

Given to Unions

A one-year contract between the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America and the Idaho State Employees' Association was announced Monday.

The contract, which covers the period from July 1 to June 30, 1953, provides for a 10 percent increase in wages and a 5 percent increase in the cost of living allowance.

The contract also provides for a 5 percent increase in the cost of living allowance for each year of the contract.

The contract was negotiated by the Idaho State Employees' Association and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America.

Present Assemblies

The Idaho State Employees' Association will present a series of assemblies for its members during the month of May.

The assemblies will be held at various locations throughout the state and will include a variety of activities, including lectures, discussions, and social events.

The first assembly will be held in Boise on May 10, and will be followed by similar assemblies in other parts of the state.

The Idaho State Employees' Association has announced a change in its rules regarding the use of buses for members.

The new rule states that members who wish to use the association's buses must first obtain permission from the association's executive committee.

The committee will consider requests for bus use on a case-by-case basis, and will take into account the needs of the association and the availability of buses.

Mrs. Pfost Tells Demo Women She Campaigned for Big Dam

WASHINGTON, May 19 (AP)—Rep. Grace Pfost, D. Idaho, "campaigned vigorously for the Hells canyon project," she told members of the Women's National Democratic club here Monday.

"I've been asked to talk to you about Hells canyon dam," she said. "I think that's one of the major reasons they voted for me."

Mrs. Oscar Chapman, whose husband preceded Mr. Pfost as secretary of the interior, was among the club members who heard Mrs. Pfost. Chapman opposed Idaho Power company's proposal for low-head dams in the same area as the federal dam.

The congressman said the government dam would ultimately bring into production a million acres of fertile land.

No other development on the river, she said, would yield as much in local and federal taxes by attracting industries to process natural resources, and freight rates would be lowered because boats could come at least to Lewiston, Ida. 80 miles below the proposed dam.

Mrs. Pfost said Hells canyon dam alone would generate 900,000 kilowatts of power.

agricultural economy. But he added the line apparently is interested only in reaping the freight business and relieving itself of the obligation of providing the other services.

Resolutions Opposed

The board authorized the extensions of Borah and Dubois avenues. City Manager Joseph H. Latimore estimated the cost of materials at \$100,000. He said the eight lots offered as a park site along at Dubois avenue.

The extension of city engineering to developments outside city limits was voted down, after Latimore reported the proposal was disapproved by the board at a meeting of private engineers at 8:30 a.m. and rejected by the engineers on the basis that they could provide the necessary engineering service.

Latimore pointed out the city could impose a zoning ordinance and specifications in the development of housing on its outskirts, simply by insuring that plans drawn up by private engineers had the approval of the city engineer before granting applications for sewer and water connections. This course of policy was adopted.

Tells Street Plans

Latimore reported plans to map the city for federal consideration in the allocation of highway funds were under way and would be ready for the board by the week of the planning and zoning commission.

Under a federal program of mapping communities about the nation, streets and highways are shown within urban areas which join U. S. highways in the areas will become eligible for federal assistance.

Latimore reminded commissioners the Idaho Municipal League convention will be held June 11, 12 and 13 in Pocatello.

Painting Parking Meters

The city reported its parking meters have been painted to indicate to motorists the time limits on the meters. Red will indicate 15-minute zones, yellow 10-minute zones and green two-hour zones. The points in the parking zones will be left as they are, a silver color.

She accomplished this feat Monday while shuttling a two-engine Lockheed P-80 jet plane at an average of 622.57 miles per hour. She shattered the woman's jet speed record of 534.375 miles per hour set by Jacqueline Auriol, France, and the all-time jet record for a 100-kilometer course set by Col. Fred Alcock, U. S. air force, 535.982 mph.

Mrs. Cochran told newsmen that "passing the sonic barrier was the most exciting and interesting experience in my 21 years of flying."

Mrs. Cochran is the wife of financier Floyd Ogdum.
