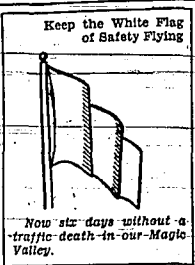

**Key Panel Aimed to Eye Defense Costs**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson announced today the formation of a key panel to study the defense department's financial operations and to make recommendations on how to reduce costs.

The panel, which will attempt to make more effective, streamlined and modernized operations, is headed by Gen. William J. Donovan, former director of the Office of War Relocation Administration and former director of the War Relocation Authority.

Other members of the panel include Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, former director of the Strategic Air Command; Gen. Robert G. Anderson, former director of the Air Force Materiel Command; Gen. James H. Doolittle, former director of the Air Force Systems Command; and Gen. William E. O'Day, former director of the Air Force Research and Development Command.

The panel will report to the defense department in three to four months.

**Fraud Order Against Battery 'Pep' Powder May Be Stopped**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—The order forbade Riche to use the mails to sell or advertise AD-22. It was issued last January on the basis of the bureau of standards' finding that the powder would not be a genuine battery pep powder, AD-22.

A spokesman for the department confirmed that "we are going to have something on AD-22 in the next three or four days." He refused to elaborate.

Riche said he has "reason to believe" the department will officially vacate the fraud order, "suspended" since March 2. He said he regards the impending action as a "vindication" of his product, labeled worthless by the national bureau of standards.

The order forbade Riche to use the mails to sell or advertise AD-22. It was issued last January on the basis of the bureau of standards' finding that the powder would not be a genuine battery pep powder, AD-22.

Commerce Secretary Sinclair Weeks and the senate small business committee went to bat for Riche and the postoffice suspended the fraud order pending further tests.

Weeks then fired Dr. Allen V. Astin as director of the bureau of standards, on the grounds that the bureau had not given AD-22 a fair test. Scientific groups protested this action so vehemently Weeks agreed to let Astin remain at his post until a committee of prominent scientists could investigate the bureau's operations in general and its findings on AD-22 in particular.

The committee of scientists has not yet made its report.

Meanwhile, the senate small business committee conducted public hearings on the dispute. Riche testified that he has testimonials from "thousands" of satisfied customers to support his claim that AD-22 works. Astin, told the senators "exhaustive" scientific tests at the bureau had never confirmed his original finding that AD-22 was a cheap mixture of common chemicals that had little or no worthwhile effect on old batteries.

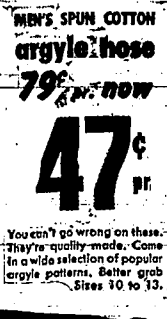

### Over Half of POWs Died, Officer Says

CLOVIS, N. M., Aug. 19 (UP)—Lieut. Thomas Harrison believes that over half of United Nations prisoners captured by communists in Korea died in prison camps.

Harrison, the highest ranking officer released by the Reds so far in operation big switch, blamed the high death rate on "poor and often non-existent medical care for sick and wounded" and on brutal treatment of prisoners.

"After 18 months in camp No. 2, some of the prisoners were still carrying untreated battle wounds and had received in 1950," Harrison said.

Harrison, a jet fighter pilot whose leg was amputated by the Reds only after they put him through weeks of torture and starvation, arrived at his home here on Tuesday.

He is greeted by a band and a crowd estimated at 2,500 persons.

Harrison told newsmen "a very small number of prisoners fell for Communist party line and became progressives in spite of five months of daily classes in communism."

Harrison said, "They said little to me selling for a nickel a head and blamed the government for it."

Harrison had little to say as he stepped from his train, with his family and parents to be greeted by a band and a throng of neighbors here.

"I've been treated like a very important person," he commented. But after two years in prison I don't have any feelings left."

### Indiana GI Is Facing Tough Task in Reporting on Buddy

INGHON, Korea, Aug. 19 (UP)—A sergeant from Indiana started today on the "most heart-breaking mission in the world." He must tell an anxious mother in New York state her son is now a communist, and won't be coming home.

It would be easier to tell her the boy died in a communist prison camp, Sgt. John G. Johnson, 21, La Porte, Ind., said.

Johnson must tell the unsuspecting mother her son chose to remain with the communists, even though the Chinese commandant urged him to go back to New York.

Defense department policy prevented Johnson from disclosing the prisoner's name.

He made his promise to tell his mother that he wants to go to China and Russia, Johnson said. "I don't know how I'll tell her, but I'll tell her."

Johnson said the prisoner refusing repatriation came from a well-to-do family. Because of this, the New York soldier's insistence on remaining behind embarrassed his Chinese captors.

"The Chinese didn't want him to stay," Johnson said. "He was gone from the company two days in June. When he came back he told me he had been with the regimental commander. The (Chinese) commandant had been telling him he should go home but he wouldn't change."

"He had been in the hospital this spring and early summer. When he got out he was terribly thin. He had tuberculosis."

"He and I were very good friends. He surprised me when he told me what he wanted to do: He was just a 'pro', (communist sympathizer) but not much of one. He was just a kid—about 19."

Johnson said his friend did not know what communism would do to him.

"He wanted to go to China and Russia," Johnson said. "Then he wanted to go to a neutral nation—what the communists call a neutral nation; like Czechoslovakia—and practice communism."

Another man in his company also refused repatriation, Johnson said. "This other guy was pretty smart," he said. "He had studied a lot. He was not a lot older than my friend, but he was very intelligent, more mature."

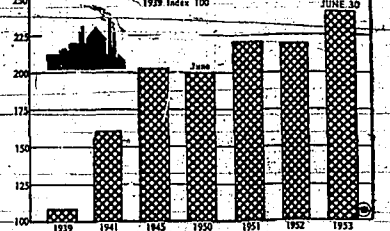

### Export Props On '53 Cotton Are Rejected

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Agriculture Secretary Benson said on Tuesday no export subsidies are planned on the 1953 cotton crop.

Benson issued his announcement in response to "many inquiries" on the possibility of a subsidy. Recalling that he had several months ago the department was not considering a cotton export subsidy, Benson said he was "glad to reaffirm my position on this matter today."

"It is our carefully-considered opinion that an export subsidy is not a solution to our cotton export problem under present conditions," Benson added.

Declining cotton exports have contributed to surpluses now threatening to force Benson to call for production controls on the 1954 crop.

Benson pointed out that this is the beginning of the marketing year, "the time to announce a subsidy for the 1953-54 crop if we were going to have one."

"I hope this statement fully clarifies the department's position on this matter," he said.

The agriculture department's last export cotton subsidy program began in December, 1944, with a subsidy of four cents a pound. The rate was reduced gradually until it reached 10 cents a bale in 1949. The subsidy was eliminated Dec. 20, 1950.

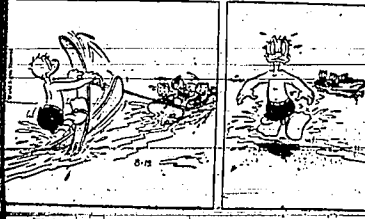
