

T. F. Medical Arts Building Due Addition

Korea Solons Blast Newest Plan of U. N.

Special participants in the U. N. session in Geneva last week, charged that the new plan for the Korean peninsula is a five nation neutral commission for disposition of the peninsula.

Another member concluded that the new plan provides that a post-armistice conference would attempt to settle the future of prisoners within the 48-hour period after the 30-day period. POWs who continue to talk would be turned over to the U. N. Security Council.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The "tight money" policy adopted by the Eisenhower administration on the advice of the Federal Reserve Board, which has been abandoned because of protests from "easy money" politicians on Capitol Hill or the warnings of certain conservative Republicans.

Wall Street Washington still believes the major threat to a sound economy and stable dollar is inflation rather than deflation.

Although the increase in interest rates had been put into effect by the Federal Reserve Board, Humphrey issued securities with the highest rates in 20 years, the Federal Reserve Board, however, has other changes for loans. It now has begun to raise the rate on short-term loans, such as New York, Chicago, and San Francisco.

In short, the little fellow—home buyers, consumers, farmers—is beginning to suffer from the pinch, as they always do in a state of economic transition. The cost of money has shot up just at the time when business and industry are beginning to pick up. Anticipated purchases normally reach a seasonal peak.

The complaint from these elements underlies the demand of 20 Democratic members of Congress that the Federal Reserve Board be reauthorized for its "operation deflation." Besides fattening great financial interests, the Eisenhower-Gore-Fulbright faction would have the Federal Reserve Board squeezed and stripped of their wartime savings and investments.

CONSIDERED TOO SPEEDY

This Capitol Hill criticism was attributed by White House advisers to more partisan politics than it was reinforced recently by a series of financial articles in the Washington Post. Although sympathetic to the deflationary movement, they now insist that it has become too speedy and extreme. They question the tempo, not the idea.

An unexpected accuser has been Elliot V. Bell, a long-time financial and economic adviser to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey. He was Wendell Wilkie's consultant in the Federal Reserve Board. He later became Dewey's superintendent of banks. Had the New Yorker been elected in 1946 or 1948, Bell probably would have been a member of the Federal Reserve Board. He is now editor of a weekly business magazine.

Writing in a recent issue, Bell urged caution on Washington. Using a familiar simile, he said it was good to have the Federal Reserve Board tighten the economic and monetary automobile, but that the passengers should not be thrown through the windshield by too violent a steering. He said that the Federal Reserve Board, caused considerable excitement and anxiety of the problem around the White House.

NEED FOR CHECK

Secretary Humphrey's review has not shaken his belief that the forthcoming flow of federal and private loans should be checked and limited to the amount of the national income. In his opinion, must be relied on to insure prudent borrowing and spending of all the money in the air.

Washington news will say that the Federal Reserve Board has a \$4 billion dollar deficit in the Korean war continues, not to mention a \$1 billion dollar backlog of unpaid funds. Plant expansion and investment in the United States are \$1 billion a year or \$400 million dollars more than 1952. Manufacturers' output is 10 per cent higher than a year ago, with heavy machinery orders still to be filled. Home construction has slackened.

Employment and wages are at such heights that national income still is rising. It hit the figure of 285 billion dollars in March, 20 per cent higher than a year ago. This peak purchasing power explains why, despite unprecedented production volume, there are no heavy manufacturers, wholesalers or retailers who are not in some line of trouble. Especially mobile and home appliances, industry cannot satisfy the buying demand.

These conditions and philosophy should last at least another year or two, barring unforeseen war, and Humphrey discounts the fear that real peace would provoke recession. Therefore, he does not believe that making money more expensive by one per cent or a fraction thereof will wreck the nation.

DAIRY COMPETITION

This is an editorial which we dislike to write, but we can't ignore or hide the fact that for the first time in our history, increasing competition from "regional" milk of creamery butter, its production has multiplied four-fold since 1940, while that of the dairymen has declined 30 per cent. Only 24 per cent of the milk was separated and churned into butter, compared with only 25 per cent last year. Consumption of butter has been declining steadily. While total consumption has been increasing, per capita consumption last year was 6.7 pounds of butter, including home-churned butter, and 7.7 pounds of oleomargarine.

