TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—When Franklin D. Roosevelt and Cordell Hull persuaded a jittery congress to enact the reciprocal trade agreement act in the depth of the depression, they rejected the tariff issue in the national political cemetery along with prohibition, etc. It was to herald a new era, they had hoped, in the national political arena.

But the behind-the-scenes battle on Capitol Hill for a mere open season extension of that law proved that they celebrated prematurely. The tariff issue has been resurrected through congressional corridors as violently and as assertively as it ever did during the session of the "big four" McKinley and Herbert Hoover, when the Payne-Aldrich and Hawley-Emmet measures built the tariff barriers against foreign import in that era.

The ways and means committee's hearings on the White House proposal have for all time with full approval during the Roosevelt-Hull-Truman regime of steadily lowered tariff walls have poured forth complicity pen-up but unheeded over 30 years.

PEPPERKING ISSUE—Rarely has there been such a laboratory demonstration of the fact that the tariff is a "local issue" almost impossible to solve on a national basis, although there is no alternative method. The tariff issue is a local issue in that it is a local industry in the protection of its own interests.

The opposition to foreign imports consists principally of interests which have been hurt. They range from such great industries as petroleum, coal, textiles and cement, to the manufacturing of shoes, gloves, jewelry, women's hats, wallpaper, jewelry, furniture, toys, etc.

Hearings Set On Revise of Levy System

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—A three-day hearing has opened the door for an exhaustive overhaul of federal tax laws aimed at a simpler, fairer coordinated revenue structure.

Chairman Reed, R., N. Y., of the House ways and means committee, called the session starting June 16 on the legislation, many of them providing more liberal tax relief for individuals and corporations.

Decisions Urged

The included such important suggestions as a deduction for working wives who have to hire baby sitters, increasing deductions for medical expenses, allowing a deduction for college education outlays, ending "double" taxation of both corporate income and dividends, and—increasing allowances for business depreciation and surplusage.

Reed has protested that tax laws have been piled pell mell on top of each other since the last complete tax revision 77 years ago, in 1878.

Time to Revise

The time has come, he said, to take a fresh look at the justice and clarity of each section of what he called the present "crazy-quilt" tax code and rewrite it in a simple and new provisions as needed.

The New Yorker said the hearings will not go into personal income or corporate tax rates themselves at this time, but will include a study of excise or sales taxes—the latter, he heard, has been a big item in movie tickets and hundreds of other items.

New Type of Sheep Illness Noted in West

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—Dr. A. Alexander, famous South African veterinarian, told agriculture department officials today "there is no doubt that the sheep disease 'blue tongue' exists among flocks in Texas, California and Utah.

"I was called in here by U. S. officials to make a tour of the area where 'blue tongue' was believed to have infected sheep herds last year. It is probably the first time that diagnosis of California veterinarians who visit others of the disease to help at his Government laboratory in the Union of South Africa.

Considerable Importance

Alexander, director of veterinary services for South Africa, says he returned from a month tour of the western states to find the disease "one of the most serious deadly virus in this country is of considerable international importance."

Alexander said the disease is confined to the African continent. He said now that it's here "you won't get rid of it until you appear to have it completely under control." He said the disease is of the type "midge" or "sand-fly" type of animal that causes it. He said you can control it in South Africa as done, by vaccinating sheep.

Vaccines Prepared

Dr. B. T. Giamas, chief of the bureau of animal industry, said Alexander has informed committee members how to make the vaccine. Giamas said a shortage may exist this summer, but by 1954 there should be a plentiful supply. Alexander explained that the disease strikes sheep only in the summer months, merely on the basis of geography, he said he would be surprised if the disease was also in Idaho and New Mexico.

Gains Noted for Disease Control

BOISE, May 14 (AP)—Idaho's brucellosis control program is well ahead of last year's when saw 105,000 calves vaccinated against the disease, Dr. A. P. Schneider, state veterinarian, said Wednesday.

He said 88,000 had been vaccinated so far this year compared with 46,000 at this time last year.

Ex-NAM Chief

Bennett, former president of the National Association of Manufacturers, said congress could act in President's emergency powers, and should not now authorize a freeze when it cannot tell that a freeze is needed.

"That's exactly the reason for the 90-day freeze," answered Senator Capohart, R., Ind. It would "hold sure of the line until we know what is needed, he said.

Senator Daniel, D., Tex., said he may offer an amendment which would limit the price freeze to the states charged by newspapers and radio and television stations.

