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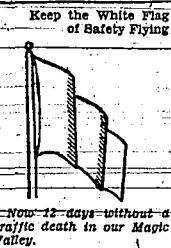

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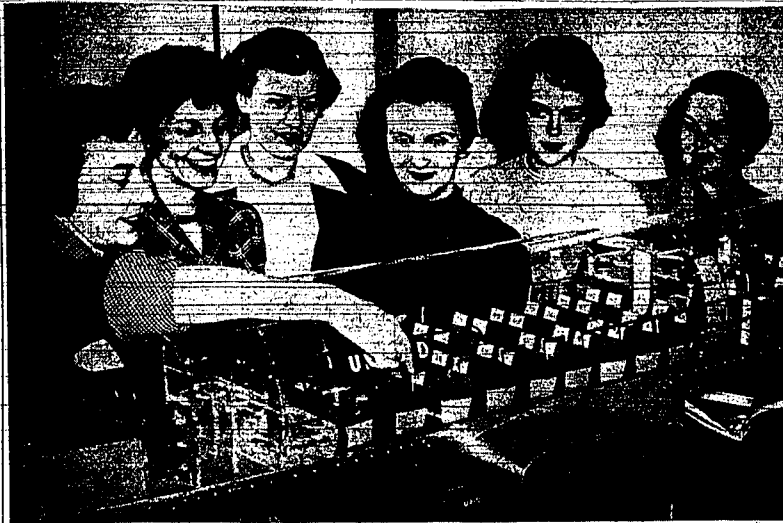

MOSCOW, July 12.—The Communist party newspaper Pravda said today party members on all levels were approving measures to "liquidate" former Security Minister Lavrenty Beria's "anti-party and anti-state activity."

The newspaper attacked "one-man" decisions and said the principle of "collective leadership" must apply to all party levels, from the present cell to the central committee of the Soviet union.

"Decisions by one man are almost always one-sided," Pravda said in a front-page editorial.

The newspaper reported that virtually all party organizations and municipal, district and republican committees representing some seven million members met in plenary sessions during the past few days to discuss Beria's traitorous activities.

"The party teaches that only the collective political experience and collective wisdom of the central committee, relying on the scientific foundations of Marxism-Leninism, can insure the correct leadership of the country and the unshakable solidarity of its ranks and the successful construction of communism."

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Experts Aver Beria Seized By Red Army

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—U.S. State Department today said it believed that Joseph V. Beria, Russia's second most powerful man and its secret police chief, had been seized by the Red Army.

Leading bits of evidence together, State Department officials think Beria was seized about 5 p.m. Saturday, June 27, for the purpose of tanks and rifles soldiers arrayed for his destruction, it is believed.

But it was the thunder of tanks and truckloads of troops along Moscow's Sadovaya boulevard, about 10 miles from the Kremlin in the Paris neighborhood of Beria's home, which first gave the tipoff to State Department that something was up.

Aside from the drama of the arrest, the time of June 27 is important, for it was the day of the arrest, it gives a date for checking actions of the Russian government to determine whether policy changes may flow from Beria's arrest. The big three western foreign ministers, meeting here, have tentatively agreed that Premier Joseph Stalin may abandon the policy of going back to a tougher line now that Beria is out of the way.

But like almost everything else about Russia this is speculation. State Department officials said today that what has happened since June 27 offers as much evidence that the Russians are going on with their "new offensive" instead of changing.

Mumfry Avers U. S. 'Unpopular'

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—Secretary of the Treasury Mumfry said Saturday that Americans have become so unpopular in some countries that "they don't even want to see us."

People have developed a "very strong nationalistic spirit," Mumfry said in an interview.

He said Americans would have to be patient until others learned that "we don't want to rob them, that we want to do a help."

Surprise Eruptions of Alaska Volcanoes May Cool Off Earth

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Alaska's surprise volcanic eruptions will cool the earth off slightly, weather experts predicted today.

"They might even do something to the northern hemisphere's rain-snow pattern in the next year or so, depending on their magnitude," Dr. Sigmond Prytz of the weather bureau's scientific services division said.

"This is due primarily," he said, to the sun-absorbing effect of huge quantities of volcanic dust spewed into the atmosphere and carried around the earth by high wind currents.

In the year after the great Krakatoa eruption of 1883 in Indonesia, the world's mean temperature fell six-tenths of a degree below the normal average.

After the 1912 eruption of Mt. Katmai, the world average "dropped three-tenths of a degree below normal. Since the world mean had been half a degree above normal at the time of the eruption, the real temperature drop was eight-tenths of a degree.

Both Krakatoa and Katmai were tremendous eruptions — Krakatoa's the greatest of recorded history. It is too early to tell whether the new Alaskan blowups will come close to rivaling either of them, although it appears unlikely.

Measurements taken at Montpelier, France, show that as long as two years after Krakatoa blew its top, solar radiation was only 76 per cent of normal.

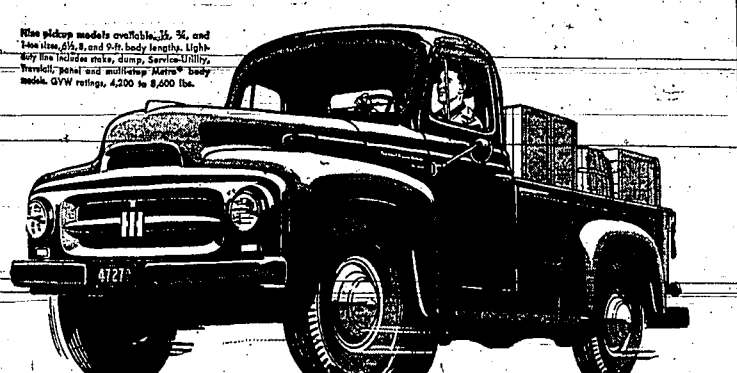

Hells Canyon Controversy Stand Earns McKay Reputation for Forthrightness

By the time the Hells Canyon controversy is decided, Douglas McKay will have made only one major policy decision, but it has earned him the reputation of being one of the most forthright men in President Eisenhower's cabinet.

When Mr. Eisenhower nominated from Lyon to head the Bureau of Mines, McKay also became the first top-level member of the Republican administration to feel the wrath of John L.
