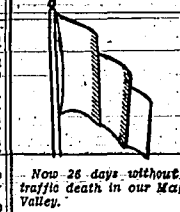

Cuts in U. N. Fund Sought By McCarthy

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—Senator McCarthy, R. Wis., filed today a proposal aimed at making them take over more of the costs of the Korean war.

As explained by McCarthy, who is engaged in a two-year battle with British leaders, the amendment would:

1. Reduce the U. N. contribution to the U. N. operating expenses to the percentage level of other nations.

2. Thereby induce other nations who are not in McCarthy's view, contributing enough to the Korean war effort to stop their participation in U. N. activities as a sort of offset.

McCarthy's new move came as Sen. H. Alexander Smith, R. N. J., a foreign relations committee member, predicted the department might eventually will accept the U. N. proposals for handling Korean prisoners of war and also "probably" the unification of Korea.

CORAL CARLISLE, 74, May 16 (AP)—A heart-broken mother appealed to President Eisenhower today to help find the body of her son, one of 46 persons killed when an airplane plunged into the Gulf of Mexico Feb. 14.

Mrs. Richard H. Shaddick, 74, said searchers had located an object believed to be the plane's bulk but refused to provide a diver to investigate.

"As a father and a great humanitarian, could you please help us in this effort," Mrs. Shaddick said in a telegram to the President.

"We want to recover the bodies of our loved ones. The sanity of the mothers and wives of the victims depends on our recovering the bodies."

The National Airlines DC-8 disappeared during a storm over the Gulf while en route from Miami to New Orleans after a stop at Tampa.

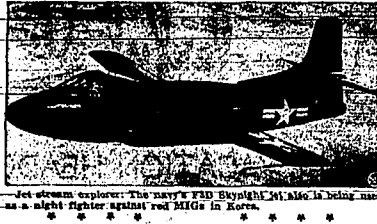

New Data About 'Jet Streams' Revising Old Ideas on Flying

WASHINGTON (NSA)—New discoveries about the "jet stream" may revolutionize military and commercial flying.
The new information, just turned up by two navy fliers, also is expected to have an important effect on the use of guided missiles, the country's air defense, and may even result in very accurate, long-range weather forecasts.
Jet streams are described as fast flowing rivers of air in the sky. They were first detected, six to 10 miles high, by B-29 bombers during World War II. No one knew what they were. Frequently bombers had to cast about for the most accurate predictions on the locations of the streams.
Further, they proved the complete feasibility of making full operational use of the jet stream for military flying. This could be the most important aspect of their study.
It's obvious that proper use of the stream will make all missions faster and save fuel. On the other hand, the need to dodge the stream when flying against it is also very important.
Concerning the country's air defense, an exact knowledge of the position and speed of the jet streams over the oceans would reveal an obvious road of attack by enemy bombers. When the stream was known to be favorable for an enemy attack, the defenses would have to be put on a special alert, with attention concentrated on the location of the stream.
It is fairly apparent how knowledge of the stream will affect the way the stream probably will affect the use of the stream for cutting down on fuel and speeding up schedules.

Report Notes Big Gains for School Costs

WASHINGTON, May 16 (U)—The Council of State Chambers of Commerce reported today that expenditures for operation of the school systems increased \$8.28 cent from the 1946-47 to the 1950-51 school year.

The 1950-51 total operating expenditures in the 1950-51 year at \$5,044,000,000 compared with \$2,707,000,000 in the 1946-47 school year.

Arizona Leads

Among western states largest percentage increase was reported for Arizona, a gain of 148 per cent with total expenditures of \$33,364,000 for 1950-51.

Smallest percentage gain was in Montana, which spent \$28,445,000 an increase of 51 per cent.

Other western figures included: California, \$61,228,000, 126 per cent; Colorado, \$47,460,000, 99 per cent; Idaho \$21,705,000, 94 per cent; Nevada, \$6,278,000, 102 per cent; Oregon, \$46,233,000, 130 per cent; Utah, \$29,923,000, 65 per cent; Washington, \$26,179,000, 77 per cent; Wyoming, \$14,153,000, 97 per cent.

The report said the average expenditure for each pupil for the nine month period from \$16 to \$24, or 66 per cent.

The council said the figures represented "a record the states and localities have made on their own not with federal aid," and added: "It is almost certain that current spending for schools is greater than it would have been under a federally assisted program. It is equally important is the fact that control of education is still in local hands with no federal strings attached."

