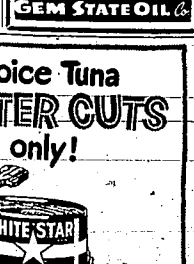

'54 GOP Win Termed Need To Hold Rein

CALDWELL, Sept. 18 (UP)—The chairman of the national republican congressional campaign committee said last night if a GOP congress is not elected in 1954, "chances of the party remaining in power after 1954 will be nil."

Only a little work is required to pick up a few votes in your district," Rep. Richard Simpson told party leaders from seven counties of Idaho's first congressional district.

\$1,017 Judgment Sought in Court

DISMISSED WORKERS REINSTATE — But his attempt to dispense with the horde of office holders have been blocked by the employers and their political friends in capitol hill and back home.

FEDERAL PAYROLL UP — Despite the Eisenhower reduction, the federal payroll is now running about \$300 million dollars higher than it did a year ago. The increase is due to salary boosts and jump sum payments accumulated leave to those separated from the service.

As of today, however, it appears doubtful that there will be any substantial action in the size or the content of the Bona family.

The economy drive will lose more momentum as a result of complaints piling up on "the" who do not do the good thing. But even labor party men privately concede "Conservative" leaders have done a good job.

These things alone could not have produced a boom. But they do contribute to a new feeling of well being in Britain, and they encourage the British voter to credit the Conservatives for all their country's gains.

This recovery, plus the greatly enhanced position of the Conservative party, stands in sharp contrast to the situation that prevailed in the first months after Sir Winston Churchill's return to power. Then the Conservatives were glum-faced before problems that seemed well nigh hopeless; and the voters appeared demoralized with their new leaders.

In this low, steady, upward haul there is encouragement for the Eisenhower administration, another middle-of-the-road government which is trying to demonstrate that economy and good management are possible even in these chaotic days.

In Britain, the demonstration could not be made in the first six months or even the first year, but even a mark was made. Looking across at this example, most fair-minded Americans may be more than ever disposed to give President Eisenhower reasonable time to show that there is more than one way to run a government.

OUR INTERFERENCE RESENTED

The big problem of battling communism in western Europe has been to convince the working people of those countries that the American-style capitalism and the free enterprise system have more to offer them than communism or socialism.

Fair progress in this phase of the battle for men's minds has been reported from West Germany. The people there can see first-hand that the American-style capitalism and free enterprise system offers the East Germans only a hollow shell.

In France and Italy, however, the fact that the free enterprise way of life offers a higher standard of living to the working people has not registered. Communism still seems to promise more to more people.

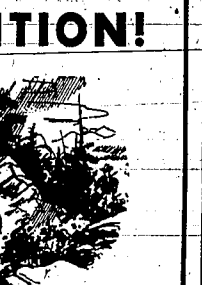

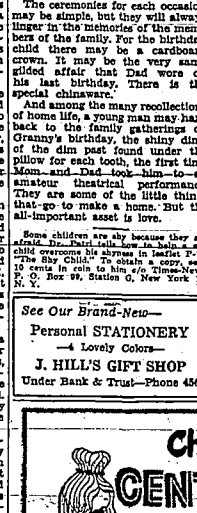

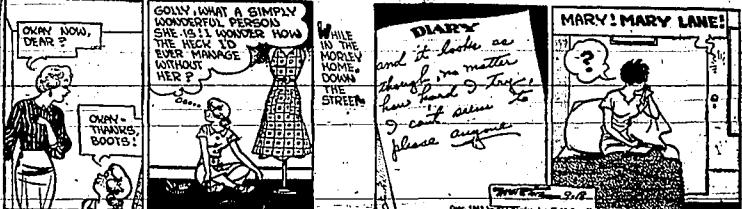

County's Levy Is Reduced in Board Action

JEROME, Sept. 15—Jerome county's 1953 tax levy has been reduced from last year's \$2.08 per \$100 of assessed valuation to \$1.90, county commissioners concluded their meeting and figures on Tuesday.

"In many cases there are dwellings beyond the signs and in the line of fire. The person shooting at the sign probably does not stop to think that he may be jeopardizing the lives of humans and animals that are unseen but still within the range of the bullet."

It also was noted that a large number of bent and twisted signs are found in many places, especially around night spots. "This undoubtedly results from some celebratory trying to demonstrate his strength," a department official said. "Signs of heavy gauge steel have been bent or torn from the supports. In some cases signs have been large enough and heavy enough to take two or three men to bend the sign," the official said.

Mutilated signs that are not too badly damaged are taken to the department's sign shop in Boise and repaired. "Even with this reconditioning work, there is still a tremendous cost to the highway user," Mathes said.

State Highway Engineer E. V. Miller said money for the replacement and repair of mutilated signs comes from the highway fund. "Every dollar spent to fix up a sign someone has maliciously damaged, is a dollar less for highway construction," he noted.

University to Open Liquor Studies Soon

MOSCOW, Sept. 16—A University of Idaho study on social and economic effects of alcohol, ordered by the 1953 legislature, will start this month.

Miller pointed out that the state law provides that persons damaging signs are liable for their repair and replacement. "In several cases, we have been able to learn the identity of the person and through process of law have been reimbursed for the damage," he said.

Data obtained in this study will be used in preparing curriculum materials for Idaho public schools, the university said.

Sheriff Jesse Carlton and his deputies will act as a fire guard and patrol hunt areas throughout the timber section of the district.

He said his crew will patrol areas near Twin Falls, Snake River, McMillan creek and Cottonwood creek.

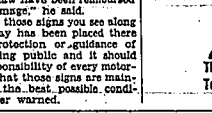
