



## Resolution of Kiwanis Asks Labor Ruling

Members of the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club approved a resolution Thursday urging county commissioners and the state legislature to exclude labor standards acts and fair labor standards acts to exclude organizations such as the Twin Falls Canal company.

The resolution was passed after being introduced by the board of directors—the committee on agriculture and the public welfare affairs committee. It was presented to the commissioners by the latter committee, and was passed by the membership unanimously.

The resolution states that the Twin Falls Canal company operations are "agricultural" rather than industrial. Company bills to accomplish this end are now in committee in both the Senate and the House, and the bill, if passed, would affect Idaho's solons urging them to use their efforts to have the bills reported out favorably and voted upon at the earliest possible date.

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

## Another Dam Is Bombed in Korean Fight

**KROUT**, Korea, May 22—Seven Superfort bombers a 300-foot-long stone and earth reservoir dam near the town of Pyongtaek in the latest concerted effort to knock out key roads and bridges.

The S-30 assault came as Chinese communists radio screamed "directly over the destruction" of two other dams in the same area earlier this week.

### Called Crisis

Peking radio called the bombing of irrigation reservoirs a "crime" and urged all Chinese to "work together to stall the armistice talks."

The target of the latest Superfort attack holds back waters of the Han River, which flows into the Yellow River. The south of the dam is key to roads and bridges along the Sunchon-Pyongyang supply route.

### Supply Area Hit

Five other Superforts hit 60-acre dams near Tokchon and Hwangju, about 10 miles from the switching yard at Simpson near the east coast, destroying 28 communist supply trucks.

Light bombers struck cover for the light bombers damaged two dams and apparently damaged one.

## Formosa Test Real Surprise

**TAIPEH**, May 22—The Chinese Nationalists staged an air raid drill on the people of Formosa today that took U.S. Ambassador Karl I. Rankin by surprise as any of the island's 6,000,000 odd inhabitants.

Warning sirens wailed at 1:25 p.m. (10:25 p.m. Thursday, MDT) and 100 planes were dropped into the air to "intercept" the predicted attacks. Air defense officers told newsmen "three to six unidentified planes" were approaching, but did add that they were part of the act.

The alert began just five minutes before Rankin was scheduled to take off on a flight to the United States. The Chinese government has various congressional committees on the China situation. NSC departure was delayed 45 minutes.

A spokesman said the alarm was set to test the efficiency of the island's air defense against communist planes that could get here in seven minutes from the red-hot mainland. Authorities were generally satisfied with the result.

## Man Convicted in Non-Support Case

A poll of the jury at the request of the defendant revealed the verdict was unanimous.

The case went to the jury at 4:30 p.m. after Mrs. Ruby Jo Harriet and her mother, Mrs. Joe Faist, testified for the state and the defense took the stand in his behalf.

Joe Faist, father of Mrs. Harmon, Robert Faist, his brother, and his wife appeared as spectators.

The court sat 1:30 p.m. Tuesday as time for sentencing. Harmon's bond was continued until the time of maximum penalty for the offense—a \$500 fine or one year in jail or both.
