will be handled by the district engineers through the district offices established in each of the six highway districts. The resident engineer will handle the highway maintenance in his district.

In some instances the resident engineer will have a maintenance superintendent located at a strategic point to shift around in the most need of maintenance men in the most need.

The board explained that each maintenance district now has a maintenance foreman with two to six men in his crew. The crew would work on one section of highway until the maintenance on that section was completed. Then they would go to another section. The present plans are to retain the maintenance sheds as equipment centers.

Under the old system it could be a week or more before the crew would get to a certain section of highway. Rich said. "The new system will eliminate this delay and allow the maintenance men to cover the section to cover his section every day."

"We believe that the personnel will be able to maintain the district highways much better and at an additional cost to the highway user," Rich said. "It is expected that the new system will cost even less."

Miller said his staff is now working on the location of the new maintenance and new residences. Miller expects to announce the final report in a few days.

The new policy will be effective Friday.

### Trading Need Is Stressed in Talk by "Ike"

WASHINGTON, April 30.—President Eisenhower has warned the nation its prosperity and very security depend upon trade with other nations.

Mr. Eisenhower, speaking informally at the chamber's annual luncheon, stressed the importance of trade with other nations. He said that the "free world" would be cut off at the earliest possible moment "to provide security at the lowest possible cost."

But it never will be reduced, he said, beyond that point that you can, with justification, say I shall sleep well tonight because my country, its system, its liberties are safe."

In defending a liberal trade policy the President hit indirectly at protection-minded businessmen and congressmen opposing tariff reductions to help foreign competition.

Mr. Eisenhower has called for a one-year extension of the reciprocal trade program to give the administration time to consider changes that might be needed. The house ways and means committee is expected to report on the request this week.

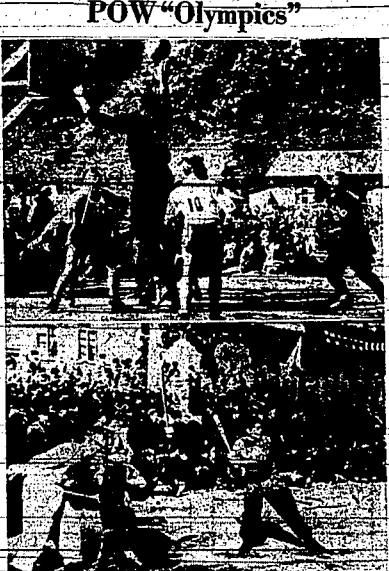

**McKay Backing Restoration of Bonneville Funds, Raver Says**

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Interior Secretary Douglas McKay has served notice he wants the senate to restore 11 million dollars the house cut out of funds for the Bonneville power administration in the Pacific Northwest.  
Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville power administrator, told a senate appropriations subcommittee yesterday McKay still stands on an "Eisenhower budget" for the agency totaling \$24,000,000. The money allowed only \$43,300,000 for the administration's power line building program for 1953.  
Raver said he talked to McKay just before appearing before the subcommittee and said "the secretary instructed me to appeal for the 11 million dollar increase."  
Raver said a \$2,668,000 item for a Stenoquist-Bell connection the house eliminated entirely was included in the funds McKay wanted restored.  
"He also asked for these other increases:"  
Childs-Joseph-Sinobich line, \$1,200,000; The Dalles area line and McKay substitution, \$2,284,000; southeast Portland area service, \$300,000; upper Willamette valley service, \$500,000; southeast Oregon tour service, \$970,000; Coos bay service, \$1,000,000; and McKay-La Grande substitution, \$221,000.  
Raver also asked for restoration of \$2,000,000 bonus cut in money for operation and maintenance of the system.  
G. A. Erdahl, chairman of the Pacific Northwest Utilities Conference committee, asked the senate appropriations committee yesterday to "lay out the ground rules" under which the government intends to continue participation in the northwest power pool.  
Erdahl, chairman of the Bonneville power administration, local public utility districts and private utilities are combined in the pool, from which power is distributed to government-preference customers and customers of the local and private utilities.  
Erdahl told the appropriations subcommittee that his group would like, if possible, the getting of a 10-year plan of government policy. "We are asking two questions," he said. "Are you going to continue and on what basis are you going to continue?"  
He received no definite answer from the committee.

