## Idaho Power Completes Filing of Bids for Licensing of River Dams

**T**HURSDAY—President Truman's proposal completed today his plan to build Brownlee Dam on Snake River between Idaho and Oregon. The government's environmental impact statement was a week after Interior Secretary I. M. Stumpf withdrew his opposition to Idaho Power's proposal by the time Idaho Power applied for the Oxbow license in April. The application included "a firm commitment for full development of the river area involved."

"Engineering work continued and has now been completed for the formal filing in fulfillment of that commitment."

The three dams comprise Idaho Power's plan to develop the stretch of the river—the interior department under President Truman favored construction of a multi-purpose dam by the government.

**PUC Hearing Set on Train Discontinuance**

The adjourned PUC hearing on the application of the Union Pacific railroad to discontinue trains 573 and 574 from Minidoka to Buhl will be held at the Twin Falls county courthouse at 9 a.m. Tuesday. Both trains are mail and passenger trains only. Train 574 leaves Buhl at 12:30 p.m. daily and goes to Minidoka and train 573 returns from Minidoka, arriving at Buhl at 6:50 p.m.

The railroad filed the application with the PUC to discontinue the trains more than six months ago. Formal protests on the discontinuance were received from civic groups in Rupert, Buhl and Jerome, and followed a preliminary hearing at Boise, the hearing was adjourned to Twin Falls.

Busey claims that only one railroader feels the area will not suffer if the trains are discontinued. Reduced passenger revenue has been given as the reason for seeking the discontinuance. Union Pacific officials say the trains are discontinued because the post office department probably will establish state routes to bring the mail from Shoshone. The officials claim the area will receive similar service as a result of the discontinuance.

Post office officials in Twin Falls report they have no information on the possible establishments of state routes in case the trains stop running.

Railroad officials said Friday they do not anticipate too much opposition at the hearing on the discontinuance. Within the last week or 10 days officials have visited various communities in the valley to explain their case.

Post office officials are continuing their efforts to keep the rates now in effect and reasonable and to insist on compensation from the company from putting off its rate increase immediately.

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**Death Claims Sarah Wygal At Age of 102**

**WEDNESDAY, MAY 15.—Mrs. Sarah S. Wygal, 102, died about 3 p.m. Thursday at her home. She was born May 26, 1850, in Crittenden, Ky.**

At the age of 3 she moved with her parents to Missouri. She joined the Methodist church there in 1868 and was married to William H. Wygal Dec. 17, 1879.

After her marriage, she moved to Colorado, settling at Fort Collins. They moved to Lander, Wyo., and remained there until 1904 when they returned to Colorado to live near Florence. In 1910 they moved to Cortez, Colo.

The Wygals came to Idaho and settled in Pocatello in 1914. After the death of her husband on April 11, 1922, Mrs. Wygal lived with her daughter, Jessie, at Pocatello. Three children preceded her in death.

Mr. Wygal was a well-known resident of Pocatello where people of the Methodist church and neighborhood had made the annual observance of her birthday for the past 12 years and a half, to which she looked forward eagerly.

Her mind was still alert and she had a remarkable memory of commonplace events of the past that often astounded the most people only through her memory.

Remembered incidents of the Civil War were often related by Mrs. Wygal.

**Funds for Pair of Agencies Slashed**

**WASHINGTON, May 15.—The House appropriations committee slashed deeply today into funds both President Eisenhower and the national camping organization received for the labor department and the new department of health, education and welfare.**

It sent the house floor for debate a bill to appropriate \$14,956,581 for the two departments and related agencies for the 1954 fiscal year, which starts July 1.

The bill, a drive to reduce the budget, will provide the largest cut for the Civilian Conservation Corps, the Camp Fire Girls and the Boy Scouts.



## Fourth Boise Valley Video Station OK'd

BOISE, May 15 (UPI)—Radio station KBOE, which will be operated by the Boise Valley Broadcasters, Inc., the fourth in this area to be granted a television construction permit by the federal communications commission, has applied to broadcast on channel 2. Earl Glade, Jr., will be station manager at both the radio and television operation. He hopes to be on the air by July 1, 1953.

Previous permits were granted to stations KIDQ and KEGM, Boise, and KFDF, Nampa.

Location Reserved. - Worthy of the Whistlewind, president of the Boise Valley Broadcasters, has said in an earlier statement broadcasting studios will be located at Meridian.

The present location of the studio will allow it to serve the Caldwell, Nampa, Boise and the other surrounding communities, Whistlewind explained.

Highest in State. - "From the 1,650-foot vantage point—the highest in Idaho—television can be made available to an area extending from Boise to Huntington, Ore., and possibly beyond."

He added that reception in the mountain valleys will have to be proven by actual broadcasts as a later date.

The estimated cost of construction of the transmitter will be around \$200,000, Whistlewind said.



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## Planes Rake Center; MiG Toll Boosted

**REPORT**, Korea, May 15—Nearly 300 United Nations fighter bombers devastated a red army training center on Korea's west coast today while bombing and strafing destroyed three communist MiG-15s and damaged five.

Capt. Joseph McConnell, Apple Valley, Calif., who downed two MiGs, is raising his total to within one kill of the world's jet record held by Capt. Manuel J. Fernandez Jr., Miami, Fla.

The 'shuttling' relays of Sabre-bombers Thunderbolts and Meteors hurled bombs and napalm for 10 hours on the training center near Chonan, 30 miles south of Seoul.

Fifth air force headquarters said the U.N. warplanes destroyed nearly 100 buildings and damaged 200,000 yards of roads, 100 irrigation ditches, 1000 men killed or wounded and 350 aircraft.

In repulsing a 1,500-man attack against Vegas hill and the outpost positions guarding the shortest invasion route to Seoul.

Positions Recaptured

South Korean troops recaptured Texas hill and two other advance positions after 500 Chinese overran the hill, but put them back again after second assault from the front.

"At sea, the U.S. aircraft carrier *Midway* has been to Korea's waters yesterday for the fourth time since 27,000-ton carrier launched its fighter-bombers in heavy attacks against targets on the east coast of North Korea.

**CARIBBEAN**, N.Y., May 15—A B-29 bomber, flying low and apparently in trouble, plowed into the ground on a farm near here Thursday and nine men died in the flaming wreckage.

Miraculously, three survivors scarcely hurt walked away from the crash.

The three had been in the tail section which was torn off the remainder of the fuselage. One man received a broken jaw but none was hurt enough to be hospitalized.

The air force withheld names of the dead and survivors due to the fact they were in Tokyo with the American Red Cross.

He had been under medical treatment here since he was freed from the Chinese prison camp at Chungmien, Korea, last month. His wife, Abigail, whom he married only two months before his capture, was in Tokyo with the American Red Cross.
