

Dulles Asserts Friendship Is Base of Policy

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles told the nation last night the Eisenhower administration will base its foreign policy on friendship "not realpolitik."

Following up a wave of congressional criticism of this nation's allies, notably by Republican Senators Taft, O. A. and McCarthy, Dulles told a nation-wide radio and television audience:

"I profits nothing merely to be critical of others. ... In a report on his recent 30-day tour of the middle east and south Asia, Dulles concentrated heavily on affairs in the troubled Holy Land. He said he found Jerusalem 'very busy with its own problems.' He said his tour convinced him the Arabs are 'more fearful of Zionism than we are.' ... Zionism is the term used to express the Jews' desire for a national homeland."

Dulles said Arab peoples everywhere fear rearmament against the United States for its role in helping create the independent land of Israel.

"Policy is important! The Secretary said the U. S. will pursue an 'important' policy in the middle east to win the friendship of both Jews and Arabs. ... The people of the middle east and south Asia, Dulles said, 'are suspicious of the colonial powers.' He said: 'The United States, too, is suspect because, it is reasoned, our military alliances are based on the question of loyalty. ... This alliance requires us to try to preserve or restore the old colonial interests of our allies.' ... He said the United States policy has become unnecessarily ambiguous in this matter."

"We cannot afford to be distinguished by millions who could be sturdy friends of freedom," he said. "They must not further all the ranks of communist dictators."

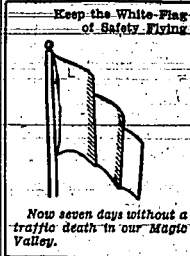

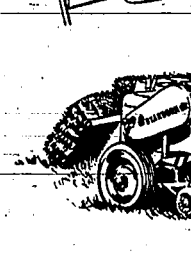
Marshall outlined five basic objectives of the Exchange Club program. He urged more emphasis on the ideals and purposes of the organization by members.

Huge Bridge Is Dedicated To Pioneers

OMAHA, June 2 (AP)—A \$14-million dollar bridge described as a "symbol of the faith of the pioneers" was dedicated Monday at the spot where more than a century ago followers of Brigham Young tolled against the Utah-Idaho Territorial line.

David O. McKay, president of the LDS church, said in his dedicatory talk: "To justice to these pioneers we must make ourselves self-sufficient. Their security was within themselves, not from paternalistic government."

The dedicatory program for the Mormon pioneer memorial bridge was held only a short distance from the grassy knoll where the Mormon pioneers buried 600 of number who died during the westward trek of a people seeking freedom of worship.

Pastures Are Topic During Lincoln Tour

SHOSHONE, June 2—Ranchers and other persons from several southeastern Idaho counties attended the Lincoln county grandstand tour last week. The tour took in grass seedings at Richfield, north Shoshone, Notch Butte and Sugar Leaf areas.

The first half of the day was spent visiting Mont Johnson's "blue" area northwest of Richfield. Approximately 3,500 acres are included in Johnson's dryland holdings. Work has been done here with created wheat grass, bulbous bluegrass and Whitman beardless wheat grass.

Results of several methods of brush removal have convinced Johnson burning is the most practical method where brush and chaparral are heavy enough to carry the fire. Somewhat less effective have been the wheeland plow and roller-beater.

Whitman beardless wheat grass and created wheat grass have made satisfactory growth when seeded with a deep furrowed drill following the brush, he said.

Native grasses in other areas have made remarkable comeback following burning.

The irrigated grass nursery in north Shoshone was visited. It was planted in the spring of 1951 by the Shoshone veterans classes in cooperation with the county agent. Seven varieties of orchard grass are included in the test plot.

The Notch Butte created wheat grass seedings were visited. These seedings were done as a cooperative project between the bureau of land management and stockmen. Jack Keith, district range manager in the local bureau of land management, explained the work here and at the Sugar Leaf area. Keith reported that according to actual range survey, the Sugar Leaf seeding area is now producing 16 times the feed produced on adjacent sagebrush land. In addition to grazing benefits, the area has more than paid for itself in seed harvested in 1951 and 1952, he said.
