Chinese Rip Into Main Allied Lines As Big Guns Roar

SEOUL, Sunday, June 14 (AP)—Communist guns unleashed their greatest barrage of the Korean front Friday Saturday, supporting heavy attacks by thousands of Chinese infantrymen that reportedly swept South Korean troops of Capital Hill, and ripped four holes in the main allied line.

In the air communist planes raided Seoul for the second time in a week but dropped no bombs. U. S. Sabrejets destroyed two MIGs over northwest Korea.

Semi-official U. S. eighth army totals showed that during a 12-hour period ending at 6 a. m. Saturday the communist fired 118,000 artillery and mortar shells.

In one of the last great actions before an armistice the Chinese hammered heavily and without regard for casualties from White Horse mountain, northwest of Chongwon, at Outpost Harry and the U. S. third division defenders for the third day, and at Sulzer ridge and Capitol Hill.

Roads Attack
Fifteen red tanks, launched Friday night, roared on into Saturday at six points, the eighth army said. At least 300 rounds of rocket, mortar and rifle fire fell on the South Korean eighth division defending Capital Hill, eight miles southeast of Seoul.

Frontline reports said the hill mass, some of repeatedly unpenetrated red attacks this time, all into Chinese hands before dawn.

It was in the Capitol Hill sector that the strong red assaults backed by tanks smashed four holes in the main allied line. Though South Korean defenders were pushed back an undisclosed distance.

On Chinese division attacking the U. S. position at Outpost Harry for the third straight day was sent, reeling back with staggering losses of 3,000 men killed and wounded since Thursday.

Hundreds more reds have fallen in battle since the South Korean repulsed a vicious attack on White Horse mountain.

Census Notes 305,000 U. S. Project Units

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The census bureau said Friday that the 1950 census disclosed 305,000 project units on 25,800,000 acres of land under artificial water supply. The bureau said an analysis of information on irrigation in the United States gathered in the 1950 census showed that: The nation has 158,987 miles of irrigation canals and ditches, 10,634 flowing wells and 150,000 pumped wells for irrigation and 155,559 irrigation pumps. The nation's irrigation system includes 5,121 diversion dams and 7,717 irrigation reservoirs with a combined storage capacity of 22,400,000 acre-feet. Irrigated farm land comprised 23 per cent of all U. S. farm land. More than 96 out of every 100 acres of irrigated land are in the 19 states lying west of Mississippi (excluding Iowa, Minnesota and Missouri). California has the most irrigated land of any state—6,000,000 acres or 25 per cent of the U. S. total. Texas was second, with 3,100,000 acres and Colorado was third with 2,000,000 acres. There was some irrigated land reported in every state. The average cost of irrigation water was \$4.48 per irrigated acre and ranged from 87 cents per irrigated acre in Nevada to \$14.78 per irrigated acre in Arizona.

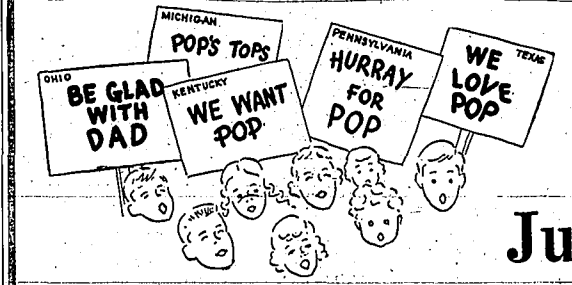

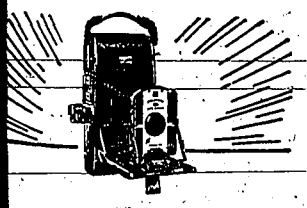

He also criticized the Interior department's withdrawal of its objections to the Oxbow project, saying, "Thousands of Idahoans who wanted to see the Snake river flood control benefits fully developed betrayed when the Interior department's role as protector of the people's heritage was terminated. No longer can this region depend on that department to act as a guardian of its resources."

