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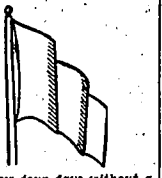

Briton Avers U. S. Backing 'Wrong Man'

BOULSOVER, England, June 27 (AP)—Britain's former defense minister, Emmanuel Shinwell, said today the Americans had a "chance of backing the wrong man" and cited particularly Chiang Kai-shek and Syngman Rhee.

Shinwell, who was cabinet minister in the Attlee labor government, in a speech prepared for delivery before a party rally, said of Rhee: "Let them fight."

"If the president of South Korea persists in his attitude and if he believes he can fight it out with the North Koreans, why not let him?" Shinwell questioned whether there was any reason why the lives of United Nations men should be thrown away in order to satisfy the personal interests of this man.

Shinwell, who was a leader in the labor party that backed the U. N. intervention in Korea, declared: "Doubtless."

"I doubt whether the United Nations has much further to gain by backing this adventure. It responded with courage to the act of aggression. It has done everything possible to promote a truce and to bring the affair to an end."

"In doing so it has justified its existence. Why not leave the Koreans to fight the matter out themselves?"

"It does seem to me that the Americans have the knack of backing the wrong man. It was for a time Chiang Kai-shek, now it is President Rhee. If they want to defeat the communist, they must find a better way."

"Hell-With-You" Attitude of Drivers Cited as Big Cause of High Auto Toll

By **HELMAN MORIN**

NEW YORK, June 27—If the facts and figures could ever be compiled, I believe it would be found that most traffic accidents are not the result of speed, lack of judgment, drinking, or driving with one arm around a doll.

Each of these undoubtedly contributes to the great total.

But, in my book, the top cause for tragedy on the highway is plain lack of courtesy.

Something queer happens to many people when they get behind the wheel of an automobile. The same man who will politely hold the door for a lady, or struggle to get his hat out in a crowded elevator, takes a strictly hell-with-you attitude once he starts down the road in a solo. Anybody know why?

For one thing, I suppose, there is a sense of power. To be able to direct a couple of hundred horses and a ton of metal engines is a sense of release.

Many people today feel frustrated, insecure and inadequate in the human world. For them, perhaps, an automobile is the great equalizer.

The little man who takes a beating in his office, and will be bridged and pushed around by the big man when he gets home, is on even terms with princes and potentates once he starts down the road.

All the interferences, suppressed emotions and plain anger seem to surface then. This, I think, is the explanation for the commoner forms of highway nuisances, to wit: The road-runner—This is the guy who can't stand having anybody in front of him. If you start to pass him, he will speed up. Or, he will pass you, then drop to his normal cruising speed, which is usually somewhat slower than yours. Better let him stay in front; he will only race you to the next curve otherwise.

The eye-front-only bird—He has a rear view mirror above the windshield, one on each door and two on the fenders. But they are solely for decoration. He never uses them. This, on a crowded highway, rolling at 50-plus, he will start out

of his lane without a second thought. Sometimes he never lives to have another, either—but neither does the driver behind him.

The corner-cutter—Center line on the highway means nothing to him. Taking a curve, he is too lazy

to keep from drifting across into the lane of traffic going the other way. May he rest in peace under that quiet headstone.

The straddler—Usually, this is a dear old lady who can't quite make up her mind. Sometimes she holds that course, grimly. No amount of horn blowing moves them over and it is worth your life to try to pass on the right. Nothing can be done about it.

The time-is-money driver—He is willing to come on the parkway, waiting in line for a car behind you for three miles, but does he wait? He does not. He glances over his shoulder, guns the motor, gets his teeth and roars out in front of you. From his point of view, it's strictly your problem at that point.

Space does not permit listing all the menaces.

Some people, of course, are just naturally bad drivers, with poor coordination, slow reflexes, or faulty eyesight. A true driving test—and good grades here—would bring out these handicaps.

But the tests today do not show whether a man or woman is an erratic common courtesy on the road. Or whether he is likely to air the grudges and complexes he acquired elsewhere by acting like an out in traffic.



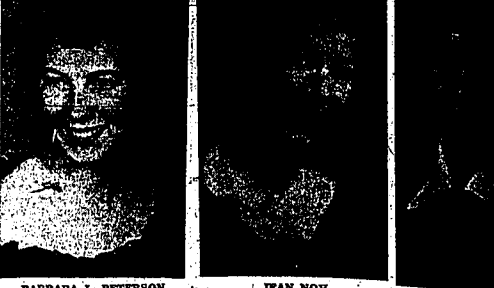

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

A child is an entity, a world in himself. In his life, beauty and power dwells. Education is the force that develops life's potentialities to these things become active forces for good in the child.

