negotiations. But the communist and United Nations truce teams remained completely split on two vital points regarding repatriation of war prisoners. "We made some progress," said the senior U.N. truce delegate, Lieut-Gen. William K. Harrison. Yesterday he had threatened to break off negotiations unless the reds stopped asking for Communist soldier delegates.

Communist soldier delegate, Gen. Nam Il, said at today's 64-minute meeting his side would be willing to nominate an Asiatic nation to take custody of 4,618 North Korean and Chinese Communist prisoners refusing to go back to red-ruled territory. This was a new proposal. The U.N. side removed one point at issue for Nam. It expected to name India and that country is believed acceptable to the U. N.

Man Is Nabbed After Threat to Shoot Pair

Clyde Slatter was arrested by city, county and state officers early Wednesday morning after he struck Deputy Sheriff W. W. Palmer and threatened Palmer and Mrs. Slatter with a 30-40 rifle. He is being held in the county jail pending arraignment in district court on a charge of violating a restraining order.

Slatter was placed on probation for 30 months May 16, 1952, after he pleaded guilty of grand larceny. His companions in the crime served prison sentences, but Slatter received a suspended sentence. Also in custody is Clyde Boatright who is being held in the city jail pending arraignment in justice court on a charge of disturbing the peace early Wednesday at the Justice Center. A similar complaint has been filed against Slatter.

C-97 With 35 POWs Lands At U. S. Base

TRAVIS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., April 22 (AP)—Thirty-five American soldiers and marines returned from Communist prison camps here today aboard a C-97 transport plane from the "free world's freedom airport." The huge plane touched down on American soil at Travis air force base, 50 miles northwest of San Francisco, at 11:30 a. m. PDT (11:30 a. m. MST) to complete an 8-hour, 17-minute flight from Hanoi, Indochina. It took off from Hanoi at 12:15 a. m. MST (12:15 a. m. PDT). The departure from Hanoi was reported by a Communist spokesman as "the first step in the repatriation of American prisoners of war."

The 35 who could walk boarded the plane at the airfield. The other 15 were stretcher cases. The plane was escorted by two F-86 fighters. The plane was loaded with supplies and equipment. The soldiers and marines were in good health. They were taken to the hospital for medical examination. The plane was then taken to the base for processing.

Wool Growers Chief Attacks Tariff Accord

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—A spokesman for the National Wool Growers Assn. today attacked a tariff accord made under the reciprocal trade program with Great Britain. The spokesman said the accord would hurt the wool industry of the United States as an important agricultural and livestock industry. J. J. Jones, Salt Lake City, executive secretary of the National Wool Growers Assn., said the accord would put new restrictions on the trade agreement law to protect American industry. "The present law expires June 30," he said.

The wool market is unworkable from a private enterprise standpoint, Jones said. "It is our belief that only action by this session of congress can prevent bankruptcy for the industry and ruin for tens of thousands of men, women and children of the nation to provide a reasonable protection for the wool growers, their workers and allied industries," he said.

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Day Term Contractors Declare Pay Bid Unjustified

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Board Blasts New Federal Grazing Law

BOISE, April 29—The Idaho fish and game commission has voiced its opposition to the uniform federal grazing law act, now pending in the house of representatives.

The commission said the proposed resolution "will not serve the best interests of Idaho or any other western state; nor does this resolution provide the proper safeguards to the water rights of Idaho and other western states."

The commission also wrote Idaho's congressional delegation in Washington urging approval of another resolution which would provide additional funds for improvement of public lands such as the construction of a building of vacation facilities and camp grounds for public use.

"At the present time there is a grave need in Idaho for improvement which will provide the public with places to stay while hunting and fishing or for vacationing on public lands," the commission said.

In its letter to the state senators, the commission delegates opposing the uniform federal grazing law act, the commission said "vesting of control over surface uses in this resolution, will not assure that timber, wildlife or recreation will be protected in the manner we are decidedly against any measure which would interfere with the free hunting, fishing and recreation of the public on public lands."

