Throw of the rod regime. The main Berlin-Warsaw railroad was cut in several places, the newspaper said.

In East Germany proper, the alternate toughness and weakness of the communists tried to quiet the people failed.

Reliable reports reaching here said the conflict in Poland was being stirred by strikers who, according to communist promises of future benefits, are demanding more pay and better working conditions right now.

Tens of thousands of other workers rioted mass arrest and summary execution by striking in a wave of protests that extended across red Germany from the Elbe river on the west to the Oder river on the east.

Walkouts and sabotage were reported from the mines of southeast Germany and hundreds of factories, most notably the big Zeiss optical works at Jena.

Arrests over the week-end increased the estimated number of Germans imprisoned since the revolt broke to well over 60,000.

### Governors Asked To Study Drought

SPRINGFIELD, Colo., June 23 (AP)—Governor's Gov. Dan Thornton, cutting in the middle of the drought-stricken southeastern Colorado, said today he will ask the governors of Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico to meet him for a first hand study of drought and dust damage.

Thornton said he not only intends to report to Secretary of Agriculture Benson on the fast spreading drought, but may go to Washington in person to appeal for aid.

Despite a twin Sunday night which ranged up to an inch and a half the dust began to blow in some areas of the state, particularly near Pritchett, Colo. Visibility was cut to less than a mile by the swirling dust.

Thornton said he intends to recommend a disaster area including parts of six counties.

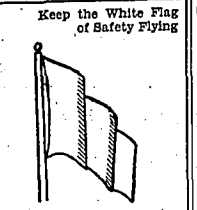

peace talks with Russia and the crisis in Korea.

The major decisions, they said, would only have to be left for the Bermuda conference — President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, and France's new premier Joseph Laniel.

### Children Get Mass Shots in Disease Fight

MONTGOMERY, Ala., June 23 (AP)—Several thousand youngsters, some quite apprehensive, others excitedly chattering-lined up today to receive injections of gamma globulin at a health center in the city wide attempt to halt a possible polio epidemic.

Tens of doctors and nurses began inoculating all children under 10 years of age as anxious parents brought their youngsters to vaccination stations throughout Montgomery county.

The huge "operation people" got underway as all cases of polio were recorded in the county—three of them fatal.

Each youngster stepped up, his name was recorded by a volunteer worker who also swabbed his hip with alcohol. Then a doctor quickly injected a three-quarters inch needle, shot in the gamma globulin, and signaled for the next child.

When the four-day assembly line operation is completed, some 30,000 children will have been vaccinated.

A team of 125 doctors and 80 nurses administered the shots, working in rotating shifts of about four hours.

### Philippines Crisis Seen In Bell Bill

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23 (AP)—Under a bill introduced in the U. S. House of Representatives, the Philippines is faced with economic disaster, Philippine Central Bank Governor Manuel Quezon said last night.

Cuevano, who is accompanying Philippine President Epifanio Quirino on his trip to Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore, Md., where the president is being treated for physical examination and treatment for foot ailments and recurrent malaria, said the bill would force the "economic ruin" on the Philippines.

Cuevano said that the United States is imposing a tariff on goods entering the country from the Philippines in July, 1954, and an additional five per cent tariff will be added each successive year.

"We import 75 per cent of our consumer goods," Cuevano said, "and 50 per cent of that comes from the U. S. A five per cent tariff would mean a 40 per cent increase in the cost of goods we import."

"Allow us to continue to export to you free of duty our main products—sugar, copra, and coconut oil. For those three items you will allow us to export to you some 300 million necessary items. Put the tariff on luxuries," Cuevano said, "not on the necessary items for survival."

### L. A. Councilmen Play 'Hooky' to Prevent Balloting

LOS ANGELES, June 23 (AP)—Los Angeles city hooky-playing councilmen are still missing Tuesday, despite a wide search by police, and council business is still a standstill for lack of a quorum.

Political observers describe their sudden absence as a political maneuver that just might pay off.

When the truants failed to answer roll call at Monday's scheduled meeting, other councilmen ordered Police Chief Parker to bring the truants in by force, if necessary.

Parker's men tried. But they didn't find one. Four left word they "gone fishing." The others left no word at all.

The six comprise the council's so-called liberal bloc, which favors the city's controversial 110-million-dollar public housing program. The eight other councilmen comprise the conservative bloc, which has the majority.

On the agenda at Monday's meeting was a vote on a successor to the late councilman Ed J. Davenport. The conservatives were in a position to dictate the successor. They's usual ally was the liberals' chief aide. The eight conservatives appeared but were two short of a quorum.

### General Bows Out; Remains Firm on View

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The United States air force marshaled a fleet of mighty jet warplanes and 2,000 marching airmen today to pay farewell tribute to Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg at a mammoth retirement review.

