Wheat Farmers Vote Solid Quota of Wheat Crop

Marketing curbs on the nation's 1954 wheat crop won solid approval among wheat farmers who cast ballots on the issue Friday. Unofficial tabulation by the Twin Falls office of the vote in eight valley counties—Blaine, Camas, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka and Twin Falls—showed 85 per cent of the supported the quota program. The vote was 1,413 for the proposal, 242 against it.

Some 84 ballots were challenged, too few to sway the verdict.

Quotas required a two-thirds vote in the nationwide referendum, and got support of about 90 per cent of the farmers. By approximately equal numbers gave federal support of the crop at 50 per cent of partly.

Breakdown of the vote by counties gave Twin Falls, 487 for, 102 against, 39 challenges; Blaine, 102 for, 11 against, two challenges; Camas, 102 for, 10 against, Gooding, 106 for, 12 against, 12 challenges; Cassia, 176 for, 30 against, 11 challenges; Jerome, 102 for, 24 against, one challenge; Lincoln, 124 for, 25 against; Minidoka, 85 for, 10 against, 10 challenges.

Opposition to the proposal varied widely, but only in the district of Blaine-Jerome. There, the vote fell to a 50-50 tie. There, the polls listed 16 votes for, 12 against and 10 challenges in Portland. Blaine and Wood river district farmers of Blaine county favored the program but challenged the figure about 42-31.

In every county the vote carried by a substantial margin. On a national basis, the vote was 70-30 in favor of the program and 67-33 against it.

In Blaine county, which is not tabulated in the survey district, the vote was 100-30 for the program and 33 against it.

The national scale, the support ratio of wheat, 90 per cent of party, amounts to \$2.71 per bushel. It is \$2.71 per bushel.

Twin Falls, Blaine, Camas and Gooding are bracketed at \$1.85, Blaine and Camas at \$1.85 and Emory at \$2.01. These prices are computed at \$1.85 per cent of party, less freight, costs to farmers.

Emory county farmers have a slight advantage because their wheat is marketed in Portland. Other valley farmers send their wheat to San Francisco and Kansas City.

Wheat Pledges Fair Wheat Quota System

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture William L. French today announced that he had approved the wheat quota control program they have voted for in an "equitable and constructive manner."

French has indicated in the past a preference for a approach to farm-surplus problems, issued this week of cooperation.

French's nationwide referendum showed that wheat farmers favored strict marketing control in the 1954 crop year.

French said he would support the program, but he would not try to force it on farmers who do not want it.

Averages Dip For Butterfat In Herd Tests

Butterfat production averages for the 13 herds of the Twin Falls county Dairy Herd Improvement association dropped below previous summer months during July; announced C. W. Dalish, Twin Falls county agent.

Nine purebred Holstein cows, all milked, owned by L. J. Tenckhoff, Twin Falls, were the association's high butterfat producing herd, averaging 50.5 pounds of butterfat per cow from 1,591 pounds of milk.

Six grade Holstein cows, all milked, owned by John Ortel, Piler, produced an average of 49.3 pounds of butterfat.

Other herds averaging over 40 pounds of butterfat were those of Jack Gentry, Twin Falls, with 25 cows of mixed breeds averaging 43.2 pounds and 10 registered Holsteins, one of which was dry, owned by M. P. Wellhausen, Hansen, averaging 41.4 pounds of butterfat.

The high butterfat producing cow in unit I was a cross-bred Guernsey-Holstein owned by Daniel Kauffman, Piler, which produced 63 pounds of butterfat from 1,680 pounds of milk.

High cow in unit II was a purebred Holstein owned by M. Z. Stansbury, Twin Falls, producing 32.7 pounds of butterfat from 2,260 pounds of milk.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

LITEN MY CHILDREN

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

As I see the line-up and the activities of our central intelligence agency in Europe, the American Union is permitting David Dubsinsky to use this mysterious "former" Communist agent as a tool.

In fact, Britain went socialist on her own initiative under the anti-socialism of the Labour Party. Dubsinsky and his group were not socialist but were using the term to gain sympathy.

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ECONOMY SHOULD NOT HURT

Even in these days, when a man in Washington can say "thanks a billion" as easily as anything, 13 billion dollars is no sum to take casually. And that's the amount President Eisenhower and Congress together have just passed for new federal appropriations.

Of this reduction, the Eisenhower administration accounted for nine-billion-dollars, and Congress the rest. Their combined efforts reduced a 19 per cent slash in the total of money voted for the fiscal year, which starts this July 1.

Moreover, these cuts were accomplished by an administration which had to study and use the entire national budget—inssofar it could—in the interval between Jan. 20, when Mr. Eisenhower took office, and Aug. 3, an adjournment date of this congressional session.

For all this considerable effort, the government looks ahead to a deficit this year of several billion dollars. Consequently, the deficit led he could not wisely undertake reductions now. His hope is, of course, that further budget savings will allow tax raising next year.

These results have not satisfied a group of Mr. Eisenhower's fellow Republicans, to believe that a balanced budget and low taxes should have been possible in 1953. Many of these are worried about being accused of falling down on their promises.

Other men would support this position but the further argument that our security is at stake. They believe the question at hand is "what will this cut do to a world-wide fabric of our defenses?"

Economy is a notable goal. But evidently the GOP governors are in the vanguard of those Americans who feel it must not be practiced at the expense of safety and well-being.

Retirement of Gen. Omar N. Bradley as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff will remove from active duty the last of the World War II five-star generals and admirals.

The present interest is to create no more officers of this rank—unless the United States gets into another full-scale shooting war from now on. For this officer will be as high as they come, in peacetime.

When Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway was made supreme commander of North Atlantic forces, it was planned to give him five-star status. This was to give him equal standing with Field Marshal Lord Montgomery of the United Kingdom who leads the "junior" command, who were really Ridgway's NATO superiors.

But to give General Ridgway a fifth star would have jumped him over four-star General Mark Clark and J. Lawton Collins. And to B. E. navy and air force would have been at least with officers of equal rank. So the sea had to be dropped.

ADVANCE DECISIONS

But these arrangements had been made in advance by the European advisory commission at London, with the late John C. Winant as the American member. Their decisions were approved, naturally, by Roosevelt.

The council termed the overall government program an important phase in what the cattlemen call their "anti-hunger" efforts which have resulted in price improvements or at least as a "brake" to the downward sliding cattle prices of this spring and summer.
