Reclamation Program for Fiscal Year 1954 Announced by McKay

TWIN FALLS, Aug. 24 (AP)—The total the bureau can spend for next fiscal year is \$124,950,322. It adds up to this: The bureau can use the full amount allowed by congress for any one specific project but it can't expend the allowable maximum for all projects, because it doesn't have that much money in other words, the goal for all projects can't be reached.

Reclamation Commissioner Wilbur J. Dezhnev reported to McKea today that approximately \$114,000,000 of the total amount available for reclamation projects in fiscal year 1954 is being allocated to the construction of new and improved irrigation systems. He said that in addition to the program for this fiscal year, the construction under way will enable the bureau to complete irrigation systems valued at \$22,877,000 during the fiscal year 1954 and \$22,877,000 during the fiscal year 1955. Also, power generating capacity will be increased by 24,500 kilowatts next year, and 12,000 kilowatts the year following.

Highlights of Dezhnev's report: The Columbia basin project, in Washington, Wyoming and Idaho, for irrigating 131,000 acres of new land, will be ready for another 55,000 acres by next June. A total of \$20,618,101 is scheduled for the Columbia basin project this year.

All of the 80,000 kilowatts of installed power capacity planned for the Canyon Ferry dam in Montana are scheduled to go on line before June 30, with first generation set for November.

A summary of Dezhnev's work projected by the bureau, along with allocations for this and other fiscal years included:

- Avondale, Ida., \$222,000; rehabilitation distribution system serving 622 acres of irrigated land.
- Dalton Gardens, Ida., \$268,000; repair distribution system.
- Castroville, Ida., north side pump-out station.
- Castroville, Ida., south side pump-out station.

Over 300 Returned POWs Reach U.S.; 150 More Released

FANJUNJOM, Aug. 24 (AP)—The Korean prisoner exchange approached the end of its third week today as 150 Americans most of them captured in the war—returned from red captivity.

The communists said they would return 186 men today, which would push the total number of freed Americans to 1,830. The reds originally said they held 3,313 Americans.

Several repatriates spoke lightly and jokingly of their shorter experiences as captives in contrast to the grim days of other POWs held for two and three years.

The reds also returned 300 South Koreans Monday. The U.N. command released 2400 North Korean soldiers and 250 North Korean civilians.

"Operation his switch" is almost two-thirds complete, providing the return of 1,830 men to the United States. Monday was the 30th day of the exchange.

Also promised for release Tuesday are 8 Canadians, 3 Australians, 2 New Zealanders and 1 American. The U.N. Command is expected to give back 8,400 North Koreans.

Although the communists have stopped their pace of exchange, they still are lagging in returning prisoners. Only about 60 per cent of the listed American captives have been released.

The reds had returned about 65 per cent—8,770 of the 12,703 listed POWs they said they held.

The reds also said most of the allied officers and non-commissioned officers they captured and apparently are keeping them in captivity.

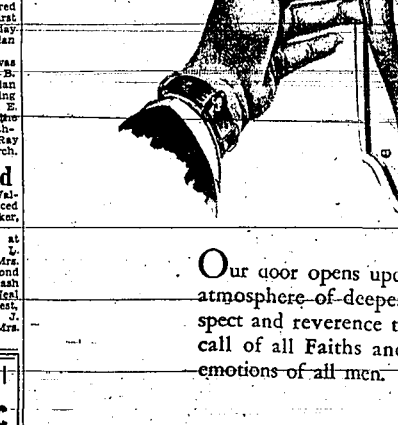

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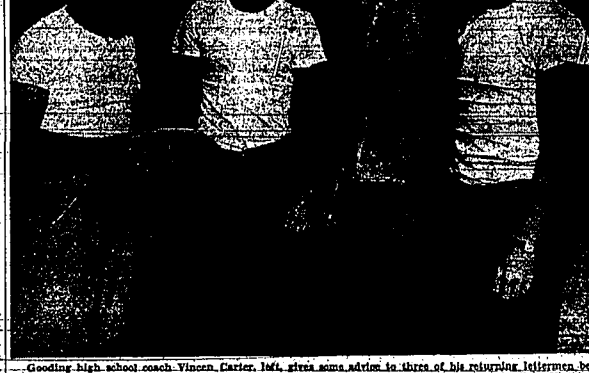

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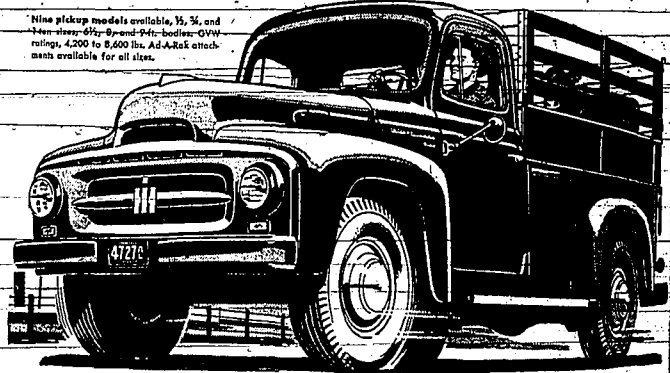