**Early Usage Of Color TV Is Predicted**

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Rep. J. Arthur Young, R., Calif., said today color television is ready for commercial use and should be made available to the public "within another year."  
Younger is a member of the house commerce committee, which recently concluded an extensive investigation to determine why color TV has not yet been put on the market.  
Several experts testified it might be several years before color is generally available to the public on a commercial basis, however, that it is ready to start color broadcasting and production of color sets immediately if given permission by the federal communications commission.  
The FCC so far has given approval only to the Columbia Broadcasting system of color TV, but further development has been blocked by an inter-industry conflict and government material restrictions.  
Younger said "undoubtedly the FCC will hold hearings with a reasonable time to determine whether or not to change the standard of its color system or to permit two color systems to be advanced side by side and let the public determine which is better."

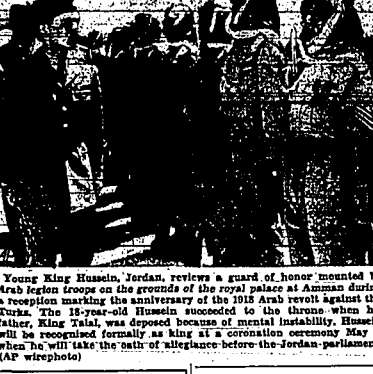

**Disaster Help for Beetle Area Eyed**

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Rep. Leo Metcalf, D. Mont., said today he has asked President Eisenhower to declare western Montana and western Idaho a disaster area because of spruce beetle infestation of timber.  
Metcalf said the action is needed so medium-sized and small lumber operations can get federal loans.  
"Our economy is threatened by the loss of up to 500 million dollars worth of timber in the Pacific northwest as a result of the spruce beetle infestation," Metcalf said.  
Maps now under way for the topographic atlas being compiled by the U. S. geological survey represent nearly 500,000 square miles.

**Crop Experts Split Federal Aid for Work**

FULLAMAN, Wash., April 30 (AP)—Agricultural extension specialists from 11 western states, meeting to consider their research programs for the coming year, spent Wednesday dividing up \$300,000 in federal aid.  
They allotted \$106,789 to 10 marketing and economic projects, midway in western land grant colleges, and \$193,211 to non-marketing projects.  
Block Research  
The lion's share of the money will be used for livestock research in all 11 states: \$27,500 for studies in livestock marketing and \$44,000 for beef and breeding projects.  
Oregon State, Utah State and the University of California each will get part of \$11,800 allotted for studies of poultry marketing and \$10,300 allotment for fruit marketing research will go to California and Washington State.  
Nutritional Studies  
Seven schools, including Oregon State, Utah State and Washington State, will share \$40,000 for nutritional studies. Utah and Washington State also will get part of \$20,750 earmarked for rural housing research.  
Delegates planned three new projects to be started in 1953: \$100,000 per cent is forthcoming from the government as asked in President Eisenhower's budget. They will be on poultry diseases, forage production and mechanization of cotton production.

### McCarthyism, Giveaway Hit By Democrats

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—Prominent Democrats today said that what may be the party's future line of political battle by denouncing what they called "McCarthyism" and a Republican "giveaway" of natural resources.

The opening of the 1954 campaign on the 40th anniversary of President Eisenhower's GOP administration was the signal for what appeared to be the opening of national debate and outlining of party strategy for the 1954 congressional and 1956 presidential election campaigns.

Sen. Herbert H. Lehman, N. Y., former Air Secretary Thomas M. Flaherty and other speakers raised a number of issues in speeches at a Democratic state committee dinner in the Waldorf Astoria hotel.

