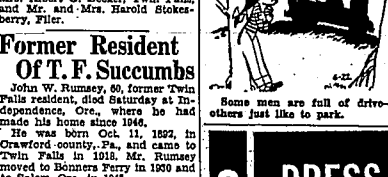

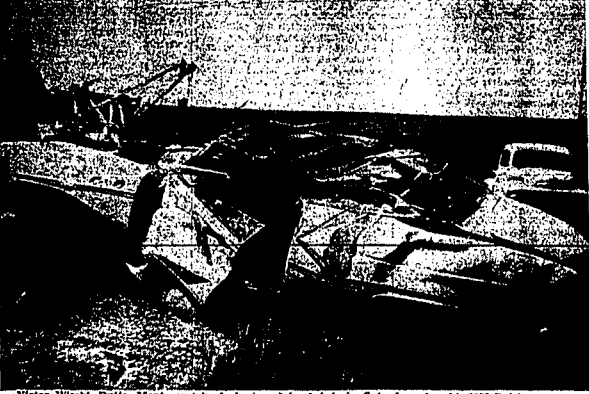

Pumping, Way to Defeat High Costs Called Keys to More Irrigated Land

BOISE, June 22 (AP)—An era in southern Idaho agriculture is ending—an era which saw dams thrown across the Snake river and its tributaries to store the water which flows out over the state's fertile but thirsty land.

A report by Lynn Crandall, water-master of the Snake river, indicates that Idaho's future irrigation expansion will be by pumping from the vast store of water underneath the land.

Out of more than 1,300,000 acres of potentially irrigable land, Crandall says more than a million acres would be supplied all or partly by ground-water pumping.

Harold Nelson, regional director of the bureau of reclamation, confirms that although some irrigation reservoirs are included in the bureau's future plans for Idaho, underground storage is considered the main source of future irrigation water. He noted that the next project scheduled for Idaho, Michaud flats, involves pumping water from the river to the land.

Studies were made by Crandall and Raymond Hill, Los Angeles consulting engineer, for the interior department to determine whether there's enough water for future irrigation and a big government dam at Hells Canyon, the reports released last week also gave a picture of the possibilities of expanding irrigation within the next 50 years or so.

Hill sees no large expansion of irrigation in the western third of southern Idaho, west of King Hill. He says there are very few, if any projects which would pay for themselves. He thinks they would be feasible only if a national water policy of subsidizing irrigation costs is adopted.

"Some would require direct subsidies to the extent of hundreds of dollars per acre of irrigated land in addition to all credits for hydro-electric power produced, at worst forming an integral part of the same project," he says.

Crandall concedes it's "a speculative matter" whether the Mountain Home desert can be irrigated, but believes that in view of the quality of the land and its location "some plan will eventually be devised for irrigating the full 327,000 acres."

In the area north of the Snake from St. Anthony to Bliss, the Snake river plain, says Crandall, possibly 400,000 acres might be developed by ground-water pumping. Along the minor tributaries from the north, from Camas creek to the Big Wood river, he thinks 45,000 acres may be irrigated by new stor-

