The U. N. officials said that the truce would be broken only by force, if the South Korean government would not accept the U. N. proposal.

One of the curious things about some scientists is the great delight they take in scaring the populace, by conjuring up terrible disasters to come. The latest is Dr. Gilbert Plass of Johns Hopkins University, who forecasts a new ice age because of the immense quantities of carbon dioxide poured into the air by industrial plants.

WINDS AND CARBON DIOXIDE - Wind, which is forced wherever cool air is burned - sets like the glass in a greenhouse. It lets light from the sun pass through the earth, but it checks heat waves rising from the ground. Thus it slows up the process by which heat radiates away from the earth, and raises its temperature. The professor calculated that, at the rate modern industry is adding carbon dioxide to the atmosphere, the earth's average temperature will rise one and a half degrees per century.

### U. S. Weather Ranges From Rains to Heat

Muddy footwaters threatened rain-soaked mountains here today as the southeast backed in dry summer heat.

Rain fell along the Rockies and western base of the nation enjoyed pleasant weather.

Seventy-mile-an-hour winds in the Dakotas and a tropical sea storm off the Florida coast both abated today after raking the area yesterday and last night.

Leaves Bolstered

Workers sandbagged a 400-foot section of levees at the junction of the Sun and Missouri rivers at Great Falls, Mont., in an attempt to bolster the dikes before the Sun flood crest hits the city tomorrow today.

Mayor James Austin of Great Falls, said 1,200 persons may be forced to leave their homes if the dikes crumble.

Town Evacuated

At least 12 families were evacuated yesterday at Sun River, Idaho, and the whole town was expected to be under water today. Residents packed belongings and prepared to pull out as water swelled the river.

Farmers were seen flying boats to their houses.

The high waters threatening Sun River and Great Falls, a city of 29,000, were caused by the heaviest rains. Early today, showers hit Great Falls again, dumping .43 of an inch in six hours.

### Guardsmen Hurl Rocks at Straffer

BOISE, June 3 (AP)—A plane from Idaho's 190th Air National Guard was struck by a rock today during a guard round units yesterday and got return fire—rock.

Major Dave Johnson, the 19th commanding officer, was flying the plane.

He said the men on the ground were in a convoy of about 30 vehicles. Instead of diving for cover, they "stood along the road and threw up a barrage of rocks at the low-flying airplane."

Major George Bender, the state military adjutant's executive officer, said that during maneuvers last week in Yakima, Wash., he had enforced down a light observation plane with such tactics.

### Sale of Surplus Wheat Is Slated

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The government put up 26 million bushels of wheat for sale today and guaranteed to drive domestic customers away.

The government offered, in an official announcement, to drive domestic customers away from its stock of about 600 million bushels at 70 cents a bushel, about current market prices for some grades.

The commodity credit corporation will sell grade two hard winter wheat on open market for \$2.15 a bushel. The price was announced by the export agency, which will give exporters a better deal but an official said: "Any sales we make will proceed through direct deals with foreign governments."

### Dock Union Acts To End Shape-up

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—The district council of the International Longshoremen's association (ILA) took two major steps last night toward ending the notorious shape-up system of hiring dock workers on New York's crisscrossed waterfront.

The council voted to begin contract negotiations with dock employers two months ahead of schedule with a view to reaching an agreement on a new system of hiring. 3. Guys wondering if the men who run the country, with access to all the facts available, weigh their decisions, their votes or noes, as citizens or as politicians.

4. Guys who understand a slip here and a slip there, in order to get alone, but not so many slips that a man endangers faith in himself.

5. Guys who say "sure" to a senator or a congressman taking a free trip to show his wife and kids the wonders of the world. After all, we average Americans are human, and we know that if an airplane to Honolulu, Greece or Istanbul were blood-as-our-disposal, we would make the most of it.

6. Guys with nothing understanding people with, everything. This country never has threatened to overthrow the men and women who give their daughters coming-out parties which cost enough to buy a major league baseball franchise. If a guy has it, let him blow it. Everyone is helped from the bandies to the busby.

7. Men and women who, for the most part, are willing to give of their best for their country and the world, meaning their sons, their lovers, their money.

