USDA Starts Wheat Price Support Aid

WASHINGTON, June 20—The agriculture department today announced an emergency wheat support program to protect farmers in five plains states and bolster a sagging wheat market.

Officials said 90-day "distress" price support loans would be made on wheat stored in the open market and temporary structures in parts of Kansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska and Texas.

Prices Depreciated

Loans will be granted at 80 per cent of the going support price to farmers. While harvesting now in progress, some growers faced a choice of piling their grain on the ground or sending it to market, depressed by huge surpluses and critical shortages of storage in some areas.

Undersecretary of Agriculture True D. Morse said the wheat market rallied when department officials announced June 17 they intended to offer the emergency program.

Morse said he "would anticipate" yesterday's announcement of the "open air" support rate and other details would bring more strength to the market.

"That's one of our reasons for the decision. We want to make sure the support program really effective," he said.

Up to PMA

Operation of the loan program will be left largely to state and county production and marketing administration committees. They will decide which areas are eligible and storage conditions—in the open or under temporary cover.

Farmers will be responsible for any loss in quality or quantity in the grain during the 90-day emergency loan period.

At the end of this time, growers who can move their grain into approved storage can get regular support loans based on the value of the grain after the emergency loan expires.

Farmers who cannot find approved storage can let the agriculture department take the grain for storage in the market value of the wheat at that time is less than the amount of the loan, the farmer will pay the interest.

The emergency loans will be available promptly, the agriculture department said through local lending agencies or county PMA committees.

Clark Blasts Rhee Regime For Releases

TOKYO, Sunday, June 21—Clark today called the release of nearly 7,000 anti-communist North Korean captives "completely unauthorized" and said "the entire responsibility rests squarely upon President Rhee and the government of South Korea."

Rhee's action may have wrecked an armistice in the three-year Korean war, just as the end seemed at hand.

Demier Comnissaire Clark, U.S. east commander, denied in a statement that the allied command had "connived" with Rhee to make the breakthrough which started last Thursday.

Communist high commanders in Korea yesterday accused the U. N. command of conniving with Rhee and brought the tense negotiations to a halt when a pact was almost ready for signing.

South Korean guards aided the prisoners in mass escapes starting Thursday. The U. N. command issued orders aimed at stemming the tide of the escape.

Clark said the action "has been a deep and personal disappointment to me. The release of these prisoners has given rise to wholly unfounded suspicions of collusion on the part of the U. N. command, the government and the United Nations command to circumvent or abrogate the armistice of war agreement at Panmunjom."

Under the pact, the 47,000 Korean and Chinese prisoners refusing to go home would be held in a neutral zone to a five-nation repatriation commission. If they persisted in their refusal during the period of custody, and while their case was discussed by a political conference, they would have been freed in South Korea.

Chinese Reds Hit at ROKs; Ignore Allies

SEOUL, Sunday, June 21—Chinese red forces renewed their probing thrusts today against South Koreans in the Pukhan sector, but they met stiff resistance from fresh divisions of 16,000 men thrown into the Pukhan sector, the Chinese gave every sign of retreating during the night.

Rain fell across the battlefield, which took last week's streamerroll attack which had been a two-mile-long battle line.

The reds pushed and maneuvered southeast of Finger ridge, searching for weak spots. One Chinese commander was killed on a hill east of Finger ridge. South Koreans counterattacked.

Most allied planes were grounded last night.

Sixteen B-29 Superforts bombed the Uiju and Sinuiju airfields in northern Korea, only a few hundred yards from the Yalu river boundary to Manchuria.

Eighth army headquarters said it had no explanation for the two-week attack which has been continuing since the war began. Commanded by U. S. divisions which contrasted to the furious fighting early last week on the eastern front.

The reds abruptly broke off last Thursday attacks which have continued on a two-mile bulge in the allied main line. This sudden quiet coincided with reports of imminent armistice agreement at Panmunjom that the two were taken to be related.

Final Report Given on U. S. War II Losses

WASHINGTON, June 20—The army, after a three-year check of the records of each man, has issued a new and final account of its World War II battle casualties—a total of 932,590 army and air force personnel.

Deaths totaled 234,874.

Altogether, about 10,400,000 served in the army and air force, and the total number of battle deaths for the three services.

The navy has reported 100,592 casualties, including 42,000 battle deaths, and the marines 89,718 casualties, of whom 17,733 died.

This makes a total of 1,123,500 casualties and 282,727 deaths for the three services.

The new army figure was about 12,000 less than the casualties estimated in 1946, but the number of deaths was a little over 6,000 more than the original count.

The revisions are the result of an entirely new method instituted by the adjutant general's office in which a name-by-name audit of the records of each casualty was conducted and new totals compiled through the use of machine record counts. All previous compilations were directed.

