Considering costs and benefits the combination of these three projects is a logical and proper development of the hydro-electric resources of the Snake river between elevations 2,077 and 4,176 and fits readily into basin development for energy, as well as future, power production.

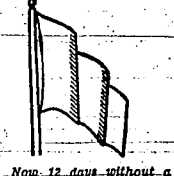

Class of 1913 Conducts Initial Reunion on 40th Anniversary

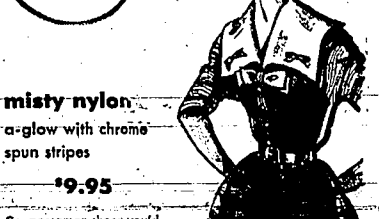

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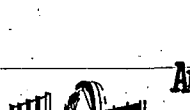

U. S. Figures Back Private Bid for Dams

also made by the government, declines much less.
"Why would power production at the three dams remain approximately the same in an interval of 20 to 50 years and that of the high dam drop as much as 400,000 kilowatt?" the Post story asks.

"The answer is simply this: As other power-producing and storage facilities are added in the Columbia system, both the frequency and volume by which the 60-mile, Hells canyon reservoir is emptied are reduced," the story continues.

"That means less water released through Hells canyon's turbines, reducing power produced at the dam. It means, also less downstream generation directly resulting from stream-flow distributed from Hells canyon barrier.

"On the other hand, the three dams, with the same power head of 602 feet, would be subject to far less fluctuation . . .
"The government's own figures tend to confirm, therefore, the Idaho Power-comparative-long-range estimate of at-site and downstream power production for the three-dam vs. Hells canyon dam."

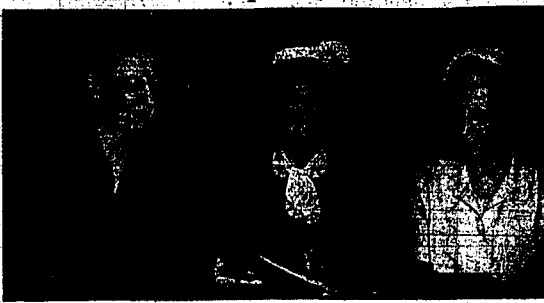

Boss Isn't Sole Factor for Poor Work Conditions, Study Shows

NEW YORK, June 8 (AP)—Tired on the job? Maybe it's your boss, but scientists don't think so.
Armed with thermometers and stopwatches, they've been doing some on-the-job sleuthing for the causes of fatigue. So far, the prime suspects are dust, noise, vibration, smoke fumes and plain ordinary thirst—not a boss in the job.

"These workday bogies were tapped by physiologists who stood by workers through entire shifts," reported pulse rates and temperatures after exertion. Closely they watched the rate at which pulse and temperature returned to "resting levels" after a stretch of work.

If pulse and temperature remain this level too slowly, the physiologists know the worker is over-laxing himself. He's on the border of fatigue. His efficiency is on, on the downgrade.

The aim of the tests, says Dr. Lucien Brouha, of Dupont's Haskell laboratory of industrial toxicology, is to organize work in industrial plants so reactions at the end of a shift are the same or only slightly higher than at the start.

"The tests," he adds, "make it possible to evaluate and classify industrial jobs according to fatigue potential."

Once this is established, employers can select workers on the basis of their physical fitness for a given job.

In so-called "hot industries," where workers perspire profusely, Dr. Brouha found men who ran

fever's of 100 degrees and higher on the job.
Increased consumption of water banished the fever, said, helped workers avoid crippling fatigue.

"But you can't rely on thirst to tell you how much water you need to make up for fluids lost through perspiration," Dr. Brouha says. "Employees feel better when they train themselves to drink fixed amounts of water on a regular schedule—much as an sick man forces liquids."

Physiologists have dealt body blows to fatigue by lowering heat and humidity, where possible, and working out a schedule of regular rest periods.

You can get tired, however, just holding your balance. Those skeletal muscles may not produce mechanical work, but they get a workout holding you up.

Dr. Brouha describes one job on which men worked all day skimming impurities from the surface of a liquid with a long, heavy ladle.

