Care of Your Children

Lorrie is 4. He has a friend the same age and they play together daily. Their mothers are friends and both try to bring up their small sons in ways that will be helpful when they go forth into the big world.

One morning Lorrie was called in for his 10 o'clock milk. He made loud noises drinking, quite unusual. After he had done this repeatedly his mother said: "Lorrie, that is not the nice way to drink your milk. You need not make that noise. Drink nicely as you have done before."

"Shut up!" said Lorrie. He looked over the top of his glass to see what effect these words would have on his mother.

"Why, Lorrie," said his mother, "nobody talks like that to anybody, let alone his mother."

"Yes they do. Jimmie does. I heard him."

"You did? I'm surprised. It is naughty. If that is the way Jimmie talks you better keep away from him. You stay in your own yard this morning—no playing with Jimmie!"

Later both mothers conferred. Each small boy had tried the same "experiment." The mothers laughed. The culprits were freed and soon they ran joyfully off to play. Whether or not they talked over the results of their experiment, we don't know.

What we do know is that every youngster at one time or another will spring a new phrase, a new word, with accompanying gestures, that sometimes stuns their parents. It is best always to be calm when reproving a child. What the youngster expects is a dramatic response. Cheat him of it and his effort falls flat.

It is unwise, in my experience, to punish a child by wasting his mouth out with brown soap because he used a bad word. That only makes the offense too important and may result in his repeating the objectionable word somewhere when it would attract more attention. Nobody ought to spank a child for such an experiment. Discipline falls of its intent and often works contrary to expectations. Calm disapproval, a rebuke and a stern look discourage the child from repeating his "experiment."

Price of Food Hikes During Three Weeks

WASHINGTON, July 6.—The bureau of labor statistics reported today that retail food prices climbed 1.9 per cent during the three weeks to June 15, led by higher prices for meats and fresh fruits and vegetables.

The bureau said the largest increase was for fresh fruits and vegetables, with cabbage prices rising 49.9 per cent, celery 37.4 per cent, tomatoes 33.3 per cent and oranges 15.7 per cent.

Meats, poultry and fish advanced 1.7 per cent. Pork stayed the largest rise with bacon prices up .68 per cent, and ham up .48 per cent.

On June 15, the bureau said, food prices were seven-tenths of one per cent below a year ago, and 1.2 per cent above mid-June, 1950.

The bureau also reported that wholesale prices of all items fell 1.2 of one per cent in the week ended June 30.

In that period, farm products declined as prices for fresh fruits and vegetables, cattle and hogs fell off. The drop put the wholesale index at 106.4 per cent of 1947-49 prices. During the week, prices for petroleum products, pig iron and hides increased slightly.