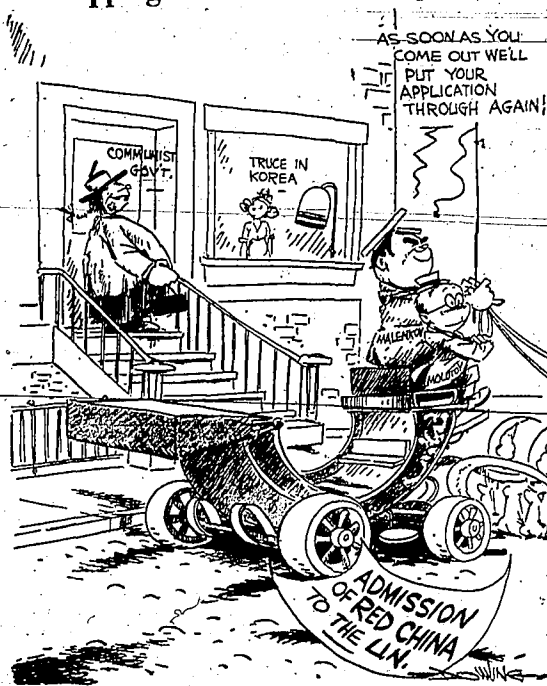
Masters said there was no reason for "hurrying the Oxbow decision since many other less costly dam sites are available to the power company between American Falls dam and Weiser."

Big Dam Urged
He said the only way the north-west can get cheaper electricity is through big projects such as Hells canyon dam.

Idaho Power President T. E. Roach said today that the Oxbow project would not interfere with upstream irrigation rights, as charged by Paul Boek, state president of the Idaho Development association.

Roach wrote Boek that the water permit granted by the state of Idaho for Oxbow, C. J. Strike and Billie dams contained provisions that the projects "shall be operated in such manner as will not conflict with future depletion in flow of the waters of Snake river and its tributaries, or prevent or interfere with future upstream diversion and use of such waters for the irrigation of lands and other beneficial consumptive uses in the Snake river watershed."

present day prices, to build a lot of cars merely to provide shipping service to the trucks.

Flanagan said he did not foresee any serious car shortage coming and added that his company is building 4,400 standard cars with all circulating fans.

Unit Packs Urged
Potato shippers were urged to market more of their products in consumer unit containers, 5, 10 and 20-pound bags.

Leonard J. Doyle, vice president in charge of bag sales, Union Bag & Paper corporation, New York, said Idaho produces about as many potatoes as the next largest state but that only 10 per cent of them reach the consumer in identified unit bags as compared with 50 per cent for the other states. He suggested that potatoes in unit bags be graded.

A housewife must be a magician to take a 15-ounce and an 18-ounce potato and bring them both out as perfect potatoes, he said.

Doyle declared that population gains in Idaho potatoes should be consolidated in face of what might be stiff competition. He warned that new growing areas brought in by shortages over the past 12 years will take some of the existing markets.

"Your position should be consolidated primarily through further consumer education, grading in the package for particular markets and placing that graded package in unit sizes clearly identified in the market place," Doyle said.

Contract Explained
Sam J. Austin, director of public relations, Chicago Mercantile exchange, explained Friday the new contract for trading in potatoes for future delivery. The "bar delivery" contract, he said, calls for Russet Burbank No. 1, size A; washed and with 20 per cent of them 10 ounces or more in weight; and packed in new 100-pound burlap bags branded either Idaho, Idaho-Oregon, or Oregon or Washington.

Among specific substitutions set up to provide leeway in delivery the principal one permits the number of U. S. No. 1, size A washed potatoes to be reduced from 20 to 16 per cent, 10 ounces or more with an allowance of five per cent of the delivery price by the seller to the buyer.

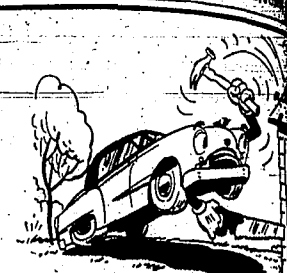

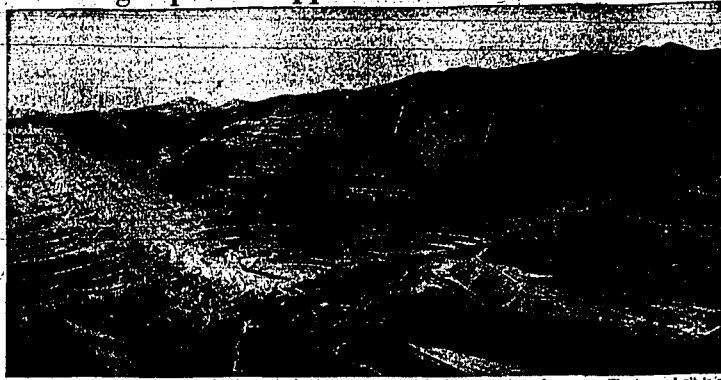
Williams, serving a life term for the first degree murder of Twin Falls Postman Craig Brown in 1929, was denied clemency by the pardon board a year ago.

