The prisoners were held in inhumane conditions and many died of starvation and disease. The camp was discovered by U.S. forces in 1953.

WASHINGTON, May 1 (P)—President Eisenhower's statement today that his administration sees no way to balance the budget for the next fiscal year has reduced the hope for a tax cut. He said that the administration is committed to a balanced budget and that a tax cut is not possible at this time.

Wells Asked in Water Project

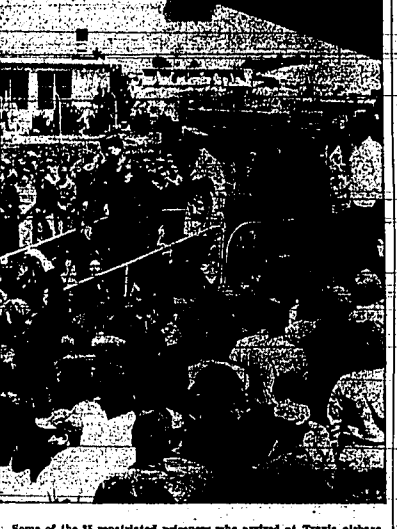

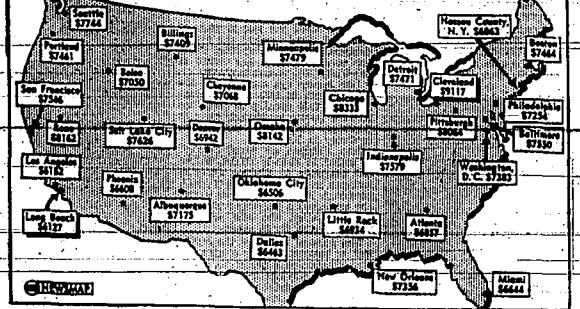

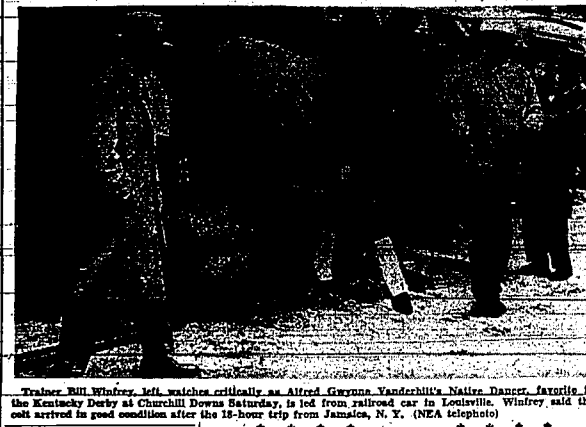

Metal Imports Sliding Tariff Plan Advised

PHOENIX, Ariz., May 1.—Small metal producers from nine states told a subcommittee of the House committee on small business here Thursday immediate adoption of foreign metal tariffs, especially lead and zinc, is a must to save American lead and zinc mines.

Chairman at the hearing, one a series held conducted by the subcommittee on small mines, was Representative Homer R. Caffery, sitting with House members Representative Frank Miller, D.-N.C., and Oatsen, D. Ariz.

Speakers for small mines from Arizona, California, New Mexico, Utah, Nevada, Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Kansas were among the more than 100 persons who appeared at the day-long meeting.

Speakers were also agreed that the public law relative to mining needs certain minor changes, but urged defeat of pending bills in congress which would change the law, saying the proposals are too drastic.

They urged adoption of a mine tax law similar to the new Canadian law under which new mining developments are taxed for a period of years. They also suggested an increase in the depletion allowance on small mines.

Witnesses expressed unanimous opposition to any premium price plan for metals, but urged adoption of a basic floor of at least 15¢ cents a pound for lead.

Leader of VA Blamed in Vet Loan Muddle

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—A leading mortgage authority has charged Cary Gray, veteran's administrator, with responsibility for "chaotic condition" in the GI home loan field he said had denied home financing to many veterans.

Brown, 12, Whitley, president of the Mortgage Bankers Association of America, told the western mortgage clinic Gray must shoulder the responsibility because he has not permitted the GI loan interest rate to be raised in line with general advances in the money market.

Whitley said a "wild system" of mortgage discounts has created "retrograde abuses" in the GI home loan financing program and that the veteran is paying the bill. The discounts, he added, have in effect raised the interest rate on GI loans, now frozen at four per cent.

Hundreds of thousands of veterans, Whitley said, have had to pay more for their loans than would have been the case had a moderate increase in the interest rate been allowed. He said the situation has been especially critical on the west coast, and in the south and southwest.

The only way the situation can be corrected, the banker said, is to make the GI loan rate an effective one.
