Hint Is Given In Army Plan To Cut Bases

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—The army today gave a strong hint of which bases it intends to close by releasing the names of congressmen invited to an special "briefing on utilization of bases."

Invited to the briefing Friday morning by Army Undersecretary Earl D. Johnson were senators and representatives from California, Texas, Indiana, Alabama, Rhode Island and Kentucky.

A formal announcement on the closing of certain bases is expected after the briefing.

Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens has said seven bases will be closed because of manpower and budgetary limitations imposed by the new defense budget. Army officials said all the bases to be deactivated will be closed over a six-month period starting next January.

Because of the touchy political problems involved, army officials refused to identify the bases scheduled to be closed in advance of the briefing, they admitted, however, the congressmen invited to the conference were those who have benefited by the forthcoming action.

The bases in their areas are Camp Roberts and Camp Stan Eads (Ohio), Camp Ft. Adams, Newport, R. I.; Ft. Crockett, Galveston, Tex.;

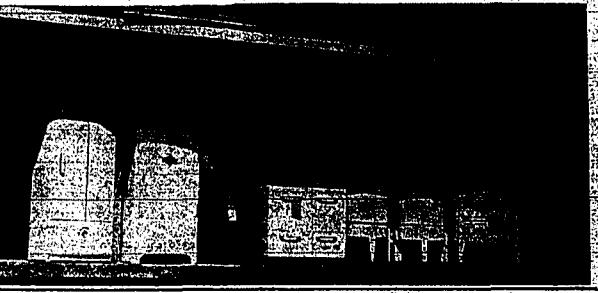

State Banker Group Elects New Officers

SUN VALLEY, June 10—Idaho bankers went up to the annual convention here Tuesday, electing S. M. Melick, Rexburg, president.

Other officers named were L. P. Zumbach, Caldwell, vice president; R. Walker, Boise, secretary; and Roy Taitner, Twin Falls, treasurer.

Reno Odlin, Tacoma, representing the secretary of the treasury, presented a "minute man" trophy to the Idaho state savings bonds commission for the great response in increase in savings bond sales during February and March.

Leaders featured speakers at Tuesday's session were Everett Reese, vice president of the American Bankers Association, Newark, O., and Odlin, president of the Puget Sound National Bank.

Odlin spoke on bankers' responsibility to back up those in government who are trying to solve the business, consumer and eliminate business depression.

He said, "It is essential that we do everything in our power to foster democratic form of government. We have been hoping and praying for a return to a free and favorable economic climate."

High Production Urged

The speaker urged the policy of the opportunity to prove that responsible tree enterprise can maintain and improve our way of life. Business interests, including bankers, must see that high production and distribution of products are available of all handicaps.

We must be just as resourceful in producing and financing a way to reach the masses with preparation goods and services as in preparation for war.

New Vision

Reese called for a new vision of a high standard of living, creating more jobs by solving road problems; diversifying manpower into fields of research; providing for medical and dental care; and supplying more and better education for more people old as well as young.

Odlin, speaking on what he called "the hard road ahead," predicted readjustment and change with the accompanying troubles but that "it will be better than taking the road of carelessness and fiscal irresponsibility" which he said the country has been on for the past 20 years.

Odlin struck out at the "mountain" in the Korean war and "handouts" to European countries, saying "it is time to get some of them out and let a lot more like friends than they do."

Denounce Fears

He denounced a feeling of apprehension concerning the future that is prevalent among businessmen today.

"The same people who were called cowards in the past are now called heroes because they are getting worried expressions and starting to wonder if we are going to win the war."

Odlin declared that the final analysis lies with the power of the people. "We have indicated the kind of people they want in government. We have to give support and backing and let them know they have it."

Among resolutions passed by the group was one calling on the government to reduce the business of extending credit in conditions that can be well handled by private enterprise.

McKay Claims Power Rights Are Protected

WASHINGTON, June 10—Secretary of the Interior McKay said Tuesday any power contracts made by the federal government in the Pacific Northwest "will continue to protect" the practical rights of the public-utilities.

