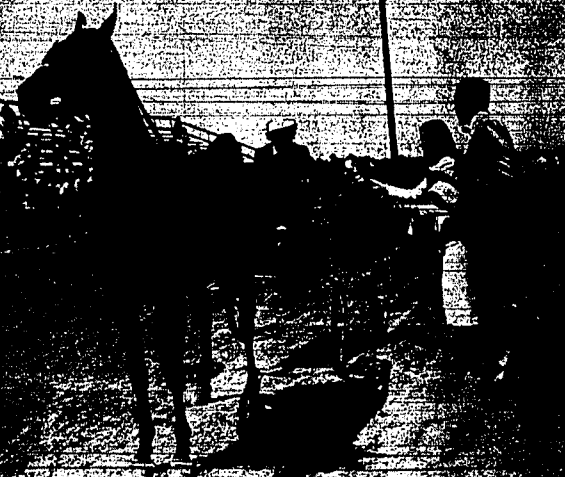

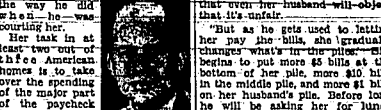

Langlie Flays
Federal Plans
On Big Dams

YACIMA, July 15.—Gov. Arthur B. Langlie today flayed the federal dam program, calling it a "water-fall" and a "federal dam construction scramble."

In a speech at the Washington State Federation of Labor convention, Langlie said some federal bureau had laid out programs to spend hundreds of millions on dam construction where even their own engineers can't agree.

Prime Example

"Hells canyon dam, of all these projects, Langlie said, is a case where a lot of money would be spent with very poor results."

The governor attacked the federal power program after leaders of the AFL group in that north-west state had praised the government project.

Practical Projects

Just before Langlie spoke, Executive Secretary J. P. Marx of the Oregon State Federation of Labor declared in a speech:

"Those people who are out supporting the Idaho Power company in building a series of low dams on Snake river instead of a single dam at the mouth of the river, are supporting a government-constructed high dam which are doing a disservice to the citizens of that state who they happen to reside in."

Curbs Placed
On New Help
To Cattlemen

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—Agriculture Secretary Benson said today that cattlemen who have the "reasonable chance of working out their difficulties" will be eligible for federal loan guarantees.

He said "established" producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats who cannot get government credit elsewhere will be able to apply. He rules out help for those just "going into" the livestock business or those in commercial feed lot operations.

Benson made the statement yesterday after President Eisenhower signed legislation rushed through congress to expand disaster relief facilities of the agriculture department to help out drought-hit farmers in the southwest.

The legislation will allow the department to make loans to cattlemen and ranchers in or out of the drought area and to farmers caught in a price-squeeze and facing economic disaster.

It also provides that in future disasters, the department would be able to pay for emergency aid to the affected area without waiting for a grant from the President's emergency fund.

Disaster relief for cattle loans are expected from drought-stricken states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Arizona. But the cattle loans are not limited to those areas.

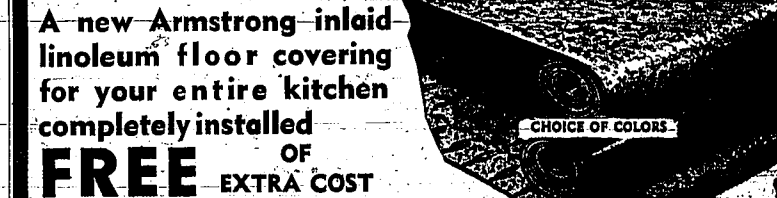

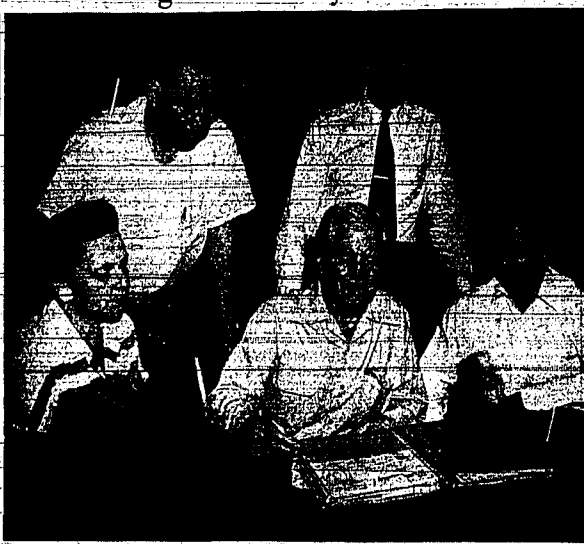

New Law Cleaning up State's Packing Houses, Officer Says

BOISE, July 15 (AP)—Your chances of getting diseased meat at an Idaho butcher shop are "considerably less" now than two months ago, says State Veterinarian A. P. Schneider.

Most of the state's packing houses are complying with the compulsory inspection law passed by the 1953 legislature, he said, and the state will start cracking down on those who aren't in compliance by Aug. 1.

"We could have closed 80 per cent of the packing houses when the law went into effect May 6 if we'd wanted to," he said. "The situation was desperate."

"But we've been very lenient to date because we're having to rectify 50 years of neglect."

Worst, some 15 packing plants came under state inspection for the first time, he said, about two out of 10 were in "pretty good shape."

Conditions at the other eight ranged all the way from failure to provide sanitary toilets to floors and tables, no screens, pools of stagnant blood and water, offal dumped outside and exposed to flies, and contaminated waste supplies. Those conditions still exist at a few plants.

In addition to poor sanitary conditions, he said, some uninspected plants were selling meat from diseased animals.

"Now, at least we have an inspector in most of them," he said. Sanitarians in the state health department make the inspections. If they fail to okay a plant, the bureau of animal industry, headed by Schneider, refuses to inspect the meat. Once a plant is approved by the sanitarian, an inspector checks the animals before and after slaughter.

To date, the only penalty for non-compliance has been withholding of the state inspection stamp.

However, Schneider said the plants have had time now to meet the sanitary requirements. Those who show no signs of complying by next month, he said, may be charged under the law with a misdemeanor. The penalty is a \$300 fine and 30 days in jail, or both.

U. S. Commissioner Howard V. Galvinsky, who ordered her held on charges of illegally wearing a military uniform and set bail at \$1,000, declared:

"This is a most peculiar case—most unusual."