Here is the question I want to ask: Why the United States? Why, anyway, is it the United States which has to make the first move toward decency? Could it be that Americans are the only decent people left on earth? I'd hate to think so, but what is a man to think when we are the only ones who seem to worry about where the world is headed? A French government falls. We worry more than the French. England crowns a queen and more Americans than Englishmen will be present. Belgium winds up with a weak king, and who worries the most? Belgium, not the U. S. We send our secretary of state around the world, hoping he can solve problems. Whose problems? Ours? No. The problems of other countries. After the Bermuda meeting the hope is to get Russia's top man to meet with the heads of the United States, England and France. Why doesn't Russia suggest a meeting? If that country is on the level, who doesn't it propose a gathering? The answer is as clear as mountain air. Russia is crooked, wicked, evil; it has no more intention of keeping its promises now than it did under Stalin, and even if that fat man who is now said to own the country puts his signature on a document, where would you find a man who'd trust it? The average American wants to know, above all, if there is honesty anywhere? If there isn't, he is about here.

Sift together 1 1/2 c. sifted Kitchen Craft Flour, 1 tsp. baking powder and 1/2 tsp. salt. Combine 1 c. sugar and 2 egg yolks and gradually add 1/2 c. boiling water, beating until lemon-colored. Gradually beat in the flour mixture, beating only until well-mixed. Mix in 1 tsp. vanilla. Fold in 2 stiffly beaten egg whites.

Four batter into prepared pan and bake in a moderate oven (375°F) for 30 min. Cool slightly, and remove from pan. Cut through the cake crosswise, making two layers. This can be served hot or cold.

Fill between layers and on top with strawberries, sweetened to taste. Frozen berries may also be used. Serve with whipped cream.

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"Betty is behind in arithmetic," the teacher reported. "Unless she makes it up before the end of the term, she will have to repeat the grade."

Betty did not make it up. Arithmetic seemed something beyond her grasp. She would just as soon say three and two make four as not. When the teacher said, "No," she would pick out another number and say questioningly, "Six?" "Nine?" anything to end the ordeal.

"Maybe if she studied all summer vacation it would help?" asked her mother.

"No, no," the teacher said. "So all summer Betty went for two hours every morning to a retired teacher who drilled her in number tables. At the end of the season, Betty showed little or no improvement and she disliked arithmetic more than ever.

"If I have to do any more arithmetic I'll run away," she said. "And I don't want to go to school, any more either, if I have to do it."

The head of the psychology department was consulted. After listening to the story and talking to Betty, he said, "Better drop arithmetic. Give her a rest from it. I believe that she may be ready for the subject sometime next year—if she is allowed to forget it now."

This decision was disappointing to both mother and teacher. A whole school year and this child without arithmetic? She would forget all she knows. "But I understand," said father, "that she knows nothing of the subject. Am I right?" "Too right," said mother.

"Then I can't see what she would lose and I have a slight hope that there will be peace in the house if she is granted a furlough."

Surprisingly enough, to the teacher and mother, six months before the school year was to end, Betty showed an awakening of interest in numbers. It was feeble at first, but interest increased gradually.

Every so often something like this happens in school. It has not been found that prolonged dull or summer makeup work helped such children. They were not ready for the subject. Later the readiness appeared and the child learned easily.

Readiness is something for all teachers to investigate when a child fails in some particular study course, while doing well in others.

A child who cannot read properly when he reads with other studies, too, because he does not understand what he reads, never learns to help his child. It is pointed by Dr. Patri in his lecture "The Readiness of the Child," June 2, 1936, at the University of Idaho, Twin Falls, Idaho.

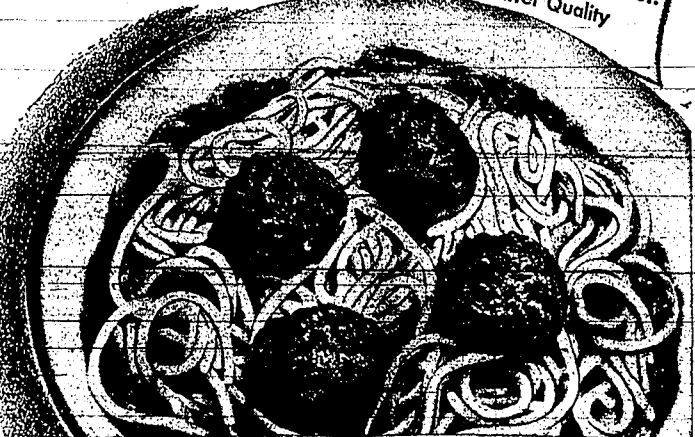
