This is two-tenths of one per cent higher than in mid-June, which was also a living cost peak. The index for July rose one-half of one per cent above a year ago.

Bradley's views in brief, that the country's best protection lies in boosting its scientific and technological lead over the Soviets—were in an article in the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post.

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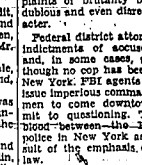

Malenkov, a former leader of the Bolshevik party, was named to the post of premier following the death of Stalin, now reported to be in the hospital in Moscow.

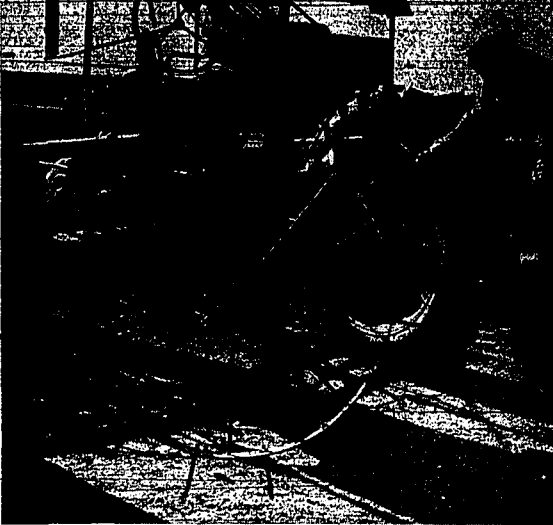

### Local Man Readies New Windrower He Invented for Display at T.F. County Fair

A Twin Falls man is just completing the pilot model of a newly patented bean windrower, and it all came about because he once got disgusted.

Roy Lipe, 3977 Pierce street, was farming near Dietrich at the time the windrower was invented. He had a practically new bean windrower which he thought was not doing the job it should.

"It was then he decided if he could not buy one that would work properly he would build one that would."

Lipe did not waste much time back there in 1937. He built the machine and used it to windrow beans that same year.

The windrower which Lipe had built consisted of two wheels set at angles attached to a tractor. He hooked it to the hydraulic lift in conjunction with the bean cutter.

Lipe was not exactly a stranger to farm machinery. He has worked with it and around it for about 15 years. He was a machinery mechanic for the D and W Sales company.

### Men Also Becoming Conscious Of Clothes Style, Expert Says

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—Men always take women on how much time they spend looking about their clothes, but now the truth is out.

Men have become clothes-conscious, too.

They now spend far more time than they ever have fussing over the way we dress—and the trend is growing steadily.

That well-tailored woman comes from Louis Rothchild, executive director of the National Association of Retail Clothiers and Furnishers, a man obviously happy over the way the trade winds are blowing.

Rothchild says one has but to look at the popular reading material to know this is true.

Some 600 newspapers now run regular articles on men's wear, and 100 papers have put out special men's wear sections, some metropolitan papers employ men's fashion editors and 20 national magazines habitually discuss men's clothes.

Rothchild thinks the basic reason is that men now have enough leisure time to think about his clothes. In the days when he had to work a 10 or 12 hour day, he had no reason to think about clothes since one pair of overalls looks pretty much like every other pair of overalls.

It will shock what remains of the celluloid collar trade to learn that last year, for the first time, men's sport shirts were sold than regular dress shirts. More slacks were sold than suits.

Rothchild said, "a terrific pants year" that public men effect fashion trends. President Eisenhower's celebrated Honolulu hat, for instance, caused a rumormongering.

"For awhile we even had a shortage," Rothchild said. "Some companies tried to renege with straw Hamburgs this summer, but that stopped."

Rothchild doubts, though, that men's interest in clothes ever will equal women's.

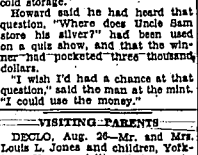

**'Gradual Barter' of Liberties Called Main Freedom Threat**

BOSTON, Aug. 26 (UP)—Supreme Court Justice Brandeis said today that the greatest danger to individual liberties is not being gradually bartered for security than by the possibility of "any sudden overthrow."  
 "Traditional freedoms are less in danger of any sudden overthrow than of being bartered or traded for something else on which the people place a higher current value," Jackson declared.  
 In a speech before the judiciary banquet of the 75th annual meeting of the American Bar association, he said:  
 "This movement is likely to progress strictly within the terms of legislation and the forms of law. Government gradually takes over direction of the total life of the nation. It regulates each step of one's daily affairs and tolerates no conflicting loyalties or duties."  
 "In moderation, many may welcome this as a 'planned economy' or 'welfare state' in excess, it becomes the totalitarian state."  
 Jackson assured the delegates he was "not alarmed by any 'dies and present danger' of this whole train of evils overtaking us in the United States."  
 He said many "are ready to exchange some of their liberties for a real or fancied increase in security against external forces, thieves, betrayers or criminals."  
 "Others are eager to bargain away local controls for a federal subsidy. Many will give up individual rights for promise of collective advantages."