Also not its big boost when the dairy industry lost the fight in the Congress in 1950 to retain the duty on oil and colored and 18-cent tax on "white" oleo. Since then, 24 states have rescinded restrictions, which affected the sale of oleo. Now factory-colored oleo can be sold in all but four states—Montana, Wyoming, Iowa and Montana—and the legislature in Iowa is considering removing restriction in that state. South Dakota was the most recent state to legalize factory-colored oleo, but in a hot fight in the legislature the dairymen were able to keep the 10-cent tax on the colored product.

Sixty-five per cent of the oleo produced today is made from soybean oil, 30 per cent from cottonseed oil and the balance mainly from corn and wheat. Oleo. So oleo, in fact, has become a product of the farm.

Now behoves the dairy industry to keep a closer eye on what is happening to other outlets for their milk. There is, as Mr. Quiser said in his dairy outlook article in our last issue, increasing competition from "regional" "filled" products such as frozen desserts as substitutes for ice cream. Many in the dairy industry fear that the program of "cheese relief" will have more than they do oleomargarine—Idaho Farm Bureau News.

EXPANDING FARM EXPORTS

It is encouraging to learn that Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson is setting up a new foreign agricultural service to help expand overseas markets for farm products. He has given the job to one of his top administrators, the job of getting this new export agency going. Mr. Short is a former vice-president of the American Farm Bureau, which long has been an advocate of freer trade policies.

There is much that can be done to improve foreign markets for farm products. But perhaps the most important thing is up to Congress—lowering U. S. trade barriers so that foreign countries can earn more dollars by selling to us.

The department of agriculture can help, however, by adopting a liberal policy on imports of farm products. Some of our most important export commodities are on this classification. Also the department of agriculture has considerable discretion in setting levels of import duties. The higher the duty, the higher must be the restriction against foreign imports.

This low price supports and a free trade policy go together. Home Secretary recognizes that believes that price supports and import restrictions ought to be moderate in order to promote the growth of the farm and the trade.

In the long run, agriculture has more to gain from this policy than it does from a policy of restriction. It is hoped that Secretary Benson will give full backing to the program of freer trade. However, the first concrete action in the field of dairy prices was to pay supports at 90 per cent of parity. This is a price support program, not a trade policy. It is a maintenance of light import restrictions against dairy products—Des Moines Tribune.

GAIN HARD TO HOLD

Three deaths of Democratic representatives so far in this session of Congress have temporarily increased the Republican majority from eight to 11. The seats now held by Republicans, 210 Democrats, one Independent and three vacancies. These vacancies were caused by the deaths of Representatives Adolph Sabath of Illinois, Garrett Withers of Kentucky and Joseph R. Bryson of South Carolina.

Since all three came from predominantly Democratic districts, there is little chance that the Republicans will hold their present gain. The new congressmen will be chosen in special elections to be held in South Carolina June 2, in Illinois July 7 and in Kentucky Aug. 1.

Boise Boys Enter AAU Cinder Meet

Spring Brings Irrigation and Threats Of Drowning to Magic Valley Children

Springtime is irrigation time in Magic Valley and irrigation water is one of Idaho's death traps, reminds Alfred Peters, Twin Falls Canal company manager.

Thirteen Idaho children drowned last year and 51 the year before. Four to seven drown each year in Magic Valley. Most drownings occur during the summer months. Precautions and knowledge of artificial respiration can reduce the number of drowning deaths, but apparently they can not be eliminated.

Peters points out the Twin Falls canal company has regulations forbidding swimming in its canals and laterals. However, he adds it is virtually impossible to enforce such rules.

Parents can do much to prevent drownings by discouraging their children from playing near water. Dangerous sections of ditches and laterals should be covered where possible.

Common sense also can eliminate many drownings. Over the nation, several thousand lose their lives each year by drownings. Many other thousands experienced near drownings.

The American Red Cross teaches that every individual should learn how to swim as young as possible, what to do in uncommon situations in the water and how to assist or rescue others.

The Idaho chapter of the National Safety Council, also concerned about the problem, recommends that residents in irrigated areas take the trouble to learn artificial respiration. The pressure-arm lift method of artificial respiration is recommended. About three times as much air is forced into the chest cavity with this method.