Fish Packer Aide Assails Plan on Dam

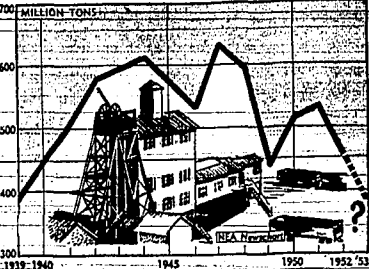
WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP) — A representative of the Pacific northwest fishing industry told congress Wednesday the Ice Harbor project is not necessary for the economic development of the Pacific northwest, nor a vital element in the national defense program.

James H. Hansen, executive secretary of the Columbia River Salmon and Trout packers association, told a house appropriations subcommittee the lower Snake river project "will increase instream demands for a vast dam building program" higher up the Snake.

English Firms Give Low Bid On 2 Projects

WASHINGTON, May 14 (AP)—Two British firms have given low bids on electrical transformers for the McNary dam being constructed by the army engineers on the Columbia river in Oregon, the defense department disclosed today.

The defense department said the bids—made on six transformers—now are being evaluated to determine which is the low bid in terms of efficiency, utilization of materials, and so on. When the evaluation is completed, the bids will go to Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens for a decision.

Low bidder on the transformers for the multi-purpose dam was the British firm of Parsons and Whitney of \$857,600. English Electric company was second with \$899,061, and third was Mooney Electric company, St. Louis, with \$983,228.

English Electric company was low bidder by one million dollars on generators and transformers for the Chief Joseph dam also being constructed on the Columbia river. The bid was rejected last month.

Defense Secretary Wilson said new bids are now being sought under revised specifications. The American action was widely criticized in Britain as running counter to the policy of "trade not aid" which was announced this week he found the specifications for the original bids were drawn too loosely.

Simplot Planning Washington Plant

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 14 (AP)—The J. R. Simplot company, Buena Vista, will build a commercial fertilizer plant here by Aug. 1, company spokesman said today.

Manager of the new plant will be Wallace Johnson, Yakima, the spokesman said.

The first building to be erected will be of reinforced concrete and will be 180 feet long. The plant will mix and batch fertilizer, insecticides and herbicides for the eastern Washington and Oregon wheat and pea areas.

A-Bomb Craft Force Called Best Defense

VALLEJO, Calif., May 14 (AP)—The United States must build up its long-range atomic bombing force as the best way of defending itself from atomic attack, a high air force official said today.

Lieut. Gen. Thomas D. White, air force deputy chief of staff for operations, said the U. S. would be lucky now if it could shoot down 30 per cent of enemy planes launched against it.

He told business and professional leaders in an armed forces day address the quantity and quality of air defense facilities must be improved.

But he warned that an offensive force cannot be sacrificed in order to concentrate on defense.

Cities Expense
"We must bear in mind that what we spend for air defense we cannot spend on long-range bombers or on tactical bombers to assist in the defense of Europe and to support our troops wherever they may be engaged," he said.

Furthermore, he said, an enemy might shoot down as many as 60 per cent of enemy bombers, but enough enemy planes might get through to destroy their targets with atomic bombs.

"Unless we maintain the ability to hit back more effectively than we are hit, we would be doomed to defeat in war," he said.

Man Is Fined \$500 for Duel Case in Reich

FRANKFURT, Germany, May 14 (AP)—Blondell Groszclose, Jullietta, Ida., was fined \$500 today for challenging a U. S. army captain to a pistol duel over a German woman.

Groszclose, 39-year-old ex-soldier and army aviator, told the American judge, "Thank you for your sentence."

But his lawyer said he would appeal because under the ancient German law by which Groszclose was tried, a duel challenge can only be punished by "honorable" confinement in a fortress.

Post-Question
"And where is the U. S. high commission going to get a fortress?" demanded the defense attorney, Elmo Gower, Cumberland, Md.

U. S. High Commission Court Judge John A. Speight, Dothan, Ala., had observed previously that the German law on the subject is "rather peculiar."

Easter Challenge
Groszclose, now a part-time prison sociologist and student, admitted that last Easter Sunday he confronted Capt. Charles D. Tarpley, Henderson, Tenn., with two pistols and offered him one of them.

Tarpley said that if he were an honorable man he would settle this matter here, and now and the one who would walk out of here alive.

Tarpley declined the challenge. Both had been courted by 32-year-old Dr. Margarete Meyer, a German service club. Groszclose claimed Tarpley stole her affections while he was in a hospital.

