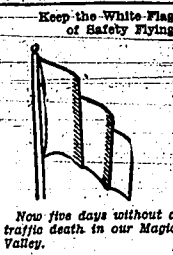

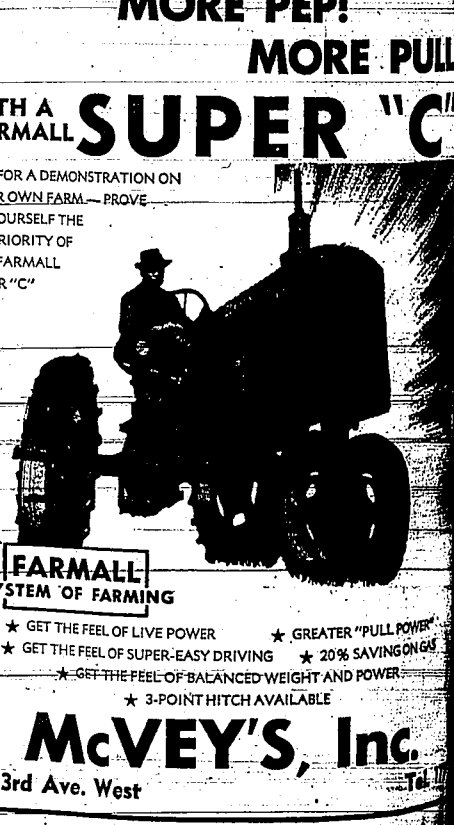

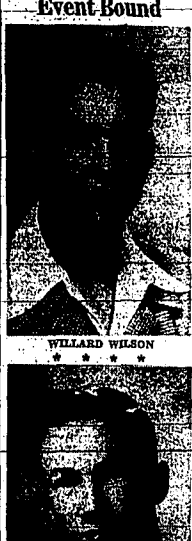

**Provokes Discussion**

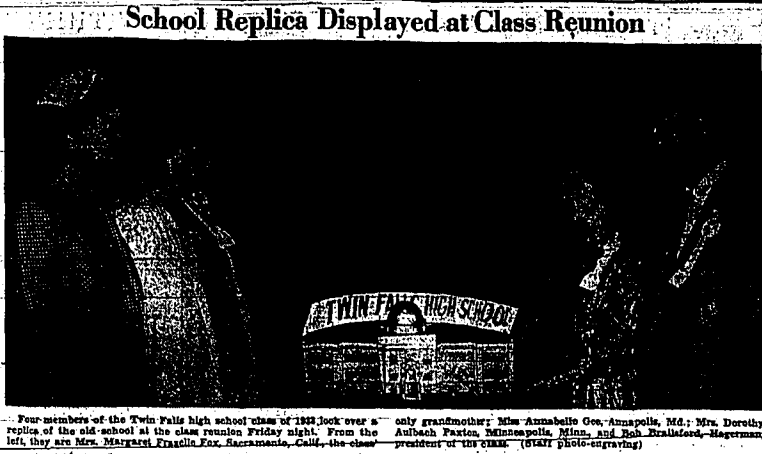

IRK SEEKS SOUND BACKLOG

For a good while President Eisenhower has been standing in a heavy crossfire. From one side he has been attacked by men who think nearly any economy is a peril to the nation's security.

From the other, he has been shot at by men who believe his economy proposals fall far short of realistic goals. But in his budget-luxury security speech, the President disclosed he is well armored for the combat.

It is determined to avoid extremes of either spending or cutting. He proposes to hew to a middle line he feels will lead to the best kind of security for Americans.

Mr. Eisenhower made the case for this approach strongly and convincingly. If he can help it, he will not allow budget reductions which would imperil America. And he measures the danger from the Soviet union as both real and large.

On the other hand, neither will the President blindly assume that genuine savings are impossible. Quite the contrary, he believes economies must be achieved if the United States is to gain in a military way and yet not yield another sort of victory to the Russians.

That victory could come from Russia's economic initiative from a steady sapping of our resources until we were bled white, from costly buildups toward successive crises whose decisive moments are always just around the corner.

Mr. Eisenhower sees the Russian threat as long continuing. He does not think the most likely way to reach a peak by some stated deadline, and then taper. Any program attuned to this latter notion he views as unwise and impractical. He wants to plan for sound, satisfying American living in an "age of danger."

He acknowledges that many honest men measure the peril differently. They feel the only safety rests in a given number of planes by 1955, or so many atomic artillery pieces, or 50 H-bombs, and so on. The President has let all these planners state their cases fully and vigorously.

But this and he has overridden them. He declares that anything less than total mobilization for war puts the nation on a guesswork basis in terms of security. In consequence, he thinks it foolish to insist we are lost if we do not have that certain number of air war tanks.