Few Places in Nation Rival Gigantic Open-Copper Mine in Canyon of Utah

SALT LAKE CITY, June 13 (AP)—Few spots in the nation and none in the west can match the romance and fascination of Bingham Canyon, Utah, hidden deep in the Oquirrh mountains and just 27 miles from Salt Lake City.

Bingham is a mining town, three miles long and one street wide, with both residential and business houses crowding flush with its twisting Main street.

Its polyglot population of some 8,000 persons streaming from a dozen or more European countries in addition to Mexicans and Navaho-Indians boats one-of-the-most harmonious communities in the west with two intense loyalties—to the town and to "the company."

"The company" is the Utah copper division of the Kennecott Copper corporation, operator of the greatest open pit mine in America. It provides around 30 per cent of the world's primary production.

More than 100,000 visitors a year see this unique community, drive through the 1,000-foot vertical tunnel and watch the gigantic pit operation. It covers 933 acres of a great amphitheater carved in the mountain by the removal of nearly 1 1/2 billion tons of ore and waste since mining started in 1903.

The sides of the pit are cut in huge steps or benches, with the 10 sub-levels averaging 50 feet and the upper levels 70 feet in height.

Minimum width is about 60 feet. There are 22 levels on the west side and 13 on the east side in addition to the 10 sub-levels, the bottom one of which is at elevation 5,840 feet and the top one 1,260 feet higher.

Each level has standard railroad tracks and on many of these simultaneous operations are in progress. Huge power shovels scoop five cubic yards at each bite into strings of cars, and electric locomotives haul them to the assembly yards at the mouth of the canyon for movement to the Magna and Arthur concentrating mills of the company.

Each shovel can load 8,000 tons per eight-hour shift. Last year they moved 87,000 tons of ore and 129,000 tons of waste material daily. The two mills have a rated capacity of 40,000 tons of ore daily, and the electrolytic refinery, in operation since 1900, 16,000 tons of refined copper per month.

Total copper production through 1937 is reported at 1,621,765,000 pounds. A sizable production is from ore currently containing only eight pounds of copper to the ton. Gold, silver and molybdenum are by-products of the operation.

The pioneer settlers of Bingham canyon was nothing more than a source of timber and a place to graze stock. It was named for Thomas and Sanford Bingham who brought their herd of cattle and horses to the mouth of the canyon in 1856, just a year after the pioneers under Brigham Young entered the Great Salt Lake valley.

It wasn't the pioneers, but soldiers of the third California infantry stationed at Ft. Douglas who made the first mineral discovery. Their commanding officer, Gen. Patrick E. Connor, known as the "father of Utah mining," encouraged his men

to prospect the area. Thus in 1863 the first mining district to be organized in the territory of Utah was the west mountain mining district in which Bingham and the mines were abandoned. The first ore was shipped in 1868.

A young mining engineer, D. C. Jackson, first saw the possibilities of "mass mining" the district in 1881. He immediately ridiculed by the entire mining industry of the day, some branding it a "wildcat" scheme. Young Jackson persisted, finally gained financial backing from three prominent Colorado mining men and in 1903 the Utah Copper company was organized.

Underground mining started in 1904 and within the same year at the pilot plant known as Copperton mill. The first steam shovel bit into the mountain in 1906 and open-pit operations were under way. And from then on the Bingham pit and its milling and refining operations have been America's greatest copper mining industry, with present employees totaling 8,541.

The town of Bingham Canyon has changed little in the interim, for it can't expand uphill. Like most western mining camps it lives in the shadow of disaster. Here the danger is from slides. The worst occurred Feb. 17, 1920, when thousands of tons of snow slid down the precipitous mountain and buried a section of the town, killing 30-some inhabitants.

Staley was born in England and came to the United States in 1880. He was a member of the LDS church and was a prominent business man in the Twin Falls community. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Staley, and several children.

Man's Best Friend Caddies For Boyer Linkster

Paul S. Boyer, Jerome, has the ideal caddy. His club-loving helper never speaks. He is strong-moment, never-second guesses the player on their choice of a club or the way they make a shot.

The caddy never gripes about pulling the clubs over the hill and rough, and he takes 18 or 36 holes in stride more easily than the average caddy covers nine.

And what's his fee? Exactly nothing.

