Budget Slash Cuts Europe Aid, Vandenberg Says

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg said today that U. S. aid to its North Atlantic allies necessarily be cut if the air force goal is changed from \$1.2 billion to \$1 billion.

Decorated chief of staff of the air force, who in May 50, continued his fight against the Eisenhower administration decision to limit for 120 wings by Dec. 1, 1955. President Eisenhower assured the country in a television appearance last night that "we are going to continue to keep up our air power."

Vandenberg appeared for the second day before a public hearing on Senate appropriations subcommittee.

Questioned by Knowland, Vandenberg said that he had asked him what effect the building of a 120-wing force would have on aid to the North Atlantic treaty organization.

"In the 143-wing program," Vandenberg replied, "NATO was taken into consideration." He said that the land transaction of \$1.2 billion was declared in the budget of 1950 and is in effect of the state.

"It has been criticized by the Senate," Vandenberg said, "and the joint senators and the committee on the floor."

IDAHO FALLS, June 4 (Interior Secretary Douglas McKay was praised for his stand on the highly-controversial Snake river dam development proposal by the committee of nine in a meeting here Wednesday.

The committee represents owners of one and one-fourth million acres of land in the Snake river valley in southern Idaho.

The praise came in the form of a resolution adopted by the committee. It called for the Snake river dam project to be developed by private enterprise instead of by the federal government.

It goes on to compliment McKay upon his forthright and instructive statement on this matter, and requests that he continue to insist that whatever benefits might have accrued from federal development of the Snake river dam project be fully realized at a later date by development of the Mountain Sheep dam project on the same site by the federal government.

One of the discussions at the session was on the proposed leading of the Snake river dam project. Formal action was taken on the matter by the committee.

A review of the general water situation in the Snake river valley was given by McKay. He said that prospects are good for the irrigation season. It was pointed out that the Snake river dam project is expected to result in the near future.

PANAMA, (Friday) June 4 (AP)—The communists reportedly submitted Thursday a counter-proposal for a Korean armistice, official sources said, which differed only slightly from the "final" armistice plan.

Bond Election, Vote on Reopening School Are Set in Minidoka County

RUPERT, June 4—Dates for a bond election, one on a bond issue to reopen the school, and another on the reopening of the elementary school to admit students were set Wednesday night at a meeting of the Minidoka county school trustees at the bond election here called for July 21 and the election to reopen the school will be held on the same date.

Twice in the last three years Minidoka voters have rejected bond election proposals. The proposal in the election planned for July 21 is the same as it was in the two previous years.

For a new high school and repairs to other school buildings in the county the trustees feel the district will need \$450,000. No location for the high school has been decided upon and the trustees have discussed tentative plans for a straw vote on the same time as the bond election held. Several locations will be presented on the ballot, trustees said. Voters can signify their preference. The trustees will use the voting in the straw ballot as a guide in selecting a site for the school.

School Supt. Carl Warner said the need for a new high school is apparent. He said the school building shown in the level-headedness in past actions and that the people should have confidence in the board to do the right thing. The board is not prone to be stampeded into action, he said, and has decided to hold another election only after having studied the merits of the proposed opening of the school for the children for a new school.

'Most Powerful' A-Bomb Test Lights Western Sky

LAS VEGAS, Nev., June 4 (AP)—The most powerful atomic bomb ever set off in the United States burst with a tremendous explosion, lighting the western sky from Canada to Mexico and from the Golden Gate to Chicago, in a blast of fire and light.

The tremendous explosion, possibly two and one-half times as strong as the atomic bomb that destroyed Hiroshima, was set off by the AEC's atomic energy commission's spring test series.

The test was the most powerful ever set off in the United States. It was a "Fat Man" type of atomic bomb, which was dropped on Hiroshima in August 1945.

The AEC said one of the air force's intercontinental B-36 bombers, which was modified specifically as an atomic bomber, dropped today's bomb "from a high altitude."

"It was the first announced use of a B-36 in any atomic test."

Benson Plans to Summon Farm Chiefs About Shifts

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Benson will confer with farm leaders here this month of what he hopes to do with sweeping new reorganization powers granted him by Congress.

Benson, who is expected to announce his reorganization plan, will meet here June 29 and 30 with Benson.

He said studies already are under way, presumably by the committee, but none are "far enough along" to anticipate early changes.

The reorganization plan giving Benson authority to make major changes in the various agencies in the interest of economy and efficiency went into effect last week. Benson said he would like to see the changes in the house and senate before he would make any changes.