Joseph G. Barkley Dies at Age of 73

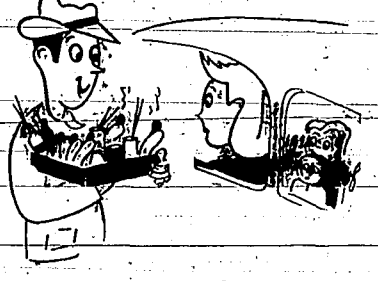

Science Academy Backs Leader on Astin Case Views

WASHINGTON, April 29—The National Academy of Sciences has thrown its full support behind the holdup order on Dr. Allen V. Astin's dismissal as director of the national bureau of standards.

The group passed a resolution at its annual spring meeting here yesterday endorsing the stand academy president Dr. Detlev W. Bronk took recently against Astin's immediate ouster.

Commerce Secretary Sinclair weeks fired Astin because, among other things, the academy had apparently been inactively objective in testing a chemical supposed to pop up tired batteries.

Bronk told Weeks April 15 the integrity of scientific effort and the national interests would be best served "if Astin were left on as director until leading scientists could carefully study the issues involved."

After this and other protests, Weeks agreed to hold up Astin's dismissal "until the late summer or early fall." Two scientific committees were put to work studying the bureau's functions and the merits of the battery compound, AD-33.

Grand Juror Study Asked On Shortage

CALDWELL, April 29—Caldwell, Idaho, Grand Juror Chairman, Tuesday asked District Judge Donald Anderson to call a grand jury to investigate the Canyon county sheriff's office during the term of former Sheriff Ray Luskup.

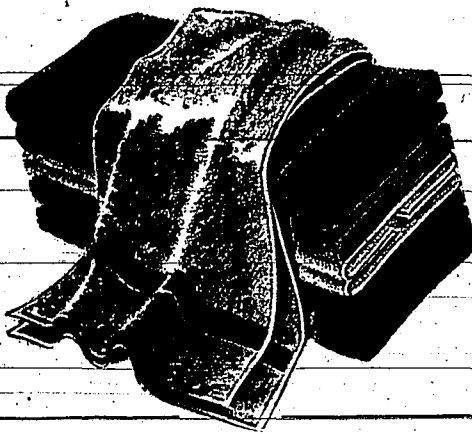

8-Month Period
The report, covering the period from July 1, 1937, to last Jan. 3, didn't show what the members did with the cash they withdrew. They don't have to use it for stationery. They don't have to account for it.

General members listed as having made cash withdrawals said they had used the money for various office expenses.

As of Jan. 3, Warren reported, 80 House members had overdrawn their stationery accounts by a total of \$1,075, and former members owed \$2,407.

AEC Leader Hints Great Atomic Gain

WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—Chas. D. Gordon, Dean of the atomic energy commission, has hinted that atomic developments have been made in the atomic arm field of which the public has no...

...a carefully worded letter to Dr. Norris E. Bradbury, director of the AEC's weapons laboratory at Los Alamos, N. M., Dean said: "I hope sincerely that at some point in the future the full story of the truly remarkable progress that has been made by you, your colleagues and predecessors, can be told publicly."

The letter was written to mark the 10th anniversary of the great atomic laboratory built during World War II on an arid mesa top northwest of Santa Fe.

Profused Stockpile
"This was the laboratory producing the ideas and designs for all the weapons in America's atomic stockpile. These weapons range in size from the comparatively small ones being tested in Nevada to the great hydrogen "bombs" exploded in England last fall.

In congratulating Bradbury and his colleagues for their "truly remarkable accomplishments," Dean said A-bombs in the past 10 years "have played a major role in the ending of one world war and in the prevention of another."

Credits Scientists
In that same period, he said, "the United States has achieved and maintained a position of world leadership in the atomic weapons field." Crediting the scientists of Los Alamos for this, Dean added: "It is hard to think of a group of people whose work has had a greater influence for good on the course of world history and the lives of people everywhere."

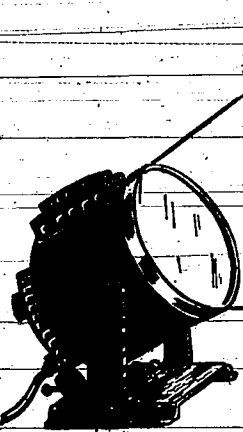
"Without this appropriation to complete the transmission line and substation, the farmers will not receive the power, and they in turn will not be able to repay their loan from the rural electrification administration," she said.