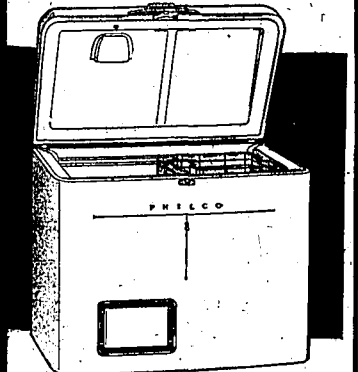

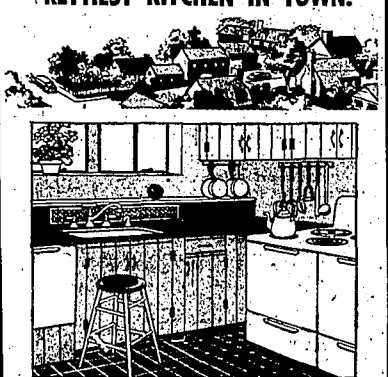

Questions Get Study by Unit

KIMBERLY, June 20—Kimberly farm bureau federation this week began discussion of five questions considered by President Eisenhower as the leading problem on the farm scene.

The President, in a letter to Allen Kline, national farm bureau federation president, asked that local organizations suggest solutions to five broad problems of present urgency: (1) farm income stability and improvement; (2) production and market adjustments; (3) conservation and improvement of resources; (4) capital needs of agriculture and (5) trade or aid.

Editor, Times-News: It has been reported that the Chicago Mercantile Exchange is now engaged in a drive to encourage potato growers of Idaho, Washington and Oregon to become more active in the use of futures trading. The activity of this commodity has, for the past several years, been of a limited nature, and has had little if any effect upon the cash market. The exchange, of course, has been encouraged in this respect by the tremendous activity in the trading of onions futures which last year traded approximately 100,000 contracts of the '53 crop, or three times the actual amount consumed. We understand further that in order to induce greater activity, quality has been sacrificed. Factors involving supply and demand, quality, size and condition have made for free and open bargaining in dealing with this perishable commodity. We distributors will be amiss in our responsibility to the trade and the consuming public if we fail to warn them that a repetition of the experience of the onion debacle will be of serious consequences. We do not blame the exchange for attempting to develop more business for themselves and, therefore, greater profits to its members, but they must not be at the expense of the industry and the consuming public. To the Idaho shippers and growers, we say that the Idaho potato commission has made great progress in improving the quality and standard of potato shipped. Many growers have set up high standards of their own. Brand names, premium packs and quality far above the tolerance have made the Idaho potato what it is today. We distributors who are members of that team ask that they do not sacrifice what has been accomplished by falling prey to a short-

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

DENILO is enjoying a short-lived tourist boom, thanks to Mrs. C. W. Vallette. The thing that's catching the tourist's eye, and interrupting his spin down highway 303 through this desert outpost, is Mrs. Vallette's rainbow-hued iris garden.

In full bloom, the gardens give the community an attraction whose color can be matched by few places in the valley, if in the west.

The imaginative flower-lover would think of the gardens as a flower community, one which Mrs. Vallette presides as godmother. The visitor discovers quickly that Mrs. Vallette knows every bloom by name and family.

Favorites with growth and vigor are the members of the Mohr family, native to the Holy Land and middle east Asia. These exotics that they tenaciously resist hybridization, and the seed-pods of the hybrids are a precious thing.

Mrs. Vallette has been successful in developing her own Mohr hybrid, the Pearlmoor, and the bloom-out-of-parchment in color, flutters about the falls with opalescent lavender—has been introduced in Provo, Utah, this year by Nell Muhlstein, another of the west's leading iris gardeners.

She has more than 2,000 varieties of iris in her garden, with blooms of all conceivable sizes and colors. A number of the hybrids she has developed have been registered with the American Iris society.

Hundreds of visitors have lined the register at the garden during the past two weeks—among them tourists from half a dozen states and residents of nearly every municipality in Idaho. Her gardens are regarded the largest west of the Rocky mountains.

As station KFPD, Nampa, begins beaming television over Idaho, the broadcast spells the fulfillment of a former Kaitley resident's dream.

Unfortunately, the man whose dream this was, Frank Hurt, died in an automobile accident last year.

Hurt was one of Idaho's pioneers in radio. He was conducting experiments with wireless years before an automobile accident.

His workshop was the woodshed on the family ranch at PLYMOUTH, 25 miles south of Hatley.

Just as he watched his dreams for radio materialize, he now his dreams for television would one day come to realization.

This day, specifically, might have been Thursday, when KFPD began interim broadcasting of television on a test pattern and became the first station in Idaho to make television broadcasts.

The station, with studio and transmitter at 6,200 feet above sea level in Boise national forest, sends to the area which was Hurt's first home his first television.

Satisfaction of the achievement itself fell to Hurt's son, Ed, who shared his father's dream and carried it out as his father's successor in ownership of the station.