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AEC Chief Reveals 'Breeder' Reactor At Arco Successful

ATLANTIC CITY, June 4 (AP)—The United States announced today the successful "breeding" of atomic fuel—that is, the production of at least as much, or more, new fissionable material as is burned up in the process of making it.

The development is the most revolutionary in the entire atomic program. It was disclosed by Chairman Gordon Dean of the atomic energy commission in a speech prepared for the Edison Electric Institute.

The project was carried out at the national reactor testing station in eastern Idaho.

Dean cautioned his audience of 3,000 electric and power men not to assume that economic power from atomic energy is near. He called the achievement a milestone of progress and said it "holds out the promise of making a new type of power industry even more feasible and attractive in the long range than the electric power industry."

Dean illustrated the process this way:

"To explain to you the impact of reaching this new milestone, I would like to use an analogy, albeit a gross one, to illustrate the point. I would like to ask you to imagine a world in which only 100 gallons of gasoline existed. When that gasoline was used up, it would never be burned from the earth. But let us imagine that we had a way of burning the gasoline we had in the presence of water."

"For example, that by burning up our 100 gallons of gasoline we could change 100 gallons of water into gasoline, and thereafter we could, by burning gasoline in the presence of water, produce more gasoline, until 90 per cent of that which we burned."

"If you see a process we would quite obviously greatly stretch our supply of gasoline, but we could burn it up and produce more. It is definitely for we would always be making a little less gasoline than we burned."

"Ultimately, we would run out of water, and all the rest of the water in the world would be used up. So, the gasoline production we concerned."

"The process we are now engaged in is similar to this. We are producing 100 or more gallons of new gasoline from water for every 100 gallons of old gasoline we burn. We would have made it possible for ourselves to change gradually all the old gasoline into new. That is what has happened at the eastern Idaho plant."

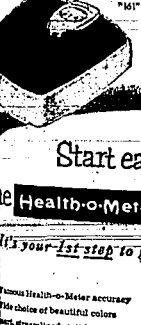

Storage of Grain On Farms Urged By USDA Official

DES MOINES, Ia., June 4 (AP)—True D. Morse, undersecretary of agriculture, has urged that farmers provide their own grain storage space to keep alive the free enterprise system.

"If we must resort to buying bins as property of the U. S. government," he said, "I will look upon those bins as monuments to the failure of free enterprise."

Morse spoke at a conference of farm leaders from Iowa, Illinois, Minnesota, Nebraska and South Dakota on what to do about the shortage of grain storage space.

He said storage space is needed for about six million bushels of corn in the six states represented at the conference including 45 to 50 million bushels in Iowa.

"We believe farmers as businessmen ought to be equipped with on-the-farm storage space but I've observed in my travels that most farms are not equipped," he said.

Wheatgrower Revolt Forecast If Cut for Planting Is Ordered

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Rep. Clifford R. Hops warned today that wheat farmers may revolt against production controls and loan price support on next year's crop unless congress stops an impending government order to slash planting 30 per cent.

The Kansas Republican, who heads the house agriculture committee, added that without production controls or price supports "the bottom probably would fall out of the wheat market next year."

He made the statement to a reporter as he called agriculture department officials to testify on his bill to limit the maximum planting cutback to 15 per cent. Hops' bill, among other things, would set a minimum national planting allotment—for the 1954 crop only—at 66 million acres. The minimum under farm law now is 65 million acres.

Agriculture Secretary Benson called his aides into session in advance of the hearing to reach final agreement on the department's position on the bill.

With surpluses piling up and exports declining, American wheat farmers for the first time in more than a decade face a choice between submitting to marketing quotas or losing price support on their 1954 crop. Farm law requires use of rigid production controls to prevent burdensome surpluses from accumulating under price support programs.

Under present law, Hops said, Benson apparently has no alternative but to propose use of marketing quotas to enforce a cutback in 1954 crop plantings to 55 million acres. That would be 30 per cent less than this year's plantings of 79 million acres.

NAMPA, June 4—Five days a year, Nampa forgets she's a bustling industrial town and a farm center. She becomes the site of one of the wildest, fastest shows in the northwest.

Nampa's annual Snake River Stampede has become one of the biggest rodeos west of Cheyenne. At-large food chains featured week-end specials in rib roast, pot roast, sirloin and chuck as low as ten cents a pound.

Budget-minded shoppers also found trying chickens an attractive buy on many meat counters around the country.

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Among other heavily promoted produce items were cantaloupe and new cabbage.

It's a community-wide affair. Hundreds ride every night in the horseshoe parade that precedes the big show. Another 250 Nampa rodeo fans on the grounds each night of the stampede selling tickets and programs, manning concessions, supervising the rodeo.