He took issue, in a letter to Drew Pearson, with statements made by the senator in a column appearing a number of newspapers concerning negotiations now under way between the Bonneville power administration and private utility companies.

Secretary of the Interior McKay said the letter published in Portland, Ore., today and made it to Pearson McKay is in Oregon on a speaking trip.

Denies Claim

McKay denied a Pearson statement that the house appropriations committee knocked out the "1908" legislation by provision, inserted under Teddy Roosevelt, whereby utilities, cooperatives and public organizations are given a call on federal power.

He said the committee made no such provision but that it did "look particular care to assure that these customers would continue to have their preferential treatment."

Pearson wrote that "the model contract McKay sent to Oregon approved by provision, inserted under Teddy Roosevelt, whereby utilities, cooperatives and public organizations are given a call on federal power."

McKay said his office has only been reviewing some forms of contracts sent in by Bonneville power Administrator Paul Raver and added:

"All proposed contracts fully protect the preferential rights of the public customers and you may rest assured that any contract that is finally signed by me will continue to protect that right."

Referring to Pearson's statement that the proposed model contract "not only gives them (the utilities) an option on all power produced by the Bonneville system, but provided that no new contracts shall be let until the utility has exercised its option on the utilities it met," McKay said:

"No contract under consideration contains nor will any contract finally signed give the privately-owned utilities an option on all power produced by the Bonneville system."

House Panel Cuts Benefits Funds for VA

WASHINGTON, June 10—A house appropriations subcommittee today cut \$100 million from the VA budget for veterans pension and compensation checks for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Chairman John Phillip, R., Calif., said the group expects the savings to be achieved in two ways:

1. It thinks veterans won't file as many claims as Truman estimated.

2. It hopes the veterans administration will be a little less operating than it has in the past in approving them.

Truman asked \$2,646,291,000 for pension and compensation checks for the fiscal year. The subcommittee cut the VA budget to \$2,546,291,000. The subcommittee boosted the cut to an even 300 million.

The reduction is tantamount to a \$6,008,000,000 appropriation the subcommittee has recommended for the fiscal year.

The bill carries other cuts and some increases—totaling \$3 million added to Mr. Eisenhower's medical budget to keep all veterans hospitals open, and possible operation of new hospitals for completion during the fiscal year.

Hells Canyon Action Hit by Grange Chief

WENATCHEE, Wash., June 10—"Echoes of Governor Langley's denunciation of the government's proposed Hells Canyon dam had barely died away Tuesday before State Grange Master Harry E. Carstensen strongly criticized Interior Secretary McKay's recent actions in the controversy over the project."

The governor described the proposed dam as a "monument to government stupidity." He said he had asked Senator Henry E. Carstensen to report made by an engineer he assigned to investigate and decide:

"Hells canyon is anything but a good project."

Grange Master Carstensen, although in a position to reply, made no direct reference to the governor or his remarks.

Discussing Hells canyon, Carstensen criticized Secretary McKay's withdrawal of government opposition to the Idaho-Palisades transmission line. Senator Dvorak, R., Ida., quoted Interior department officials as saying that construction of the dam was unnecessary at this time.

"This could, in turn," he continued, "bring about destruction of our Idaho-Palisades transmission line, municipal utility operations; and finally the abolishment of the bureau of public lands, reclamation, mineral, and U. S. forest service."

Power Plans Are Eyed for Basin Group

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10—The Columbia interstate compact commission took up the problem Tuesday whether to get into the power business.

Without reaching a decision at this time, the commission asked a panel of speakers discuss such points as whether to make the group an operating agency, building multi-purpose dams and financing them with bonds.

Speakers Listed

The speakers, Gen. Thomas M. Robins, retired; Dean M. W. Lee of the Washington State college school of business administration; Dr. Vincent Odium, University of Oregon political science department; and William A. Dillmer, Bonneville power administration, said that power cannot be separated from water resources.

Secretary of Interior McKay spoke briefly at the meeting, mostly in his comments of the record. He did refer to the power agency, building multi-purpose dams and financing them with bonds.