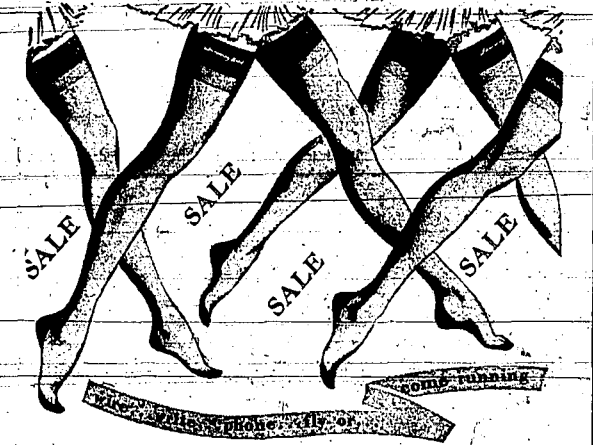

 IDAHO FALLS, May 15 (UP)—Flow of Snake river in eastern Idaho is so low that water regulations were imposed Friday, the earliest date in 12 years, water master, Lynn Crandall said today.

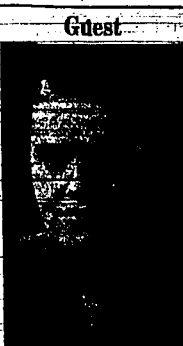

The any other news reporter would have done," one newspaper asked. Oatis looked at the questioner and said emphatically: "I am not going to express an opinion on that point."
Another reporter asked Oatis to say a few words about the thousands of Czechs and Slovaks still in prison for nothing more than loyalty to their old traditions and about the recent general amnesty for Czech prisoners.

Refused Comment
"I'm sure for anybody in prison anywhere," Oatis said. "But I can't say anything about the amnesty because I never heard of it."
He told the group he was notified by a Czech security official Friday midnight that he was going to be released.

This drew the question: "Why do you think you were released?"
"Frankly I don't know," Oatis answered with a puzzled expression. "I was told that a letter with news to the president of Czechoslovakia had a great deal to do with it—more than anything in the world."
He said he met no Americans but one west European in prison, then added, cautiously, because he is still talk about him because he is still in prison.

He was permitted three visits by representatives of the U. S. embassy in Prague during his imprisonment. Then a reporter asked him to comment on communist press accounts that he had confessed at his trial, which ended July 4, 1951.

Nothing to say, he said. "I have nothing to say," the correspondent replied. "Will you withdraw your question when you get home?"
"I'd better wait until I get home," he replied. Oatis said.

"I had been worried because some of my employers (Czech) nationals were getting into my car," Oatis said. "My car was being followed by what was obviously a car of the Czech police on April 23, 1951. I left the U. S. embassy, stopped the car and thought it over. I decided I was in no danger."
"I talked with people in the embassy and made an appointment to see them Monday. I left the Associated Press office, six policemen walked up and said I was arrested."

Wife Delighted
In St. Paul, Minn., Mrs. Oatis was "grateful, delighted and shocked" when she learned her husband actually had crossed into the free world. She had been up most of Friday night waiting for the news after the first bare announcement came that Oatis was going to be let out.

Mrs. Oatis' letter to the Czechoslovakia, written as a desperate appeal, said:
"Surely you must have a simple plan for money and put an end to this bitterly unhappy situation in which my husband William and I are entrapped. We married because we wanted to spend our lives together. Yet the days go by, one after another, and so does the time we would be spending together. We can never regain what has already been lost but I continue to hope for it."

His wife when he was assigned to the AP foreign desk in New York and she was employed in a press association in reference department there. Assigned first to London and then sent to Prague as chief of the bureau. He was planning, when arrested, to have his wife join him in Czechoslovakia.

Senator Magnuson's attack on the Eisenhower administration came as it was doing now and giving our scalps to Wall Street.
"We westerners are a pretty hardy people . . . For the next four years I suppose we will have to take it . . ."

