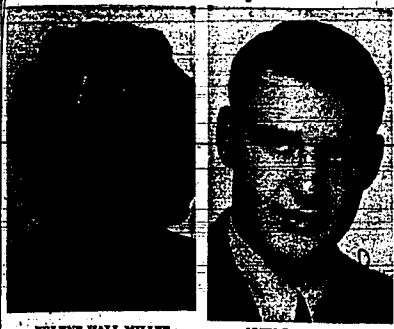

The dairy industry is a booming asset; large percentages of the nation's seed crops are grown here; and the crop yield is among the highest in the United States. The majority of the homes are new, modern and spacious. In the ever-increasing fight of mankind to gain food for his increasing numbers, the Black canyon district and the Boise project are important allies. The region has none of the wild, unusual aspects of scenic grandeur found elsewhere in Utah or Idaho, but it has a quiet, pastoral charm that "delights the eye. Through the magic of water—the area is an oasis—an oasis of farming, of fishing, of work, of relaxation, and of beauty.

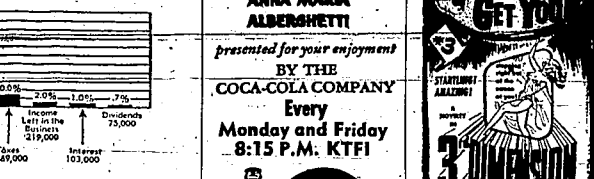

### U. S. Gathers More Data in Czech Attack

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—The United States is compiling new evidence to back up its unswerving demand that communist Czechoslovakia pay for a U. S. F-44 jet fighter plane shot down March 10 by Czech pilots.

U. S. investigators are working on the case in western Germany where the plane crashed after being attacked on a border patrol mission. They are taking affidavits from witnesses and assembling other evidence of Czech guilt to be used as the basis for new American demands that the reds pay for the downed plane, valued at approximately \$200,000.

Mr. Warren G. Brown, pilot of the destroyed plane, was forced to parachute after two Soviet-built MIG-15 jet fighters with Czech insignia fired into the F-44's tail and wing.

Part of the American case is based on the fact that U. S. radar technicians watched the three unidentified aircraft cross the border and jump the F-44. The operators plotted the location of the attack while the U. S. sons and Brown landed unharmed on the German side of the Czech-German border.