Several years ago the honor roll erected in MURTAUGH to display the names of the men and women

serving in the military legions of their nation, are unscathed by young vandals with a mixture of oil and varnish.

In recent years groups and individuals have raved at the statue with a variety of cleaning agents in an effort to erase the damage, but without avail.

"Of exceptional fine quality" were the purebred Scotch heifer and the Hampshire lamb exhibited by Harper Buel, who now makes his home in Dietrich.

The Farm Bureau sponsored exhibition work in those days and the 4-H clubs were sometimes called Farm Bureau Juniors club.

The boys and girls of the county enrolled in the "Juniors" clubs then include many of the successful farmers, businessmen and homemakers of today.

Approximately 100 persons were registered for the work. Names of the clubs were a representative of work undertaken such as "Sewing club," "Pig club," "Garden club," "Dairy Hutter club" and "Sheep club."

The closing program will be held June 26 featuring open house. Parents and friends are invited to attend. At the close of the program a picnic lunch will be served in the west city park.

or days without boring repetition. It's just a short "stop" from Bryce to Zion by going through the Mt. Carmel tunnel. Zion isn't just a big canyon through which the Virgin river flows peacefully during most of the year. It was carved by a raging stream led by surging torrents cascading down through some of the most beautiful mountains in the west. Often tourists miss much of its scenic beauty by not taking enough time to enjoy its grandeur. But still they are amazed at the towering sandstone walls as they enter the park. One finds deer and wildlife interesting in hikes up the Narrows. Traveling back down the canyon and on to other points of interest don't overlook the panorama of the canyon as seen from the east or west rim.

From Angel's Landing in the center of the canyon one can see miles in any direction. The view is spectacular and can be reached in half a day's hike. Cable mountain, from which the early pioneers used to drop lumber into the canyon on a suspension cable, is a challenge to the more vigorous tourist. Zig-zag trails carved up the sheer mountain wall offer beauty and appeal seldom found.

Lady mountain, the west rim trail or any of a dozen other appealing side trips introduce a canyon of color and fascination. Zion and Bryce can be reached in a day from any Utah point. Accommodations at both parks are the best. Bryce is operated as a tourist attraction by the Utah Parks company. More than 25,000 visitors enjoyed it last year.

Accommodations at Zion are operated by the Union Pacific Railroad company. Reservations should be made in advance at both parks. Aside from the registration fee upon entering the parks, there are no charges for utilizing any of the numerous free campsites.

"The Man Who Was Let Off"

No one of the Gospel stories has provided a greater challenge to young people than this story of the "Great Rejection," as someone has fittingly called the episode of Christ and twelve young rulers which Matthew, Mark and Luke all tell in one form or another.

It is evident, by reading the context of this thirteen-fold Bible story, that this young man who followed Jesus was not



only rich and cultured, but also good as far as conformity to the Jewish law of righteousness was concerned. It also is evident that he had been following Jesus closely enough not only to hear, but to copy, this abundant and eternal life about which the Son of Man spoke so frequently and convincingly.

Finally, one day, he sought the Master out, saying: "Good Teacher, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?"

And Jesus answered him in this wise: "Why callest thou me good? None is good save one, even God."

None is good save one, even God. That which thou hast, and give to the poor . . . and come—follow me."

"But when the young man heard

that saying, he went away sorrowful; for he was one that had great possessions."

He wanted the goods, but the price staggered him. He was asked to give the whole; but he couldn't trust his heavenly Father's care. He missed his chance by not being game. He stood shivering on the shore of a great ambition; but he feared to take the plunge from which he would have come up in a tangle of new life.

He might have traveled day by day in the company of Jesus, with the Master's words in his memory, his eyes upon Him. His friendship would have been a great blessing to the man's heart up and out. He might have become an apostle; one of the guiding spirits of the young church, handling growing responsibilities, seeing the world, facing kings and mobs, testing the fullness of life. His name might today be a household word wherever the Gospels are

read, and millions of boys might have been named after him as either Peter and James and John.

Instead, he probably lived and died as the richest man of his little Galilean town, carrying in his from heart the dead seed of a great life, unless, indeed, some Roman official squeezed him dry, or the Jewish law did for him by force what he would not do freely for himself.

Yes, the rich young ruler was "let off" from sacrifice and service; but he was also let off from the reward—developed, Christ-like, personality—walking the highways of the world with Jesus in helpful service to his fellow men.

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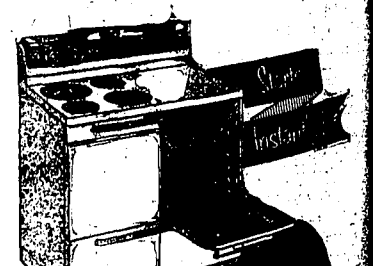