Joe J. Cramer, who produces some of the biggest rodeos in the nation, has produced the Nampa show for years. Stock comes from all over the rodeo ranch near Big Timber, Mont.

Here in the Stampede stadium cowboys wrestle with rangy Texas longhorns. They rope calves and ride smacking broncs and Brazos bulls.

Some of the cowboys prove up on ranches. Some are fresh from college. Others have scarcely seen a ranch. For today's rider is an athlete more than a cowboy.

It's a tough sort of game, though. Once in the saddle he never knows whether he'll be alive 10 seconds later. When he rides a "bruhm," bull that has the power of an Alaskan brown bear, the agility of a tiger and the disposition of a rattlesnake. If he's thrown, a rodeo clown will draw the bull's attention away—provided he's lucky.

This stampede is more than a show.

Guest Discusses Sewing Patterns At T. F. Meeting

Figure problems left the closest of attention and became an all-absorbing topic of conversation for more than 100 Magic Valley women and girls Wednesday afternoon in the Idaho Power auditorium. The occasion was a woman-to-woman session on fitting patterns to individual figures, conducted by Mrs. Alice South, New York City, representative of the Simplicity Pattern company.

The primary principle of choosing patterns was announced to be "know yourself." Women, who will be among those making about 500 million garments a year during each year, were advised to measure themselves. Their favorite dresses, discover their figure types and then go on bravely from there.

All pattern companies take their "average" measurements from the bureau of standards at Washington, D. C., and then add an "ease" or "allowance," averaging about four and one-half inches in the bust and two inches at the hip-line.

Therefore, when a seamstress gets ready for a session with the measuring tape, she is advised to "measure snugly," because the tape is already in the pattern. The only exception is at the waistline—the home sewer follows the stitching line, she was also told, and it is exact as that is scheduled.

Another sound bit of advice forwarded to the Magic Valley women was to be comfortably and well-fitted in their undergarments before they start measuring. Just by wearing brassieres, a woman's bust measurement may vary as much as several inches. Mrs. South said that a struggle may have just about the same amount of influence on the hips. An extra shank or curve in the back of the body is the kind of dart which should point toward the fullest part of the bust.

Every woman has her favorite dress, the one she hates to throw away. That dress, according to Mrs. South, is the one she should take for an easy check on her measurements.

For example, across the back from sleeve to sleeve, from the center back at the center back to the natural shoulder line to the bust and waist, from the center back to where the sleeve is sewed in and from the sleeve line to the wrist bone.

The seamstress, after pinning her pattern together, then may measure it in similar places before making any necessary adjustments, which should be accomplished, if possible, without breaking of stitching line.

The differences between pattern terms also were enumerated by Mrs. South. Junior, misses and women's sizes measure the same for bust, waist and hip, with the variety showing up in the length between the shoulder and hip.

The "half-size women" will find her patterns usually about an inch shorter in the bodice and a slight bit shorter in the shoulder, with the skirt length the same as for junior misses' sizes.

The half sizes are manufactured about an inch larger in the bust, as compared with regular sizes, from one to two inches larger in the waist and hip line.

A listing of advice to the seamstress was to follow her pattern instructions and sewing book as a cook follows her cookbook. . . . a little husband experimenting may do a lot of damage.

The meeting was for home demonstration and 4-to-5 leaders of Blaine, Lincoln, Gooding, Jerome, Cassia, Minidoka and Twin Falls counties. The latter was made by Florence Schults, Twin Falls county home demonstration agent.

"We have a great influence on our children, so we should always be careful concerning our example before them. We are obliged to consider everything we do for them or to them."

"We give our children many and varied experiences as we live with them day by day. Most will be healthy, happy experiences promoting their growth and understanding. Some experiences are bound to be unpleasant, but we hope that they, too, will be good for the youngsters. We are obliged now and then to 'swat' a child's will. Often, we must deny them something. Children will occasionally show defiance of a regulation. Then we have to punish them—an unhappy experience for a youngster."

If the punishment is not understood to be because he was disobedient, it is likely to be thought a mean act on our part, an imposition of our power upon his weakness. If it is the result of his own act he must be made to understand he was responsible. This is not always easy.

ROK Troops, Reds Meet in Rough Battle

SEOUL, Korea, June 4 (AP)—South Korean infantrymen killed or wounded 648 communists today in fierce fighting on the flaming eastern front.

Reports said the ROKs took full command of only one of seven communist-held outposts but the Reds paid a heavy price in defense of the positions they took in last week's offensive.

