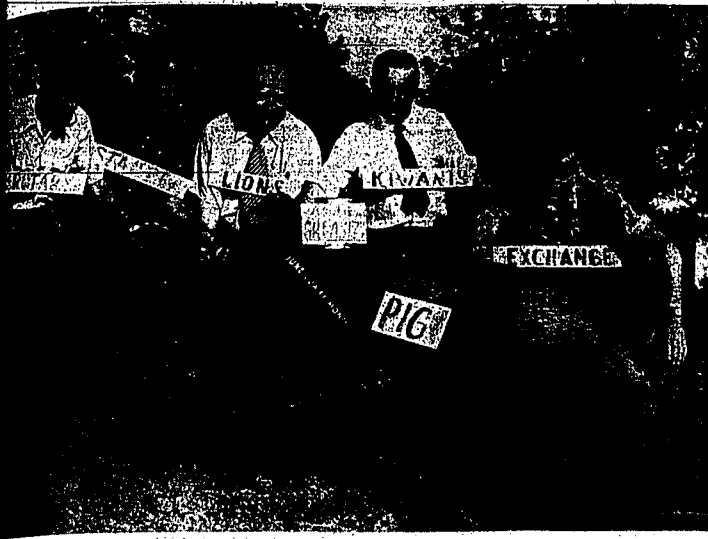

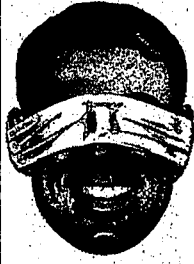

Wheat Harvest Start Reveals Tremendous Crop for Texans

DALLAS, June 18 (AP)—Combine operator J. D. Russell says he is harvesting so much wheat for farmers they don't know what to do with all their cash. "I had to keep one of them from stopping cars on the highway and trying to loan the drivers money," Russell said with a twinkling smile. "The 43-year-old Dallas county farmer is cutting his neighbors wheat before pushing north with the harvest. He says the wheat is the best he has ever seen. Some of it is yielding 50 bushels to the acre compared to a normal 10 or 20 bushels. There is so much work to do getting in the tremendous crop that some harvesting crews are spending extra days here along the southern edge of the great continental wheat belt. Others are working now in Oklahoma and in the drought-damaged fields of the Texas panhandle, one of the few sections of the nation where the crop is poor this year. All summer, combine crews like Russell's will toil in the golden fields from Texas through Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas. September frost will catch them on the Canadian prairie at the end of their 1,500-mile trek. They will harvest an estimated 1,132,000,000 bushels in the U.S. There is a crop-over of some 870 million bushels from last season. The total would give the U.S. an

Bill to Protect Trout Farm Industry Showing Gains as Idaho Solons Press

WASHINGTON, June 18 — The Rocky mountain trout farm industry is showing gains as Idaho solons press a bill to protect the industry.

The threefold purpose of the bill is:

1. To protect the public and consumer from deceptive and unfair competition.
2. To protect the domestic trout producers from unfair competition.
3. To benefit indirectly the hundreds of thousands of fishermen who whip the mountain streams and do it in pursuit of the slim and wary rainbow.

Dworshak says correspondence from domestic producers indicates that Danish and Japanese fish sell at about one-third the price of U. S. trout, but are inferior in quality. The trout producer wrote the Danish fish firm and succeeded because they are fed "fishheads and fish tails."

Many of the Danish fish, which are shipped frozen, are seized out of the ocean and rivers on the Isle of Jutland and fed in ponds. They are sold to U. S. wholesalers at 40 cents a pound, about half the cost of production for domestic trout.

Government figures show that imports of Danish fish increased from 104,000 pounds in 1947 to about 1 1/2 million pounds last year. The total jumped sharply in 1948 when the import duty was cut from one cent a pound to one-half cent.

No totals are available of Japanese fish, but they are believed to be large.