Vandenberg at 54 was shedding his four-star uniform after more than 30 years of military service, the last five as chief of staff and permanent advocate of a supersonic jet for air power in national defense strategy.

Ironically, he was stepping down after a dramatic, losing struggle against the Eisenhower administration's decision to reduce the air force from 143 to 120 wings. Vandenberg had fought the 143-wing goal through joint chiefs of staff in late 1951.

President Eisenhower, whose name headed the list of almost 600 distinguished officials, officers and foreign attaches invited to the farewell review did not plan to attend.

Nor did Defense Secretary Charles Wilson nor Deputy Secretary Roger M. Kyes.

Succeeding Vandenberg, whose term on the joint chiefs ended Tuesday, was Gen. Nathan F. Twining. Other members of the new team of joint chiefs, including the chairman, will take over Aug. 16.

In his last official act before retiring, the military parade and flying of jet fighters and bombers at Bolling air force base here, Vandenberg sent a message to all air force units exhorted them to pursue "the unfinished task of building adequate air power for the security of our nation." He said that security "is threatened as never before."

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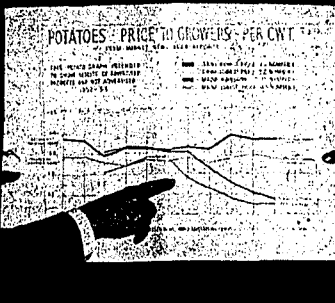
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### Chart Shows Idaho Potato Price Trends

### Eastern Markets Waiting for Idaho Potatoes; Expert Says

Sounding an optimistic note for the coming year, C. G. Rice, field representative for the Idaho advertising commission, told a small meeting at the Twin Falls Grange hall Monday night eastern markets are waiting for the new crop of russet potatoes.

Outlining the history of potatoes in this country and how they became the top crop in the state, the first Burbank russet was grown in Idaho in 1877 and shipped to California. To the surprise of the growers, the spuds brought \$1 when the standard price at the time was 50 cents.

From that start, the state's potato industry has grown to where it brings a 60-million dollar income to Idaho producers. That was the income brought in by last year's crop which Rice termed the best in the history of the state.

He told the commission's efforts to open up new market areas for Idaho producers and how the plan has succeeded the last few years, especially in the southeastern section of the nation.

Rice also noted Idaho farmers lost more than a million dollars last year by shipping smaller-sized potatoes. Even so, Idaho's spuds outdo Maine and Colorado spuds on eastern markets although the other potatoes were larger in size.

He reason, he said, is the years of advertising which has made Idaho the No. 1 potato state so far as most housewives are concerned.

### President, Solon Discuss Refugee Plan at Ceremony

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—President Eisenhower today discussed his proposal to admit 240,000 European refugees with Sen. Pat McCarran, D., Nev., an outspoken foe of the measure.

Mr. Eisenhower talked privately with McCarran for about five minutes before a White House ceremony in which the President signed a bill to provide for naturalization of aliens who have served in the U. S. armed forces since outbreak of the Korean war.

McCarran has been instrumental in delaying senate judiciary committee action on the refuge bill. He told reporters after his talk with the President that "just the general subject" of hiking immigration quotas was discussed.

### Judge Backs End To Pact on Hops

SPOKANE, June 30 (AP)—America lacks jurisdiction, Federal Judge Sam Driver Monday dismissed an action brought by several Yakima Valley hop growers to prevent Secretary of Agriculture Benson from ending a federal marketing agreement for west coast hops.

Judge Driver said the secretary is empowered by congress to terminate the agreement. The marketing pact affects 30,000 tons of hops grown in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and California. It is scheduled to end Wednesday.

The court action was brought by several Yakima area growers who contended a four-state referendum which led to the order revoking the agreement was not valid because it did not represent more than 50 per cent of the hop producers.

### Meeting Called

The transfer was approved last week by the state highway board. It involves half the \$200,000 fund for the Enaville-Murray road in Shoshone county and all \$50,000 for U. S. highway 10 through Coeur d'Alene area.

The money was transferred for construction of eight miles of the state and state highway east of Orofino.

Chamber Secretary Ryle M. Walker said, "From what we learn, the Orofino Chamber of Commerce, which is vitally concerned with the completion of the highway, was contacted."

### Gamma Globulin Offers Relief, If Not Cure, to Polio Victims

NEW YORK, June 30 (AP)—Gamma globulin, one of the many compounds of blood, contains antibodies with which the body fights off invasions of disease-causing micro-organisms such as viruses.

When foreign bodies get in, the body reacts chemically to protect itself. It manufactures antibodies which are tailor-made to knock off the particular invader and none other. These appear in huge quantities in the blood stream and after the invader is routed, they remain in the blood for a long time.

