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# Looms Among 3 Top 'Generals'

## Planning Plans for New Farm Policy

Rep. Clifford R. Hope, R., Kans., chairman of the house agriculture committee.

These three are in effect the ranking Republican generals in the farm world's civil war, a conflict centering around the administration's idea on the best way to increase and stabilize farm income.

Their strategy and leadership will determine in large measure the kind of program congress will adopt when the present law requiring fixed high support prices for basic crops expires next year. The basics are wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco, rice and peanuts.

But in the showdown fight, Mr. Eisenhower may find one of his

are likely before fall.

But Benson has outlined a fairly clear picture of the direction he wants to go and there is every indication he has the full support of President Eisenhower.

On price supports, he said recently:

"I doubt very much if any government can, by high rigid supports, prevent some adjustment in prices, unless we step from one commodity to the next and then to the next, until finally we have control of all of them. When we have that, we will practically have state socialism, and I do not believe that farmers want that any more than you do or I do."

Benson believes high price supports tend to "freeze" crop production. In other words, if a farmer is guaranteed a profitable return for growing corn, then there isn't much reason for him to shift to a more

needed but less profitable crop even though corn surpluses do pile up in storage.

As is now the case, Benson also thinks the fixed high supports tend to price a commodity out of the market in domestic and world competition.

The secretary says that as long as prices are supported at high levels, there is no pressure on farmers to increase efficiency and lower production costs by using better seed varieties and farming practices in order to be in a better position to compete in home and overseas markets.

In other words, he says, high supports subsidize inefficiency.

As a farmer, Benson never accepted a government subsidy payment himself. But he says there should be some price support structure to protect the farmer from economic disasters such as they experienced 20 years ago.

Judging from Benson's speeches, policy statements, interviews, and testimony before a congressional group, he favors in general a program that runs in the direction:

1. Flexible price supports ranging from 75 to 90 per cent of parity. Parity is a return estimated to be fair to both the farmer and the consumer. Under this flexibility, supports could be lowered to discourage overproduction, or raised to encourage shifts to needed crops.
2. A greater voice for farmers and commodity groups in drafting programs to fit their particular needs. This would mean, Benson says, decentralizing federal control with emphasis on controls at the state and county level.
3. Expanded efforts through private enterprise and government to build up foreign markets which have been sagging badly in the

past year. This would call for expanded sales efforts and efforts to remove trade barriers at home and abroad.

4. Shifting to the agriculture department, some of the authority and responsibility now held by the state department in the field of foreign trade policies.
5. Government-industry efforts on a wider scale than in the past to find new uses for farm products through research, thus absorbing off some of the farm surpluses now piling up the farm program.
6. A concentrated effort by government, farmers and food handlers to find ways to cut marketing costs. Costs have risen sharply in recent years and cut deeply into the farmer's share of the consumer dollar spent for food.
7. The possible wider use of marketing agreements, price insurance and a two-price system for exports.

The two-price system would mean that wheat and other commodities would be sold at home and abroad at two different prices.

