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## Injuries Are Fatal to Man In Auto Crash Near Eden

ROME, July 1.—Henry J. Nordmeyer, 43, Rupert, became Magic Valley's 13th traffic fatality when he died in St. Benedict's hospital here about 10 p.m. Tuesday of injuries received earlier when the truck he was driving overturned on highway 25 about six miles west of Eden. Nordmeyer's death was 79th in the state this year compared to 74 at the same time in 1952. The toll for the valley is the same as at this time last year. It was Jerome county's second fatality death.

Deputy Sheriff Gordon Newby who investigated the accident with Jerome County Sheriff Pat Burns said Nordmeyer was alone in a 1951 Ford pickup truck which he had been driving eastward on highway 25 when the vehicle, owned by Union Pacific railroad, was used by the railroad's electrical department, Rupert, Newby said.

Newby said the truck apparently came around a curve, hit some gravel and overturned. He said the right side of the truck was back to the left side where it flipped over and rolled twice. It rolled over and skidded, Newby said. No other vehicles were involved.

Death was caused by an injury to Mr. Nordmeyer's lungs.

Mr. Nordmeyer was born Feb. 11, 1909, at Sterling, Neb. He married Gladys Catasta at Cheyenne, Neb., in 1935. They have two sons, Arthur and Robert, and a daughter, Mrs. Gertrude Raths.

He worked for the Union Pacific in 1941. He was an employee of the Union Pacific railroad.

Surviving are his widow, one son, Donald, 19, of Idaho Falls; one daughter, Arthur Nielsen, Boston; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Gertrude Raths; "Acqua," four grandchildren; his mother, Mrs. Louis Nordmeyer; Lincoln, Neb.; his wife's parents; two brothers, Lincoln, and two sisters, Mrs. Minnie Barthous Lincoln; and Mrs. Sophie Almon, Firth.

ON THE WESTERN FRONT, Korea, July 1 (UPI)—The soldier wore his helmet cocked to one side and was asked if that was the right angle with the loose-jointed swagger of a wisecracker.

When he saw the press jeep draw alongside, his face twisted into continual pain.

"Is the war over yet?" he yelled, and then roared with laughter.

A Korean armistice was a joke to him, he said, because he was still in action. It was a slightly bitter joke, for many—but they turned to laughter.

"They even cut out all combat panels for a while," said Sgt. Elwin E. Maxwell, 25, of Los Angeles, Calif., who was sent to Korea to cut down the casualties. Now we're going back to combat patrols again," he said.

Maxwell was one of the guilty in-voiced in the Korean armistice. He was one of the last to leave the front.

"It's funny," he said. "They're shooting hell out of the ROKs, but we're not getting a thing."

Then he grinned. "They didn't want to fight us, but they'll fight with me," he said. "Let 'em shoot ROKE."

## TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON.** The revolutions of widespread popular uprisings will be the communists' answer to a sharp re-orientation of Washington's policy toward the Kremlin's dictators, as distinct from the oppressed Russian and satellite peoples.

An Eisenhower-Dixie program of eventual lib-

eration will supplant the Truman-Acheson-Kennan program of "containment" and building positions

of strength through military expansion.

It is necessary to "save the free world

from engulfment in 1948, a mortal

political threat to break the politi-

cally grip on all 100,000,000

upheavals needed now."

**May Tasks**

**INVITED COMMUNIST INVA-**SION? The idea of "containment" or "co-existence" with their official allies never had any appeal or influence on the communists. They were invited to make their revolution. To them it satisfied Western acquiescence in their malignant imprisonment by Moscow's tyrants and their secret police-military stooges.

It meant our acceptance of incarceration for them.

We can remain free, or work a work-

shop, while the Kremlin's back is turned.

Dean Acheson dominated the other frontiers that we would defend, it appeared to them that we had turned the lock in their dungeon door. It also invited "communist invasion of South Korea."

**VIREK ADVOCATES "LIBERATION"** — President Eisenhower sensed the difference in the two approaches when he advocated "liberation" during the campaign, presumably with his eye on certain racial minorities.

## Industries to Buy Again on Open Market

**WASHINGTON**—July 1—The administration has given the go-ahead to the defense production of iron steel, copper, aluminum and other industrial materials that have been government-controlled for more than two years.

Government officials said there were materials supplies will be available and that now they can be produced again.

The administration delayed months ago that by July 1 material supplies would be sufficient to meet all military needs. But the administration decided to continue allocations and priority controls only for military and atomic energy production requirements from today.

The administration department says it retains several hundred employees of the national production authority to handle the remaining materials controls. Officials already are working on plans to end controls.

## Town in High Owyhee Mountains Now Mere Shadow of Gold Boom Day Glory

The remains of this old post office occupy the corner across from the open bar. South across the street behind the post office block is the saloon. What used to be the "head" of the town is now a mere wreath of front and made of native stone and concrete.

Climbing on this wreath

climbs toward with the activity of a day commerce you look around. North across the narrow canyon is a still impressive wooden building. Its Masonic emblem shows proudly high on the front. On the opposite hill is an ornate mansion—it is severely weather-beaten now. A neat, painted house sits in front to one side. To the right stop another fine equally weather-beaten church. It's a corner and there you are.

The trip over the route is an experience in itself. Take it in daylight, the road is not suited for night driving.

You can gaze over thousands of acres of country in Idaho. They appear to have been disturbed by man. But closer inspection reveals trails here and there.

Cattle and horses are in those areas. Mountain sheep in those areas. Sheep herder. Mountain explorers. Hikers. And the adventurous ride horses along those trails just for fun.

To reach the high road with its switchbacks, eight travel south from Mountain Home past the Air force base, turn right past Grandview to Murphy. That's where you get off the highway. From there the trip is easier. Murphy, now the "Owyhee" county seat, is reached on hard-surfaced state highway 40. But you still have the mountains to cross from there. You miss the high mountain

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## Release of Catholic Cardinal Believed Forthcoming in Soviet Peace Campaign

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 1.—Many Catholics here believe Bishop Cardinal Mindszenty, prisoner of the Hungarian government for treason, will be freed before long.

This hope rests upon the rickety hoping that Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito's release, Archbishop József Mindszenty, prisoner of the Hungarian government for treason, will be soon if they are to cure the severe living conditions that it would make a good impression upon the Hungarian people in their current Soviet peace offensive.