In applying this method, the subject is placed face down in a prone position. His elbows are bent and hands placed on top of the other. His face is turned to one side, placing the cheek upon his hands.

The person applying artificial respiration kneels on either knee at the head of the subject. The operator's knee is placed against the subject's head.

Next he places his hands upon the flat of the subject's back in such a way that the heels of the hands are just below a line running between the armpits. With the tips of the thumbs just touching, he spreads the fingers downward and outward.

He rocks forward until the arms are approximately vertical and allows the weight of the arms to press his body to exert slow, steady pressure downward upon the hands.

This forces air out of the lungs. The elbows are kept straight and the pressure exerted almost directly downward on the back.

His then releases the pressure, avoiding a final thrust, and commences to rock slowly backward. Placing his hands upon the subject's arms just above the elbows, the operator draws his arms upward and toward him, just enough lift to feel resistance and tension at the subject's shoulders.

The operator does not bend his elbows. As he rocks backward the subject's arms will be drawn toward him.

Then he drops the arms to the ground. This completes the full cycle. The arm lift expands the lungs by pulling on the chest muscles, arching the back and relieving the weight on the chest.

The cycle should be repeated about 12 times per minute at a steady uniform rate. The proper position and expansion phases should

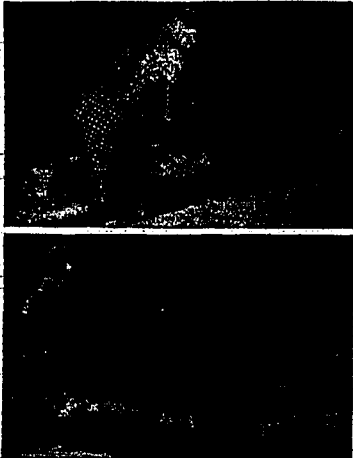
occupy about equal time, the release periods being of minimum duration. When needed, it is all-important that artificial respiration be started quickly. There should be a slight inclination of the body in such a way that fluid drains from the respiratory passage.

The head of the subject should be extended, not flexed forward, and the chin should not be flexed or obstructed. A check should be made to ascertain that the tongue or foreign

objects are not obstructing the passages. These aspects can be cared for when placing the subject into position or shortly thereafter or between cycles. A smooth rhythm in performing artificial respiration is desirable, but spill-second timing is not essential.

Shock should receive adequate attention. The subject should remain lying after resuscitation until seen by a physician or until recovery seems assured.

New Method Demonstrated



A drowning victim's chances of revival are greatly increased through the use of the new artificial respiration technique, the Nielsen "back-pressure arm-lift" method. In administering the new technique, the rescuer rocks forward exerting pressure on the victim's back at the top, and then rocks backward grasping the victim's arms, repeating the cycle about 12 times a minute.

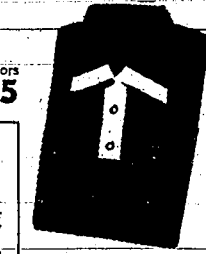

Idaho Road-Traffic Shows 10-Per Cent Boost for 1952

Continuing a trend of the last decade, highway traffic in Idaho in terms of vehicle miles increased nearly 10 per cent in 1952 over 1951. By type, the vehicle miles counted in 1951 and 1952, include, all vehicles, 4,161,043, compared to 4,339,249; foreign passenger cars, 819,208 compared to 899,439; and commercial vehicles, 1,181,814 compared to 1,278,452. The figures, which are contained in the traffic comparison report prepared by the department's planning survey division, also show that August has the heaviest traffic count. This is due in part to the increase in tourist travel. The report was released this week by the Idaho department of highways in conjunction with the United States bureau of public roads. The report is used by the department to assist in determining the type and standards of roads to be built in certain sections by projecting the traffic trends. The counts also assist in determining the width of road and number of lanes. The figures were secured at 653 separate, strategically located stations distributed over the entire state. The stations are operated on a definite schedule during a specified number of hours and on specific days during the year. Counts are obtained through the use of electrically operated portable traffic counters. The department also maintains nine permanent or continuously operating stations to secure accurate monthly data throughout the year. Vehicles passing the counters are counted on a paper tape. The tape records the traffic for each hour and lists the day and the week. This enables the planners to determine the maximum traffic during the day. The recorder are electrically operated and are of two types; one uses a beam of light and the other a cable under the surface. Manual counts are made periodically in order to classify the types of vehicles passing a station. Traffic is classified, for purposes of the report, into three categories—all vehicles, foreign passenger cars and commercial vehicles. With 4,339,249 miles of state and federal routes checked, traffic since 1941 has more than doubled—from 2,227,841 vehicle miles for the average annual 24 hours of travel in 1941 to 4,339,249 vehicles in a 24 hour period in 1952. This represents an increase of 103.3 per cent for all vehicles. During the same period foreign passenger cars increased 56.3 per cent while the vehicle miles of commercial vehicles jumped 134 per cent. The heaviest average 24 hour traffic count for the entire state was shown at the junction of U. S. 20 and 30 west of Boise. The count was 22,075 vehicles. State Highway Engineer Earle V. Uranium, Oil and Natural Gas Flood Coffers of Navaho-Tribe