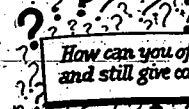
"The tanks were located so high above the floor the whole operation had to be performed at shoulder level," he said. "Average heart reactions were high, reaching 100 beats per minute for the first pulse recorded after skimming the tank."

Special platforms were built so the men could work at waist level. Average heart rate recorded one minute after skimming the tank at this level was 112 beats per minute.

In other instances, physiologists have determined to what extent

work crews should be increased to reduce fatigue and increase efficiency. Sometimes, they discovered more mechanization was needed.

U. S. Outlook Encouraging; Banker Avers

SUN VALLEY, June 6 (Special)—George E. Eccles, president of the First Security corporation, Ogden, said here today that the outlook for the economic situation is "by no means dim."

Eccles addressed the closing session of the 27th annual convention of the Pacific Section's association. He said he favored a continuation of moderate optimism, basing his stand on what he called "intangibles that are on the asset side of our economy."

The Utah banker said that removal of direct controls has restored traditional flexibility to the business system. He predicted that competition and an expanded supply of key materials will bring a whole new series of consumer and capital goods into the market. Eccles said also that he foresees an economic downturn in the reasonable near future and that its extent and duration are likely to depend on the aggressiveness of any program followed by the government.

He warned that relaxation of credit in itself cannot be expected to reverse the downturn and called for a flexible credit policy that must be watched closely and changed whenever necessary.

"A government policy should be pursued," he declared, "that will stimulate private investment to be brought about by tax reductions and increased government expenditures on new plant and equipment investments."

The economist's group, with membership in seven western states and two Canadian provinces, elected Ray Hanley, Sacramento, Calif., president of the organization. Other officers named were Harry A. Marks, Los Angeles, first vice president; Northrup Hamilton, Portland, second vice president; and David G. Cuthbertson, Mountain View, Calif., secretary-treasurer.

Bottomland Trees Prove Boon To Operators of Mill at Hailey

HAILEY, June 6—Three young Fairfield men have started a new business enterprise which promises to clear most of the cottonwood trees from Big Wood river bottom. Stan Ramsey, Roy Rogers and W. B. Shappes started operations at their sawmill just south of Bellevue about a week ago and have sawed 15,000 board feet of cottonwood. They have cut and hauled to the plant about 350,000 feet.

Seven men are employed at the sawmill and three are in the timber. At present timber is being cut from the ranches of Wallace Young and Don Spencer. The mill is producing at the rate of approximately 10,000 feet per day.

Ramsey said they estimate timber on Big Wood river is sufficient.

The power to run the mill is furnished by a 140-horsepower diesel Caterpillar tractor, buried underneath the floor. A large hoist is used to haul the timber, which averages around three feet in diameter.

On leaving the saw, it is run through the edger, trimmed and stacked in neat piles to dry by the hoist.

Stewart is taken on a long conveyor belt, dumped behind a high stockade of tin and buried.

As yet the mill is in the open, but will be enclosed as soon as possible.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

A little west and about four miles south of HAZELTON is a region of fertile farms, modern homes and patches of shade trees known as the Dixon community. It is a neighborly community, a lot like a big, happy family.

Back in 1906 this area was nothing but sagebrush. There were no roads, no ditches, no power lines and no buildings. Across the deep Snake river canyon stood the town of MURFERTON but there was no bridge. Hazelton had not yet been born. But MURFERTON on the river was a flourishing community. The dam had been completed and canals were being dug.

It was in 1907 that the first settlers came to Dixon. Among the first were three brothers, David Freeman, Henry Freeman and John Freeman, and their families. Henry Freeman's house was the first one built in the area. The Freeman house burned in 1961 and now the site is occupied by the modern home belonging to Ralph Kholis and his family.

Dr. R. Lee Wood, Sonora, Tex., also was one of the early settlers. He divided his land into three parts now owned by Paul Conway, Ray Looney and William Leonard. The latter place is farmed by Don McWalt.

At 1908 the late H. L. and Mrs. Wood came to the community from Texas and moved onto the Rice place. Mr. Wood died several years ago but Mrs. Wood lives in Hazelton. She tells of their first home on the creek, a "shack" with a tin roof. She also recalls crossing a toll bridge on the river to shop in Miller.

