WASHINGTON, June 5 (UP)—Senate Republican Leader A. Taft proposed today a military alliance with Great Britain in the east in a statement denying he favored it as a policy.

Atomic Attack Power Is Cut, Panel Advised

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—Gen. Hoyt Vandenberg told senators today the proposed air force cutback would reduce the strategic air command's "combat readiness" to below the limits of an acceptable "calculated risk."

The four-star air force chief read from a "top secret" cable by Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, commander of the strategic air command, saying a proposed reduction below 67 wings would be "an extension of the calculated risk to a point where the security of the United States and its allies."

The Senate appropriations subcommittee, before which Vandenberg began his third day of testimony, had been told the reduction of 130 wings would hold the strategic air force at 100 wings, a 30 percent cut from the 130 wings in a wing, by December 31.

Vandenberg, who is retiring at the end of this month, has been a vocal critic of the Eisenhower administration plan to cut the air force to 100 wings by December 31.

One of the hottest was the abandonment of Southern Idaho College of Education at Albion into a school for delinquent girls. The state would be used for boys only.

Other issues would reduce the voting age from 21 to 18 and require that students attend school until the age of 18 or high school graduation, whichever comes first. The present requirement is that they finish the eighth grade.

Another would provide for a medical school at Idaho State college, with an appropriation of \$2,000,000 to start construction, and another would make it a felony to sell alcoholic beverages to anyone under 21.

Other bills would provide for regulation of the liquor and better fair-to-market roads.

SEOUL, Korea, June 5—Allied Saboteurs shot down eight communist MIGs today, probably destroyed one and damaged five more in low-level air battles near the Suho reservoir.

On the ground, South Korean infantrymen remained locked in combat with North Korean communists on the eastern front, scene of flaming conflict for the ninth straight day.

While Saboteurs had a field day over North Korea, bad weather held back U. N. fighter bombers. However, jets were seen in the sky against front line communist positions.

Two of mankind's highest, most feared enemies and tent caterpillars—are rampaging in record hordes in several sections of the country this year.

A check by Associated Press bureaus brought such comments as "worsening by the hour," "million dollars' damage to crops," "a general outbreak," "a general outbreak of agriculture that preliminary results of a survey run under way showed a "sharp increase in the number of worms from the east coast to the Mississippi."

Several infestations of army worms were reported from Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Missouri, West Virginia, Kentucky, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Louisiana and Tennessee.

Tent caterpillars are concentrated in New Jersey, New York, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Washington, Georgia and Maine.

Other insect pests were reported out in major force in corn limited areas. Massachusetts is conducting infestation in 20 years to strip trees of their foliage about 20,000 acres; but the worst attack is in an area around Westfield, N. Y.

"It's one of the few trades in which a big league club has let go its star player while he was still at the peak of his career. Last was Hank Borow who the Yankees turned loose in 1945 to the same Cubs. But Rickey has a long record of trading players he thinks are past their prime. He ushered Dixie Dean to the Cubs and Dixie Walker to the Pirates in yesterday's trades.

Kiner, whose salary of \$75,000 is second only to Stan Musial of the Cards, recently became the 10th player in history to hit 300 homeruns. He has seven this season.

Manager Phil Cavarretta was elated over the transaction. "I'm sure sold to Kiner," he beamed. "This will give us a good 1-2 punch with Hank Sawyer. This is something the Cubs needed for a long time."

Going to the Cubs along with the favorite of Pittsburgh fans are catcher Joe Garagiola, pitcher Howie Pollard and outfielder infielder George Metkovich.

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Cold Weather Nips Planting For Shoshone

LONDON, June 5—Britain's adulation of its newly-crowned queen reached such heights today that a newspaper had to warn against a rumor that race horse owners intended to let her share with tomorrow's Epsom derby racing classic.

The Daily Mirror published and denounced the "fantastic rumor." It said "addicted rumor mongers" were talking "gibberish" because any attempt to throw the derby would rob it forever of all meaning or dignity.

Every owner and jockey wants to win the race just as much as the queen does, the Daily Mirror said. The queen's colt, which jockey Harry Carr is to ride, now is second favorite in the betting at 11 to 2.

There is no doubt the public would go wild if Aureole won and gave the royal family its first derby victory since King Edward VII's Minerva won in 1909. But Britain takes its racing seriously.

Flora crowds jammed central London early today to cheer the queen, three days after her coronation formally opened the second Eusebian era.

More than 40,000 persons were waiting outside Buckingham palace to see their affection when the young queen appeared on a balcony after a state banquet last night, and an equally large crowd is expected tonight.