What he plainly seeks is to put the nation into what might be called an agile posture of defense—a position from which it could spring to action against hostile attack and hold off the enemy effectively until full mobilization could be effected.

This is Mr. Eisenhower's policy for national security. Having determined upon it, he moves easily and logically to these other propositions: That there can be substantial cuts in defense and foreign aid spending but that there must stop short of checking the development of flexible, well-toned defense muscles. That there can be no real tax cuts until, also, prudently engineered savings bring an end of deficits in sight.

The man who want budget cuts and tax slashes at any cost do not like this plan. The President is clearly aligned against them. Whether he prevails, whether his whole security program prevails, may depend finally on the support he is able to draw from the people.

He may still decide whether he is sensationally overburdening them—or whether, with his unique experience in military matters, he is trying scrupulously to strike a sound balance that will bring both reasonable security and a gradual easing of a crushing load.

Kremlin Decision on Germany Seen as Part of New Program

By WILLIAM L. EVAN AP Foreign News Analyst Moscow's decision to close down the Soviet control commission in East Germany scenes part of a strong diplomatic offensive which may be followed swiftly by Kremlin demands for a four-power meeting of foreign ministers on the German question.

The Kremlin says its commander-in-chief in its occupation zone will be limited to command of Soviet troops there. This could be a prelude to an offer to withdraw Soviet troops from Germany, a bid the western allies would find difficult to match.

The Moscow moves are in keeping with recent developments in the Kremlin offensive aimed at knocking the props from under the western European defense community. The insistence in all recent Moscow pronouncements on the terms of the Potsdam agreement of 1945 is significant in this regard.

Germany is the key to all Soviet maneuvers on the world scene. Without the neutralization of Germany without the breakup of the western defense community, the world communist movement cannot consider its rear secure while it goes forward with plans for expansion in the Soviet Union.

The maneuvers on the world scene also have a relation to events inside the USSR, where the new regime apparently still is struggling to entrench itself securely. On the home front Moscow has changed its theme to what apparently will become a campaign by communist politicians of certain elements of the Soviet army is reflected in this.

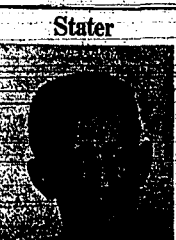

The dancers represent all-age groups. About 16 numbers will be presented.

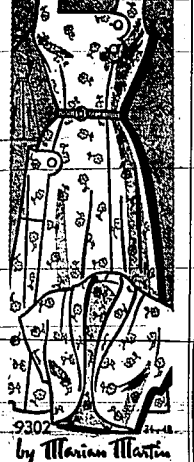

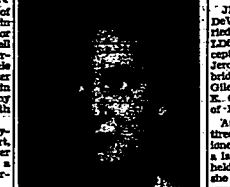

### Pressure Cookers Tested For Safe Canning Season

A steam-warmed room and a cheery atmosphere made the job of testing pressure cookers a delight for Twin Falls Grange women whom they took their places Thursday in the Twin Falls junior high school home economics room.

The "safety" first theory guided about 30 Twin Falls housewives into the building for a double-check on pressure gauges on their cookers.

Conducting the experiments were Mrs. I. T. Cross, Mrs. Thomas Speedy, Mrs. Kenneth Fox, Mrs. Noah Olson, Mrs. M. Z. Stansbury, Mrs. Hester Turner, Mrs. E. F. Durbin and Mrs. George Sorenson.

The basic ingredients for the tests were one pressure cooker, about 1/2 inch of water covering the bottom of the cooker and a tin can containing a thermometer and the variety which registers and retains the highest degree attained.

After closing the cooker, the worker lets it steam for 10 minutes before closing the potcock, bringing the gauge up to 10 pounds pressure and leaving it there for three minutes. After which, she opened the potcock and let the steam escape before reading the thermometer.

At Magic Valley's altitude, 10 pounds of pressure should register at 235 degrees Fahrenheit. Any more or less requires a mental correction or, in some cases, a new gauge.

After determining how much the gauge is "off" by the number of degrees registered, the housewife may safely cook at the required 10 pounds, or less, if the difference is less than four or five pounds, a new gauge is recommended.

### New Interest On Loans to End Practice

As a result of its recent one-half per cent increase in interest rates on all loans, the veterans administration plans to restrict sharply all "discount practice" in the financing of all home loans by lenders and builders, Arnold Helweg, local VA representative, said Saturday.

Discounting on 0% home loans was practiced in the increasingly tight money market which prevailed under the former four per cent maximum of interest rate. For example, Helweg noted, a \$10,000 mortgage purchased for \$9,000 at a three per cent discount, would give the investor a higher interest rate than the four per cent allowed.

**Quality Suffered**

Builders, in most cases, were forced to accept this discount or pass on discount costs to the veteran borrowers in the form of higher prices or lower-quality action is being taken in accordance with the housing act of 1923 which makes the government housing agencies responsible for limiting fees and charges with which lenders and charge builders and home buyers in the financing of government guaranteed or insured loans.

