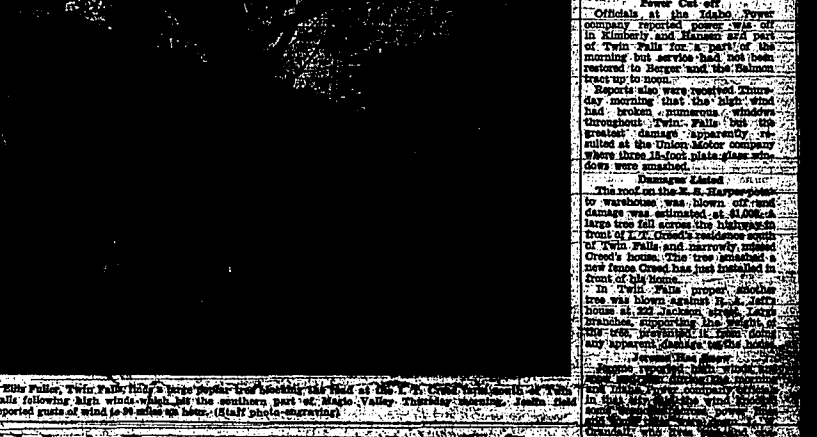

At least one roof was ripped off when the full force of the blow hit Twin Falls at 9:27 a. m.

night that a weak letter Oatis was released to the State Dulles "made diplomatic representations" to the Czech government.

The announcement said Mrs. Oatis' husband, Walter Oatis, died March 7. It said Dulles told her that the U. S. government would give her a passport to get her husband free.

Mrs. Oatis said in New York she wrote the President and Dulles, and the new administration office Jan. 20, because she wanted to preserve the continuity of her husband's letter to the State.

On his return to the U. S. Mr. Oatis' letter outlined how he served the U. S. government in any capacity while he was Associated Press correspondent in Czechoslovakia.

It was said the cause of his trouble was that he got news tips from sources other than the Czech news outlet, then checked them with the U. S. embassy in an effort to get more information.

Such practice is routine in western countries, he said, but under Czech law "can be construed . . . to be espionage."

The President is scheduled to return to Washington from this trip on June 16, and Hagerty said the "three countries probably would be held soon after that date."

Hagerty did not expand on Mr. Eisenhower's statement as to the purpose of the meeting.

"The agreement on it comes at a time when there has been increasing pressure in Britain for a high-level conference with the Russians aimed at easing east-west tension.

But so far as could be determined here there was no intention or desire on the part of Eisenhower to turn the meeting into a big four session by ringing in Soviet Premier Malenkov."

proportion bill, under which actual payments will be made. It did not add to the \$12,747,822 in new funds for the department during the coming fiscal year.

The fight over the soil conservation payments was a hot, see-saw struggle. At first the house approved a measure with amendments that it was a "give-away program" which would benefit mostly the "limestone trust" through time purchase to improve the land.

On a preliminary non-record vote, the house agreed 197 to 187 to stick with the administration program. But on a showdown roll call later, the members voted 401 to 186 on the \$12 million dollar program the appropriations committee had approved. Eisenhower asked 140 million a year cut from the \$263 million asked by former President Truman.

The house did vote to cut from \$2,500 to \$1,000 the top amount that may be paid to any farmer under the bill for the rental, rearing and rebuilding soil fertility.

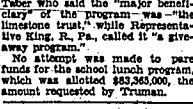
"The total of new funds voted in the farm bill is \$27,104,158 less than the \$30,000,000 requested, and \$9,947,088 more than Eisenhower had sought."

Behind the new cash and the conservation authorization, the bill would authorize loans of 34 1/2 million a year out from the Soil Conservation Administration and the farmers home administration. This is 17 1/2 million less than Truman requested, but 42 1/2 million more than Secretary of Agriculture Benson asked. All these loans are repayable.

To meet commitments on the 1953 conservation program, the house approved \$11,892,000, a cut of \$40,444,000 from Truman requests. Republicans headed by Chairman Tabor of the appropriations committee led the drive to pare the soil conservation program. It was Tabor who said the "major beneficiary" of the program was—the limestone trust, while Representative King, R. Pa., called it a "give-away program."

No attempt was made to pare funds for the school lunch program, which was allotted \$83,565,000, the amount requested by Truman.

bow, and was "heavily charged with concerning the matter of full and reasonable development of the resources involved."