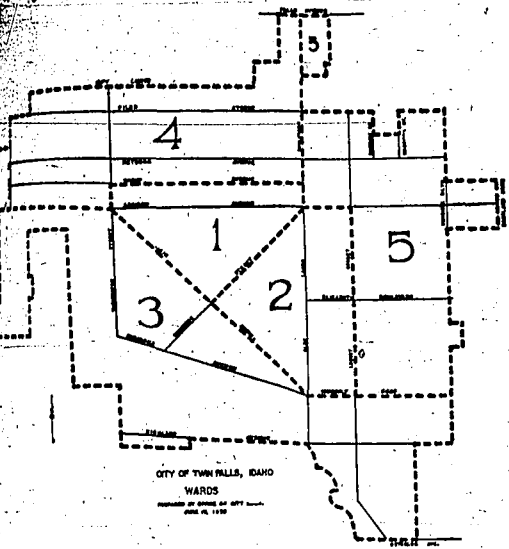

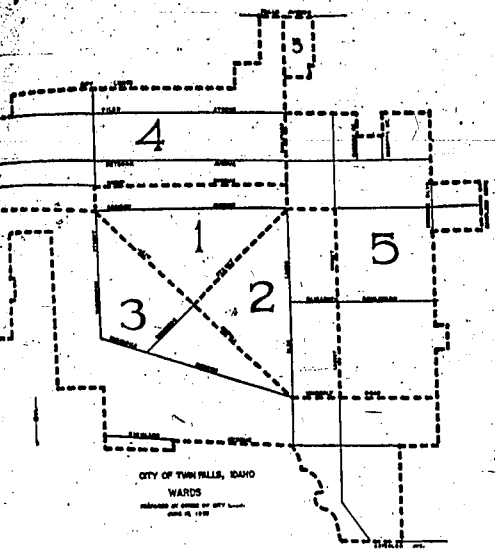

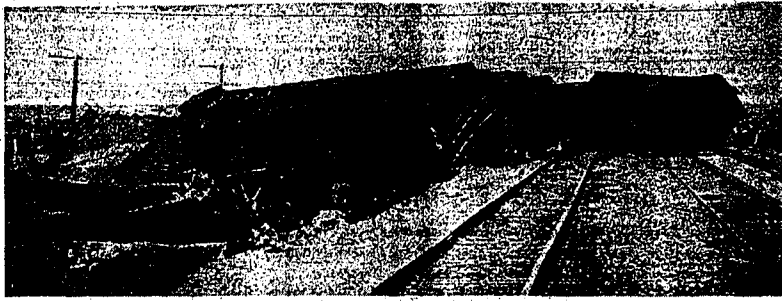

WASHINGTON, June 25 (AP)—Representative Hoover, R., Ia., said Wednesday commodity credit corporation officials may have shown "poor judgment" in the way they handled a sale of dried peas to three west-coast firms.

Bus Heeven, chairman of a house agriculture subcommittee which investigated the transaction, added there was no evidence of anything political or illegal. He made the statements to newsmen at the end of hearings which began last week.

Representative Burton, D., Tenn., said Democratic subcommittee members probably will file a minority report containing stronger criticism of the deal than is expected from the GOP majority.

CCC officials appointed by the administration handled the private negotiations which led to sale April 30 of 80,000 tons of Australian winter peas for \$80 a ton although the government was offering them publicly at the time for \$55.

### Care of Your Children

When school closes for the summer vacation it is time for teachers to take the measure of their work with the children. What effect has the school had on the character growth of the pupils? Are they more mature in outlook? Have they greater interest in school and learning? Have they acquired more skill in certain fields of action? Is their self-control adequate to their stage of development?

The marks children in elementary schools, or the students in the upper schools, have gained have a certain value. They had to be worked for, and work well done is always a source of power to mind and spirit. But there is another kind of accomplishment, which is intangible and immeasurable. It can mean life or ruin to a child.

There was a teacher who took more of a group of boys—graded to no school standard, or, indeed, to any set standard society. Of different ages, different races, varied degrees of intelligence, these boys very well could have staggered the most experienced of teachers, but this one smiled and began work.

By some magic, known only to such teachers, she managed to weld the group into some unity of purpose. They organized a newspaper staff, every boy had assignment in one capacity or another, every edition—it was a weekly—carried a news item about such and such. The strength that was inherent in these nonconformists was impressive.

Toward the close of the term, the teacher was sitting at her desk, alone in the classroom, wondering how much, or how little, she had hoped these kids to be in a better way in the world. Then one of the most nonconforming of the lot, came into the room and said "Teacher, when I gave my mother that note you wrote about my getting the highest mark in the class she kissed me. It's the first time she kissed me for a long while. I'm so glad." Out he went, proud of his mother's recognition of his school work.

The teacher, in the absence of an empty classroom, laid her head on her arms and cried in thankfulness.