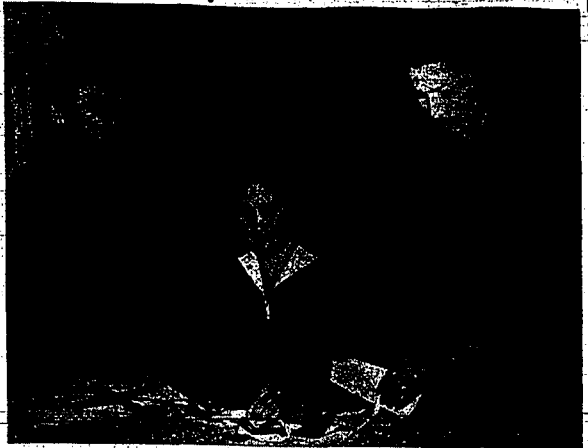

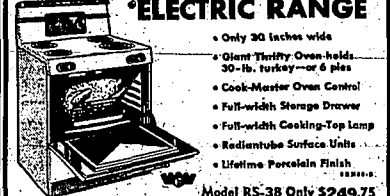

Rise Reported in Retail Food Cost

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Retail food prices rose slightly in the 10 days from May 15 to May 25 largely because of higher prices for fruits and vegetables, the bureau of labor statistics (BLS) reports. An eight-city survey showed a three-fifths of one per cent increase to put the retail food price index at 112.1 per cent of 1947-49 prices. BLS said this was 1.5 per cent higher than food costs in mid-June, 1950, just before the Korean war. In the 10 days, fresh tomato prices increased 10 per cent, potatoes 6.3 per cent, lettuce 4.5 per cent, and apples 2.8 per cent.

Wilson Views Of Red Might Creating Stir

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Military circles were surprised today at Defense Secretary Wilson's professed doubts the United States has enough A-bombs a year from now to deliver an all-out attack.

The statement was seen as further evidence of important differences between the Pentagon's new civilian leadership and military chiefs on the kind and scale of threat that Russian power poses at present.

Gen. Omar N. Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, warned a House appropriations subcommittee a few weeks ago in closed session that there was no change in intelligence estimates of Russia's growing atomic power. Informants said he stuck to earlier estimates that mid-1954 will be the time when Russia achieves the "capability" for atomic attack.

Wilson gave his view to a Senate appropriations subcommittee yesterday when asked, for comment on air chief of staff Gen. Hoyt H. Vandenberg testimony to the same group, "by the middle of 1954 the Soviet Union would be able to launch an all-out atomic attack against the United States."

Questions Claim
Replying that he would "question" the "little bit" Wilson said, "there's no reason to believe they have atomic bombs in quite that volume." Wilson was defending a \$8,000,000 cut in air force appropriations which Vandenberg opposed.

The Wilson testimony followed expressions by Deputy Secretary Roger M. Egan on Russia's war potential which seemed to collide with views of military men.

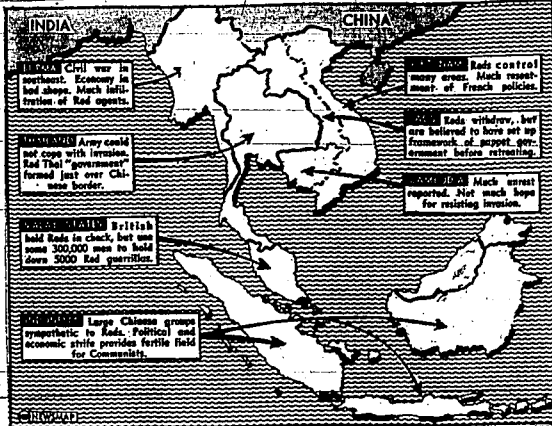

Ike Urges Rhee Not to Repeat Same Crime as North Koreans

President Eisenhower has urged South Korea's President, Syngman Rhee not to commit the same "crime" of aggression which he committed three years ago and led to our entry into the Korean war.