Chairman said he contended that the Idaho Power company plan, which originally called for construction of five low dams on the Snake, would result in the loss to the Pacific northwest of some 600,000 kilowatts of power.

McKay said he found that a three-dam development proposed by Idaho Power "is reasonably comparable as to results" with the federal project and that his department had no assurance it could carry over the plan without needed funds, primarily because of efforts being made to balance the budget.

He estimated that power from the first unit of the three-dam private power project could be in production at least seven or eight years before the federal project could be built and said the Pacific northwest is critically in need of more power.

Since McKay's decision was announced, Idaho Power has formally applied to the power commission for the first unit of the three-dam project and Brownlee dams on the Snake to supplement the "Oxbow" project and develop a 10-mile stretch of the river downstream from Weiser.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Paving Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge's economic forecast and Secretary Douglas McKay's power policies, President Eisenhower has quietly approved continued construction of the great, multiple-purpose Oahe dam in South Dakota as an important element of his \$770,000,000 tax-saver. Personal and political considerations alone motivate the White House decision.

The Truman request of \$418,000,000 for 1959 construction was authorized by Dodge from the war department's old functional appropriations bill on April 20. Because of doubt as to Oahe's economic, engineering and hydro-electric value, the dam's construction for indefinite deferral and possible permanent elimination pending further review of the natural resources problem in the vast Northwest.

Many army authorities and local interests support this viewpoint. The cost of power production by the dam is estimated to be less than that of other power plants. The dam's power plant will produce electricity at a rate of 100,000 kilowatts per hour, which is a sufficiently favorable rate. But the politicians' interest in this section is on going ahead with Oahe.

COSTLY, UNNECESSARY DAM—On May 5, only a few days after the governor spent two days with Eisenhower in conference at the White House, the President decided to cancel the \$418,000,000 appropriation of \$200,000,000.

Times blocked by congress, the dam's decision will require a heavy expenditure of a dam bill. It is regarded as unnecessary, it also will inspire political interest in every part of the country to begin logging on capital hill for other projects.

Apparently, the governors from this politically important section of the country are in a state of confusion. White House to recall "Her" on Oahe. He is also concerned over opposition charges that he plans to "give away" the natural resources, especially power, to private interests.

SECURITY AND THE BUDGET

There seems to have developed in congress a bloc of lawmakers committed to a "tax cut at any cost." The distinguishing mark of this group is its fervent desire to slash taxes without serious regard to the country's needs.

This group, of course, is diametrically opposed at the statement of Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey that the administration has given up hope of balancing the budget in the year ending September 30, 1959. Humphrey has insisted that a balanced budget must precede tax reduction.

The tax-cut advocates think this is nonsense. They think it's perfectly sound to ignore the danger of a big deficit and even take the risk of enlarging it. If they practiced that kind of economy in their own homes their wives would divorce them all.

The only assurance they offer that things would be better is the vague promise that lower taxes will "unshackle" business, and that business will thereupon respond by producing so much more than even at lower rates the tax revenues will be ample.

It is certainly true that the structure of the tax-cut advocates think this is nonsense. They think it's perfectly sound to ignore the danger of a big deficit and even take the risk of enlarging it. If they practiced that kind of economy in their own homes their wives would divorce them all.

PROJECT PLAN EXPANDED—The Oahe undertaking provides a per-ot-example of the difficulty of eliminating a paternalistic form of government and reducing costs after 20 years of giving the political factors what they want. SNAGS IN TAX PLAN

A few snags have developed in Commissioner of Internal Revenue T. Coleman Andrews' new plan to eliminate the need for some 30 new tax to 40 million low-earning-bracket individuals to file income tax returns. The Andrews plan is intended to apply to people who now have income tax payments regularly deducted from their wages and who have no other income than their wages.

Tax experts now find that to use this plan, withholding tax rates will have to be calculated much more accurately than at present. This year will probably act as a record on the need for refunds and additional tax payments because the withholding tax rates are off.

Also, before the Andrews plan can be put into effect, tax rates will have to be stabilized for a whole year beginning next Jan. 1. Changing rates in mid-year fouls up the withholding rates.