"We know what's coming—that's for sure. And from the flood of letters and telegrams pouring into my office protesting the grab, giveaways and cutbacks, I think we westerners are beginning to get a little bit angry."
More interjected frequent denunciations of the McKay decision during Magnuson's speech.
When Magnuson observed that if Idaho Power goes ahead with the Oxbow dam, "the name should be changed . . . to 'Dog-in-the-manger Dam.'" More suggested that it should be named "Eisenhower dam, as a monument for all to see what happens when the people go to sleep."
At Lewiston, Mitchell told a meeting of Democrats that Walker changed this transcript of an ex-

change between himself and Magnuson concerning Hells canyon.
"Senator Magnuson had him in a corner . . . and Senator Walker was protesting forcefully that he was neither for it (the dam) for against it . . ."
Transcript Altered
"You should see how he altered the transcript of that debate before it appeared in the Congressional Record."
The Democratic leader did not say how the transcript was altered. Mitchell accused McKay of falling in his obligation to the people when he withdrew the Hells canyon intervention before the PFC. He called McKay's "deductions" "most difficult reasoning that defeats itself."
He said McKay maintained it would be useless to build the high Hells canyon dam unless four other damsites downstream also were developed—Ice Harbor, Luger Mountain, Little Goose and Lower Granite—and the budget bureau would never allow that.
"If anyone recommends that Ice Harbor or any of the other lower Snake dams be started, Mr. McKay can argue that they fall potential can't be realized either because the high dam at Hells canyon will never be built," he said.

Mitchell referred to statements reportedly made by Walker in a recent Tennessee visit when the senator was quoted as advocating sale of Tennessee valley authority dams to private power companies.

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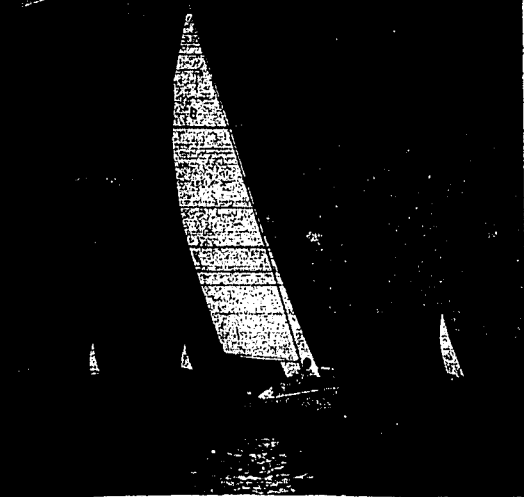

Pruett Gives His Views of Sky Oddities

By J. HUGH PRUETT

 One evening last month when the full moon was beaming in the southeastern sky, my telephone rang. A woman's voice asked, "Have you looked at the moon tonight?" "What's the matter with it? There is an immense cross of light centered on it and extending out a long distance toward the top and bottom and on both sides of it."

Since this was an old story to me, I suspected at once that I knew the trouble. Others, some quite excited, have asked me the same question. A few years ago one winter night, a happy inquirer had seen the phenomenon and called me at 4 a. m. to witness the supposedly supernatural manifestation. Great disappointment ensued when I cited a perfectly natural explanation for the appearance and that it was not a divine omen of any kind.

When the recent inquiry came, I asked at once, "were you viewing the moon through a screen?" The answer: "Well—yes, we were looking through a screen."

I suggested that while I waited, she should go outside and view the moon without a screen or a handkerchief. Rotation of the object through which the light is viewed will cause the cross to rotate. This effect is a case of diffraction, a phenomenon well explained in the study of optics.

Each year at night the following night the big moon again caused concern. Late in the evening a man's voice came over the telephone. "Is it ever possible to see a rainbow at night?" He was sure he had seen one only shortly before the moon came out.

It is possible. And from his description and the directions given I am sure he saw one. But such is a very rare sight from inland locations. I have seen only one about a dozen years ago. The colored rings (coronae), sometimes seen around the moon are not rainbows.

Rainbows are in the opposite part of the sky from the sun or moon. Raindrops must be falling in the direction the bow is seen. Refraction (and reflection) of the light takes place (since moonlight is far more dim than sunlight, it requires a full moon—or almost such—to produce a bow easily seen at night).

Sometimes an unknown telephone caller starts, "Are you the astrologer?" Perhaps it is the height of impudence to call attention to the error in terms, but I usually attempt a slight correction. Since astrologers of the present do not believe in telling fortunes by the stars, they dislike being called astrologers.