Tests Reveal Ways to Cut Wreck Tolls

LOS ANGELES, May 14 (AP)—Scientific tests indicating that passengers who survive air crashes by sliding in well cushioned, strongly braced, backward-facing seats were reported here by a widely known flight surgeon.

The experiments demonstrated that the ability of a human being to withstand an impact equal to more than 40 times the force of gravity if he is seated in the stopping force is applied evenly over his back and hips, or over his chest and abdomen.

The shock of 35 per cent of all commercial plane crashes amounts to less than half of this experimental force, Lt. Col. John F. Slapp, U.S. Air Force, said at a press base, Dayton, O., told interviewees at the world meeting of the Aero Medical Association.

In ordinary planes, Dr. Slapp said, backward-facing seats made to protect a person against an impact of 18 times gravity. The greater majority of commercial crashes involving such things as plowing through treets and other belly straining incidents are caused by a shock greater than 20 times gravity, he asserted.

Crashes made to take up the impact of 40 times gravity, but they would have to be heavily cushioned and strongly braced, a floor much heavier than most planes now have.

Boyle Relates Sad Tale of His Mother's Battle to Grow Lawn

By HAL BOYLE

KANSAS CITY, May 14.—Once a girl is a mother she just has to keep on growing something.

Well, if you ever bought a house and tried to grow grass around it, it's like to have some children. You meet my mother.

She has been trying to grow grass around a house for more than 30 years. You can't tell her the Stookery bridge, but you can convince her you grew grass on "this" bridge—she'll bargain for the seed.

All-mom started with was the fact of a fair, green, clean lawn—or, in her time, a meadow quiet and undisturbed. And I suppose she always has had a yearning to get back to the peace of it. So she goes on planting . . . some day to get back.

She was the eldest of nine Irish girls and an Irish boy, born on an Irish farm where Irish pride jured above the stones of Irish porphyry.

The girls came over to help settle a barren America, all nine of them. The boy stayed at home to keep England from owing all of Ireland, and filled his hands, and died there, while his sisters lived across the seas.

I have passed the statue of liberty many times in my life, going and coming, and think I own a part of it. My mother never has taken it for granted. She never has passed it going the other way, and doesn't want to. When she mentions the statue of liberty her mouth frames a kiss.

But mama did bring from Ireland something she is always reaching back to—to her dream of the fair lawn of youth. She always has kept a green fern thumb in the city, and a sweet growing mind. She has liked to see things come to flower, including her five children, and never has lacked the energy to kick a bud into bloom.

But it is that fair green lawn she

yearns for. And so for 32 years she has fought to make a lawn before, behind and around an eight-room old-fashioned house—died—bought for \$3,000. Mom now threatens to give away and actually is willing to part with her one million dollar lawn—cold cash, no sentiment involved.

The spring has been rainy in the Midwest, and the grass has come up in patches. All dogs and children in the neighborhood are afraid of mama, and they love her too, because when she is strong she orders them off the possible lawn of her dreams, and when she is tired she sits down in the old scabbard yard and will talk to them.

Mama has always been that way. When she raises her voice, every body runs away. When she is weary, everyone wants to cluster around her. This is the hardest single fact about one human being I have ever tried to figure out. She is 60 and I am 42, and I still don't know how she can boss children and dogs that way, and make them all love her.

She fights the lawn so hard we have to forbid her the lawnmower. Maybe you can't hire kids today to mow lawns, but she has always tackled that grass herself, though her face grows red and she has been told not to do it.

But nobody can stop mama from putting in her tomato plants. Wonderful, too, but she has always offered to take her back for a visit to Ireland, and see again the farm she was born on. She says: "Ireland isn't modern. I would rather see the rest of America."

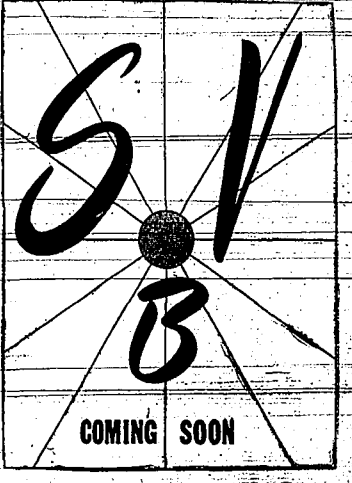

Chinese Reds Also Ease up On Prisoners

YONG KONG, May 14 (AP)—The Chinese ease of their attitude, appear to have started a campaign of "freedom and light" on the Chinese domestic front.

"Nothing unusual" but reports coming from prisoners held in the Chinese interior have reported several cases in which prisoners have been released from Red Chinese jails.