Finally, it is believed a new law will have to be passed to authorize a full tax collection by the withholding process. It might take a full year after such a law was passed, freezing the tax rates before a satisfactory bookkeeping system could be made operative. Once put into effect, however, it would save millions of dollars.

RIF'S CHAIN LETTERS

Any government employee who is being liquidated out of his job through various executive department and congressional economy drives is becoming known as a "RIF." The initials come from what is known as the reduction in force program.

This program is having an ominous reputation. As soon as a government employee is notified that he is being fired, he writes his congressman. The congressman then forwards the letter of complaint to the head of the agency doing the firing, asking how come?

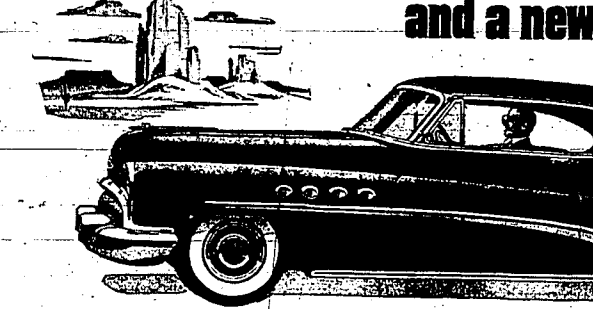

COPENHAGEN, May 21 (AP)—The Russian MIG-15 jet fighter yesterday on Bornholm island is the same type as the Soviet-made jet "delivered" to the free world by the same route 10 weeks ago.

Lieut. Zdzislaw Jaszewski, the daring Polish pilot who brought the second MIG through the iron curtain, told questioners it was a "newer type" than the one flown to Bornholm in March, but Danish air experts said after preliminary investigation it was the same model.

Reports that the relatively-quiet aircraft was Bornholm soon would be lengthened in anticipation of further jet arrivals from the Soviet world were denied by high sources here.

Danish Col. Erik Rasmussen, who went to Bornholm yesterday to examine the MIG and its refugee pilot, flew back here last night. Jaszewski was brought to Copenhagen on the regular passenger boat early today, escorted by plainclothes police.

Police sources said Jaszewski was "very cooperative." They said he had been planning an escape attempt for some time but had waited for the favorable weather of late spring before making his move.

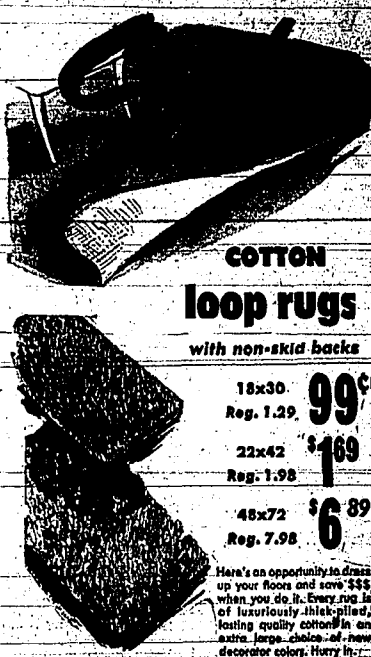
Beverly Ann Bradley, described as small for her age, wandered away from her grandmother's cottage at about 11:30 a.m. yesterday.

Tidelands Bill Is Assailed by West Senator

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Sen. Henry M. Jackson said today he is appalled to find that coastal states, which have just won control of so-called tidelands, are reaching out for a share in exploiting the federally-owned continental shelf beyond.

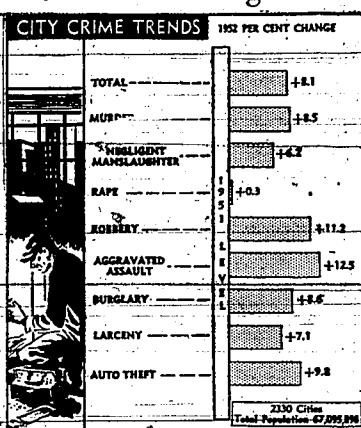
The Washington Democrat, a member of the senate interior committee, strongly opposes legislation made before the committee yesterday by three Texas state officials, in a joint statement. Gov. Allan Shivers, Atty.-Gen. John Ben Shoup and Land Commissioner Bascom Giles said coastal states should get 25 to 30 per cent of the revenue from oil and gas production from submerged lands of the continental shelf.