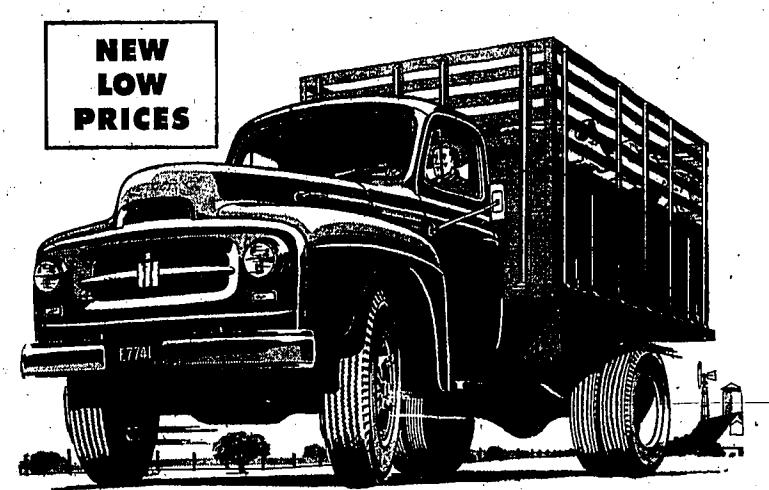

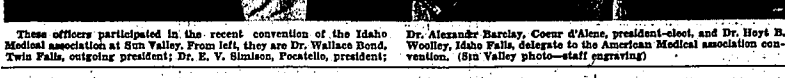

Solons Warn Foreign Trout Labeled as 'Rocky Mountain' May Destroy Market

WASHINGTON, June 22 (Special)—In an official report last week, a senate committee warned that imported trout labeled as "Rocky mountain" may destroy the carefully built up market for domestic producers.

The report followed senate approval of S-2026, a bill introduced by Sen. Henry C. Dworshak to require the labeling of foreign fish as to country of origin.

Noting that privately owned trout farms, mostly in the Rocky mountain area and the northwest, represent an investment of between six and seven million dollars, the document explained:

"American trout producers are engaged in a highly specialized business and are producing a delicate food product and have made large investments in proper facilities and equipment in order to give the public the highest quality of trout available. . . . One of the present safeguards, to both consumer and producer is the reputation of the producer of the product which has been built up over many years so that when you purchase a Rocky mountain trout or an eastern brook trout you are assured of purchasing a product of the domestic producers."

In recent years, imported trout have been sold as "Rocky mountain" or under other names "which may deceive the purchaser into believing they are domestic trout," the report said.

"If this practice continues, the entire reputation for quality that has been established by the domestic trout producers will be completely destroyed in spite of the fact that it has taken them many years of time, effort and money to build. Not only will such deceptive practices destroy the reputation for quality of the product sold under these common names, but they will destroy the market for the entire domestic producers of trout."

House action on the bill is expected within a few weeks. If signed into law, it will amend the federal food and drug act to require labeling of all imported trout and notice by restaurants serving imported trout.

Land Reports Are Expected By Gem Solon

WASHINGTON, June 22 (Special)—Rep. Hamer Budge, R. Ida., expects a report from the interior department "soon" on his proposal to free 40,000 to 50,000 acres for private development.

Assistant Interior Secretary Fred C. Aandahl wrote Budge several weeks ago that the matter has been referred to the bureau of reclamation's regional office in Boise for study.

The acreage withdrawn from entry is located in Jerome and Mindoka counties. It adjoins the 77,000 acres now in the Mindoka project.

Budge says that "there appears to be no valid reason why these withdrawn lands should not be restored promptly. All bureau reports indicate an abundant ground water supply."

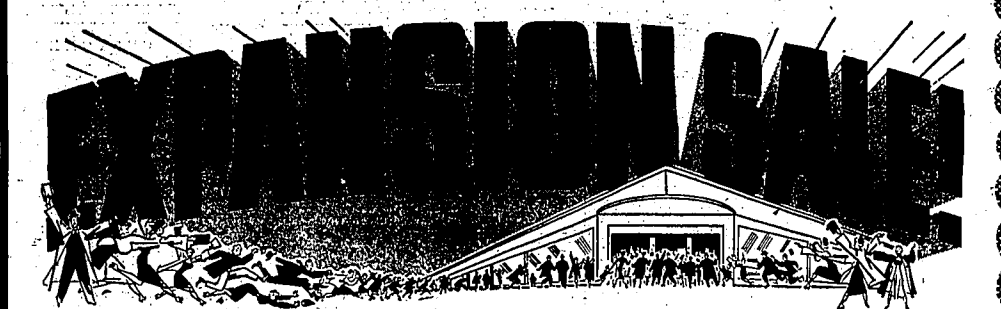
