Without irrigation, Mureau said, most of this year's acreage would be of little value for cropping. Under irrigation, it produces bumper yields of grain, fruits, vegetables and livestock crops.

Mureau said the Twin Falls soil conservation day is of special significance as it is the symbol of the soil conservation district movement. These districts, he said, have spread over the country with astounding speed and represent one of the great land movements in history.

Mureau declared "what we have seen here this morning and what we shall see this afternoon is a show window of the activities of the Twin Falls soil conservation district. Like a merchant's show window, it does not display all the stock of the business, but it is an effective way to demonstrate a soil conservation district in action."

Senator Dwarakich compared the fertility and exceptional agriculture resources of Idaho to states of the east and indicated which have been farmed for many years.

He pointed out the forests, mountains, rich mineral resources, fertile soil, water, and delightful climate makes Idaho a state of almost unlimited resources.

However, Dwarakich noted that the human element, which reflects intelligent conservation and use of these resources, is the essential element of a successful economy.

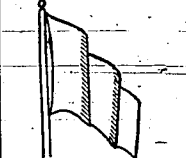

ing" at upwards of 500 million dollars and said more advanced engines now will be ordered for several supersonic fighters.

No Plane Effect—Wilson and Talbot said the cancellations will "not affect the production of one single plane."

They said the engines, all spare or extra and mostly for jets, no longer are needed for two chief reasons:

1. Jet engines are much more durable than had been expected—the result of "accumulated knowledge" in operation, maintenance and design.

Attrition Rate Down—2. Attrition rates have fallen off—that is, fewer accidents and, of course, no losses in combat since the true in Korea.

"We assume that we will have to go back into Korea," he said. "We cannot plan otherwise until a permanent truce is signed."

955 Planes Out—On Sept. 2, the air force announced it was eliminating plans to buy 955 airplanes including 751 B-29 bombers already ordered, at a "saving" estimated at 750 million dollars.

BOISE, Sept. 17 (AP)—Representatives of six motor freight lines told the Idaho public utilities commission Wednesday they are operating at a loss on their runs between Idaho points and need a 15 per cent rate increase.

The commission, which previously turned the companies down, announced that it will set a date for cross-examination of witnesses.

Bid for Boost—Fourteen firms are being represented by the Rocky Mountain tariff bureau in their bid for an increase. Annual reports of firms not represented were submitted in evidence.

Edward B. Taylor, Salt Lake City traffic manager of Orange Transportation company, said "indefinite losses" is not bearing the share of the cost.

Chester J. Bams, Pocatello, traffic manager for Garrett Freightlines, said Idaho rates are "confiscatory," but his company is still trying to build up its Idaho interstate business.

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Judge Weighs Case Decision

Leader Avers TV Industry's Future Great

SUN VALLEY, Sept. 17—The electronics and television industry is a billion dollar industry that will replace the automotive industry in importance to the country in a few years, a Los Angeles corporation executive declared here Wednesday.

Speaking at the evening meeting of the 20th annual convention of the National Security Traders Association, Leslie Hoffman, president of the Hoffman Radio Corporation, Los Angeles, said the electronics industry has been and will be the leader of the nation's economy in the future.

Hoffman said the electronics industry alone employs more than 10 million people in the United States. Hoffman said this percentage will increase substantially each year as the electronics industry plays an increasingly important role in the economy of the nation. He added that the electronics today is the largest, most dramatic and dynamic industry that has developed in the postwar period.

Hoffman cited his own company as an example in the electronics field. He said it had increased its sales from 4 million dollars in 1947 to 60 million dollars this year. It had increased its net worth 800 per cent from Jan. 1, 1948, to July 31, 1952, he said.

Defense Role Cited
Hoffman said electronics will play an increasingly great part in the maintenance of peace and security.

Turning to the television stations serving the country, Hoffman said at least 300 stations probably will be on the air at the end of 1953, an increase during the year of 25. He predicted this increase will have a wonderful effect on programs through increased competition.

Color television, Hoffman said, will not make present black and white sets obsolete. Every color set can get each program whether telecast in black and white as well as color.

ROME, Italy, Sept. 17—Italy's three main labor unions today ordered a 24-hour general strike for Sept. 24 in an effort to force the government to relieve widespread unemployment.

Communist labor boss Giuseppe Di Vittorio announced the strike call after conferring with Chianci democratic and social union leaders.

Di Vittorio said the strike will affect all public making it potentially the nation's most damaging walkout since the one called in July 1948 to protest against the U. S. military aid to Italy.