Troops of four South Korean divisions struck against Chinese and North Korean troops along a 20-mile battleground in eastern Korea.

Long Battles
The battle for Lake the Gook's castle and Anchor Hill, strategic outposts defending main allied positions on the mountainous eastern front, raged throughout the morning.

While the ground troops slugged it out, American B-29 Superforts from Okinawa staged their biggest tactical strike in almost a year to bombard red supply buildings behind the fighting front.

The targets were located along the base of the old "Iron triangle" which runs from Chien-wu to Kumsu-lwa, Pyongyang, a communist-held city destroyed by bombings, is at the apex of the triangle.

100 Tons of Bombs
Nineteen Superforts dropped 100 tons of high explosive and air-bursting bombs behind the front in direct support of fighting ground troops.

Utah's Highway "Target Signs" Are Abandoned

SAIT LAKE CITY, June 4 (AP)—The proposed use of "target signs" to protect Utah's highway safety markers has been abandoned. The experiment has proved too successful.

The state road commission erected a few hollow markers in Blaine county and other remote areas to see if they would draw the fire of disgruntled hunters away from road signs—a form of vandalism which takes about \$30,000 out of the state's coffers every year for replacement.

Commission Chairman D. H. Whittemburg said the "target signs" worked well. The signs were damaged little but the targets were riddled worse than unprotected signs ever were.

Whittemburg said apparently the targets encourage breaking the state law against firing from the highways.

GOODING, June 4—Gooding county 4-H club members will attend 4-H summer camp and hot spring on June 20-22. A fee of \$8 will be charged to cover the cost of food, transportation, insurance and handkerchiefs.

McKay Announces Increase in Park, Monument Visit Charge

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Interior Secretary McKay has announced a new fee schedule for automobile, motorcycle and house trailer permits affecting visitors to 26 national parks and monuments. It becomes effective Monday.

New 15-day automobile permits will be sold at the same fees formerly charged for annual permits and the cost of annual permits will be twice as much as before.

The same charges will be made for motorcycle and house trailer permits. The national park service said the new schedule is the first in which the one-time or short-term visitor is charged less than the resident or the long-term visitor.

McKay said there is no general increase in fees charged in the national park system during the last 25 years, though some new fees were added in 1929. He added that the cost to the government in providing visitor service and facilities should be met in part by tax and equitable fees.

Under the new schedule the highest fees will be at Yellowstone national park, at \$6 for an annual automobile permit and \$3 for a 15-day permit. At Yosemite national park in California the annual fee will be \$4 and the 15-day permit \$2.

In other national parks where automobile fees are new charged, they will be \$2 and \$1, except at Shenandoah national park in Virginia, where the present annual fee of \$1 and single trip fee of 25 cents remain unchanged. In most of the national monuments where fees are charged, the annual permit will cost \$1 instead of 50 cents and 15-day permits will be 50 cents.

The park service said present fees remain unchanged, except for the following national parks and monuments, where some of the changes involve guide fees as well as vehicle permits:

- Bryce-canyon, Utah; Crater lake, Ore.; Glacier, Mont.; Grand canyon, Ariz.; Grand Teton, Wyo.; Lassen volcanic, Calif.; Mammoth, Calif.; Mesa Verde, Colo.; Mount Rainier, Wash.; Rocky Mountain.

Stamp Collectors in Magic Valley Form Organization, Vote National Affiliation

It would be more logical than hobby show to get a group interested in stamp collecting.

It is the way Lynn Langdon, Robert Hinkley, Jr., Twin Falls, and their idea led to the formation of the Magic Valley Stamp Club.

Bob and I saw they are better to follow collectors, saw a opportunity in a recent Camp to hobby show. They posted a list as a starting point, and invitations to an informing and creation of the club in Twin Falls and in the entire valley, was made.

The club was formally organized and Langdon was elected president and Hinkley, secretary-treasurer. Armour Anderson, another stamp enthusiast, became vice president and was promptly appointed the club's sales manager.

Now the club boasts 10 adult members, including three from Jerome, and is looking forward to more members as soon as the word gets around to other collectors the young organization is in existence.

The philatelist—the technical term description for stamp collectors—meet the first Tuesday of each month at the Idaho Power auditorium and Langdon has issued an invitation to all valley stamp hobbyists to join the club. Membership is restricted to persons 18 years or older but youngsters under that age may attend if sponsored by a club member.

Wasting no time, the club members have already voted to become a chapter member of the American Philatelic Society, a nation-wide organization with membership totaling 10,000 collectors.