Boyer's caddy is his dog—a robust, 100-pound, 3-year-old, flat-thighed pointer named Jupiter.

Jupiter—or Jupe as his master calls him—doesn't actually carry a club, but instead pulls a club, built specially for him. Strangely enough, Jupe got his name as a caddy because his master never bought a cart to pull himself.

An old golfing friend, Lynn Hemphill, kidded Boyer about carrying his clubs on his back. Boyer answered, "Well, if I had a cart, I'd hitch Jupe to it."

He looks himself seriously. He got Frank Price to bring to him a cart for the dog from an old typewriter frame, and Bert Shuman, Jerome, to make a harness for the dog and cart.

Jupiter tried the dog a couple of trips around the backyard, and the dog took him onto the golf course. Boyer chuckled, "Since that day I've never carried more than two clubs at a time."

The dog has taken to the work without special training. Jupe has taken it upon himself to wait for his master on the edge of each green while he puts and when Boyer sinks a putt the dog, by habit, begins to walk toward him.

Jupiter comes from working stock. His mother was an old English shepherd, and he was sired by a purebred Newfoundland, a breed noted for its work in saving drowning victims and popularly used in Belgium to pull milk carts.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

In the town of HEYBURN lives Linda Lenore Cole, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Cole. She was graduated from high school on May 28 and although not the highest scholastically in the class of 29, no senior faces life with a more resolute courage than she.

Linda's life has been one of trial. She was born Dec. 28, 1918, and has been unable to walk since the age of 2. She practically has grown up in a wheelchair.

In 1934 Linda was graduated from the eighth grade and did her studying at home with the help of her mother as teacher. At the age of 9 or 10 she would memorize her older sister's assignments. Learning the names of the bones and muscles of the human body was no effort for her. She liked science and had her time to wonder about the world around her and the people in it. She studied piano and learned to play like a professional. Her memories of the piano, determined to know and understand.

Having no one with whom to compare her progress, she often made a game of her studies with her mother. She also became a neat housekeeper and an excellent cook. Linda also has taken time to play. She has discovered laughter and uses it freely.

She always has loved pets. When quite small she coddled and cared for her doll with as much love and tenderness as a mother could her child. She is kind and considerate to animals and now has a dog whom she calls "Dixie." Dixie returns the affection and considers her his special responsibility. He looks out for her welfare, guarding her wheelchair whenever she goes in a car and leaves it at home.

During the past few years when firecrackers were legal in the state, Linda enjoyed the displays, knowing Dixie would not allow a lighted match or firecracker to be near her. He felt it his duty to kill a firecracker before it could explode.

All of her high school studies except those this senior year were carried on at home.

Attendance at school meant that someone of the family had the responsibility of taking her to school and bringing her back each day. But during the year, she has had the privilege of meeting and asso-

ciating with her classmates—the same classmates with whom she began her studies in the first grade. Linda has taken time for music, studying each day at home at her piano. During the past year she was student director of her senior class play and served as staff artist for the school paper.

From her senior curriculum, Linda took typing, government, home economics, psychology, speech and journalism. She coordinated her work in home economics by joining the Heyburn chapter of the Future Homemakers of America.

Anxious to make some expense money she is teaching music to a small class of beginners.

Three years of patient work have rewarded a group of children at the First Baptist church in SHOSHONE. The fund for the fund which was begun three years ago in the children's Sunday school classes, has been purchased and was put to use at the church for the first time last Sunday evening. It will be used in the church basement for the nursery, primary and kindergarten Sunday school classes and for other activities held there by the church members.

The piano purchase plan was originated three years ago by Mrs. Leonard V. Bond and Mrs. Loren Watson, when they were working with the basement department, since that time succeeding teachers and officers have followed through with the idea until actual cost of the piano was three-fourths paid by the children's weekly donations. The bank in which the donations were placed contained mostly pennies, nickels and dimes. Approximately 60 children have participated in the project over the three-year period.

The church board of trustees, headed by Carl Baylis, and the music committee was authorized to go ahead with the purchase at the annual church business meeting last month. Mrs. Howard Anderson, Anna McKittrick and Mrs. Luella Kinsey are members of the music committee. Mrs. T. V. Strunk

Many thrilling tales of adventure and hardship have been told by the pioneers who traveled the Oregon trail to the northwest but probably the most thrilling tale took place along the Snake river valley in Idaho long before the pioneers began their westward trek.