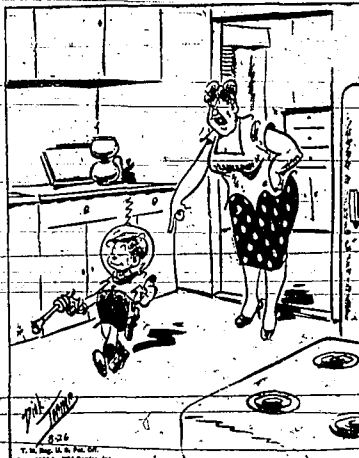

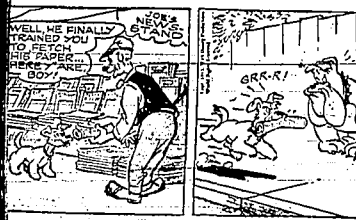

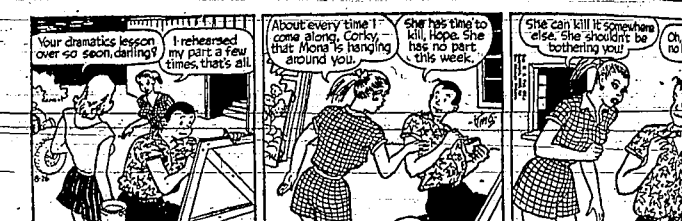

### S. Power Commission Holds Key on New Federal Policies

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The power commission will have to determine whether the proposal to develop the resources of the Snake river valley is the responsibility to deny the application.

The power commission, in ruling on Idaho Power's application, will decide whether the utility's proposed projects are feasible from engineering and economic standpoints and whether they would prejudice the most comprehensive development of the middle reach of the Snake river, a tributary of the Columbia. When the hearing resumes, Idaho Power witnesses will be cross-examined. Then the power commission legal staff will present witnesses from the interior department. These witnesses haven't been identified, but they are expected to include engineers who supported the federal proposal at a congressional committee hearing last year. Finally, public power groups intervening against Idaho Power will present an affirmative case for the federal dam.

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### Auctioneer Says Records Broken At National Sale

FILER, Aug. 20.—At Col. E. O. Walker's consecutive ram sale for the National Woolgrowers association at Ogen Tuesday and Friday, two world records were set. The sale was the 38th annual for the association.

Copeland Walker set a pen of five Suffolk rams sold to a Wyoming sheepman for \$400 each and another pen of Suffolk ram lambs sold to a California man for \$450 each. The two world records were set. The top Suffolk ram sold for \$4,500 and the second top ram sold to a Texas sheepman for \$2,000.

The quality of animals at the annual sale is much better now than it was 37 years ago, although the top price for a ram was set in 1916. Colored Walker said that in 1916 a Rambouillet ram sold for \$6,200. The top Rambouillet at the sale last week brought only \$1,500.

The coldest in the oldest sheep auction in years of service in the United States. Prior to the Ogen sale he handled the Suffolk sale at Pendleton, Ore., and on Thursday will leave for Ephraim, Utah, to handle a sheep sale there.

### Round Trip to Moon in Only 10 Hours Visualized by Briton

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 20.—An English scientist, in a scientific report disclosed here, visualized a hydrogen-hydrogen molecular rocket, which could make a round trip to the moon in about 10 hours.

Dr. D. Z. Work, in a report published by the Los Angeles Times, believes ultimate future travel to the moon and planets can be made through the use of diatomic monatomic hydrogen fuel. According to Work, the rocket would not be a hydrogen bomb (a missile with a uranium power plant) or like a rocket engine powered by such conventional fuels as alcohol and liquid oxygen.

It would travel through space at about 15 miles per second, or 48,000 miles an hour. The moon is only 240,000 miles away. The maximum speeds of present day jet rockets is just over one mile per second, much too slow to allow man-carrying rockets to soar above the earth's gravitational field. Rockets must race at a speed of seven miles per second to escape the gravitational field.

Work points out that a hydrogen molecule consists of two connected hydrogen atoms, each made of one positive charged proton in the nucleus surrounded which a single electron orbits. The new rocket principle would be broken up into monatomic hydrogen (independent hydrogen atoms). The diatomic hydrogen would be broken up by the use of these atoms to re-join the molecules from which they are separated would provide the great thrust for the rocket, Work concludes.