Langdon says the group will open up more avenues to the club for collecting and exchanging stamps by putting it in touch with other organizations.

A veteran of 16 years in the hobby, Langdon is a member of several national societies and has exhibited his collection in national shows.

He just returned from a trip to the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs show at Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada, where he had a chance to see some outstanding exhibits.

Langdon pointed out that some members in the club are not satisfied with general collecting have branched off into specialized fields. Hinkley, for instance, concentrates on French and Italian issues while Anderson is sticking strictly with American stamps.

To give members still more aid, plans are in the making for a club library of special books and catalogues and dealer lists and even auctions where members may bid by mail.

For the foreseeable future, arrangements have been made to buy issues from Canada and the Netherlands. Calvin Church, Jerome, has been appointed chairman of this part of club's activities.

An added attraction for members later will be programs to be arranged by Mrs. Winona Merritt, program chairman.

Turning back to his recent trip, he said he saw stamps worth \$5,000 to \$15,000.

Too, he observed, there is the British Guiana, a one-cent stamp of 1968. The most recent sale price on one of them was about \$4,000, he added.

On the other hand, he noted, collectors can buy hundreds of stamps for as low as one cent in both domestic and foreign issues. "So you see, he concluded, "it's about like everything else, you can name your own price and still have a lot of fun doing it."

Public Lands Policy of Nation Compared to Soviet Principle

WASHINGTON, June 3 (REAP)—The case for stopping the federal acquisition of public land holdings and for turning a maximum amount of the present public domain back to the state gov-

ernment is being made most effectively promoted by Laurence P. Lee, last year's president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

During a meeting of the National Lumber Manufacturers Association in Washington last year, Lee openly accused Richard E. McCarde, chief of the U. S. forest service, of heading a monopoly government bureau program which looked restraint from no one.

Lee, a Yale lawyer, makes his home in Jacksonville, and heads insurance companies in Florida and North Carolina. But he was born in New Mexico and has extensive interests in stock-raising enterprises which raise cattle and sheep on public lands and are therefore subject to restraints of the Taylor Grazing act and other U. S. conservation laws.

Lee's opposition to these laws and U. S. government land-management policy over the past 20 years goes beyond his personal interest, however. He declares that freedom of land ownership is a fundamental of American liberty. Property rights, he says, are human rights. Tyranny has its roots in land controlled by politicians.

As the classic example of this, Lee points to communist Russia, where the Soviet union has the world's largest landhold. The United States, he says, is becoming the second largest landholder, with 24 per cent of its area under federal control, and government land ownership increased from 33 per cent to 54 per cent in the 10 western states during the last 10 years.

Forty different federal agencies are involved in the management of these lands. Lee charged in his speech that the government control of these agencies control some timber lands and there is no uniformity in their management.

Lee spelled out his ideas further in a recent article for American Forestry magazine.

"Do the American people know that the federal government does not pay taxes to the states in which its holdings are located?" he asked. Answering his own question he admitted that, "in some instances, the government pays the states a portion of the gross receipts in lieu of taxes. But—payments are made only when revenues are derived. When no timber is sold or no minerals mined, no payments are made. With rare exceptions, the states and local governments receive less in the long run under any system of federal ownership than they would receive if the lands were privately held and operated by tax-paying owners."

Two principal proposals along this line have been presented to congress this year. The first was an amendment to the Lifshild bill, referred by Sen. George W. Malone, R., Nev., all mineral rights and control of all grazing rights on federal public lands within their borders. This amendment was defeated in the senate without a record vote.

The second proposal is from Rep. Wesley A. Stewart, R., Mont. It called for transferring to the states federal land users all water rights for mining, agriculture or manufacturing. The amendment was defeated in the senate without a record vote.

The Republican party platform of 1952 called for a re-examination of federal land policies along the lines Lee outlined. It further called for legislation to define the rights of grazers and other federal land users.

Lee's proposal is to have the federal government own the land, but to have the state own the mineral rights. This would give the state the right to transfer these privileges to others.

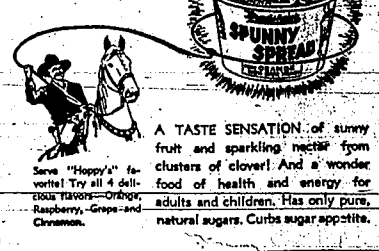

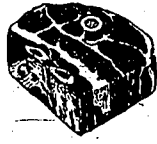

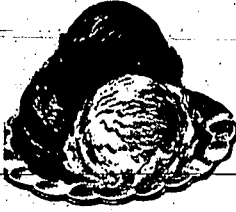