Lehman said that the "giveaway" would be thought control policies of congressional investigating committees.

"What a spectacle we present to the rest of the world he exclaimed, 'who have witnessed our own people that this great democracy of ours is homebound with traitors, spies, subversives and sexual deviates.

"Our democracy is portrayed as a 'giveaway' of natural resources to the benefit of the rest of the world."

Flaherty declared a "frontal attack on McCarthyism" might not be the way to political victory but said:

"If we can have the cause of freedom in our country, by risking nothing in our next election, let us take that risk."

### 5 MIGs Shot Down by Jets

SEOUL, Korea, April 30 (AP)—American fighters destroyed or damaged five communist MIG-16s today while hundreds of U. N. warplanes bombed North Korea from the Yalu river.

The Sabres shot down three MIGs when swarmed from Manchuria in a valiant attempt to break up the allied fighter-bomber formations. Two others were damaged.

Colonel Ferdinand J. Miami, Fla., tied the jet destruction record by shooting down his 12th MIG in two hours, 45 minutes, or with his former commanding officer, Col. Royal N. Baker, McKinney, Tex.

### Hearing Ordered For Will Dispute

### Higher Fruit Prices Loom

WASHINGTON, April 30 (Special)—Recent cold weather and an expected smaller crop of canned fruits should make growers prices for most fruits higher than last year, the USDA "demand and price situation" said today.

"Cold-storage holdings of apples on March 31 were about eight per cent larger than a year earlier, and those of pears were 14 per cent smaller," the report said. "Stocks of both fruits were dropping rapidly with nearing of the end of the season."

Frozen delicious fruits and berries on March 31 were reported at 150 million pounds—down 10 per cent from a year earlier. Figures on canned stocks were not available but are expected to be smaller.

Prospects for delicious production in 1953 looked higher as of April 1 until the widespread cold wave cut the outlook.

Mid-spring strawberry production to get on the market next month is expected to be 10 to 15 per cent less than 1952. However, late spring acreage is believed to be about the same as last year.

Some woods technically classified as softwoods are actually harder than some hardwoods. Yellow pine, softwood, is harder than poplar or gum, which are hardwoods.

### Inquiry Ordered On Plane Service

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The civil aeronautics board has ordered an investigation on whether suspension of service by United Air Lines at Rock Springs, Wyo., should be continued.

In another order the board granted Frontier Airlines authority to overfly Rawlins, Wyo., on an additional daily round trip flight between Denver and Billings, Mont., provided that Rawlins is served by at least two daily round-trip flights.

Frontier had asked that United's suspension of service at Rock Springs, granted in February, 1950, be extended through March 31, 1953, the expiration date of Frontier's certificate to serve Rock Springs.

### Ex-RFC Aide Is Sentenced

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—Mel Young was sentenced today to four months to two years in prison for failing to disclose to senators who dug into his bank account buying and high financing while investigating alleged influence on RFP loans.

Young, 55, asked for probation but U. S. District Judge Matthew McQuire turned down the plea.

However, the judge expressed the hope authorities will feel the interests of justice have been served when Young completes four months in prison.

"Taking into account good time, Young could get out by serving a little less than four months," McQuire told McQuire he was "suffered mentally, physically and financially."

McQuire imposed the same sentence—four months to two years—on each of the four perjury charges of which Young was convicted March 31. But he stipulated that the sentences run together, instead of one after the other.

## Gross Income Per Acre of North Side Project Is About \$100 Above Average

Per-acre gross income for the new northside reclamation project of the Mindoko project was nearly \$100 more than the record-breaking average of all projects in the Pacific northwest last year.

A report of the bureau of reclamation regional office, Boise, revealed today the land served by wells averaged \$217.40 in gross income per acre. The average of all projects in the Pacific northwest was \$130.97, a record high. The previous all-time per acre return was \$120.18, established in 1947.