There are various views concerning education but at the moment we are concerned with the use in which education is a discipline, a force that develops, prunes, limits, expands the abilities of the individual child. How this is best done must rest with the nature of the child and his teachers. The child's family, the community, the church and the school, every active force that touches his life comes under the word "teacher."

It is difficult to rear a child in a way other than that set by the child himself. He will not because he cannot—it precedes into any pattern. Provided the pattern is one that comes fairly close to his inherent qualities of thought and act, based on ability, he can be most after it.

No child, however amenable or gifted, willingly composes himself to work but work he must if he is to grow. Being a child, he must work with a purpose, to discipline because it holds a child's mind on the task before it. There always comes a time when the child stern "you must" which will, if we have been just and wise, eventually become "it must."

There was a time when a child had no voice in his own destiny. He was held always in thrall of duty even when that duty was foreign to both his nature and his abilities. In reaction to that culture came the idea of full freedom. Some educators went so far as to say a child would "burst into reading" so he need not be asked to attend to a lesson in that very important field. And some, maybe in wild idealism, or in sheer lassitude, decreed that a child should be left free to behave as he wished. The results were dire!

Children do not burst into reading. When they are about 6 years old they should be exposed to reading by an expert teacher. We do they learn good manners or morals without direction, correction, good guidance and example. Healthy growth is disciplined growth. Discipline—in its best sense of cultivated growth and development.

Freedom of a child should be stimulated by an ideal of righteousness. The only discipline worthwhile is the sort that leads to that end.

Continuing to say "you must" does not teach. Dr. Patri tells how to train a child in obedience in his book "How to obtain a copy, send 25 cents in coin to his publisher, J. Hill's Gift Shop, New York 19, N. Y."

33-Mile-Long Island Park Village Gives East Idaho One of Top Vacation Regions

ISLAND PARK VILLAGE, June 27 (AP)—One of America's longest villages—the main street stretches for 33 miles—is one of America's most scenic vacation spots.

And Island Park village in eastern Idaho is really perk up, now, welcoming the thousands of some three million tourists who will pass by its scattered log "business district" this summer.

A loose grouping of ranches, bunk lodges, and cabin camps, the village lies in the middle of a spectacular greenery of forests, cascading rivers and alpine lakes where fish seek in cool depths.

The main street is the Yellowstone highway, or highway 101 as it is tagged on the road maps. Its back yard is hundreds of miles of Targhee national forest—and the only link to the forest is just forest is the highway. It stretches from Last Chance on the picturesque north fork of the Snake river, one of the nation's top fishing streams, almost to the continental divide on the Montana line. It is entirely located within Fremont county.

Formation of the sprawling village was prompted by law enforcement problems arising from the use of whisky and the fact that Idaho provides that liquor by the drink and not machines can be available only in incorporated cities and villages.

The summer sees fishermen from coast to coast on a line in the many streams and lakes while the fall—and many figure this is the most popular season—finds sportsmen hunting deer, moose and elk.

There are so many moose in the area that fishermen often find them in the bushes when they are looking down at an angry cow moose.

The attraction of the area is twofold. It is the "vacation centers" who come back yearly to these rambling to Yellowstone national park. West Yellowstone, just over the continental divide where the village ends, forms the gateway to one of nation's most fabulous parks.

Former Cassia County Agent To Head Training of Recruits

The man who has been given the assignment by the University of Idaho to head the training of recruits in the extension service received his early experience in Cassia county. He is Warren Barber, veteran of 33 years' extension service.

His first assignment brought him to Cassia county in 1920 as 4-H club agent. The following year he became Cassia county agent, and later district agent, with headquarters in Pocatello. For 10 years he served as the state's county agent director, and since 1940 has been working on special assignments.

Now, in recognition of his conspicuous record, the regents of the university have given him the job of directing the production training of new staff members.

Barber in 1921 initiated the on-the-farm demonstrations in teaching agriculture, and it has been copied over the state.

He is the father of Idaho's short-course for 4-H members. He arranged and conducted the first short-course on the Idaho State college campus, where it continued an annual event for 10 years. In 1939 the program was transferred to the university.

Holder of bachelor's and master's degrees from the university, he authored Idaho's first extension work handbook. The manual is still being used.

He is credited with an important role in protecting the quality of Idaho potatoes, which have been the state's chief claim to fame. In 1924, when diseased seed potato stocks made sharp inroads in the fields, he organized a group to promote the exclusive use of disease-free seed. Other counties were similarly organized, leading to organization of the Idaho Seed Potato association, which today manages seed certification.