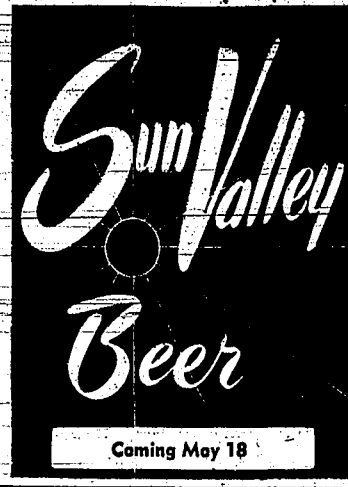

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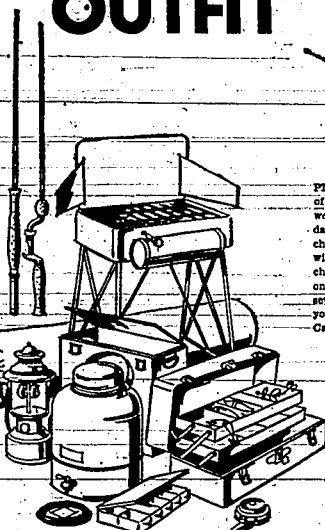

Drew Pearson Loses \$50,001 Damage Claim

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—A federal court jury Friday ordered Drew Pearson, columnist and radio commentator, to pay \$50,001 damages to former Assistant Attorney General Norman R. Littell.

Court verdict on the award was the largest in a libel action in the past 30 years. Pearson, who was in his 50th year, announced promptly he will appeal.

The jury decision came after three days of testimony and two and one-half weeks of testimony.

Two \$100,000 suits

Littell brought two \$100,000 actions against Pearson.

The jury was unable to reach a decision in one in the other awarded Littell \$50,000 compensatory and \$1 punitive damages.

Littell sued Pearson for statements in a newspaper column of April 10, 1946, and a broadcast of May 2, 1946.

In his column Pearson said the justice department was causing a "quintal eye" at Littell because of reports that he was a Communist agent for the Dutch government without registering as a foreign agent.

Beals of Award

It was for this statement that the jury made today's award.

It was unable to agree on the other suit, asking damages for defamation on the basis of the broadcast. In the broadcast Pearson said Littell, who had been an attorney for the Polish embassy here, arranged to get Communist Polish officers aboard the liner Batery ahead of U. S. authorities.

Bids Asked on Test Wells for Mountain Home Area Project

BOISE, May 16 (AP)—The regional office of the bureau of reclamation Friday called for bids on three test wells in its project planning survey of the so-called Sloan plan to irrigate the Mountain Home desert and to lower the ground water table in the Boise valley.

Under the plan drawn up by W. G. Sloan, former assistant director of the Billings regional office, water would be pumped from the Snake valley, where the ground water is too high, and used for irrigating. Farmers downstream on the Boise river would relinquish some of the water held at Anderson Ranch dam, which would go to the Mountain Home area through the proposed Long Tom tunnel.

The tunnel said it would open bids in Boise June 3 for three test wells within a 25-mile radius of Caldwell, and possibly three to five observation wells around each of them.

It announced also it plans to start next fall drilling north of Mountain Home next week on a potential power plant site. The plant would utilize a drop of about 300 feet at the discharge end of the seven-mile-long Long Tom tunnel.

An aerial survey was made this week as part of an investigation of a pumping plant half a mile below Marston on the Snake river, and core drilling will be done within the next 30 days. The project may include the purchase of some water from the Snake into Deer Flat reservoir, the bureau said.

Eisenhower's Statement Over Project Gets Varied Reaction

WASHINGTON, May 16 (Special)—President Eisenhower's statement putting him on the record for private power development of Hells Canyon brought a mixed reaction from Idaho's congressional delegation.

While Democratic Rep. Claude Frost angrily challenged the source of the information that local opinion "definitely" favored private development, Republican members of the delegation indicated that the President had not gone as far as he had.

Sen. Herman Walker declined to say anything at all and Sen. Henry Dworshak wanted against stirring up political heat when the matter is before the federal power commission.

Mrs. Frost, leading proponent of the federal dam, issued a vehement statement.

"I don't know who discussed the Hells canyon issue with the President," she said. "I am convinced, however, that if they are the same private power representatives responsible for Interior Secretary McKay's adverse decision, the President has had only one side of the story."

"I discussed the dam with many people," she said. "The Hells canyon dam have been built by many, many more. Over 80 per cent have expressed themselves as favoring Hells canyon dam. They know the urgency of supplying more low cost energy in the Northwest. They are well aware of the many benefits that will accrue to Idaho, the Northwest and the nation as a whole. I