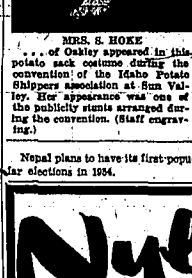

Douglas Follows Usual Role in His Action in Rosenberg Case

WASHINGTON, June 18 (AP)—It was natural for William O. Douglas to spend hours brooding over the complex issues in the Rosenberg case. The 64-year-old supreme court justice has a reputation for championing the rights of defendant criminals. Time and again, he has gone out of his way to see that they get every benefit of law and constitution. Douglas, a scholar with the weathered face of a farmer, belongs to the so-called liberal wing of the court. In 14 years of decisions, he has shown special concern for the protection of civil liberties supported by government regulation and backed labor. The former new dealer was appointed by the late President Roosevelt. He was boomed at various times as a Democratic candidate for President or vice president but nothing materialized. Douglas was the son of a Scottish Presbyterian minister but he tells stories that would make a traveling salesman blush. He was raised in the west and still wears five-gallon hats and favors his speech with the jargon of loggers. From a post at Yale law school, Douglas moved to the security and exchange commission in 1935, becoming chairman a year later. His elevation to the high bench followed in 1938. He created quite a stir in 1948 and 1949 by declaring in a series of speeches that the United States should offer "liberal humanitarian" programs to foreign nations to win the international duel with communism. Douglas is no stranger to controversy. He probably expected some more for his action in the Rosenberg case.

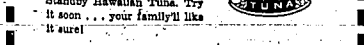

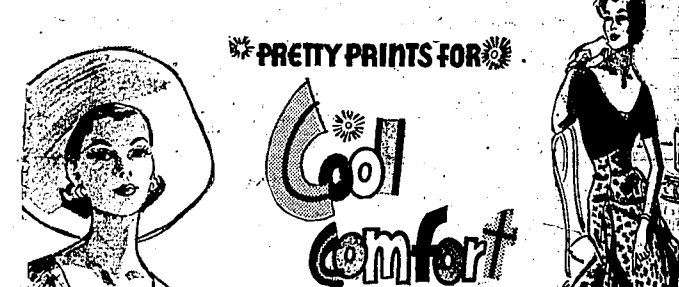

Freezes Hurt Bi-State Fruit Crops for '53

SALT LAKE CITY, June 18 (AP)—As a result of freezing weather during the April and May months, Idaho fruit production will fall from 28 to 88 per cent below last year's production.

Apples were "hit hardest," with the Utah crop expected to be only about 14 per cent of last year's. The Idaho pear crop shows the best prospects in the major fruits, with a drop this year of only 20 per cent.

USDA Report This information was released today by Allison R. Larsen, head of the local bureau of agricultural economics, U. S. department of agriculture.

Based on the statement was the estimated crop production in the U.S.A. by farmers in the area. All major fruit crops in the Idaho area have fallen, but estimates from around the nation indicate the national agricultural production will be close to last year's.

Few Cherries The estimated production for this year in Utah is only 700 tons as compared with 5,000 tons last year. Only 1,400 tons of cherries are expected to be produced this season. About 5,200 tons came off the trees last year.

Apple Crop The Idaho peach crop should be near 150,000 bushels, which is 200,000 bushels less than last year. Fifty-two thousand bushels of peaches will be produced this summer, against the 72,000 last year.

Bright Colors in Classrooms Aids Students, Survey Shows

BALTIMORE, June 18 (AP)—Schools painted in bright colors produce better marks and, surprisingly, more so among young boys than girls, Johns Hopkins university psychologists report.

They found that planned color painting has a definite effect on the behavior and performance of school children.

The greatest improvement was among kindergarten children. "Perhaps the most surprising revelation was that boys show greater color response than girls," the psychologists stated after two years of research.

"We have been convinced for some time that color and its dimensions influence human behavior," said Dr. Wendell R. Garner who directed the project.

Nevertheless, we are pleasantly surprised to see such amazingly clear results come from this research. These positive results will, we feel sure, be of real interest to educators and all those others concerned with the color design of school facilities.
