### Korea Shipments Tieup Threatened

TOKYO, Aug. 11 (AP)—More than 100,000 Japanese employed by the U. S. military forces threatened today to tie up military shipments to Korea for 48 hours, beginning Wednesday, with a nation-wide strike against a new labor contract offered by the American forces. Two unions claiming a total of 125,000 members in U. S. employ yesterday reaffirmed their decision to call the first national strike against the American forces. Leaders informed labor-minister Kenzaro Kowaka the strike would begin at 6 a.m. Wednesday. The walkout threatened to paralyze loading of military shipments in harbors, military motor pools and shops and offices to a lesser degree work in effect, and distribution of electric power, gas and water supply to military installations.

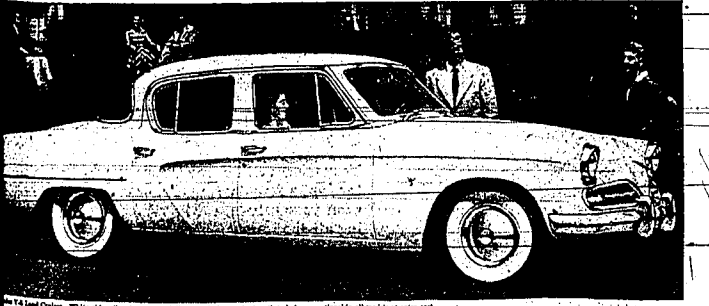

## Few Real Trims in Federal Spending Seen by Leaders as Result of Truce

Editor's note: This is the second of three articles on the home-front situation in the Korean truce.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Treasury and congressional leaders say: Don't look for any early or appreciable cut in government spending this year as a result of the Korean truce.

The picture could be different in the second half of 1954, if there is peace then, even a shaky peace, congress can be expected to trim defense spending below present levels.

How much is anybody's guess. But the reduction won't carry the defense budget back to where it was before the Korean war.

Assistant Defense Secretary William J. McNair predicts defense spending can be cut only one billion dollars in the next 12 months, even if "things settle down and the truce is firm."

That would drop defense spending to about 42 billion dollars in the fiscal year.

But even the anticipated defense budget cut of 1954, if there is peace in 1954, would be made up of the next 12 or 16 months by costs of rehabilitating Korea and building up the Korean army.

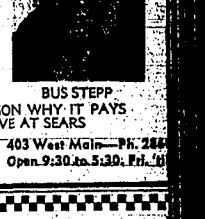

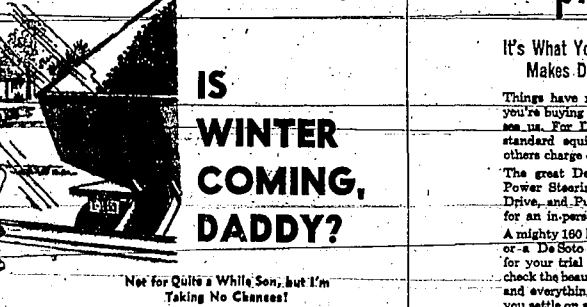

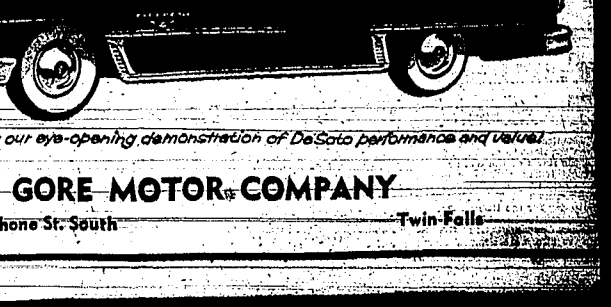

The regulations will give the flyways their longest season since 1945. Interior Secretary McKay announced the 1953-54 basic regulations and individual shooting dates for the individual states are to be chosen by them and announced later.

States generally may choose their hunting days anytime between Oct. 1 and Jan. 10, based on the number of days allotted the flyways in which they lie.

The 1953-54 flyway will have a 76-day consecutive season or two periods of 34 days each. This increase of five days over last year, McKay said, "represents an attempt to alleviate an acute depression problem on both grain and grazing areas."

McKay said the new regulations eliminate the "one-half mile" clause from the no-belt regulation, but added that the regulation essentially remains in prior years. For two years the regulation has prohibited shooting within one-half mile of a baited area.

Director John L. Parry of the fish and wildlife service, when asked for an explanation, said in a statement: "Dropping the half-mile provision is not intended to soften the law; shooting migratory birds by use of bait is still outlawed."

Hunting hours for ducks, geese, and other waterfowl are liberalized on all flyways in the new regulations to allow shooting until sunset. The starting time of one-half hour before sunrise remains the same as last year. On the opening day of the season, hunting hours are extended to one-half hour before sunrise, the same as last year.

Shooting hours for woodcock are extended to one-half hour before sunrise, the same as last year. The "no-belt" regulation, which prohibits shooting within one-half mile of a baited area, is also liberalized. The regulation is extended to one-half hour before sunrise, the same as last year.

Bag and possession limits for ducks have each been increased from 6 to 7, plus 4 pintails or woodcock in possession, singly or in combination. For geese, bag and possession limits remain at 2. For waterfowl, the possession limit has been raised on Oct. 10 to 10, and on Dec. 1 to 10.