State Patrolman Wins Pistol Honors, Misses State Title; Wife Shoots, too

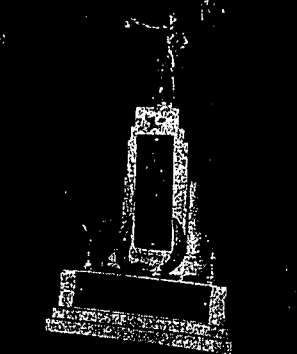

### U. N. Report Attacks Russia 'Slave Labor'

GENEVA, Switzerland, June 23 (AP)—A United Nations committee has charged that forced labor exists in Russia "in its fullest form and in the form which most endangers human rights."

The U. N. committee on forced labor accused the Soviet Union of violating the U. N. charter by operating compulsory work camps to attain its own political and economic ends. Bulgaria, Romania and Czechoslovakia also were accused of running similar systems for the same reasons.

A 621-page report was issued after nearly two years of investigation of charges involving 24 nations, including the United States. The inquiry concluded most specific charges against the U. S. were irrelevant or unsubstantiated. But it noted the legal definition of "vagrancy" in some of the states was so broad and the punishment so severe "that it extensively interpreted and applied it could lead to a system of forced labor for economic purposes."

19 Others Absolved Cause was found for criticism of Spain and the Union of South Africa but the U. S. and 10 other nations were absolved of major charges. They were Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, France, Paraguay, Peru, Britain and Venezuela. The Russian penal code, the report said, was manipulated in such a way that political offenders were charged. ### \$40 Basement Shelter Termed 'Some Help' in Atomic Attack

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—A government report loaded with "ifs" says a \$40 homemade basement shelter might save lives in an atomic attack. The report contains the civil defense administration's findings about shelters tested in the March 17 atomic explosion at Yucca flat, Nev.

Under the special circumstances of the limited experiment, ODA said, the \$40 wooden lean-to shelter provided "good" protection from atomic blast and radiation from a falling debris. A "corner-room" shelter, also of wood, but costing \$60, provided even better protection. The best protection of all was supplied by several kinds of concrete covered back-yard shelters.

Two target houses, typical two-story wooden structures, were used in the test. One was 8500 feet (about two-thirds of a mile) from the explosion. It was demolished. The other was 7500 feet (about one and two-fifth miles) away. It stood up but was seriously damaged. Even in the nearer house, which was 50 to 75 feet from the destroyed dummies in a lean-to shelter in the basement were undamaged, and the civil defense administration concluded human beings would have emerged unscathed, too.

That is where the "ifs" and the special circumstances of the test come into the picture. For one thing, the atomic explosion was a small one, equivalent to about 15,000 tons of TNT. Thomas E. Murray, a member of the atomic energy commission, has called it "but a token of the destructive power this country can now lay in a single nuclear explosion." For another, the test houses were specially built and treated to make sure there would be no fire, either from the bomb's flash heat or from short circuits or broken gas lines. Fire was the great destroyer at Hiroshima. And the houses were of wood. The simple basement shelters might not have stood up under the greater weight of crashing brick or stone walls. The ODA concluded that backyard shelters, or stronger basement shelters with an escape hatch to the outside in case of fire, would be more effective.

### Idaho Congressmen Receive Only Few Protests on Cuts in Federal Spending

WASHINGTON, June 23 (Special) — One of the old political saws that everybody wants economy in government except where he's concerned doesn't seem to be working out this year.

Idaho's congressional delegation, which was braced for a lot of letters starting out "I want economy, but . . .", has been getting almost no protests against the general cuts in federal spending.

"We've heard from more people who want further cuts than from those who are against what's happened so far," Rep. Elmer Budge commented. "There was a wave of letters from veterans' groups when it was rumored that the VA was going to be cut, but that stopped when the appropriation came out of the house."

Sen. Henry C. Dworshak reported more requests for restoring such items as vocational education and health program funds but "not a single complaint about federal payroll reductions."

"Of course Idaho was not directly affected by these, not having any big defense installations. And only a few individuals were affected by reduction in the interior department."

"We did have quite a bit of mail from people interested in the Aberdeen grass nurseries, which I think was justified. The agriculture department allowed only \$100,000 for liquidating the operation and turning it over to the state. However, I think this was an error since the

state was not prepared and the appropriation was restored to keep the nursery in operation."