But the aged and single-minded Rhee so far has paid no attention. Persistently and dangerously Rhee has proceeded to whip up European and Korean emotions to continue a war which now not only could not have United Nations support but under the U. N. charter, must have its active opposition.

The president told Rhee "the enemy has proposed an armistice which involved a clear abandonment of the fruits of aggression."

He added that he believed "profoundly" that it should be accepted.

Thus Rhee is told that any new Korean aggression must be on his own head.

The president's message, besides its appeal to reason, was attitudinal in accord with chapter article 1 point 1 of the United Nations charter. It says the purposes of the U. N. are:

"To maintain international peace and security, and to that end, to take effective collective measures for the prevention and removal of threats to the peace and for the suppression of acts of aggression or other breaches of the peace, and to bring about by peaceful means, and in conformity with the principles of justice and international law, ad-

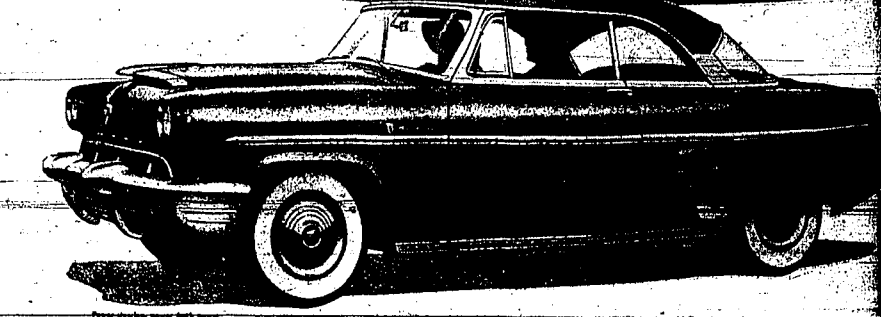

GOP Leader Hits Military Fund Action

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 10.—Republican National Committee Chairman Leonard Wood Hall accused the military today of "beating congress dead, dumb and blind" with threats that defense cuts would jeopardize national security.

The Republican leader, speaking at a \$100 a plate GOP fundraising dinner last night, also called President Eisenhower as the man best qualified to get the most out of the defense dollar.

Hall, said a substantial reduction to be made in the cost of government had come from the military program because it now absorbs 70 cents of every dollar the government spends.

He said that during his 14 years as a member of congress he watched the military persistently warn congressmen that the national security would be in serious danger if the defense budget was cut.

Few Experienced

"Not more than a handful of congressmen are equipped by experience to contest the statements of military experts," he said, "and even they have little or no information to go on."

He said he "thanked God" for Mr. Eisenhower being in the White House, because the President knows more about military programs than those who make congress for more defense money.

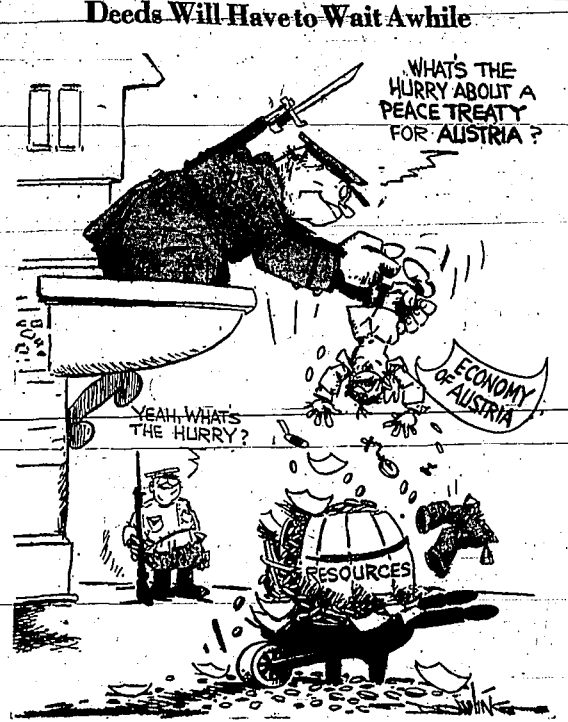

GM Supports Extension for Profits Levies

WASHINGTON, June 10 (AP)—Big General Motors would like to see recorded in favor of the Eisenhower administration's tax program, including extension of the excess profits tax.