**Under the policy, the VA is advising** its regional offices of a nationwide maximum scale applicable under the new four and one-half per cent rate, for charges made by lenders to builders for construction financing.

Regional offices will require all builders to certify to the VA that they have not or will not pay or absorb any charges or fees in excess of those authorized by the VA.

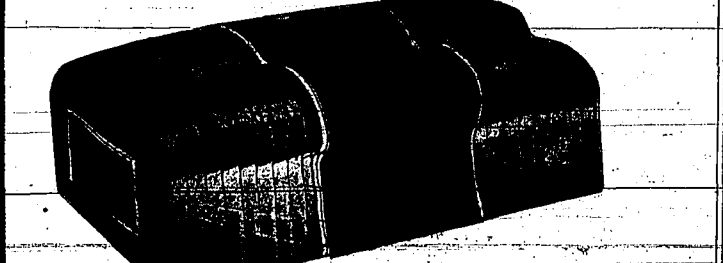

### Group Okays Plan to Curb Flood Threat

PORTLAND, Ore., May 30. — The water management authorities of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee has disclosed a plan to lower the peak Columbia river stage by about one foot at Vancouver, Wash., and reduce estimated flood damage by approximately \$200,000.

The committee said this could be accomplished by reducing outflow at Grand Coulee during the beginning of the major rise in the lower Columbia through use of 80,000-acre field of available storage space in Franklin D. Roosevelt lake.

Members agreed the storage space in the lake formed by the huge dam will not be filled at present. The plan calls for holding the reservoir at its present level of 1,280 feet above sea level until appearance of the major rise, which varies from early in May to as late as July 1.

When the created rise begins the outflow would be reduced and the reservoir filled. The result would be lowering of the peak river stage at Vancouver by about one foot and thus "substantially" reducing flood damage in the lower Columbia basin.

### Fifty Per Cent of Idaho Population Born Out of State

WASHINGTON, May 30 (Special)—Only about half of Idaho's population of 568,077 residents counted in the 1930 census was born in the state, the census bureau reported today.

Of the "out-of-staters," 20,443 were foreign born and the majority were immigrants from neighboring states.

Idaho-born numbered 287,780. Next largest group were 25,460 living Utah as their place of birth.

In descending order were Washington with 23,925, Nebraska 12,720, Missouri 10,230, Kansas 10,100, Oregon 14,710, Iowa 12,750 and Montana 10,815.

Smallest contribution of all 48 states was from Delaware, which furnished 55.

### Farm Phone Rate Higher

WASHINGTON, May 30 (U)—The department of agriculture reports farmers paid seven per cent more for local telephone service last year than in 1931.

A bureau of agricultural economical annual survey made in 1932 included reports from more than 21,000 farmers throughout the nation.

The agency said the survey showed the average monthly rate paid by farmers amounted to an estimated \$4.62. This included an average local service rate of \$2.06 and a long distance average of \$1.55.

These compared with an average of \$4.53 a year earlier, including \$2.97 for local and \$1.56 for long distance service.

### Record Total Of Autos Set In Past Year

WASHINGTON, May 30 (AP)—Record number of \$3,256,570 automobiles, trucks and buses crowded America's highways in 1952, the commerce department reports. California with 5,145,232 registrations, was the first state to pass the five million mark. This was an increase of 4.8 per cent over 1951. 

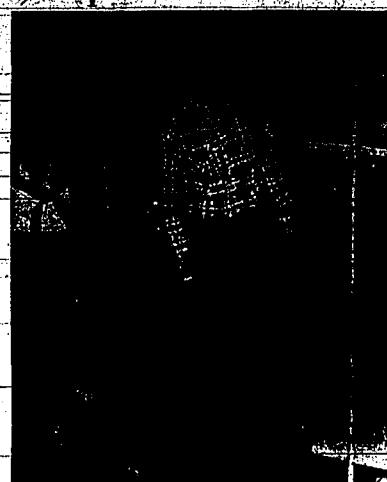

### Pruett Moves Fantasy From 'Will-o'-Wisp'

Some people, although not strictly astronomical, are of the opinion that those who study natural lights at night. A few years ago I received a request from a rural home before daylight several persons were watching a mysterious light.

Little balls of light rose now and then from the bushes, and suddenly swam upward of the horizon, for a few short distances in the wind and then flicked out.

Quite likely this appearance was a "Will-o'-Wisp" or "Ignis fatuus," that mysterious little light whose existence still lies in the misty borderland between superstition, fancy and actual fact.

Many places are its favorite haunts; the livers in apparitions to weary victims. Even the unlearned and the ignorant are not too certain on its real nature. I have received many reports on these objects since my publication on the subject seven years ago.

