

Iron Curtain Aides Direct Red Printing

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—Sen. John M. Butler, R., Md., said today many of the communist underground operations uncovered by the senate subcommittee on internal security were directed by "iron curtain diplomatic officials."

Butler, a member of the subcommittee, called the discoveries "alarming and significant."

He said a subcommittee report on communist propaganda, made public last night, shows "striking evidence of the fact that communist 'have' infiltrated many phases of the printing industry in this country."

Maryland Republican said he was especially disturbed because the "iron curtain diplomatic officials" directing some of the activities are not presently required to conform with the foreign agent registration act. He did not name any diplomats.

The subcommittee released testimony, taken in secret last spring, that communists have secret printing presses to print communist propaganda if the party goes underground. The testimony also said large amounts of money are entering the United States through Soviet-bloc embassies or illegal mail shipments.

The hearings, conducted by a subcommittee "task force" headed by Sen. Herman Walker, R., Idaho, released testimony by five former communists, three of whom were undercover agents for the FBI.

These and other witnesses testified:

1. The communist party established printing facilities in Copenhagen, N. D., New York City, Pittsburgh, Pa.; Birmingham, Ala.; and near Birmingham, Ala.

2. Washington, D. C., firm, Superior Print shop, printed leaflets for communists and office copy for iron curtain propaganda.

3. From 5,000 to 7,500 bags of mail arriving in New York monthly are subject to confiscation as foreign political propaganda, mostly intended for foreign-language groups in this country. This does not include material brought in by passengers, pouch, smuggling or addressed to registered agents of foreign powers.

4. The communist party distributed small portable mimeographs for communists to hide in their homes for storage.

The subcommittee recommended amending the internal security law to require the communist party and its fronts to register all propaganda-printing devices, from presses to mimeographs.

"But most of them have never been captured at all."

By persistent demands, Bryan got from the communists a promise to furnish by nationalities the number of allied prisoners the reds hold who refuse repatriation.

The communists previously had informed the U. N. command that they held more than 300 South Korean prisoners and more than 20 North Koreans, but never have given a breakdown by nationality.

The reds are scheduled to deliver the allied prisoners to Indian troops in the demilitarized zone Thursday.

At the Indian village five miles southwest of Panmunjom in the buffer zone, the allied delivery of allied prisoners to the Indian custodial force neared an end.

During the day, the U. N. transfer of 500 North Koreans and 1,355 Chinese swelled the total delivered so far to 20,028. Power than 2,500 men are to be turned over by Wednesday. The allies plan to deliver 1,479 North Koreans Tuesday and between 750 and 1,000 sick and wounded North Korean and Chinese prisoners on Wednesday, the final day.

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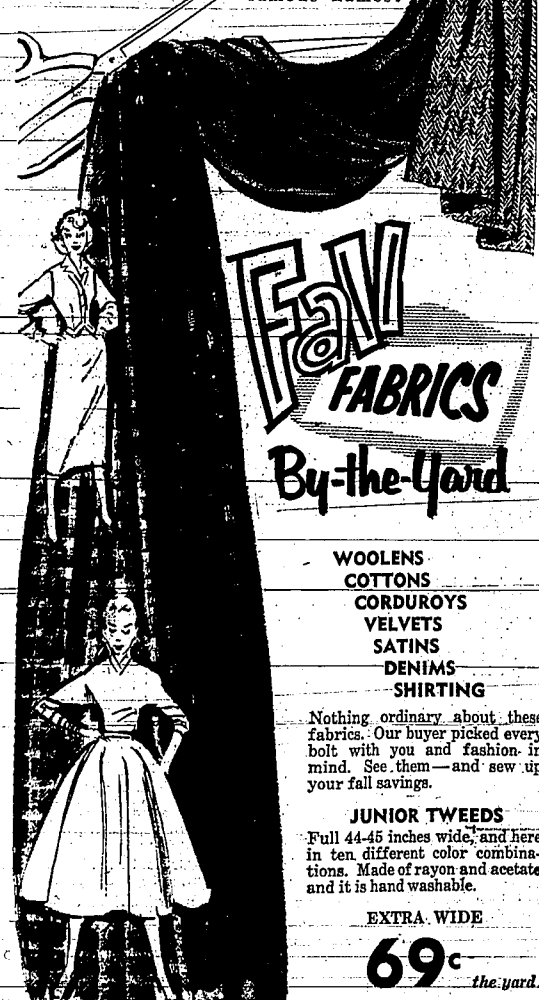

