Soviet Air Power Has Big Range, USAF Aide Says - WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (UP)—Air Force Secretary Harold G. G. Tamm said tonight that Russia has the powerful air force capable of immediate atomic attack on any point in Europe and any point in the United States. "If a nation has enough air power, the danger is not only in the air, but also on the ground," Tamm said. "The association, composed of present or former members of the air force is holding a convention here. Early in the day it asked the administration for a 'clearly announced national policy to unleash the whole force of our atomic power against armed forces of aggression in any future Korean-type communist-adventure.'" A policy statement approved by the association said that only the threat of "immediate decisive military defeat" can prevent Soviet aggression.

Valorem Levy Cut by Idaho Panel

The state levies the ad valorem against the counties on their real valuations, and leaves it up to the commissioners of the counties whether to pass any increase or decrease along to their taxpayers. The annual session of the state board of equalization, the commission set the valuation of 1943 at \$800,000,000. The 1942 valuation was \$750,000,000. The net increase reached \$50,000,000 as a result of a \$908,578 in exemptions allowed power generation and one of \$637,6 in private car companies assessed by the department. The largest increase assessed property among 43 counties which totalled \$2,249,000, in Bonnaville and Bingham also assessed more than a million dollars. Twenty-one counties had decreases, all of them less than a million dollars. The largest decrease was in Blaine, \$1,171,133. The commission lowered the valuation of railroads from \$8,697,700 to \$8,200,000. It also reduced the valuations of grape and Pullman companies.

AEC Planning Arco Reactor Consolidation

IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 22 (UP)—Final negotiations "have been started" to consolidate a number of operations at the national reactor testing station under the management of a single director. L. E. Johnston, manager of the Idaho atomic energy commission operations office, said the negotiations will be carried on by Phillips Petroleum company, Bartlesville, Okla. Phillips will continue to operate the materials testing reactor. In addition it will manage a number of other departments such as chemical processing, nuclear engineering, technical library and document control, warehousing, provisions and property disposal, and reproduction facilities. At present, these operations are under the jurisdiction of American Cyanamid company, New York; Liberty Transportation company, Idaho Falls, and the AEC itself. Johnston said the merger will result in substantial savings, eliminating more than \$250,000 annually in fee and overhead expense alone.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 22 (UP)—Senate majority leader William F. Knowland said today that he is asking here Friday night that the United States should make it clear to other nations that it has a system of collective security they should prove to it. "I know that nations should do it now and not talk about it," said the California senator, who plans to leave San Francisco Sunday by air on a five-day trip to the Orient. Knowland reiterated his intention to press for adoption of a resolution which has introduced in congress from the United Nations and in China is admitted. 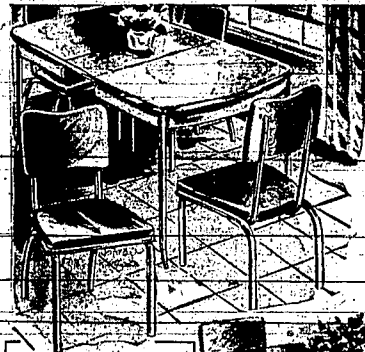

## Repairs Progressing on Local Streets; Program Is Outlined

Repairs and seal-coating of city streets and avenues is progressing pretty much on schedule, reports H. H. Ballenger, city streets and water-department superintendent.

Seal-coating began Monday. Patching and repairing of city roads began several weeks prior to the seal-coating. City crews and equipment are being used for the program.

The project is designed to repair and seal-coat streets and avenues not worked on during a similar program two years ago. Thus far, Eleventh, Tenth, Ninth and Eighth avenues north and east have been seal coated as well as several blocks of Sixth avenue north and east.

Third avenue east from Locust street to Madison street, Highland avenue from Washington street south to Noble street, Teton street, the municipal golf course road and parking area, and Joslin field parking area, all called this year, also will be seal-coated if the weather remains favorable.

Several downtown alleys which were paved two years ago are scheduled for seal coating.

Ballenger reports the program must be completed before fall or delayed until next year. The city street department has until June, 1939, to complete the project.

## Sugar Quota, Pricing Set at London Meet

LONDON, Aug. 22 (AP) — The international sugar conference, in a final agreement late Friday night, assigned Cuba an export quota of 2 1/2 million tons, authoritative sources said today.

The conference fixed a total world export quota of 13,000,000 tons and set the price range at 3.25 to 4.35 cents a pound for raw sugar.