Gross crop returns for all 19 federal reclamation projects in the northwest totaled \$270,212,832, also a record peak, the report showed. The production was from 2,063,215 acres under production during the year.

The 1952 gross return for the federal projects boosted the cumulative total for the projects since 1907 to more than \$15 billion dollars.

A principal factor in the record-breaking total was the large acreage planted to onions and potatoes in the Mindoko project and upper Snake river valley and the Owyhee project in Oregon and Idaho.

Potatoes were the heavy income producer. On several projects the per-acre gross return from the tubers exceeded \$500, the bureau reported.

The Mindoko project and the upper Snake river valley region topped the northwest developments with \$115,106,077 from the 1,004,543 acres under cultivation.

Other top projects were Yakima in Washington, with \$73,470,068 from 383,248 acres, and Boise with a gross of \$32,935,422 on 319,366 acres.

The report also noted total gross and per-acre returns for the projects in previous years. In 1951 the totals were \$23,462,400 and \$13.23; 1950, \$18,406,530 and \$9.24; 1949, \$17,209,842 and \$8.78; 1948, \$20,539,040, and \$10.67, and 1947, \$22,539,238 and \$12.03.

### Indo-China Help Is Eyed by U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 30 (UP)—The Eisenhower administration, deeply concerned about the widening war in Indo-China, soon may shift a substantial amount of foreign aid to French and native forces fighting the communist-led rebels.

Senator Wiley, R., Wis., chairman of the Senate foreign relations committee, said yesterday the recent invasion of the kingdom of Laos is "a serious eruption on the world perimeter."

He reported that Secretary of State Dulles, in a private session with the committee, said the invasion has "created a serious new problem which disturbs all peace-loving peoples."

Dulles often has called Laos because when American colonists first saw them they found a plague like those they had read about in the Bible.

# FACTS - In The Labor Dispute between the Rocky Mountain District Council of Carpenters and Associated Builders of Southern Idaho, Inc.,

Because the stability and growth of Idaho is being endangered by requests for wages higher than our present economy justifies, we wish to present the following facts:

- (A) Our present contract provides a basic carpenter rate of \$2.35 per hour or \$94.00 for a 40-hour week.
- (B) On February 28th, 1953 the Unions made the following request of this Association:
  1. Wages to become effective the first payroll period after April 1, 1953—Carpenters \$2.55 per hour or \$102.00 per 40-hour week.
  2. Holidays—Armistice Day shall be included as a holiday.
  3. Travel time and subsistence—When the job is outside the city limits the employer shall pay for travel time one way at the regular rate, and when the job is over twenty-five (25) miles from the city limits the workmen shall be paid Four Dollars (\$4.00) per day, additional living expense.
  4. On-Congressional election days employees will be allowed time off to vote, not to exceed two (2) hours, and without loss of pay, but in no case will the employees be paid if he does not vote.
  5. Carpenters shall have ample time in which to pick up their tools before quitting time.
  6. The employers and unions agree to jointly share the expense of printing this agreement and working rules for the information of members of both groups.
- (C) Numerous meetings were held and attempts were made to arrive at just working conditions and fair wages, dictated by present economic conditions.
- (D) In answer to our proposal, the unions rejected our offer and called a strike before any further negotiation meetings could be arranged.

The Members of this Association, recognizing their responsibility to the owners and the public, will attempt to carry on their work under the same conditions existing as of March 31, 1953, and until the dispute can be resolved in a proper manner.

### McCarthy and Editor Tangle Over Charges

WASHINGTON, April 29—Senator McCarthy, Wis., told New York Post editor James Wechsler, with whom he is feuding, Wednesday that he was not a "privileged profession" immune from investigation.

McCarthy made public a telegram addressed to Wechsler as "Arthur Lawson, Editor, New York Post." He told Wechsler he thought it "appropriate" to use that name because that was Wechsler's Young Communist League name in the 1930s. Wechsler himself has said he renounced communism in 1937 and has been actively opposing it.