Communism Dies; Russ Scared, Revolt Cooks, Observer Claims

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—Countess Alexandra Tolstoy, the Russian-born woman who has spent most of her adult years fighting communism, has returned from a two-month tour of Europe with three optimistic beliefs.

1. Communism is on its death bed.

2. The Russians are scared to death of war.

3. A revolution is cooking behind the iron curtain and it will start at the top.

The predictions of the 69-year-old countess, daughter of famous author Leo Tolstoy, were made in an exclusive interview after her visit to France, Switzerland, Italy and Germany.

"No one can say when the revolt will start," said the head of the Tolstoy Foundation, Inc. "We may wake up to it tomorrow, or it may be three or four years away."

Countess Tolstoy did not try to go behind the iron curtain on her tour.

"I never would return," she said bluntly. "The communists have marked me. I would be shot."

The countess came to America in 1931 and now is a United States citizen. She heads a foundation giving material and spiritual aid to Russians who have fled the Soviet regime. She also has just completed her second biography of her father.

She said three events behind the iron curtain point up the weakening of communism—the death of Stalin, the East German revolt, and the purge of Lavrenti Beria, former boss of the secret police and minister of interior.

Accused Red Defends Role As Recruiter

SEATTLE, Sept. 17 (AP)—John Daschbach, one of six defendants in the government's communist conspiracy trial, testified Wednesday he believed University of Washington professors had a right to recruit students into the Communist party.

He said, was no different than recruiting students for the Republican or Democratic parties.

But, when asked if he would feel the same way about recruitment into the German-American Bund, he answered with a show of indignation.

"Of course it is not the same. We regard the bund as anti-American."

The opinions were voiced during cross-examination of the defendant by the government's attorney, Tracy Griffin.

He told the court he was unable to recollect a King county Communist party convention in 1944 during which, Griffin said, Daschbach read a report served as a member of that committee.

"I would be proud to know I was a member of that committee," he said.

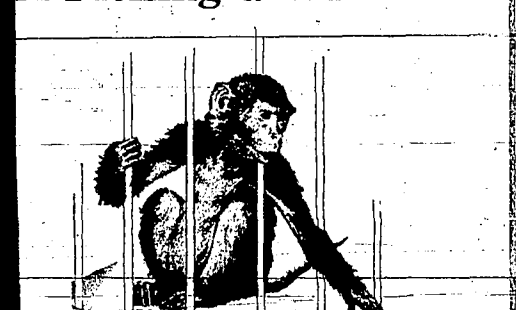

American League Approves Shift of Browns' Franchise

AGO, Sept. 17 (AP)—A shift of the impoverished St. Browns to another city, apparently Baltimore, was Wednesday by an American league screening com-

mittee after a three-hour huddle with Baltimore officials and the Browns' franchise to permit the Browns' franchise to be switched to a city "to be later determined."

Just before the session, a wealthy Baltimore attorney and a Browns' director issued a statement saying that if the American league approves removal of the Browns from St. Louis to Baltimore, there would be no "substantial" Baltimore capital represented in the Browns' ownership. Urged For Shopping

The economy-minded housewife will have to shop a bit more carefully in the market this week-end. Meat and vegetable prices generally will be higher than a week ago.

Beef, pork, lamb and veal went up at the wholesale level this week, and many stores will be raising their prices on these cuts for the week-end. Produce man say the rise in vegetable prices can be laid to cooler weather, which has brought a pickup in cooking.

Egg prices also will be higher. The same goes for frying chickens. And some stores will ask more for butter.

Far From Intolerable

The situation is far from intolerable, however. Judging from reports from food stores, the housewife will be able to find special items such as eggs of lamb, fresh and smoked hams and various cuts of beef if she watches prices closely. Many stores don't plan to hike beef prices immediately and some plan features on chuck roast, pot roast and ground beef.

Bargains in fresh chops, however, will be hard to find. In general, they'll cost a few cents to around a dime more per pound than last week. Store advancing prices on frying chickens will ask two to six cents more per pound.

Egg Prices Rise

Egg prices will range from two to eight cents a dozen for the large grade A white. Butcher's eggs will amount to one to two cents.

Although vegetable prices edged higher, a good number remain as good buys. Heading the list, in the opinion of produce men, are beets, cabbage, corn, leeks, onions, potatoes, rutabagas and tomatoes. In the moderately good classification were celery, spinach and sweet potatoes. Produce men called cucumbers expensive and said carrots are quite high.

California tokay grapes are arriving in volume, and the experts clasped them with California seedless grapes as especially good buys in fruit. Also cited as good buys were peaches, prunes, cantaloupes and honeydew melons.