GM is entitled to an opinion, too. It is estimated unofficially that the company pays approximately 20 percent of all the excess profits taxes collected by the treasury. At that rate GM paid upward of 20 million dollars in 1952 excess profits taxes.

Opposed Organized View

The position of General Motors is directly opposed to the organized spokesmen of business. The United States Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers urged the house ways and means committee yesterday to refuse extension of the tax for six months from June 30.

The chamber and the association spoke for many but far from all of the approximately 50,000 businesses paying excess profits taxes at a rate of 1.5 to 30 percent.

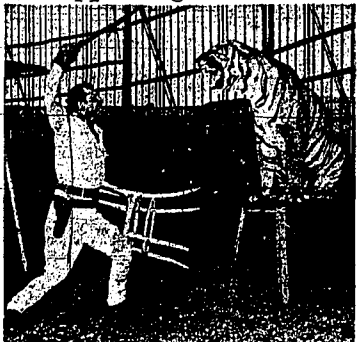
Support for the extension comes largely from Democratic, labor and left-wing sources.

Supported by Leaders

But the Republican congressional leadership is supporting the President's program with the argument that the treasury's unfavorable financial position makes it necessary to retain a tax the administration concedes is a bad one.

President Harry S. Truman announced General Motors' support of the excess profits tax extension last week in a Kansas City press conference which apparently failed to hit the national news wires. Curtice said he would not support indefinite extension of the tax.

MILWAUKEE, June 10 (AP)—Labor Secretary Martin P. Durkin said today proposed cutbacks in labor department appropriations have "cast a shadow on the future."

Durkin said he felt that the administration's request for operating funds for the department during the 1954 fiscal year was a "good one" and noted the "deep reductions" proposed by the house.

However, he added, if the slash goes into effect, "we will certainly do our best to get the most out of it with the least harm to the programs involved."

Durkin's remarks were in an address prepared for the convention of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security.

Durkin was unable to attend the convention and his speech was to be read by George Brown, his executive assistant.

The couple has three children. Property includes farm machinery, household furniture, a 1940 Chevrolet, 2,000 pounds of clover seed and three insurance policies which the wife claims he gave her for \$1,000, \$2,200 and \$2,500.

The wife asks custody of the children, all personal property and court orders to prevent him from disposing of any property or changing beneficiaries in the insurance policies pending outcome of the action.

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Storm-Struck Michigan Region Presents "Blitzed" Appearance

PLANT, Mich., June 10 (AP)—The thickly settled Beecher metropolitan district north of here, struck by one of the most destructive tornadoes in history, looked today as if it had been chewed by a giant lawn mower.

Relief operations in the area swung into high gear as Red Cross volunteers and amateur radio operators took over the task of answering casualty inquiries.

Already some 2,000 persons had asked the Red Cross to notify them if their loved ones in the Flint area were safe.

The death toll in Beecher district remained at 113 dead and 18 missing, and the Red Cross said no significant change in the figures was likely. Another five persons were killed at Erie, Mich., four at Searsville, one at Leeper and one at Pleasant Lake. More than 1,000 were injured.

In the Flint area alone, more than 500 persons jammed hospitals here and in nearby Saginaw and Bay City, at least 60 were in critical condition.

A Detroit reporter, Jerome Hanson, who saw the ruins of Hiroshima and Nagasaki after they were atom-bombed, said the destruction here was as bad as what he saw in the atomic Japanese cities.

Property damage in the "blitzed" area—three and one-half miles long and two blocks wide—was estimated at 15 million dollars and the Red Cross said 258 homes were destroyed and five left standing.

About 30 volunteers and 40 radio operators worked steadily to answer the casualty inquiries. Terry Townsend, Red Cross field representative, told how they made the business of handling out tragic news as humane as possible.