He organized the Minidoka-Cassia cream pool, when dairy industry was in its infancy in the area. The pool, an association, operates today as a branch of the Jerome cooperative creamery.

For years he chairmanned the state farm safety committee.

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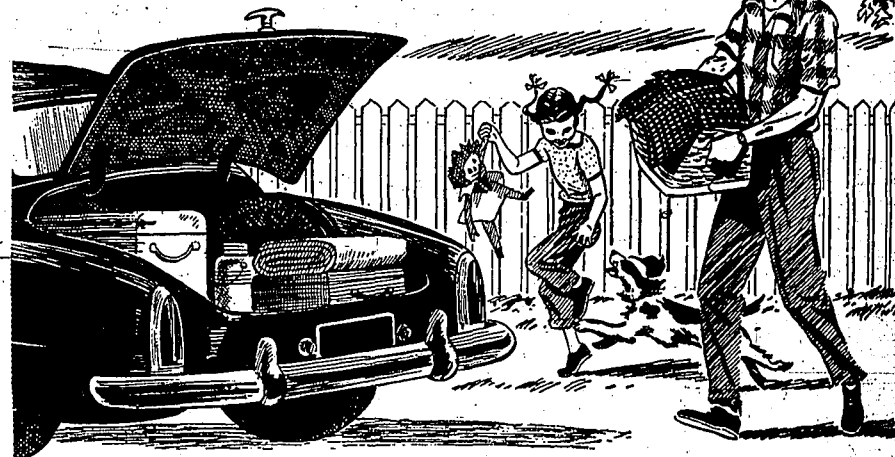
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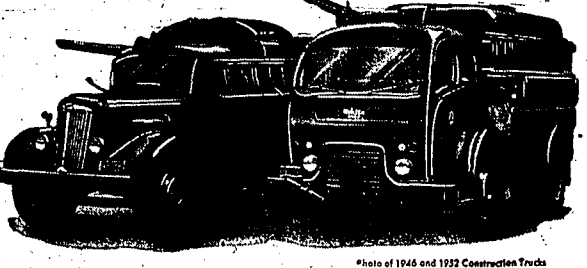

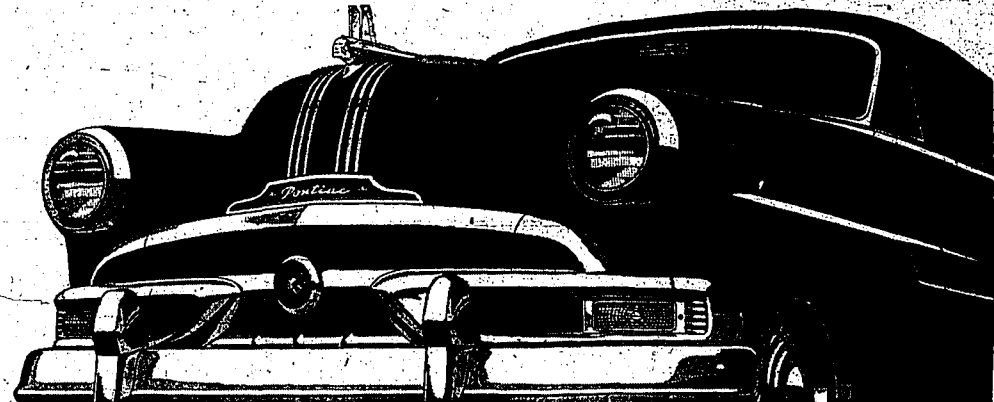

Space No Limit, Avers

SCIENTIFIC ADVANCEMENT DIVISION of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration is planning to send a man into space within the next few years. "What lies beyond the stars? Is there life out there? Has the black void of space been reached into this century?"

Dr. Fred A. Bicknell, chief of the division, said that the average of almost 100 million stars in our galaxy is only one of eight billion stars in our universe. "That makes up our solar system, or galaxy. These stars are thought to be arranged in the shape of a flattened double spiral with arms of 100,000 light-years in length."

Thinking out 100 years ago it was discovered that very great distances of space were definitely beyond the stars. "This was interpreted as that we had almost reached the outer limits of the universe, or that our system was thought to be the entire universe. But now, so-called, have been known, but until this year were generally thought to be outside our system. But now, methods of distance measurement by spectroscopy and photography and photography have proven definitely that there are other huge star systems outside our own. Weather and Public Opinion Are Most Unpredictable Factors in Farm Plans

BY DON MARTIN
WASHINGTON, June 26 (AP)—The two most unpredictable elements in the battle over a new farm program are the weather and the prevalent view of public opinion. Either could have a potent influence in the light.