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Rift on Oath Given Dodge By Chairman

CHICAGO, Sept. 21 (AP)—Democratic National Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell today pooh-poohed the so-called "loyalty oath" controversy within his party and decided to pick a fight with conservative Democrats. He also suggested a sort of "Pulitzer prize" contest to study the performance of investigating commissions and then rate them for their constitutionality.

In a network television appearance yesterday, Mitchell went on to deplore cases of a "senior or congressman, using the powers of his office to glorify himself or his political ideas."

He said the question of the much-disputed "loyalty oath" enacted at the 1952 Democratic national convention had been "exaggerated beyond all proportions" by observers who don't know what they are talking about.

In answer to repeated questions about Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., Mitchell made his suggestion for a committee to investigate.

One spectator asked how, in view of Democratic criticism of McCarthy, "you can do business with Democrats like Sen. Patrick McCarran, Nevada, and Senator F. Byrnes, South Carolina, and Herman Talmadge, Georgia."

"I don't do business with Byrnes," Mitchell said.

"I have no differences with Sen. McCarthy," Mitchell said. "I am a Democrat. I am a member of the highest Democratic majority in the union in the last election."

Senate Will Study Titanium Output

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The senate interior subcommittee today scheduled a hearing at Washington, N. Y., next Monday in an effort to find ways of boosting production of titanium.

Chairman George W. Malone, R-Nev., said the subcommittee has received "confidential" information indicating there is a serious shortage of the metal which is used in making jet airplanes engines.

Four other subcommittee representatives of producing companies in the area have been called to testify at the hearing. A spokesman said part of the testimony probably will be taken behind closed doors.

The subcommittee is considering the question of the stockpiling of strategic materials opened hearings at Seattle today.

Second Trillion of Appropriations Is Started by Solons

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Congress is working on its second trillion dollars in appropriations in the last 83 years.

Since 1872, when the house appropriations committee started keeping year-by-year statistics, congress has appropriated \$112,000,000,000, well over half of it to the military.

More than half the staggering total was appropriated during the last 10 years, although the all-time high was the 147 billion dollars allotted in 1942, the first full year of World War II.

Only once during the last 10 years have annual appropriations been less than \$10 billion. That was in 1951, when the threat of World War III became real and congress shelled out \$10 billion.

Doubt Voiced On Rumors of Beria Escape

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Government officials expressed skepticism today about a report that the Soviet Premier Joseph Stalin had ordered the escape of Lavrenti P. Beria from Russia.

The report came from a highly-placed informant on Gen. Joseph McCarthy's documents.

The informant, who would not let his name be used, said Beria is "in contact" with subcommittee agents abroad and is eager to come to this country to "tell all he knows about the international communist conspiracy."

Beria, once the number two man in the Kremlin, was first July 9 as head of the Russian secret police and charged with treason. Western authorities have assumed that he was in a Soviet prison awaiting trial, but there has been no direct word on his whereabouts.

The McCarthy subcommittee informant conceded the possibility that Beria's reported escape may be a genuine hoax. He first told reporters today that Beria has been out of Russia for more than a month and the subcommittee has been in contact with him for a considerable length of time.

Later, however, he said the subcommittee is still investigating the matter and does not yet have conclusive proof that the man claiming to be Beria really is the deposed Soviet leader.

"The McCarthy subcommittee informant declined to give any details of Beria's alleged escape, or present hiding place. But he said three other high ranking communist agents in Russia at the same time are now with Beria."

Egypt Regime Nabs Bigwigs

CAIRO, Sept. 21 (AP)—President Nasser's government arrested Premier Mustafa Nahas, his wife and 12 other officials today in a move to end the Egyptian regime.