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz., May 27.—Uranium, oil and natural gas are helping the Navaho Indians on the road to economic independence.

Income from oil and gas is pouring millions of dollars into the Navaho's communal fund which provides the capital for tribe-sponsored business enterprises. These include a thriving sawmill, a cement plant and a string of motels.

This spring the tribe pocketed nearly five million dollars from sale of leases on 271,000 acres in the northwest corner of the Navaho reservation. Shell Oil company alone paid \$1,742,000.

Somewhat larger than the combined land area of Holland and Belgium, the reservation comprises 15 1/2 million acres in the remote "four corners" region where New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Utah meet.

The tribe coffers stand a good chance of being enriched by further development of uranium resources. The fabulous Colorado plateau uranium fields deep into the reservation, and Kerr-McGee Oil company's Navaho uranium division operates a mine near Coy. The company whose owners include Sen. Robert S. Kerr, D., Okla., already leases 2,800 acres for a proposed \$1 million dollar uranium mill near Shiprock.

At the same time they are pushing their own industrial development program. Their most successful enterprise is a sawmill employing 275 Navahos and producing about 15 million board feet of lumber annually, grossed \$1,078,732 last year.

Another going concern is the tribe's motel business. Clean, modern tourist lodges are in operation at Window Rock and Shiprock. Built with money from the tribe, the reservation at a total cost of \$243,000, the motels have been such

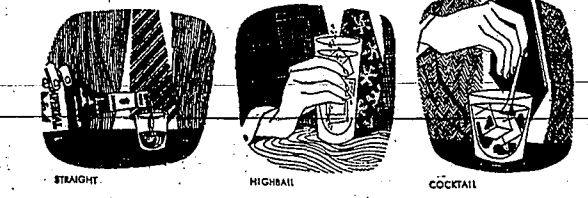

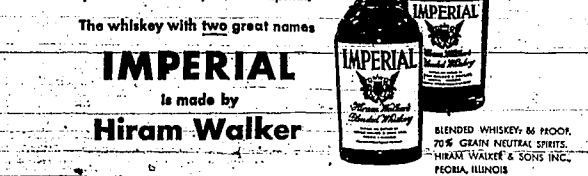

Senator Asks Benson Stand On Law Shift

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield, D. Mont., has demanded that Agriculture Secretary Benson stand up and be counted on bills to revise national forest grazing regulations "to let the public and congress know whether he is on the side of the people or the special interests."

Mansfield said in a statement that Interior Secretary McKay also should speak out personally and not through a subordinate. "This issue is so important and so far reaching in its possible consequences that it is imperative that Benson and McKay come from behind the curtain and face up to this issue immediately," Mansfield said.

He referred to bills now pending before house and senate committees to revise grazing regulations in national forests. Opponents contend they would give grazing interests too much power over publicly owned lands. Mansfield said the bills "constitute a real by-the-by-stander interest on the national forests and if successful will lay the groundwork for further attempts to despoil the national parks, federal wildlife refuges and other public lands."

Protect Holders "He said the bills 'are deliberately designed to protect the holders of grazing permits and not the people.'"

Mansfield said Benson has been "strangely silent" although his department includes the forest service. "He said livestock lobbyists who have been swarming over this issue during the past few weeks... have it as an open secret that (Benson) and his forest service have been placed behind a curtain of some sort on this subject."