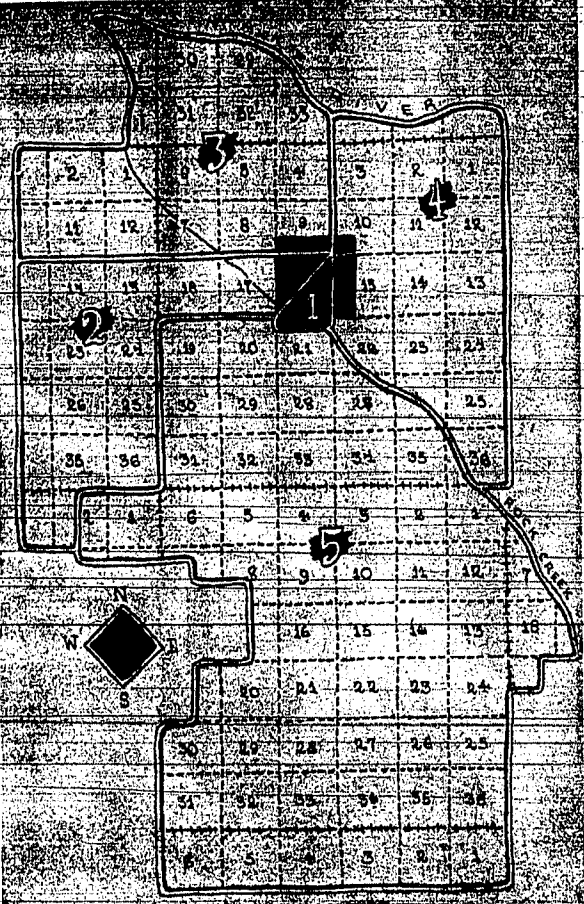

### Galena Area Tree Poison Work Noted

**GOODING, Aug. 22**—A warning that 2,000 trees on south and north Cherry creeks near Galena summit were poisoned with a special soluble form of arsenic early in August was sounded Friday by Vernon Ravencroft of Penta Post company, Tullahoma, Tenn.

The chemical was dyed bright red and applied in a band about eye height from the ground. The procedure is in accordance with experiments conducted by Armstrong Paper company, Virginia; University of Washington, and University of Idaho, Ravencroft said.

Purpose is to reduce weight of 2,000,000 pounds per cord for shipping. Lodge pole pines so treated also may slough off their bark, thus eliminating nesting and enabling a reduction in processing costs for the pine.

Officials of the Southwest national forest approved the experiment and are following it with interest. All hope this will be one more step toward the practical commercial use of lodge-pole pine forests, Ravencroft explained.

Forest officials want campers, especially young people, to know of the presence of poison in the Galena summit area for their protection. Children chewing red colored pine pitch isn't safe if it is on Cherry creek, he added.

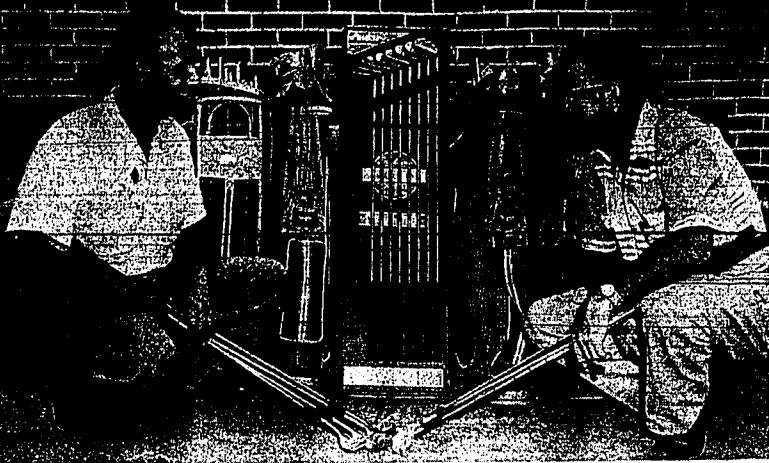

### Kansas City, Like Magic Valley, Fights For Safety on Highways, Tourist Notes

Kansas City has become the scene of a vigorous traffic safety campaign, according to a Kansan who has been visiting in Twin Falls on a vacation trip through the west.

The tourist Mildred Dillon, Kansas City, Mo., said the traffic safety consciousness which now grips Kansas City, Mo., is the outgrowth of mounting tolls of death and damage in highway accidents, the same thing that has sparked traffic safety campaigns in Magic Valley and other parts of the nation.

Kansas City, Mo., has been outstanding on safety records by its outlier neighbors, Kansas City, Kans., and in recent weeks has taken harsh steps in an effort to improve its record, Miss Dillon said.

Alarmed at one of the fastest-mounting road-death tolls in its history, Kansas City, Missouri's second largest city, has cracked down sharply on violators of speed limits. Miss Dillon said that in the past week alone she saw 150 violators, and it was as if there were "no speed limits."

Limits of 35 miles per hour by day and 25 miles per hour by night have been established on all major urban traffic arteries she said.

In neighboring Kansas City, Mo., speed limits are 30 miles per hour on most streets and 20 miles per hour in congested areas, she said.