These lands, declared by congress to be under the control of the federal government, lie seaward as much as 150 miles off the coastal area given to the states under the so-called tidelands bill.

The Texas officials made their bid for a share in control of the continental shelf even before President Eisenhower signed the bill giving coastal states outright title to offshore lands out to their historical boundaries—3 to 10 nautical miles.

In addition to a share of the revenue, the Texans said adjoining coastal states should have the right to tax oil production, administer leases and exert their conservation laws over oil and gas production on the federal shelf.

PUSAN, Korea, May 21 (AP)—A scared Korean boy walked through the windy door of a huge plane today with a ticket to a new life. Song Yong Cho limped a little, but what can you expect of an 11-year-old lad who has to walk on artificial feet?

Americans in Korea and in the United States opened that glimmering door for Song. He will go to Boys Town, Neb., as the first Korean orphan admitted to the U. S. under the quota recently authorized by congress.

"Is the new budget based on economy or security?"

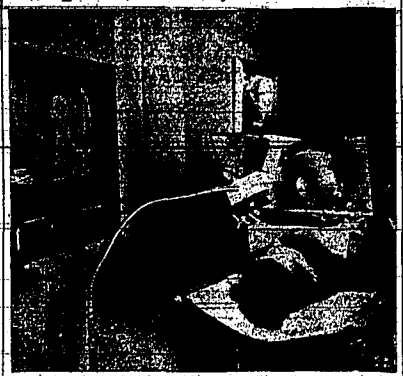
The Maine Republican tried 40 minutes yesterday, in a military appropriations subcommittee hearing, to get some of the questions answered by Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson. Today she made public the list of written questions she sent to the department at the close of the hearing.

Among other things, Mrs. Smith asked the defense department how close must an atomic bomb come to destroy a carrier? Mrs. Smith supplied one answer, which she said came from Adm. William M. Fletcher, chief of naval operations, "1,600 yards."

The list divided into 23 subdivisions. It included almost every question that has been raised in connection with the proposed five billion dollar cut in the defense appropriation.

Wilson proposed by former President Truman. Many questions dealt with the air force, hardest hit by the budget. How can you cut more than five billion dollars from air force appropriations, cut back the air force's strength to 114 squadrons, and say that the air force will be more powerful in 1954 than if the original 15-squadron air force by 1954?—Mrs. Smith asked.

Red China Accuses Air Force Of 'Atrocity' Korea Bombings

KUMHANG, Korea, May 21 (AP)—Red China's communist news agency accused the U. S. air force today of flooding 70 North Korean villages and drowning 300 North Koreans in the "atrocity" bombing of two big dams south of Pyongyang.

Radio Peking, voice of communist China, additionally demanded that the United Nations end the Korean war by abandoning the absurd war prisoner proposal when truce talks resume next Monday.

The radio broadcast said the bombing occurred from May 13 to May 16, destroying both reservoirs and flooding miles of farmland with a "great number" of peasants reported drowned or missing.

New China News agency said in a Pyongyang dispatch that North Korea Acting Foreign Minister Li Dong Min called the alleged attack and to communist demands that the U. N. give up its proposal for forcible detention of Korean and Chinese prisoners of war.

The U. N. recessed the truce talks at nearby Panmunjom for three days last Sunday and then extended it to eight days. Both sides are deadlocked on the issue of disposing of some 40,000 allied captives who do not wish to return to communism.

The U. N. was reported to be preparing final drafts of a new proposal closely following the Indian plan which the United Nations general assembly adopted in New York last December.

This plan would agree to a communist demand for limiting the fate of prisoners at a political conference but would impose a time limit on the conference with resumption being turned over to the United Nations world organization.

Egypt Rise as Air Power Predicted

CAIRO (AP)—Germany's foremost warplane designer, Ernst Heinkel, who created the dreaded twin-engine fighter-bomber that carried his name, said that Egypt can easily become the dominant air power of the middle east.

The vigorous, 65-year-old German gave the United Press an interview at the Rabesco Helopolis hotel.

"Egypt is striving for independence, therefore, she must have a strong air force," he said. "I believe that Egypt is predestined to become an important air power."

"She is more suited to have a good air force than any other country in the middle east. She has an important geographical position with ideal weather conditions."

"She has an intelligent, energetic people—Naguib. She has a number of excellent officers in the air force, some of whom studied engineering in Germany before and after World War II."