Polio can be considered three diseases, not one, because it is caused by three different micro-organisms or viruses. The antibodies which protect against one, are no good against the other two, all three viruses are extremely inefficient as disease-causers.

Hardly one person in a thousand who is invaded by one or another has polio so you could recognize it. Nevertheless, the invasion produces antibodies which are in the blood stream for many years, perhaps for the life of the person, but being so many thousands upon thousands of these carriers of

antibodies against polio micro-organisms, it was reasoned that if you took their blood and mixed it all together, as is done in the Red Cross blood pools, and then extracted the gamma globulin from the pool, you'd have a substance containing with anti-bodies to all three of the polio micro-organisms.

This was demonstrated in 1941 and 1952 when this gamma globulin was injected into 7,386 children in polio epidemic areas.

During the first week after injection, it seemed to give the children little or no protection. But those who got polio had very mild cases, as though the "borrowed" anti-bodies had affected the incubation of the polio micro-organisms which were already in their bodies.

The protection seemed at its height during the second week and continued high through the third, fourth, and fifth weeks. Thereafter, it diminished rapidly. It did not always work 100 per cent, but the relatively few children who developed polio anyway, had mild, non-paralytic cases.

### U. S. Orders 'Red Aid Halt'

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—The treasury department yesterday forbade any person in this country to take part in trade of strategic goods between communist countries and other nations.

Previous rules banned Americans from shipping strategic goods from this country to a country in the Soviet bloc, but the new American laws have not been barred from having a hand in supplying strategic goods to communist country from a third country.

The new order specifically prohibits persons in the United States from purchasing or selling, or arranging the purchase or sale, of commodities in this country to be used for ultimate shipment to the Soviet bloc, where the transaction would be inconsistent with the controls on this country and of strategic foreign nations.

Violations of the order are punishable by a \$10,000 fine and 10 years in jail.

### Senator Declares Democrats Ready For Row on TV

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D., N. M., said last night Democrats are "delighted" to fight Eisenhower for the Tennessee valley authority "creeping socialism" and are ready to carry the issue to the people.

Anderson is ready to go down the mat on the question of TVA, he said in a radio interview. "That suits us to the hilt."

He added Democrats want "to spend money all over the country on great projects that the biggest laws between Republicans and Democrats in the Eisenhower administration are the question of the Tennessee valley authority. Anderson said government-built dams, with their power output and other benefits, are essential to the elimination of prosperity."

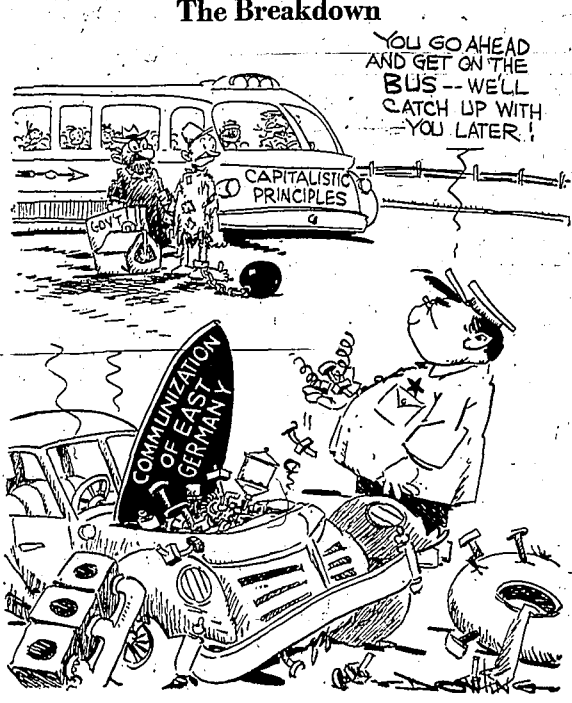

### Naturalization of Alien Vets Passed

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—President Eisenhower signed into law Tuesday a bill allowing speedy naturalization of alien veterans at least 90 days in the United States armed forces since the outbreak of the Korean war.

The bill extends to Korean veterans the same citizenship privileges granted citizens since in the American armed forces during World War II. It applies to service up to July 1, 1953.

Approximately 1,000 alien veterans, many of them now in Korea, are affected.

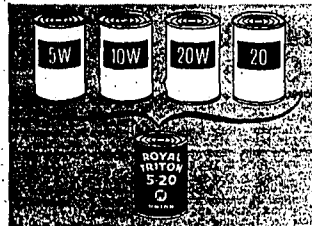

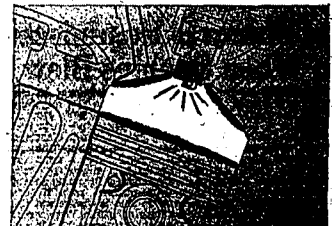