Great changes have been made in the land but traces left by the inhabitants of the area give a glimpse into their life history. Just west of HAAGERMAN, across Snake river in Twin Falls county, lies the remains of a fossil bone. Miner Cook Egerman, an amateur collector, contributed much to the discovering of the remains of pre-historic animals that once roamed the area. In 1928 Dr. H. T. Stearns of the United States geological service was engaged in a study of the geology and ground water of this region. Cook was familiar with the area, having spent many long hours in the desert as a cattlemen and he called Dr. Stearns' attention to the bones on the west slope of a ridge. The ridge projected southward about 55 to 60 feet above the desert surface and 400 feet above the level of the river.

Dr. Stearns sent a small collection of bones to the National Museum. As a result an expedition was organized in June 1929, by the Smithsonian Institution with Dr. J. W. Gidley, assistant curator of mammalian fossils, United States National museum as leader.

Gidley returned to the same locality again in 1930 and in 1931 further development and additional material was obtained with N. H. Doas in charge.

In 1934, G. Lewis Gaxin, assistant curator, division of vertebrate paleontology, U. S. National museum, continued work to make another collection of prehistoric horse bones. Stearns, a geologist, standpoint one of the most important conclusions was that most of the heavy gravel and sand deposits in the valley were accumulated during the last geologic epoch known as the "Ice Age." The pioneers along the Old Oregon trail saw much big game but it was nothing compared to the game 60,000 years earlier. The bones were larger. Each horn was more than

six inches in diameter at the base and spread were more than seven feet.

When there were great mammoths, mammoths and muskoxen, ground sloths, camels, great bears and horses of two distinct species. The larger was about the size of a cow pony. Among the smaller animals were found wolves, coyotes, beavers, pocket gophers and rabbits. Many bird specimens also have been found in the area.

The bones have been found mainly in beds of sand and gravel known as the Haagerman lake beds. Bones from a span and a pelican have been found, as have bones of fish, frog, swamp turtles, beavers and many other wild living animals. Because of evidence of vegetation, scientists believe the area once was a drinking place for wild animals. The way the bones are scattered suggests slow accumulation over many years.

Some of the bones have been discovered in rock formations. Mrs. Cook shares her husband's enthusiasm for collecting pioneer and prehistoric articles. The den of their home is filled with many interesting and valuable items. Her part in the recovery of the "bone pile," she says, was to look for the man in the expedition while her husband worked with them.

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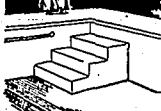

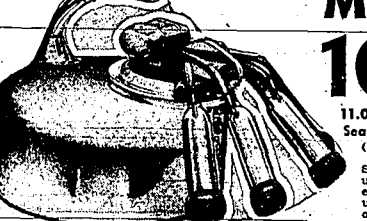

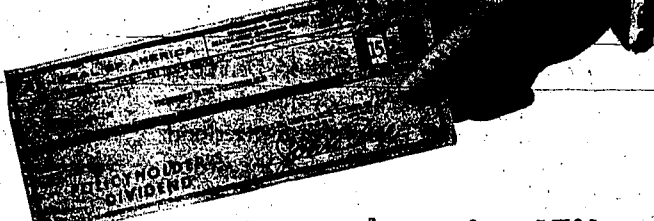
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YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

...the Egyptian army was behind him and the waters of the Red Sea were ahead of him, but faith in God overcame the peculiar situation. All along the road in the wilderness he discovered peculiar situations. When Joshua entered the land of Canaan he found the land full of peculiar conditions, but he had faith in the power of God to overcome all these unusual conditions.

From the time he met Jesus on the Damascus road until the hour of his death the pathway of the Apostle Paul was beset with peculiar conditions. He found them at Philippi when he landed in jail at Jerusalem when he was taken to the castle for refuge from the mob; at Rome as a prisoner. No man ever found as many peculiar conditions as did Paul, but he seemed to accept them all as a challenge to his faith. The 11th chapter of second Corinthians names many of the peculiar conditions which Paul found in his ministry.

Adoniram Judson, found peculiar conditions in Burma, especially when he languished in a cruel Bur-

spot, but none of you saw the big sheet of white paper. That's my speech."