The Motor Car Dealers' association of Greater Kansas City has joined the crusade and is distributing safety slogan placards to be attached to the rear bumpers of automobiles to motorists of the metropolitan area.

Miss Dillon carries such a placard on her car. It reads: "I am pledged to be a safe driver. Your mayor says 'Give pedestrians a brake!'" The placards are luminous.

### Bureau Cites High Cost of Soil Services

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—It costs nearly a million dollars a year to administer soil conservation programs in Idaho, Senator Dworshak's office was informed Friday.

E. O. Dykes, acting chief of the soil conservation service, said the cost to the federal government for administering projects in 23 Idaho counties totaled \$772,127 in the 1953 fiscal year. In addition, operation of the state office cost \$45,000 and the regional office in Boise, \$129,856, making a total of \$926,922.

Dykes said there were 10,513 farmers in Idaho cooperating in soil conservation districts, with Latah county topping the list with 1,108 farmers more than twice as many as other leading counties.

Dykes listed the cost of the Latah county operations at \$34,099, compared with Bonneville, \$43,440; Jerome, \$48,151; Washington, \$58,251; Franklin, \$59,289; Jefferson, \$32,401; Kootenai, \$30,843; and Bonner, \$30,485.

He explained that some soil conservation districts overlap county boundaries and accounting records are maintained on a district basis. Therefore it was necessary to estimate the expenses of the counties.

Arms Revolutionized by Inventions of Modest Gunsmith, Pioneer Utah Man

By DEXTER ELLIS

It was not until the late 19th century that the modern repeating rifle, the automatic pistol and the automatic machinegun were developed.

Believing that a man does best that for which he is suited, they decided that John would devote himself to gun designing while Matt would take care of the business end.

For their first venture—gunshop and sporting goods—store—the brothers decided they should have a stock of some rifles. With the help of two half-brothers they tediously hand-made that number before offering any for sale.

When the first samples were put on display, a Winchester representative appeared and bought the whole stock and the patent to manufacture them.

By this time John had developed the idea of his famous lever-action rifle. In all, he patented four models of this type which in a few years monopolized the market for repeating rifles. One of them, the model 94 Winchester, became the most popular sporting rifle ever produced.

A rival manufacturer told the inventor: "I don't know what you received for that patent, but I would have given half of my factory for it."

In the meantime he perfected a lever-action shotgun and at the invitation of Winchester worked out a design for a repeating .22 caliber rifle.

When the guns were sold, he was surprised to receive a letter telling

discovered it wasn't very dry. The army forces in 1917 called for competitive test with the machinegun which was proving to be the greatest casualty weapon.

John had two guns ready—a recoil-operated, belt-fed heavy machinegun and a gas-operated automatic rifle fed with a 30-round clip.

They easily won the tests and were declared by the examining board to be "the most effective guns of their type known."

At the request of the U. S. ordnance department he also made models of three different 37-millimeter (1 1/2-inch bore) cannons which hurled one-pound shells at the rate of 120 per minute.

His last creation was the Browning superposed over-under shotgun which was turned out, however, only recently manufactured in Belgium and distributed in the U. S. by Browning Arms company.

He died of a heart attack in 1926 after having gone to Japan to be present when the first superposed guns were turned out. Matthew had died three years earlier.

John M.'s guns continued to dominate the rifle field. His machinegun helped win the battle of Britain by providing the eight-gun firepower with which British pilots riddled the Heinkels and Götters.

They were used on land, sea and air in World wars I and II and in Korea. Despite the superionic era in aircraft, Browning's 50s were the main armament on the F-26, F-27, F-28, F-29, F-30, F-31, F-32, F-33, F-34, F-35, F-36, F-37, F-38, F-39, F-40, F-41, F-42, F-43, F-44, F-45, F-46, F-47, F-48, F-49, F-50, F-51, F-52, F-53, F-54, F-55, F-56, F-57, F-58, F-59, F-60, F-61, F-62, F-63, F-64, F-65, F-66, F-67, F-68, F-69, F-70, F-71, F-72, F-73, F-74, F-75, F-76, F-77, F-78, F-79, F-80, F-81, F-82, F-83, F-84, F-85, F-86, F-87, F-88, F-89, F-90, F-91, F-92, F-93, F-94, F-95, F-96, F-97, F-98, F-99, F-100.

He had difficulty getting it produced in America, so on the spur of the moment he strolled down to the docks, found a boat sailing for Europe and bought a ticket.

The great Fabrique Nationale plant in Belgium readily accepted it and thus the first successful automatic scattergun first was produced outside the U. S.

The high-powered automatic sporting rifle followed and the well-balanced .22 automatic. The latter, made by Remington, was one of John's favorite guns.