They are factors which cannot be ignored in any speculation about the kind of farm program to be written by congress when the present fixed high-support law expires next year.

So far, there's been little indication that the general public, which consumes the farmers' products, is choosing an aid in the conflict over fixed high-support prices vs. flexible farm price proposals. But it could happen almost anytime, become aroused as they did against the potato support program a couple of years ago. More recently there has been some grumbling over heavy government buying of butter, cheese and dried milk to support prices of these products.

In the case of potatoes the federal government had this crop under average control. But farmers increased potato yields per acre to record-breaking heights through generous use of fertilizer. Then they dumped the surplus on the government at a heavy cost to taxpayers.

The market couldn't absorb the supply. This spoiled. Neither farmers nor farmers could argue effectively against the public's outcries, and the potato price support program was knocked in the head.

Is there any distance so great that no more galaxies exist all we know is that with every increase in telescopic power, more distant systems are found and without the least indication that they are reaching a long way before the end is reached. What lies beyond we can only conjecture.

Edgar Allan Poe in 1849 surmised that our universe is limited and that anything beyond can never be comprehended by mortal mind: "There they have a different set of natural laws, yes, even entirely different gods."

The weather can go a long way to make or break the realization drive for a flexible system of price supports for basic crops such as wheat, corn, cotton, rice, tobacco and peanuts.

These crops are now supported under law at 90 per cent of parity. Parity is a return estimated to be fair to both the farmer and consumer.

Up to this time, the weather appears to be on the side of the Eisenhower administration's arguments against continued rigid high-price supports. The prospects are for good crop weather, which would mean more surplus piled on surplus carried over from last year's bumper crops.

The agriculture department already is a bit frantic trying to find storage for wheat and corn surplus on hand and in view. They are piled in bins, warehouses, old hangars and even ship holds. And in their surplus are the seeds of public discontent over the present farm program.

The department has slightly more than three billion dollars tied up in farm surpluses. This investment may well approach five billion by the end of the 1953 marketing year if crops turn out well. This would be nearly a billion dollars more than the previous peak reached shortly before the Korean war.

The larger the surpluses, the greater is the danger of heavy taxpayer-financed losses through deterioration and sale at less than cost.

A bad crop year would strengthen arguments for continued fixed high supports. In bad times, the nation would be fortunate in having surplus for human and animal consumption.

The present farm program was designed to keep a reasonable surplus of grain and other staples on hand in case of prolonged drought or war emergency. But some surpluses have climbed beyond the point many considered

reasonable and are embarrassing the government and farmers alike.

The wheat surplus is around 800 million bushels, the corn surplus about 800 million. Good growing weather has boosted supplies.

But despite such bountiful farm production, the farmer has been fighting world-wide trouble for two years, trouble he hasn't experienced since before World War II.

Farm prices are down but farm costs are up. The farmer's share of the consumer dollar spent for food and fiber is at the lowest level since 1941, just before the war boom lifted him into his greatest period of prosperity.

He isn't yet in deep trouble, but the trend in that direction has been so steady as to sound alarms in Washington and in the farm country. Many people recall vividly the bleak days of the '30s that came after a farm depression.

Agriculture Secretary Benson says the way to reverse this trend is to use a flexible price support system to encourage crop production shifts. This would be tied in with efforts to find new farm markets, cut farm costs and increase the purchasing power of the dollar.

Benson's opponents argue the answer to the farm problem is not in cutting down on production or tampering with high-price supports. They see in surplus production a sign of healthy agriculture. They contend the nation should have surplus as a backlog.

They argue the cost of these surpluses is not too great a price for the taxpayer to pay for assurance of abundant food and fiber. They also argue that the factory worker is getting more good for one hour of labor today than he did in 1939, or in 1929, before the farm program started.

PMA Explains Crop Program

JEROME, June 27—Carl W. DeVoe, chairman of Jerome PMA committee, explained Friday the conditions by which the committee will establish allotments for wheat farms.

According to DeVoe, a "new" wheat farm is a farm on which wheat was not seeded in 1951, 1952 or 1953 and will be seeded for 1954. DeVoe stated producers desiring a new wheat farm allotment must file an application with the county committee no later than Tuesday.

It is very possible that errors have been made in compiling data on the 1954 wheat allotments and any farmer who has a question about whether the history for his farm has been properly recorded should contact the PMA office at Jerome. Since it is possible marketing quotas will come into effect with the 1954 wheat allotments, DeVoe stated each farmer should be sure that his production history is listed with the county committee so allotments for 1954 can be determined.
