143 Killed, Hundreds Hurt in Warning in 2-State Region

FLINT, Mich., June 9 (UP)—Six death-dealing tornadoes slammed southern Michigan and northern Ohio Monday night, killing 143 and injuring more than 1,000. The twisters, funneling down out of humid evening skies, hit without warning in almost every case. Shortly after 1 p.m. today state police in Michigan and Ohio issued a tentative "final" count of 143 dead, making this storm the sixth most deadly in history. The job of digging through the rubble continued, however, with a possibility of still more deaths. Men, women and children were found hurled dead in basements, cars, under tons of rubble or out in the open—tossed, there like mere twigs. Two young boys were carried a half mile to their deaths.

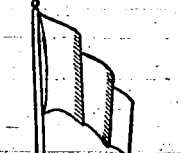

Barter Trade With Soviets Set for Japan

TOKYO, June 9 (AP)—Japan is moving quickly but secretly into desirable barter deals with Russia and communist China in an apparent effort to bolster the country's economy prior to the "shock" of a Korean armistice.

The government has announced it is buying 450,000 tons of cheap Russian coal from the former Japanese-owned island of Sakhalin, but 30 miles to the north. The price of \$10 per ton was one-third the cost of coal previously bought in the U. S.

Ship Repair
In exchange, Soviet ships will be repaired in Japan and Russian crewmembers will be allowed to stay in the country for a specified time. In addition the international trade and industry ministry announced an unspecified number of fishing ships will be sold to the Russians.

This announcement came hard on the heels of another deal with red China for 130,000 tons of coal from Chiungting. In exchange the Japanese are sending the reds spinning and weaving machines for the Chinese textile industry.

Relax Restrictions
Kiyohide Okano, Japan's minister of international trade and industry, told a press conference the government of Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida is negotiating with the allies to relax restrictions on Japan's trade with red China as much as possible.

Presently, the Yoshida government has agreed to the export of only non-strategic goods to the reds.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower will now go to Bermuda with far greater influence than he has enjoyed in any of his previous visits to the island.

It is clear that the whole area of international differences, observers find it difficult to single out any success for special credit. But the most important success is that understood, perhaps, was his addressing of the resolution to withdraw American financial aid from the United Nations, if red China were admitted to membership.

It seems as how someone has one of those old-time ailments that predicts the type of weather, direction of wind, tonnage of dust in the air for any given locality and whether the birds will be flying or walking on a specific day.

CHINA'S ADMISSION POSSIBLE—In return for this congress, Eisenhower has agreed to oppose China's admission before. Even proponents of the resolution, Sen. William F. Knowland, Calif., and Everett McKinley Dirksen, Ill., concede Chinese membership, in the President's opinion, might be possible and desirable in the far future.

Eisenhower's quiet dissent from Sen. Robert A. Taft's "it's all alone" idea was in similar vein. Although the President misinterpreted the Taft position because he had not heard the senator's speech, the adverse reaction in Europe and the far east forced the White House to repudiate even its own misinterpretation.

COMMERCE WITH RUSSIA—Washington again quieted Anglo-French fears and averted pro-Berlin demonstrations on Monday when Eisenhower announced European allied trade with Russia.

DULLES TAKES FRANKS—But the address which the State Department announced along the Avenue and the politicians on Capitol Hill was Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' bold and frank attack of the problems he and Eisenhower bumped into on their tour of the middle east and south Asia.

AREBS FEAR ZIONISM—The politics, especially those from urban areas, were aimed at his handling of the Arab-Israel dispute. Though he did not mention Harry S. Truman's midnight recognition of Israel independence on the eve of the 1948 election, Dulles every day in his address, by either side, and many historically friendly people have begun to hate us because of our past support of Paris and London policies.

THE BONN government in West Germany is no different. Able Chancellor Adenauer had to resort to tricky parliamentary devices to get the European Army pact through its legislature.

Some writers are suggesting that the dominant characteristic of postwar democratic systems is the feebleness of the executive arm and the contrasting power of parliaments. Given a weak executive and a legislature torn among many parties—or at least differing viewpoints—you most often have chaos and ineffectiveness.

Parliaments can make laws but they cannot govern, that is, administer and make day-to-day discretionary policy. They are not equipped for quick decision. Yet they seem strong enough to prevent prime ministers from governing effectively.

The problem probably is least evident in Britain. But there are those who profess to see considerable signs of it right here in America, where in congress even the President's own party frequently stands in the way of policies he desires.

SLIP IN TIME

A lot of officers and civilian officials in the Pentagon could be expected to resign recently when Defense Secretary Charles Wilson absent-mindedly left a "classified, top secret" military budget document on a congressional committee table during a recess.

What delighted Pentagon subordinates, however, was that this was exactly the kind of forgetfulness for which they can be severely punished. And for the big boss to make a slip of this kind gives them an alibi if they get called down for failure to lock a file drawer at night.

In fact, on March 26, Secretary Wilson had sent a special memorandum to all the three service secretaries, the joint-chiefs of staff, the chairman of all Pentagon boards, committees and council. The subject was: "Security violations in the Department of Defense." The memo began:

"I am deeply concerned over the number of security violations occurring recently within the Department of Defense."

It concluded with a call for prompt and effective disciplinary action, regardless of rank or position.

The weeklies and semi-weeklies of small journalism are more wholesome for the same reason. The professional faker and liar who enjoys social privilege in Washington would be kicked to a sorry way by direct action and if that didn't suffice they would do no less to the editor himself.

This is not to say that fear is the reason small-town editors conduct themselves with a decent respect for truth and the opinions of mankind. But remoteness from moral and physical "reader response" critics does affect the editorial and critical judgments of metropolitan magazines.

It may be little beside the sever of Sigma Delta Chi's "substantiality" but let me quote from a recent letter by Karl A. Bickel, one of our great ones in his time as president of the United Press.

"It is important, I think, that the Henry Luce business be brought out to the sunlight." He wrote: "That the implications of the deal be brought out. 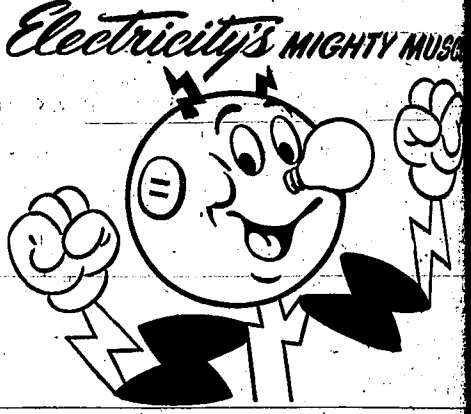

The annual consolidated financial report on the counties by the bureau of public accounts was released Monday by State Auditor N. P. Nielson.

Nielson disclosed that delinquent taxes totaled \$1,326,750 with Kootenai county at the top with \$111,771. Ada was next with \$102,975.

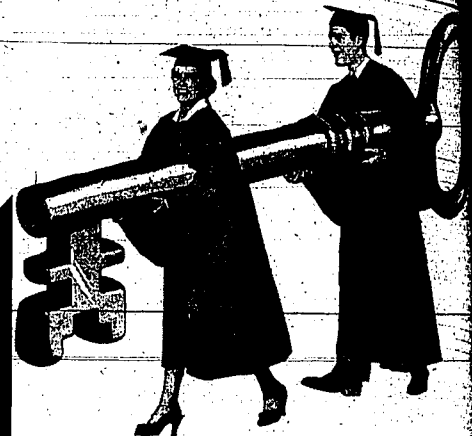