Doctor Flays 'Chiseling' in Hospital Aid

ST. LOUIS, May 21 (AP)—Dr. Paul B. Magnusson said last night that too much "chiseling" on hospitalization insurance, backed by physicians, is overloading the nation's hospitals.

In an interview prior to a speech to the St. Louis Medical society, Dr. Magnusson said there are a lot of people in hospitals who shouldn't be there, who should be treated in their homes.

Headed Commission

The Chicago doctor was chairman of the commission on the health needs of the nation during the Truman administration.

He said too often a person tells his physician he has hospitalization insurance so treatment may as well be administered in the hospital. The physician agrees, he said, because "it's easier for him to treat a lot of people in the hospital than in their homes."

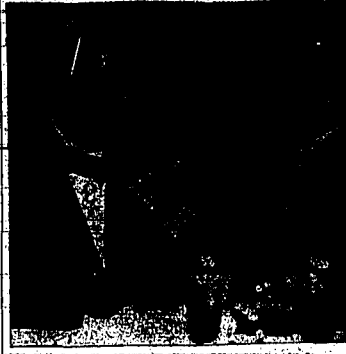
This not only overloads the hospitals, but it runs up the costs of hospitalization insurance for other people.

As a remedy Dr. Magnusson advocated hospitalization insurance which he likened to auto-insurable automobile insurance, under which the car owner pays the first 400 of any damage to his machine.

The physician said he would not set a dollar limit, but would require the patient to pay the first full week of his hospital bill before his insurance would go into effect.

"What would cut out the chiseling," he said.

PTA Convention Panel Places Blame for Youth Crime Spiral

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 21 (AP)—The parents' teachers' association today placed blame for the juvenile delinquency in the United States on parents, teachers, and the school system.

William G. Carr, executive secretary of the National Education Association, told 2,000 delegates attending the convention that "some of our sharp-tongued critics claim that the schools are indifferent to moral values."

Carr said, "We must bring the blame home to the parents and teachers and the school system. We must get them into the school to acquaint them with the facts."

Dr. William Menninger, secretary of the Menninger Foundation, Topeka, Kan., also reported to the PTA yesterday that mental illness is the national single most important cause of youth delinquency. He said one of every 12 babies born this year will spend part of his life in a mental hospital yet the U. S. allows research in psychiatry to "stare to death."

The panel of experts' recommendations included Dr. Martha M. Elliot, children's bureau chief for the department of health, education and welfare; Ralph G. Eckert, Washington State college and Herman G. Starr, director of the California Youth Authority.

Starr emphasized that parents must know what their children are doing and what their organizations are doing. He said that parents should spend more money in the anti-delinquency fight. "We spend twice as much for liquor as for helping out a young people stay out of trouble."

About 500 red Chinese drove the South Koreans from their position on a hillside at night, but they were driven back within two hours, only to be reattacked.

Full Second Time The South Koreans picked up reinforcements again, but the Chinese position again without success.

A thick overcast limited allied air action to strikes along the 100-mile-long battlefield plus a single raid into North Korea after morning carrier-borne strike on targets in the Haeju peninsula.

A peek under the bamboo curtain around red China was given Twin Falls Rotary club members by Dr. Ralph C. Lewis, Presbyterian church missionary and surgeon-physician to China, featured speaker at the Rotary club noon luncheon Wednesday noon.

Dr. Lewis also spoke in Jerome Wednesday night and showed slides of China. Henry B. Harris was in charge of arrangements. One hundred twenty-five persons attended the dinner meeting at the Presbyterian church.

Dr. Lewis spent 20 years in China and four years in a Japanese prison camp during World War II. He was the last Rotarian to leave Peiping where he had spent several years at the Presbyterian hospital during the communist party's government.

He said China today seethes with hate, fear and suspicion and no one dares speak out in favor of the United States. He maintained that although the communists are conducting intensive "hate America" campaigns, the Chinese consider the United States as "his only savior."

The communists had little trouble in winning China over to their cause, according to Dr. Lewis. They promised freedom and land reforms to the working man who felt any promise was better than conditions under the nationalistic China government.

However, instead of the promised freedom, the working man now works long hours, has less money and attends night indoctrination courses in communism. In addition, his wife and parents have had to go to work to help support their families.

