

### Western Road Experts to Reap Harvest Of Engineering Data From Washo Strip

Testing at the Washo road test section, near Malad is beginning to bear fruit. Anticipated failures in the roadbed, from which much valuable information is being obtained, are beginning to appear. Special deflection studies and other preliminary tests on the Washo road were completed early in June and on June 11, the regular traffic was started. Truck loads with tandem axles loaded to 20,000 and 40,000 pounds per pair of axles operate over varying thicknesses of subbase and pavement. The tests are being conducted by the Federal Highway Administration, which is conducting the research under the guidance of a committee made up of representatives of the cooperating states and other interested groups. The project promises to provide useful and much needed answers to many of the perplexing problems facing highway and tax administrators, as well as motor truck operators, vehicle manufacturers and other groups in the highway transportation industry. ### ROK Army Good, But Couldn't Fight Alone, Advisers Believe

CENTRAL FRONT, Korea, July 24.—Chinese communist troops in the recent Central Front offensive convinced many American officers the South Korean army could not fight alone. The Chinese drive, which forced the ROK's back as much as 10 miles at one point, showed up the inexperience of the young army, observers noted. The ROK army, it was too much for such a young army, one American officer said. The withdrawal might have turned into a rout if the Chinese had kept coming south. President Syngman Rhee repeatedly has threatened to send his 16 divisions north in a drive to the Yalu river. He may order such a campaign if a post-armistice political conference fails to unify Korea peacefully in 90 days of talking. But American advisory officers attached to ROK units believe the South Koreans would have their hands full if they tried to attack the numerically superior Chinese. Without American airpower, artillery and supplies, the ROK army would be particularly vulnerable to a mass counter-attack, the American officials said. Other said the ROK army, in the recent upset, showed several weaknesses, including:  
1. Lack of experienced officers  
2. Indifference of ROK staff officers to paper work of any sort.  
3. Unfamiliarity with armor, artillery and airpower support.  
4. Possible lack of confidence of officers because of the presence of American advisers.  
The South Korean army has nothing to be ashamed of, an American officer said. "The mistakes have been honest mistakes; soldiers are as brave as any of them when they get into combat, and are very good."



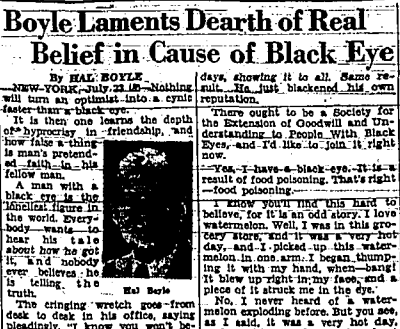

### Boyle Laments Dearth of Real Belief in Cause of Black Eye

NEW YORK, July 25 (AP)—Nothing new about an optimist into a cynic faster than a black eye.

The cringing wretch goes from dead to dark in his office, saying pleadingly, "I know you won't believe this; but I bumped into this door in the dark, and—"

And sure nobody will believe him. Nobody really listens to his words. Everyone insists on taking him at his face value—and a black eye is universally regarded as a sign of guilt.

When you have a black eye no one sends you flowers. No one has sympathy enough to ask, "Did it hurt?" All you hear are the time-worn clichés:

"Next time I guess you'll learn to duck."

"That ought to teach you to quit pecking through keyholes."

There are many examples in history of black eyes acquired innocently, accidentally, or through gallantry and kindness, such as:

A. You are helping an old lady across the street during a heavy rain, and she slaps you in the eye with her umbrella.

B. You bang your head hurrying to get out of a cab to help your wife alight.

C. You are helping your wife hang a picture, and she drops the hammer on your upturned face—presumably by accident.

"Only minor adjustments of equipment and sagging of the floors remain in the new high school gymnasium," the work is expected to be completed by the end of the week.

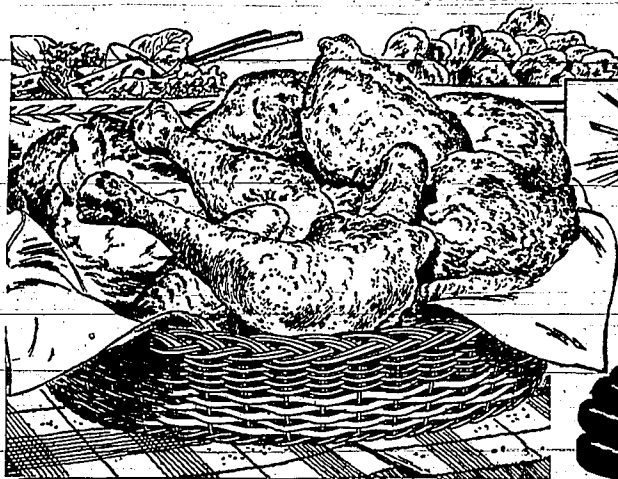

They said the 34 army, navy, air force and marine corps centers were operated to obtain blood to be broken down into derivatives such as plasma, serum, albumen and gamma globulin.

Such substitutes as dextran are less expensive and do not transmit jaundice, officials said. The substitutes, therefore, have proved more acceptable for treatment of shock caused by combat injuries.

Cross has a "demonstrated ability" to meet whole blood requirements of the armed forces. These officials said frequent emergency calls for whole blood of the universal donor type "O" on the west coast are made because shipments for the far east originate there. These shipments run about 10,000 pints per month.

Officials said that by relying on Red Cross blood, the defense department expects to meet present and future needs and at the same time save considerable savings in the defense budget.