What do we see? Of course there is a "black spot." But do we see the big sheet of white paper, which represents our opportunities, our advantages, our blessings, and the challenge of today and tomorrow? 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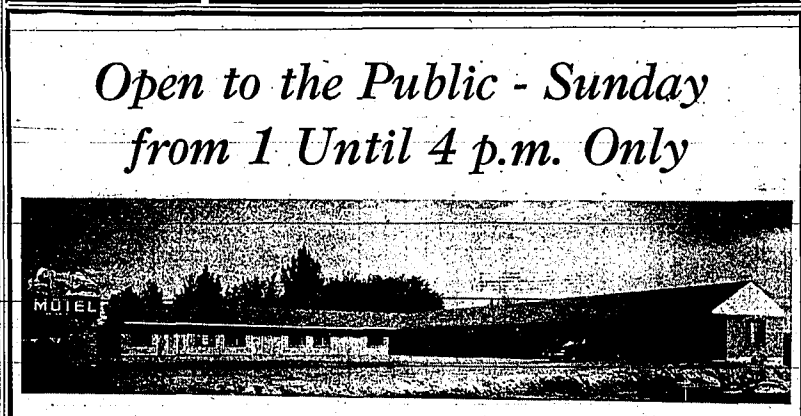

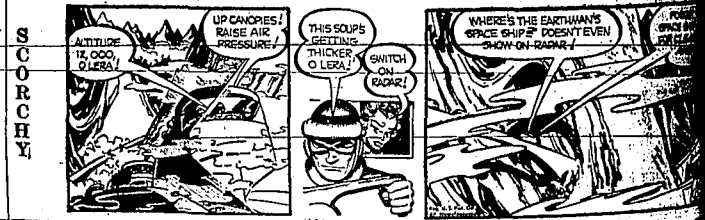
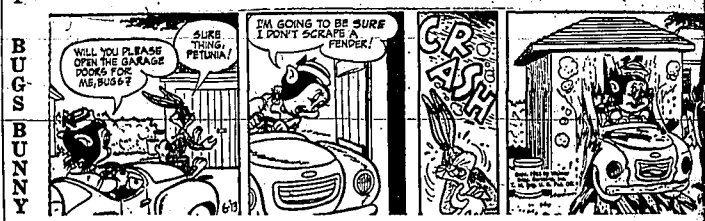

'Retired' Banker Directs Ike's Office; Economist, Cold War Expert Give Aid

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—Nothing in Roger Stefan's smile tells you that, but for one thing, he is not a banker. He is a Cold War expert. That thing was President Eisenhower's election. Stefan, 50, is going into retirement, he became business manager of the White House offices, and one of the top aides. "I'll last year he was vice president of one of the largest banks in the country, New York's National City bank. For 17 years he has been preparing the perfect retirement spot, his exotic ranch. He planned to quit last year. Then he was tapped for the White House staff. "He has I am, over 60, with a new job," he says, his eyes twinkling. "I'm not sure it's a promotion. Pruett Happy At Discovery Of Stargazer

When perusing a book by one who lays no claim to being astronomically proficient it is indeed refreshing to find his statements regarding the stars correct.

I have been reading "The Desert Year" by Knutson and find him very accurate. From New England he had transferred his residence temporarily to the dry southwestern states, or a latitude of 10 degrees farther south.

With more latitude he discovered celestial facts where few people seem to realize. Here I enlarge on some of his observations. Sunlight never had been so intensely bright in the northern states. This was due to the clearer air in the south and the fact that old Sol actually was 10 degrees higher there at noon and shone through less air.

Not Overhead
The sun never was directly overhead for it never reaches that position during the year except for places between the tropics of Cancer and Capricorn, 23 1/2 degrees north and south of the equator. This band extends from about the latitude of Mexico City to Rio de Janeiro.

The longest day of the year, June 22, is not quite so long in Arizona as it is in Connecticut, 12 degrees in length from northern Alaska, where the sun is above the horizon 24 hours, to the equator with 12 hours of sunlight in the southern hemisphere they have their shortest days of the year when we have our longest. It's winter there when summer here.

7-Week Cycle
Knutson discovered also that it is about two weeks from the time the thin silver of a new moon appeared in the west shortly after sunset until the full phase glowed in the east at this same hour. A little watching showed that each night Luna came to the same place an hour later than the previous night and showed slightly more lighted surface.

This thin crescent offered little competition to the other heavenly bodies. But as it grew more plump from one night to the next, the milky way—never so gorgeous in the northern latitudes—was the first to succumb to Luna's increasing light. Next, the dimmer stars faded out, and by the time of full moon only

After a full phase it was only a few days until no moon could be found anywhere in the sky until bottoms. Some seem to think a moon is always in the night sky.

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
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