Dr. Lewis said although the Chinese people fear Chiang Kai-shek they would welcome his or anyone's invasion of the China mainland. He cautioned Rotary members not to be too critical of our foreign policy, saying the Chinese problem must be solved by the Chinese.

The Chinese have little faith in communist charges of American gun warfare, according to Dr. Lewis. He said the Chinese are adept at reading between the lines of communist news dispatches.

Dr. Lewis was introduced by Ralph Carpenter. John Angerhauser reported the Rotary club "ladies night" card party will be held June 1 at the Blue-Lake Country club in place of the June 3 luncheon meeting.

No Secret Made of England's Attempt to Build China Trade

The British make no secret of the fact they are trying to build up their "invisible trade" with red China. But they insist it does not violate the ban on strategic war goods to the reds.

Early in this month a British board of trade officials revealed a sharp increase in British exports to red China during the first two months of this year. Exports for January and February, 1953, totaled \$5,500,000 as compared to only \$27,000.

The figures were roughly the same Foreign Undersecretary Anthony Joseph R. McCarthy's investigating committee in Washington, Wednesday.

British spokesmen said the increase was due to large purchases of textiles and fertilizers made last year by the Chinese, and did not involve sale of any strategic goods.

Presumably, it was a direct result of deals made at the Moscow economic conference last year between the Chinese reds and private British firms.

An agreement concluded then involved a total of 55 million dollars covering a period of one year. The British agreed to export to China textiles and non-strategic metals and chemicals. The Chinese agreed to export agricultural products to Britain.

Meanwhile, early this week British Undersecretary Anthony

trading relations in the house of commons that Britain has no intention of embargoing non-strategic goods with communist China.

There have been many times in the nearly three years of the Korean war that the British right hand has not seemed to know what the left hand was doing.

It was not until March 15 of this year that the British finally agreed to close a gaping hole in the ban on the shipment of strategic goods to the reds.

It was only then that they agreed that no ship under British license would be allowed to carry war goods to red China, and that no ship carrying war goods to red China would be allowed to refuel at British ports.

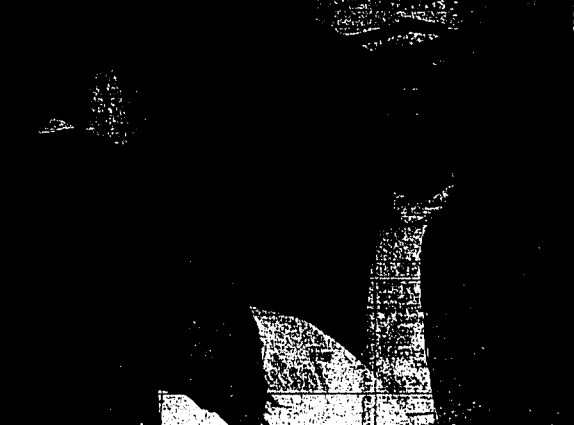

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The weather over the Atlantic had cleared at last. And so, early in the morning 38 years ago Wednesday, the airplane was rolled from its hangar.

May 20 (AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh, "Captain" of the Missouri national guard, left his bride and set out today on an unmarked trail for Paris.

When the Spirit of St. Louis finally settled down on the airfield at Le Bourget near Paris 33 hours and 59 minutes after the take-off, the scene was unbelievable.

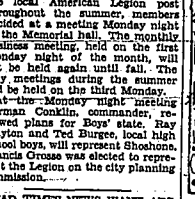

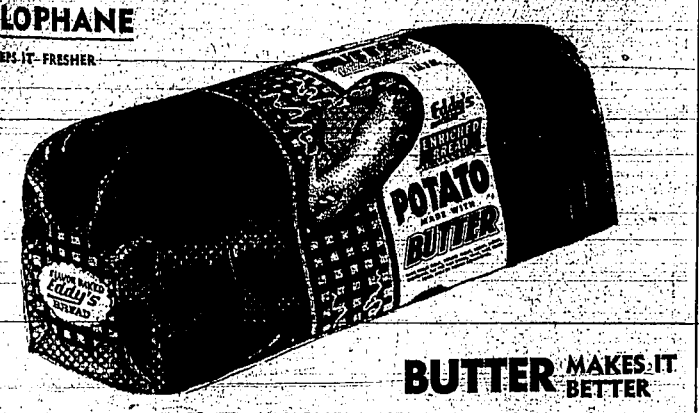

Misplacing of Decimal Point Mixes Report

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—The navy says the University of Washington misplaced its decimal points in a critical report of armed services' buying of food.