The first telephone line from Dixon to Miller was hooked onto the phone posts and in order to have a connection all poles had to be closed. Dave Freeman owned a graphophone which he would play for the benefit of all persons listening in on the telephone line. Dave Freeman's place now is owned by Mrs. Ralph Kholis.

Around 1900 a store was opened at Hazelton by Hank Napton and many bought over from Miller twice a week.

Among the early settlers were eight brothers. The first were: Dixon, Frank Dixon, Roy Baker, George Baker, Carl C. Dudley, Fay Shepherd, Jasper Shepherd, the Baker brothers returned to Chicago in 1920 and George Baker's place is owned by V. L. Lapsall. Will Wood owns Roy Baker's place. Dudley also has moved away and his farm now is owned by Jasper Shepherd. Dudley had an insurance business in TWIN FALLS for several years and now operates a photography shop in Twin Falls.

Jasper Shepherd married Josephine Beuchner in 1912. They built the first modern home in the community in 1910 and still live in it. Mr. and Mrs. Beuchner are working on their farm.

Frank Dixon didn't stay in the community very long but returned to his place as city engineer at Hazelton in 1910, farming in his spare time. He married Alene Baker in 1918. He served in the army during World War I and is the oldest member of the Hazelton Grange. He taught school at Hazelton while he was in the service.

Fay Shepherd and Guy Dixon are the only ones of the original eight bachelors still living in Dixon. The two like to recall their "Thanksgiving" dinner in 1908. Frank Dixon was the cook and dinner consisted of baked beans, dumplings, potatoes, salt pork and apple dumplings. After dinner, the two claim, the eight bachelors played leapfrog. A swinging foot bridge was stretched across the canyon in 1911. Shortly after the bridge was erected, George Baker returned from Chicago with his bride. There was no bridge at the station to meet them and they had to walk the three miles to their home. Mrs. Baker said she carried across the swinging bridge on her hands and knees, wishing all the time she was back in Chicago.

The largest farm in the community is a 400-acre place known as the Houghtain place and farmed by Van Houghtain. It originally was homesteaded by O'Donner and Downey, Montpelier. There was a farm sale there in 1918 and the auctioneer from Twin Falls decided to cross the canyon on the swinging bridge.

It was customary in those days for the auctioneer to furnish the coffee at a sale and as the auctioneer started across the swaying bridge he dropped his sack of tin cups and coffee into the river. Disgusted, he returned to Miller and drove his team across the regular bridge—a distance of 18 miles. The sale didn't get under way until 3 p.m. and the thirty farmers had to drink water with their sandwiches.

The Dixon schoolhouse was built in 1909 on land donated by the Dixons. A Mrs. Parsons from JEROME was the first teacher. She had seven pupils. The old frame building has been replaced by a brick one but no classes have been held there since graduation.

Fred Marshall, who once farmed the Houghtain place and who was a real commissioner, was instrumental in getting money appropriated for a bridge between Murrain and Dixon.

Mr. and Mrs. Ross Sealey came to the community in 1910. Today their son, Richard E. Sealey, is prosecuting attorney of Jerome. The prosecuting attorney's father has been a county commissioner for 14 years.

Refuge Shelters Wide Variety of Birds

Utah's Bear River Bird Refuge Rates High as Haunt of Air 'Tourists'

June 5 (U)—If waterfowl were to guide their sea-son's hunt for a least-pleasant place that would be a big red circle and a star. Top accommodations here would be the vast, level marshes of the Bear River bird refuge, at the end of Great Salt Lake, one of the most popular spots in the world.

It is one of the most popular spots in the world, where hundreds of thousands of birds of many kinds come to roost and feed on the 64,000 acres of waterfowl marshes. It is a government ex-posed pond. This is a "hot" refuge, which is the food value the birds get from the water.

At any time of year, you can see an odd assortment of winged creatures whose plumage ranges from the drab to the fop-lish and which paddle, stalk or strut and take to wing in alarmed flight at your approach.

In all, 108 species of birds have been counted at the refuge. About 60 nest here.

Besides practically all kinds of ducks and geese, there are terns, gulls, pelicans, black-crowned night-herons and great blue herons; avocets, phalaropes, cormorants, curlews, plovers, snowy plovers, whistling glossy ibis, to mention just a few.