Five Encountered

A New Yorker reported that one evening as he was going through a boggy woodland, he encountered five of these luminous globules. Each was about the size of a 50-cent piece. They were undulating in the breeze. He had heard of similar lights in comeries.

A most interesting account of the ignis fatuus seen over a desert region of Nevada has been given by M. H. Cook. Cook was training alone on a January night shortly after a heavy rain. "Coyotes were howling in the distance," he reported. "In the ground known as dry lakes were holding water for the first time in several years.

At about 2 a.m. these weird lights began to appear. Luckless thought they could see them as they rose through the water toward the sky. He saw hundreds floating in the air above the water, often very close to him.

He seemed to be unable to estimate their distance from him: "Now, the lights, during the entire hour he was crossing the region and recognized them as his will-o'-wisp, although he never had seen such before.

### Supply Boost Brings Cut in Potato Prices

WASHINGTON, May 30 (Special)—With early crop potatoes already totaling 12 million bushels—18 percent up from 1933—predictions of much lower prices—in all areas—are bearing out, the agriculture department's "Demand and Price Situation" reports.

"Supplies for the rest of the year are likely to continue well above a year earlier and prices much lower. If March intentions to plant are carried out and yields are average," the report declared.

Late spring preliminary figures point to a harvest of 11 million bushels, 28 per cent above 1933.

Sweet potatoes, declining for the past several years, are also expected to show an increase this year.

The present anticipated crop of 35 million bushels would be well above 1932's 28 million bushels but still less than two-thirds of the 1941-50 average. The increase should be enough to take the edge off last year's scarcity prices.

### Fuzzy Status Is Noted for U. S. H-Bomb

BERKELEY, Calif., May 30 (U. S. Press)—The United States completed research on the hydrogen bomb in 1952, but is now ready to make produce the awesome weapon?

Or has the atomic energy commission decided to shift emphasis away from the H-bomb because it is too expensive or doesn't work as well as anticipated?

These lines of speculation were opened by the San Francisco Examiner. They followed disclosure that Dr. Edward Teller, who first suggested a theoretical H-bomb and is one of the top 10 in the AEC's H-bomb program, will join the University of California faculty on July 1 as professor of physics.

**Locations Reported**

The fact that much of the work on the fuzion bomb has been centered in the AEC's super-secret Livermore laboratory, 10 miles south of here, was revealed in the current issue of Fortune magazine.

**Head of the Livermore program** has been Dr. Harold Eugene Urey, born Dr. Teller, described by the magazine as one of the most ardent H-bomb advocates of the world.

On the other hand, Fortune said there has been a group of scientists led by Dr. Robert Oppenheimer, former California physicist who headed the world war II development of the atomic bomb at Los Alamos, N. M. This group argued that research stimulates the atomic weapons race and that possession of the H-bomb is an insurance against a catastrophic war.

**Conclusion Noted**

Fortune—pointing to last November's Eisenhower still blast generally believed to be a pilot H-bomb—concluded the H-bomb advocates won out, and are to be permitted to carry out former President Truman's 1949 decision to press for all-out H-bomb development.

But the Examiner points out that conclusion was reached before the recent announcement of a five billion dollar air force budget slash and a contemplated 30 percent cut in future AEC spending.

Or has the H-bomb already been perfected to the point that younger scientists can be entrusted with the remaining development?

In any case, Dr. Teller will be here soon, teaching the graduate course in theoretical atomic physics. And his lecture series proceeds.

Not is the AEC which arrests any and all queries with "no comment."

### Bureau to Make Censuses of Business, Industry, Mining, Transportation in '54

Census bureau is now making careful preparations for census of industry and trade in 1954 under law passed by 80th congress.

Next year covers business, manufacturing, mineral industries (mining) and transportation. This is the first census of transportation will be more limited in scope than the other phases of the 1953 census because those statistics already are

regularly available for those transportation systems which are required to file reports with federal regulatory agencies.

These statistics will be augmented by a series of surveys designed to fill in the major gaps in transportation data. One of these, the survey of commodity movements is being conducted now by the Bolo

district office as well as other district offices of the census bureau.

Why are censuses taken? Federal law places on the census bureau the responsibility of taking a full-scale census every five years covering American industry and trade. This is also true of the censuses of population, housing, irrigation and drainage which are taken every ten years. They all provide benchmark data that are in constant demand by businessmen, market research organization, labor unions, chambers of commerce, teachers, etc.

Users of census statistics are frequently unaware of the fact that these data, which are so important

to them, would not be available if businessmen and others did not first supply the raw materials, so to speak, in the form of their reports to the census bureau. Thus their cooperation in the 1953 censuses of industry and trade will provide data which, after it has been compiled by the census bureau, will appear in both governmental and private publications to which users will refer for many years to come.