The \$43,000 university study of military food buying charged that the report "misplaced" the decimal points in the figures to match up quantities of food larger than necessary.

Bvt. Vice Adm. Charles W. Fox, director of naval materiel, told a house government operations subcommittee, "this university of higher learning, it was learned, misplaced the decimal points."

A navy report on the university survey said "rivalry" is not limited to the military and that the university group itself was hindered by "friction" among the professors.

The university report said that although the peacetime military population was one per cent of the country's total population, the services bought up 8.7 per cent of the coffee imported into the United States in 1948 and 8.8 per cent in 1949.

Fox said that actually the figure should be 0.87 per cent and 0.88 per cent, because of misplaced decimal points.

He said the report was corrected some time after it had been distributed to all of the services and the navy caught the errors.

Other Corrections

The university report also said the percentages in 1948 were 8.0 on tomatoes, 4.6 on flour and 9.8 on sugar. In each case, Fox said the figures had to be corrected by moving the decimal point one place to the left.

The university report, one of five made recently by different universities on military supply and procurement problems, has not been made public. The five studies cost an estimated \$174,446.

Fox revealed the report recommended establishment of a civilian agency to buy food for all branches of the military and thus cut the gordian knot of inter-service rivalry.

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Back at the White House: Those golf bags the secret service agents lug around a country club as they protect President Eisenhower contain not only clubs, but golf-wear radios.

There are signs in the clubhouse at Burning Tree, Mr. Eisenhower's favorite golf course in this area, questioning members not have guests on Wednesday and Saturday afternoons.

Wednesday and Saturday also happen to be the President's favorite golfing days.

One reason Mr. Eisenhower likes to get away from the White House for a few days is that by taking his wife with him, it relieves her, however briefly, of the burdensome chore of being the first lady.

Surgeon Reports Gains on Cancer

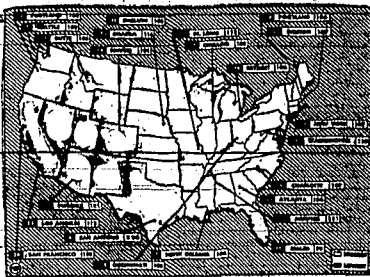

Daring 100-Year Forecast on U.S. Weather: Brrr and Whew

By RICHARD KLEINER
NEW YORK (NEA)—Weather forecast for next 100 years: whew and brrr.

The most striking thing about the prediction is Arnold Court, graduate meteorologist at the University of California, using a mathematical formula, he has predicted the probable highest and lowest temperatures for 100 spots in the U. S. in the next century.

"Sometime between now and 2053, the mercury in Death valley, Calif., will bubble up to a wild 140 degrees. And the coldest we'll see, if Court's computations are correct, is a brisk 64 below in the mountains of northern Montana. The Montana range manager hardly wait.

Court sets forth his conclusions in an article in the American Geographical Society's geographical review. It has all the fascination of a horror story.

Place your location and hear the worst New England? A high of 107 (in Massachusetts) and a low of 28 below (in Vermont) will be recorded in the coming 100 years. The south? Up to 114 (in Arkansas) and down to 22 below (in Tennessee) make this coming century charming.

There is no escape. The plains states probably are the worst off, with Court anticipating a high of 116—along a belt extending from Montana through the Dakotas, Nebraska, Kansas and on to the Oklahoma-Texas border—with a chilly

Court bases his figures on a complicated bit of business called the statistical theory of extreme values, the work of a mathematician named E. J. Gumbel. This includes such phrases as "the extreme of a sample from a distribution of exponential type," so let's not get involved with it.

Bolled down, it sets forth that by considering the extremes of any part of "figures" like weather you can predict future extremes. Court takes the 30-year period from 1901 to 1930 and applies the theory to predict the coming 100.

He carefully points out, however, that the computation is purely mathematical and cannot take into consideration the climatic changes taking place. Such changes are so gradual, however, that they would only add a degree or so here and there.

Senators Propose Doubling of U. S. Stocks of Wheat

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Senators Republican senators proposed Wednesday that stocks of wheat and corn be doubled before acreage limitations apply under present government price-support program.