And many of them could teach humans a thing or two in family devotion. Take the Canada goose. They mate for life and their family group is inseparable until the goslings are old enough to fend for themselves.

If one falls prey to a hunter's gun or disease, its mate will remain single for a suitable period of mourning—usually two or three years—before taking another mate.

One vigorous patient, a wild-duck, really traveled after being released. Eighty-three days later he was shot at tiny Palmyra island in the Pacific ocean, 3,600 miles from Bear river.

Gunsners from New York, California and Florida and many other states annually stake out their de-velops and fire at the awfully-moving formations.

Several celebrities including Clark Gable and the late Wallace Bear have bagged their limits at Bear River.

The duck and geese flocks re-main on the refuge in great num-bers until the end of each winter, gradually pushing out from the shore-line, encroaching on their food supply.

Even they utter their wild cries, leap into the air and pump their wings vigorously, seeking altitude. Once properly aloft, they fall into formation and cruise at an effort-less pace that will take them in a series of hops to their wintering grounds in southern California, the Gulf of Mexico and the southern states.

Come early March they will be back, and it's a sure thing that up to two million of them will be lodged temporarily at the Bear river refuge.

We plowed into home education full speed that first morning—and quickly found ourselves spinning our wheels.

I was working then from midnight to 8 a.m. and the schedule for my pupils—the two older boys—called for classes from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. But when time came for papa to hit the hay for the afternoon, neither Paul nor John had finished half his work.

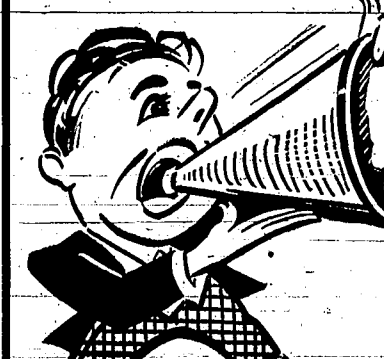

Pruett Traces Star Location In June Skies

Summer is practically here even though the almanac date of its arrival still is about two weeks away. Officially, summer begins at 10 a.m. MST, June 21. The sun will be above the horizon only a few minutes longer on June 21 than today and less than one degree higher in the south at noon.

The majority of naked-eye planets at present appear to be in the sky. Dr. Pruess says they can only be seen only with difficulty. Jupiter is rising only shortly before sunrise but by the end of the month this bright "king of the gods" of the ancients can be spotted clearly low in the dawn sky a little north of east.

Mars and Mercury set shortly after the sun. Mars will not be visible in June, but later in the month Mercury can be seen low in the west as soon as the sky is getting dark.

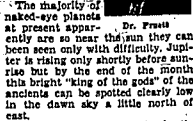
Saturn in North
Yellow Saturn, the ringed planet, is well up in the south at nightfall and still is only a little above Spica. The two make a nice wide pair. Saturn is somewhat brighter. The difference in the apparent behavior of planets (other worlds in our solar system) and stars (distant suns) is well exemplified here. Saturn shines with a steady light while Spica twinkles.

For real planetary splendor, observe low in the sky—almost due east—about an hour before sunrise. Gorgeous Venus, the most brilliant of all star-like objects, will present a picture of startling celestial glory on any clear morning for anyone willing to brave the early morning "dews and damps."

Vega Shines
For the brighter stars, observe about two hours after sunset. High in the sky and about due east, blue-white Vega, the gem of the harp of Orion, shines in splendor. Somewhat lower and to the left of Vega, is Deneb at the head of the northern cross. This fairly large figure of stars is lying on its side with the head toward the north. A little inspection will usually reveal the cross.

Low and almost due east, bright Altair in the eagle is spotted earlier since dimmer stars are both above and below it. Red Antares in the scorpion is flashing energetically rather low in the sky and slightly east of due south. Only a little south of the overhead point, orange Arcturus, principal star of the bear, shines.

In the western half of the sky is Regulus, at the end of the handle of the sickle, well above the western point of the horizon. Over toward the northwestern sky line the gem, Aldebaran, and Pollux are twinkling. Pollux is to the left of Aldebaran and is somewhat brighter and more orange in color.