Called for Quotes  
McCarthy called Wechsler before his Senate investigation subcommittee for questioning last Friday, a move Wechsler assailed as "attempts at intimidation" because he had criticized the senator. Wechsler demanded that the official transcript of his testimony be made public.  
McCarthy wired back Wednesday that he would "extend the courtesy" of letting Wechsler examine the transcript and "make such corrections as you desire" before it is released.

Sends Reply  
In New York later, Wechsler released the text of a new telegram he said replied to McCarthy's. It read: "Your wire again deliberately falsifies my position, which is on the record."  
"You are not interested in my youthful communist activities which ended more than 15 years ago and which I have never concealed."  
"If and when a true record of last Friday's hearing is released it will show beyond dispute that you are attacking the policies and personnel of the Post because we have fought McCarthyism. To that we stand guilty; we will continue the fight...."

### U. S. Consumer Credit Nearing Record Peak; Opinions Varied

NEW YORK, April 30—Consumer credit is at a near record 23.5 billion dollars.  
Delinquencies in payments on automobiles, appliances and personal loans are on the rise in many cities.

Finance companies are doing more repossessing from folks who don't pay their bills.

Does it mean that consumer credit is getting out of hand?  
"Nothing to worry about. In fact, further expansion of credit would be good for the economy," says one group of economists and businessmen.

Another faction asserts, "The situation definitely calls for caution, especially if income and employment decline."

Edward J. Ader, who operates a collection business in New York, gives a report that sums up: "The picture over much of the nation... We noticed a climb in delinquencies the past 90 days. There are more skips, more people delin-

quent from one place to another, and not paying their bills," says Ader.  
"For example, quite a few people who went to Texas and California after the war are coming back here now, leaving behind bills we've asked to collect."  
"They're back as though things are getting back to normal. A lot of companies—while they've credit—the last few years without doing any checking are going to have to tighten up."  
Noting that the rate of automobile repossessions is higher than last year, Thomas W. Rogers, Chicago, executive vice president of the American Finance conference, declares, "Good business judgment is coming back into its own again."  
While expressing concern over the rapid rise in credit, Federal Reserve Board Chairman William McChesney Martin has indicated a feeling that the situation "will right itself without government action."  
"Delinquencies and repossessions, painful though they may be, will operate at some point to correct

second terms and to cause lenders and lenders to accept after credit policies," says Martin.  
Biggest part of consumer debt in installment credit, which has climbed 13 straight months to reach a record of \$18,700,000,000, 2.5 billion more than one year ago. Charge accounts and personal loans make up most of the balance of consumer credit.  
Many economists regard the rate of consumer credit to spendable income—total personal income after taxes—as an important "index" in the credit question.  
Consumer credit now accounts for approximately 10 per cent of spendable income, about the same ratio as in the pre-war years.

"Why should I change the physical appearance?" he said in answer to a question, "I like this place the way it is. The pictures blend with the other trappings and I like the size of the place. It's the biggest workshop I've ever worked in."

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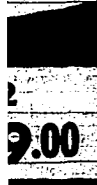

He said the Idaho frequency rate for the first three months was 183, compared with 181 the second quarter, 174 the third and 155 the final one.

The accident rate for surface mining was 41.2 per million man-hours, for mills 60.32 and for open pits and dredging 62.64.

Greatest Hazard

McDowell said the quarterly accident reports show the greatest single hazard confronting underground workers is falling rock or ground.

He said progress in mine safety is being made and studies are still being made to improve safety conditions.

### Total for U.S. Tanks Is Far Short of Russ

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The United States will have on hand by the start of this summer about 13,000 medium tanks, still far short of the estimated 40,000 of all types generally available to Russia.

But, an army spokesman said, there is no intention or desire to match Soviet armor, tanks for tanks, any more than there is attempt to match the huge Russian satellite force man-for-man.