Senator Mundt, R. S. D., introduced the legislation. If approved, it would avoid a vote by farmers on limiting production of wheat and corn this year.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson already has served notice that, because of large surpluses, notes by corn and wheat farmers probably will be required this year under the terms of the existing law.

This estimated supply is based upon carryover, or old stocks from previous years, plus indicated plantings or acreage.

Mundt's bill would raise the limit to 180 per cent of estimated normal supply for corn and 150 per cent for wheat.

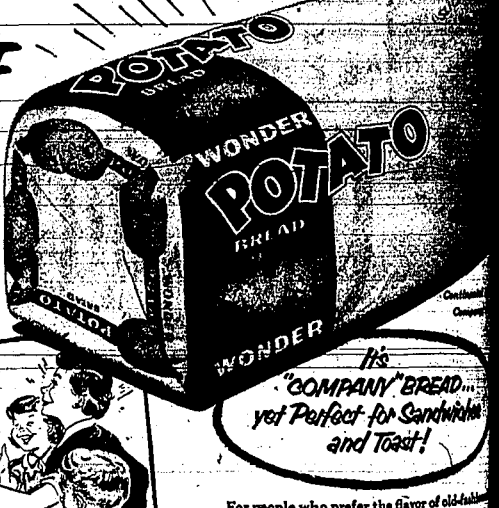

Beef Remains Top Bargain; Lamb Boosted

By The Associated Press

The nation's food stores picked all cuts of beef again this week as the best buys in meat. Lamb prices climbed nearly everywhere while pork continued to sell at high prices.

Strloin steak was selling from 4 to 10 cents lower in some retail outlets. Other cuts were unchanged to a few cents lower. Chuck roast, round roast, ground beef and other cuts also were mentioned by food stores as being good buys.

One chain was featuring an "economy dinner"—corned beef, potatoes and cabbage, all of which were on the bargain lists of most stores.

Holding Steady

The average rise in the retail price of leg of lamb this week was about four cents a pound. Food men commented that both lamb and pork were holding steady at high prices after their recent jumps.

There were some specials on frying and roasting chickens. Wholesale prices reported that poultry raisers were selling chickens at or below cost and that the processors were not getting "their proper spread."

In retail stores, egg prices generally held the same as last week, but there was a slight rise in a penny or two was added to the cost of a dozen.

Food Variety

There was good variety among vegetables as good buys. Onions, carrots, celery, green beans, green peas, corn, lima beans, and old potatoes.

As the "food historians" of the U. S. department of agriculture selected potatoes, asparagus and onions, all of which are plentiful, with quality superior.

Shortening prices weakened. The Procter and Gamble company announced it had reduced wholesale prices of its shortening by a penny a pound. It was believed the reduction would be passed on at the retail level.

Hog With Extra Chops, Added Bacon Developed by Scientists

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)——New science has come up with a hog with extra pork chops.

A hog with nearly two extra ribs has been developed by Washington State college researchers. Besides extra pork chops, it means longer bacon, less fat.

So far this "bonus hog" has only a number—No. 61. Dr. E. Christian of the college's animal husbandry department says the paper work now is under way to get No. 61 named "Mammoth No. 61" to cause considerable excitement among hog raisers.

"Nobody wants fat meat," Dr. Christian points out. "Even the farmer for hogs is being gobbed up by the vegetable oil. So why raise fat hogs? Our new hog will dress out only 10.58 pounds of fat as compared with 21.18 pounds for the conventional breed."

The average pig has about 15 pairs of ribs. No. 61 will average 12 extra ribs. Furthermore, this new breed is 1 1/2 inches longer, has one-third less back fat and will produce about four per cent more ribs of ham, loins, picnic and bacon.

The breeding of hogs for lean meat isn't exactly new. The U. S. department of agriculture first imported the Danish Landrace strain in 1934 and from the strain have come the lean-type hogs, but none with the extra size. The college here got three boars from the USDA in 1945 and started his project with 18 Chester-White hogs.

In the successive breedings, only the most desirable was chosen. After 240 litters, No. 61 was obtained. It is similar to other cross breeds except that it is white and has extra ribs.

Dr. Christian says only time will tell how exceptional his new breed is. He calculates there are between 25 to 30 co-operators in the north-