Missionary Joseph Gaertner, who arrived here from Yenchow, said he knew of several political prisoners released from jail and others whose prison terms were reduced.

Further, George Schwab, who left China Sunday evening, said that in Szechow, Shantung province, the common law treatment of prisoners has lost much of its severity.

Similar reports came from refugees from Fukien and Szechuan provinces.

In Kwangtung province, according to the Communist newspaper, the Wah Kii Man Poo, accusation meetings against landlords and other persons have fallen off sharply. Many imprisoned landlords, the paper said, now are being given "freedom of movement" and they are being permitted to work with the labor corps.

India's "Grand Trunk" Route Mere Path, GI Finds on Trip

NEW DELHI, May 14 (AP)—An ex-GI thumping his way back from Korea has advice for globe-trotters—don't try to hitchhike across India. "Everybody picks you up, but how fast can you travel on ox carriages," asks ex-Cpl. Leo Gotslinger, 24, Youngstown, O.

"You stand for six hours along a road 10 feet wide, with monkeys for company, but not even any cow to ride. You get tired of bananas, oranges and sugarcane juice," Gotslinger, in an interview, said he and ex-Pvt. Alfred Evans of Boechurst, N. Y., got special permission from Gen. Mark Clark to return to the U. S. the long way. They hopped a freighter at Kobe, Japan, Feb. 28, and reached Cal-

cutia a month later after one free air passage and two cut-rate hops. They separated in Calcutta. Evans rode through Delhi weeks ahead of Gotslinger, who looked over Calcutta and the holy city of Benares among other Indian centers, en route to the capital.

Gotslinger, who left Japan with 400 and had 400 when he reached Delhi, said a battered map of India showing the "grand trunk highway" from Calcutta all the way to mountaintop Kashmir led him astray.

He had visions of "maharajahs" riding along by the dozen to Kashmir. He came down to earth when he got off a bus on the outskirts of Calcutta and found the beginning of the grand trunk only a lane filled with oxen.

He finally wanted a ride with a police car escorting the prime minister of West Bengal state on an inspection tour. That took him to a village where he spent his first night of a straw cot, "just like the army."

Hitchhiking and sightseeing from Calcutta to Delhi, Gotslinger reported to trains and buses twice. The first time came when he discovered the grand trunk stopped dead at a river bank.

At the famed Taj Mahal, at Agra, he went to the edge of the Yamuna river behind the marble monument to see if turtles really fed on dead human bodies "as it says in 'Lives of the Bengal Lancers.'"

"There were turtles, but no corpses," he reported.

After a week in Delhi, Gotslinger started westward in pursuit of Evans, via the middle east, and pa-

There are at least three measures under consideration now by the house ways and means committee to impose tariffs on lead and zinc. The general bill by Richard M. Simpson, R. Many Fliers Now Past 60; Study Shows

LOS ANGELES, May 14 (AP)—Old airplane pilots are getting older. They just keep pushing 'em through.

More than 1,000 civilian pilots in this country now are past the age of 60, a study by the Federal Aviation Authority reported today.

Dr. Ross A. McFarland, Harvard University school of public health, told the world meeting of the Aero Medical Association.

But the senior fliers still are doing a good job. A study of 60 civilian air crashes shows that pilot error had nothing to do with the crashes, Dr. McFarland said.

Those and other findings about increasing numbers of pilots who accumulate many birthdays but do not grow old brought a proposal from a Los Angeles psychiatrist that a test for determining a person's functional age might be useful to society.

Under this way of reckoning, a person might be young at 80 or old at 35.

Atlanta No. 10 flier Dr. McFarland cited tests which show that older pilots are less affected by high altitude than youngsters.

At 16,000 feet the young men lost more oxygen than their elders, he said.

Falling eyelids, Dr. McFarland added, is more of a hazard in automobiles driving than in piloting planes.

The "most obvious difference in the age groups," he reported, is that the older men cannot remember recent events as well as the young ones.

Atlanta Pilots Of the more than 1,000 men over 60 flying civilian planes, Dr. McFarland reported, 12 are airline pilots, 16 are commercial fliers, and the others operate privately owned planes.

Because of the anomalies in the age picture, Dr. John D. Mortari, the psychiatrist, proposed that four different things be taken into consideration in determining the effective age of individuals.

First would be the person's age in years. Second, the condition of his arteries, heart, kidneys, liver and other vital organs would be rated. Then his mental level would be thrown in, and finally his emotional age. The average of these, Dr. Mortari said, might be taken as a pretty good indication of the realistic age of the individual.