"Mostly it's a question of setting people's minds at ease," he said. "When it turns out that a loved one has been killed or injured or suffered property loss, we send that information to the local Red Cross chapter concerned. It sends a representative in person to break the news as gently as possible."

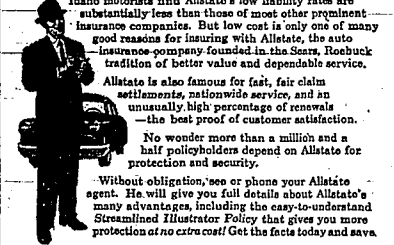

Storm Spawns Twisters Over Large Region

MILTON, Mass., June 10 (AP)—New England's tornadoes were spawned by the same squall line that crossed Michigan and Ohio just 24 hours earlier, Meteorologist Charles F. Brooks of Harvard university's Blue Hills observatory said today.

"The situation which produced the Michigan and Ohio tornadoes reached here during the afternoon," Brooks said.

"In order to get tornadoes here in New England you have to have a very favorable set of conditions—the extremely great difference of temperature at different levels."

"The squall line that crossed Michigan and Ohio yesterday moved across New England yesterday afternoon just as the sun was heating the surface air."

Brooks explained that the squall line, running about 150 miles south of an eastern axis, low pressure area, carried cold upper air and set up the necessary temperature contrast.

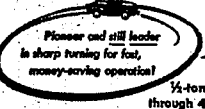

Boyle Achieves Dual Goal on Coronation Journey to Britain

LONDON, June 10.—We have a mystery in our hands. It is the strange case of the laughing Englishman.

When I set out from America for London town, I had two goals: To see fair Queen Elizabeth get her crown, and to try to catch an Englishman laughing. I was real, roaring belly laughing.

So far as I could find in the history books, the last time an Englishman laughed was during the first Elizabethan era, nearly 400 years ago.

There was a doubtful case in the provinces in 1880, during Queen Victoria's reign. But the accused man re-established his social standing by explaining it wasn't a laugh at all. He was merely fiddling in a dry chuckle, perfectly allowable under the British ground rules for humor at that time. A sudden snicker got a frog in his throat and he coughed explosively. His friends let him off with a reprimand to be more careful.

But London was in such a mood of mellow happiness over the coronation, I felt sure the stolid reserve of one of John Bull's sons would crumble, and he would break out laughing. There might not be another chance like this for centuries.

So I told an old British acquaintance of my quest, he said: "Really, old boy, your ruddy American are always looking for the funny. Mind, you're a good fellow, you won't hear a loud laugh in London. But if you do, I wager it will be an Irishman's, or, perhaps even a Welshman."

"But an Englishman? I must say I doubt it. One does have one's traditions, after all. As a matter of fact, if it should happen—and, mind you, I don't believe it will at all—it would happen in a pub. They made the ale for the coronation a bit stronger than usual, and one cannot tell what any man will do if he gets too deep in his cups, can one?"

So I went into the Pink Griffin. Like many British taverns it is divided into two sections, the public bar and the saloon bar. The drink and play darts in the public bar. Only a partition to protect them from the rude noises and jeers of the upper classes in the saloon bar.

As the average British working man earns less than 25 dollars a week, which doesn't give him much cause for laughter, I entered the saloon bar.

Bert, the barman, and his wife, Grace—the calls her "Orzyce"—made me at home at once. As a special gesture toward Anglo-American unity, Bert put a finger-ling-shaped chunk of ice in my glass of milk. Over here a bartender ordinarily doesn't make ice—his in-laws do—and tries to keep it in a tin in their own lifetime so that he can pass it on down to his oldest son, when he takes over the business.

Bert looked shocked when I asked whether any of his patrons ever broke out laughing.

"We're a chuckling folk at most, and I must say how and again a chuckler wanders in," he admitted, and then turned to his wife, "Orzyce, 'ave you 'ard any blokes laughing out loud in 'ere?"

"Well, I 'ope not!" she said indignantly.

There was only one other customer, a tall Englishman in a pin-striped suit at the far end of the bar. He had a straw sticking in a pipe and was staring moodily into his beer mug.