Sen. Herman Walker had exactly one letter opposing the slash in agricultural conservation payments (which were boosted by the senate later to about halfway between the Truman and Eisenhower recommendations).

"We actually received two or three others urging that the conservation payments be held to the minimum," a member of Walker's staff said. "Our mail in general bears out the findings of the state Republican committee that the public agrees with the cuts made so far."

Mrs. Grace Frost also heard from veterans and supporters of the Aberdeen nursery and other specific issues.

"I think people have been very

intelligent about asking for more appropriations when they have," she said. "Most of the letters have had good reasoning behind them."

The congresswoman differed from her colleagues in that she said she

received few requests for more general spending cuts.

"I don't think one in 25 of the people writing have asked for more extensive reductions."

### Lack of Feed Is Blamed for Sheep Deaths

SALT LAKE CITY, June 25 (U. P.)—A University of Utah veterinarian reports preliminary examination indicates "lack of feed" is not alone blame, caused unusually heavy deaths this spring among sheep in southern Utah.

Dr. Robert C. Day, Utah college of medicine, said official reports on his study and a survey of 1,000 animal deaths by other experts "would not be complete for at least 30 days."

However, he said an examination of sheep carcasses around Cedar City, 100 miles east of the Nevada along proving grounds, "showed no significant radiation count and no beta (one of the rays emitted by nuclear detonation) bursts."

"There were signs of extreme malnutrition due to very poor range conditions," Day reported, adding that livestock which showed supplemental feedings showed no unusual losses.

"However, there may be other contributing causes to the high losses some flocks suffered, and it will be 30 days to two weeks before we have completely ruled out all factors," he said.

### Even Some of Idaho's Best Highways "Intolerable" Due to Heavy Traffic

BOISE, June 25 (U. P.)—Some of Idaho's best highways aren't even "tolerable" under the state highway department's standards, highway engineers say.

"It's just because they have to carry too much traffic," said Zeno V. Miller, state highway engineer.

Miller said many of the 1,500 miles of state highways rated "intolerable" in the highway department's sufficiency report would be rated "tolerable" if they were only located in sparsely settled areas.

He cited the Nampa-Murphy highway west of Boise for example. It's a good straight road with a smooth surface and ample sight distance for oncoming cars. But it's rated "intolerable" because the 10,000 cars a day traffic demands it be much wider. But the same quality road in a less-traveled area would be a godsend.

Miller explained that when the sufficiency report rated 32.4 per cent of the mileage of rural roads in the state as "intolerable" it didn't mean they are impassable to anything but jeeps. Miller added that current driving practice calls for major transcontinental highways to be safe for 70-mile-an-hour driving in open areas. If it can't carry heavy cars at that speed it isn't "tolerable" under department standards.

He likened highway standards to home construction, saying a new well-built two-bedroom house may be adequate for a small family. But when mom, pop and 10 children try to crowd into it, it's "intolerable." Highways are just the same.

On the other hand, some chuck-hole filled dirt roads are rated "tolerable" by the highway department.

"The Brunau-Gransere road in Owyhee county and the Ashton-Beecher river road in Fremont county are something you wouldn't want to drive your new car over. But traffic counts reveal only about 60 cars a day over those roads. So the department rates them "tolerable," considering the relatively small amount of traffic.

The Wallace-Coeur d'Alene road is another good example of how traffic volume affects the "tolerability" of roads. Miller said U. S. 10 in that area "is structurally sound" but it is narrow, and "lacks good opportunities for passing." As a result many sections are rated "intolerable," or just barely above standard.

Structurally the Whitebird hill route is good, Miller said, but modern traffic speed requirements make its curves and grades "unstandard."

The Nampa-Murphy road in Owyhee and Canyon counties is approximately the same condition the district route. This first four miles south of Nampa are rated "intolerable" because of the heavy traffic from farmers. The next nine miles are barely above minimum standards and the final 14 miles, with a light traffic load, is rated one of the top stretches in the state for the amount of traffic carried.

The report that 1,603 miles of rural roads and 143 miles of urban roads are "intolerable" means just this: They aren't as good as they should be considering the traffic they have to carry.