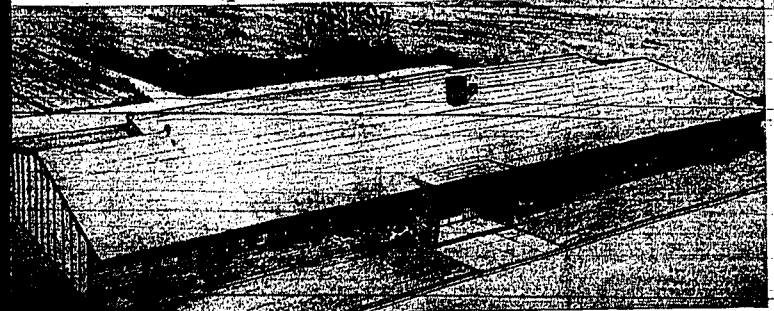

### S. Cancels Battery 'Pep' Fraud Order

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—The Justice department has canceled a fraud order barring California manufacturer Jess Ritchie from the mails to promote his consumer battery selling scheme.

# Publishers to Gain Help by Mail Revision

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—The postoffice department believes steps it has taken to cut red tape in mailing magazines and newspapers will save time and money for both the department and publishers.

The department has just made public mailing regulations changes it put into effect in the last few weeks.

It said "substantial savings" will result from elimination of hand-weighting of publications at the time of mailing. Under the new system, the publisher determines the weight of one copy and multiplies it by the number being mailed.

Another change permits publishers to deliver their publications directly to the postoffice or railway station and pay postage later. They formerly were required to present copies at the postoffice where they have a second class permit before taking them to the office or station where they actually are mailed.

The department said two other changes were adopted for the convenience of publishers and one for second class mail subscribers.

The department now forwards magazines and other second-class mail without charge to subscribers who move to another address in the same community.

The magazines will be forwarded free for three months to give subscribers time to notify publishers of their address change. The department will continue to charge for forwarding magazines out of town.

Another rule change provides that publishers no longer need to print on each copy the name of the local office where they mailed their publication.

Publishers also were given blanket permission to deposit their publications in private mail boxes on Sundays and holidays when there is no delivery.

# Life in MAGIC VALLEY

When the obituary was written for Walter V. Day, TWIN FALLS, on Aug. 2, there was one sentence, "For many years he was active in the American Legion baseball team that could have been enlarged upon by many youths who had taken part in American Legion baseball in the Magic Valley, Walter Day was 'Legion baseball'."

It is interesting to know that, Francis, postmaster at Twin Falls, was an immediate past vice commander of the Magic Valley Legion baseball team. He was state athletic officer for the Legion and did much of the work in the early days of the baseball team.

Day came into Legion baseball in this area rather late in the game and was manager of the Twin Falls Legion team for five years. He resigned last spring because of health and entered the veterans hospital at Boise.

When Walter Day left the hospital he came to Twin Falls to live with his family in Twin Falls, he had another thought in mind. The American Legion state manager was to be played here. He wanted to see "his boys" and he didn't make it. He died before the tournament started.

Day was active in the Legion in this area for five years. During that time he saw many of the boys who were under the guidance of Walter Day. For his funeral, members of the team were honorary pallbearers.

There were those, of course, who probably did not like the way Walter Day did some things but Day was a philosopher. He coined an expression, "You can't stop to kick at every dog that barks at you."

TWIN FALLS City Manager Joseph H. Lattimore recently queried Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph company about the possibility of a company furnishing special telephones at key spots about the business and industrial areas of the city as a fire alarm system.

The company couldn't give him an immediate answer. Local officials told him they knew of no such service anywhere in the system and would have to study the plan.

In other words, Lattimore may have originated a new scheme of fire control. But he sees nothing profound in his idea. He says it simply makes good sense.

In the first place, the city couldn't afford for a time, to install the usual type of alarm system.

Such systems are priced at about \$1,000 for each alarm box, and the city would need a minimum of about 25 boxes to adequately cover the key business and industrial areas, not to mention residential areas.

And Lattimore sees several advantages in a system of telephones. The informant on a fire would be able to tell firemen what type of fire it was, he pointed out. For example, this would spare the department sending every man and piece of

equipment to handle a routine fire simply because it happened in an industrial area, as would likely be the result if a box alarm were turned in from such a key area.

And he believes the plan would reduce the problem of false alarms. Where the prankster could work the box alarm and run, it would not be so easy to escape consequences in giving an alarm by phone. The caller would be forced to identify himself, or give a false identification, by phone, as well as discuss the fire with firemen.

The telephone could be marked

clearly so they would not be construed as intended for general use, and operators could be trained to handle only emergency calls on those lines.

And Lattimore believes the telephone company could supply the city with this service at a cost well below the cutting-and-maintenance costs required on the box alarm-type system.