"We're our regular stranger, that one is," volunteered Bert. When I looked mystified, he added: "Doesn't you see regular strangers in America? A regular stranger is a bloke who keeps coming to the same pub, and nobody knows 'oo 'e is."

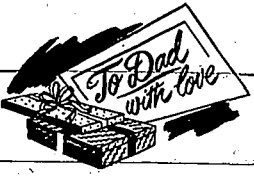



Mt. Everest Finally Conquered After 12 Lives Lost, Vast Sums Are Spent

Fortunes were spent and at least a dozen lives were lost in expeditions since 1921 before the party led by Col. John Hunt succeeded in scaling Mt. Everest.

Why do men risk death just to get to the top of a mountain that has never been climbed before?

The mountain climber's usual answer is that he has to scale the impossible peak just because it's there. It's a challenge; he's in the wilderness; the mystery of speed.

It's sport, adventure, exploration. The exploit of New Zealand's backcountry and a Nepalese mountaineer in Colonel Hunt's party in conquering the tallest known mountain in the world has an impact on international politics, scientific knowledge and the morale of the British Commonwealth as well.

Britannia, who once ruled the seas, now rules the world's highest peaks. This achievement provided a new gem for the crown of the new queen in the midst of the jubilation of coronation.

Queen Elizabeth II, she of Britain's golden age, could boast of a Sir Francis Drake and a Sir Walter Raleigh, who with their expeditions laid the foundations of empire 400 years ago.

Elizabeth II, who has called for adventure in an age of jet planes and atomic energy, has evidence that the spirit is not dead. The queen and two prime ministers, Sir Winston Churchill, Britain, and Sir Roy G. Hoadley, New Zealand, sent their congratulations to the expedition. Churchill called it a "memorable British achievement."

Politically, the exploit may stir up feeling on the other side of the iron curtain. Four Americans who went looking for the remains of Noah's Ark on Mt. Everest, near the Soviet border, in 1949 were accused by the news agency of being spies.

A spy would seem to be wasting his time on Mt. Everest, where all you can see is blizzards and more blizzards.

Nevertheless the traffic in the Himalaya on the remote southern border of red-coated Tibet and Chinese Turkestan has been getting thick this year and the communists may be getting suspicious.

Five expeditions besides the Mt. Everest party mapped expeditions into the trackless border states of Nepal and Kashmir this year.

A United States party of seven, led by Dr. Charles B. Houston, Webster, N. H., has gone to Rawalpindi in Pakistan for an assault on the unexplored mountain of Godwin Austen mountain on the border between Kashmir and Chinese Turkestan.

Godwin Austen, 26,250 feet high and second tallest peak in the world, has defied five previous teams—in 1902, 1909, 1920, 1924, an American Alpine club expedition led by Houston in 1938 and a climb by Fritz Wiessner in 1939 in which four persons perished.

Pakistan's Nanga Parbat, 26,500 feet, in the same general area, has killed 26 climbers since 1895 but is the largest of another German-Austrian team this year. Nanga Parbat (naked mountain), seventh highest in the world, is where the noted climber, A. J. Mummery, appeared in 1865. Willy Margi, Germany, led one expedition in 1932, but his life was lost in a fall.

It was a second attempt in 1934 when he got within 800 feet of the top. Sixteen of the 17 climbers lost their lives in another disastrous attempt by Dr. Karl Wein in 1937. Paul Bauer's 1933 try also failed.

Eight members of the ascendant Alpine club, Zurich, Switzerland, are planning to assault Dhaulagiri, 26,000 feet, in the Himalaya. Nepal, 26,000 feet, which was the tallest mountain climbed by the British when the Frenchman Maurice Herzog reached the summit in 1950.

After a successful 1952 reconnaissance, a German expedition, headed by 62-year-old Y. Eila, hopes to scale Mansalu in central Nepal, 26,000 feet high. Mansalu is 20,000 feet high.