Several factors are involved in this planning, the spokesman said, "current limited production lines could be accelerated to keep up supplies in quantity with superior tanks."

Moreover, army tacticians do not subscribe to the theory the only way to beat an enemy tank is with another tank.

But the army also relies on other armor, including the "shaped" charge for penetrating tank armor by a burning action, and the familiar bazooka and rifle grenade launcher for close-in fighting.

### Row Develops Over Plan for Montana Dam

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Whether the new dam should be built in Montana by the federal government or private industry has been argued at a power commission hearing.

Officials of Big Horn Canyon Irrigation and Power company, Hardin, Mont., asked preliminary permit for a power-irrigation dam in the Big Horn river 28 years after a similar permit expired.

Power commission attorneys questioned whether the commission has authority to issue the permit because congress has authorized a government dam in the same deep, bozlake canyon.

The issue is somewhat similar to the Hole canyon controversy pending before the commission.

### Western States Gearing for Expected Increase in Tourists During Summer

The western tourist industry is gearing up for another record-breaking, billion-dollar-plus season.

A survey by United Press reporters in the 11 western states indicates that western vacation playgrounds will enjoy their same popularity which Mr. and Mrs. Ketchum expect on their 1936 launch to the mountains or the ocean this summer.

The survey also brought out the possibility that tourists in the west will pay slightly more for their 1936 vacations as a result of decontrol and other factors.

The biggest price hike is expected to be felt in the cost of meals, while rates for accommodations probably will remain mostly unchanged.

Figures for 1932 and estimates for 1936 indicated that almost two million more tourists will visit the eight Rocky mountain states this summer than last. A total of 24,467,000 tourists visited those states—Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming—last summer.

The 1932 flood of tourists spent almost 977 million dollars in the Rocky Mountain states, and the 26 million this year are predicted to spend about \$1,331,000.

Colorado expects the biggest increase this year. The state's advertising and publicity director, Lowell

Cobb, predicts a 10 per cent increase in tourist numbers and a 12 per cent jump in tourist dollars spent.

The Colorado outlook, based on Cobb's figures, is for 3,708,000 tourists this summer, spending an estimated \$27,270,000 in the state.

The U. P. survey showed Wyoming looks for a "10 per cent" jump in dollars, and a 15 per cent increase in tourists.

That would give Wyoming 3,474,000 tourists this summer, spending \$30,040,000.

New Mexico State's tourists director, Melvin Drake, said the "land of enchantment" expects to have eight million tourists this year, an increase of about one million.

He expects vacation prices to be about the same as last year, with a notable increase in shelter rates if demand exceeds room supply.

A study of figures available indicated California will have a 15 per cent increase to give the state another banner year in the vacation department.

The All-Year Club of Southern California said the 2.5 million tourists it counted last year spent about \$24 million dollars, and that a 20 per cent boost is likely this year.

Nevada, where the gaming tables are the biggest attraction, is expecting a 10 per cent increase this year.

Almost 6.5 million tourists visited Nevada by car last year, and spent almost \$4 million dollars in the "atomic test" state.

Oregon travel officials were wary about making estimates this year, but best guesses indicate visitors will increase slightly, probably up to 3,300,000 tourists.

Washington set an all-time high of 3,380,000 visitors last year, who spent 134 million dollars.

Montana expects a five per cent increase; Utah probably will remain unchanged from 1932, and Idaho looks for a jump of about five per cent.

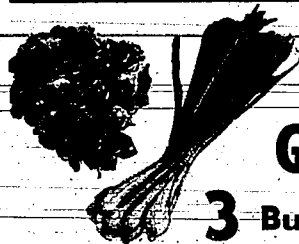

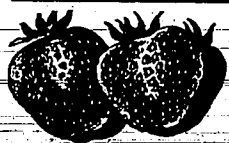

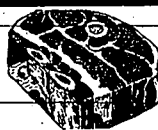