Athol Roberts, a New Zealand manufacturer's representative, is heading a party of four which plans to climb a 24,200-foot mountain without a name just west of Everest. An aviation engineer and several hundred porters and Sherpa mountain-wise tribesmen from Nepal who also specially adapted to carrying heavy burdens in the rarified atmosphere—are involved in these enterprises.

In the ranks are such persons as surgeons, psychologists, photographers, physiologists, biologists, ecologists, and a few others. They are all unlikely adventurers at a furniture maker, a farmer and a New Zealand shepherd, Edward Hillary, who was given a flag of Nepal to plant atop the Union Jack on the top of the world, and was treated as an "equal" on the expedition.

Early accounts said Bhutia was given a flag of Nepal to plant atop the world's highest peak. The fact that a Sherpa, 39-year-old Tenzing Norgay, and Hillary introduced another political element.

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She has moved to stop the recruiting Gurkhas for Britain's forces; they have to be transported through India to Kenya.

Any strengthening of Nepal's bond with Britain as a result of the Mt. Everest conquest might be distasteful to India.

Scientifically the reaching of Mt. Everest's snowy summit would seem to not much. Few physical mysteries were to be unlocked. Man already had looked down upon the great rock mass from airplanes and photographed most of it. The extremes of temperature and the force of the perpetual winds already had been measured.

Much of Asia's violent weather is supposed to be bred there. But one expedition is not a permanent weather observation outpost. Confronted with the hazards of flying freight over the Himalayan "hump" to China during the war, the U. S. air force maintained top-secret weather stations close to that roof of the world.

Colonel Hunt's crew may now be going to climb the world's second highest is Mt. Everest.

Back in 1852, when Mt. Everest was called Chomolungma by Tibetan natives and was known simply as Peak XV to British surveyors, the height was measured at 29,002 feet. But this was done at a distance, by mathematical observation.

Last year, the unsuccessful Swiss expedition which reached the summit of "Everest" had not been ascertained. Scientists theorized that Mt. Everest was still "growing," being pushed "gradually" higher by internal pressures.

The conquest may raise another question that has not been answered. Is there a higher mountain somewhere? Red China of Russia may claim there is in the Himalayas near the northeast of Tibet and northwest of Chungking, China.

Back in the days when U. S. planes were flying the "hump," one pilot far off course reported his radar blips showed a mountain lowering 3000 feet in that area. His report caused considerable speculation but was never confirmed.

At any rate there are still rugged parts of Asia that have not been surveyed by land or air. The Pakistan mountaineering club reckons there are 84 mountains in the world never climbed by man.

He was in jail and he became a Christian.

He was released in 1904 and went to the United States to study at George Washington University, Harvard and Princeton, where he received a doctor of philosophy degree in theology.

That same year, 1910, Japan took over Korea and Rhee returned to fight against foreign influence. He finally had to flee and went to Hawaii.

In 1919, a group of anti-Japanese Koreans met in Seoul and named Rhee president of what they called the Korean provisional government. During the years that followed, Rhee wandered countries around the world to recognize him as a chief of state. Although the United States refused, he lived most of the time in Washington.

He even carried his plea to the League of Nations in Geneva and it was there he met and married Francesca Donner, an Austrian who contributed much to his career. She is with him in Seoul today.

Rhee and his wife returned to Korea soon after the end of World War II.

The Japanese were gone, but this country was divided at the 38th parallel.

In 1948, South Korea held its first elections and selected a legislative assembly. The assembly named Rhee president.

His ambition had been only partly achieved. Soviet-controlled communists held the northern half of the nation and efforts to unite the country by conferences were fruitless.

Rhee was very grateful when the United States rushed troops to Korea to meet the communist attack. However, he always has insisted that the communists would not have attacked if South Korea had been given sufficient arms and ammunition to defend itself.

Many Koreans believe the United States "invited" the communist attack by repeated statements from high officials to the effect that Korea was outside the U. S. far east military defense line and was "indefensible."

Rightly or wrongly, Rhee and many other Koreans feel the United Nations promised—after the war began—to unify Korea.

Rhee knows the prowar "unification" talks were fruitless and he fears any subsequent political efforts will be just as unsuccessful.