All 14 face trial before a special court created to deal with "traitors" to the revolutionary regime and corruption during the reign of ex-King Farouk.

No specific charges were announced against any of the 14. It also was not known when they will appear in court.

The roundup came as the three-man special tribunal began trials today of revolutionary regime leaders who were scheduled to continue throughout the three-year "transition" period.

Political parties have been banned during that period.

The arrested Monday included leaders of two once powerful political parties, several close advisers of Farouk and other persons prominent in the corruption under the monarchy.

Prominent Couple Divorced in Idaho

BOZEMAN, Sept. 21 (AP)—The marriage of two prominent eastern socialites was ended by an Idaho "quickie" divorce.

Elizabeth Astor, slender blond daughter of a famed brain surgeon, was granted a divorce from William Vincent Astor, a grandson of the famed John Jacob Astor, who made a fortune in fur and real estate.

The divorce was issued in the district court by Judge Henry McGuire. Mrs. Astor charged mental cruelty but the nature of her testimony was not disclosed following the "quickie" hearing.

Under Idaho law the divorce is final immediately. Mrs. Astor established Idaho residence by living for six weeks at Sun Valley.

Accompanying her to court were Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Rainey, Halley, Idaho, who served as Mrs. Astor's corroborating witness.

Astor and the former Mary B. Cushing were married Sept. 27, 1940, at East Hampton, N. Y.

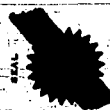

Idea of Atom Weapon Ban Gets Support

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—The thought is kicking around in military circles that nuclear super-bombs may go the way of poison gas as weapons.

Before disclosure of Russia's recent H-bomb and A-bomb tests this idea either had little currency or was kept well suppressed. The general assumption was that the next big war, if any, would be fought with atomic weapons of many kinds.

But Navy Secretary Robert A. Anderson suggested in a speech at Quantico, Va., Saturday that U. S. and Russian super weapons might well "cancel themselves out."

How widely this idea is shared among administration officials is not known. As recently as last June 25, the man who at that time was the country's top atomic official expressed belief that use of nuclear weapons in war would meet public approval.

The official was Gordon Dean, then chairman of the atomic energy commission. He knew on June 25 that the Russians had an A-bomb stockpile and could be expected soon to master the H-bomb. Said Dean: "I think the predominant public attitude today is that atomic weapons are awesome and terrible weapons but that they are a necessary part of our defense against which we must not deny ourselves if we are forced into another world war."

Minnesota Car Crash Claims 4 And Orphans 6

BUFFALO Minn., Sept. 21 (AP)—Six children, the oldest only 10 years old, were orphaned today by a two-car collision that killed four persons.

Two of the persons killed in the smashup yesterday were farmer Vernon J. Fadden, 30, and his wife, Le Varne, 26, parents of the children.

Mrs. Fadden died at Buffalo Memorial hospital two hours after the accident, but the others were killed instantly.

The children were taken to the farm home of their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Fadden. Authorities said it was not yet determined who would care for and rear the children.

New Plan Outlined for Classification Of Idaho Autos to Fix Insurance Rate

(From Page One)
are classified as class 2A, 2B, or 2C, according to the degree of hazard involved in their operation. Class 2A remains unchanged and still includes individually-owned cars used for business and with no operator under 25 years of age, and also cars owned by corporations, copartnerships, or unincorporated associations, regardless of age of operator.

Classes 1A, 1B and 1C
The new plan recognizes that the use of a car in the course of going to or from work and the amount of such travel are important as a measure of hazard. A car not customarily used in driving to work is generally subject to less exposure than one driven under pressure of time and at the week-day peaks of traffic.

Therefore a non-business car with no operator under 25 years of age, which is not customarily driven to work, is the least hazardous risk. Such cars are classed 1A and receive the lowest rate.

A non-business car, with no operator under 25 years of age, which is customarily driven to work and travels a one-way distance of less than 10 road miles is classed as 1B.

A non-business car, with no operator under 25 years of age, which is customarily driven to work and travels a one-way distance of 10 or more road miles is exposed to greater hazards than 1A or 1B car and is classed as 1C.

Classes 2A, 2B and 2C
An individually-owned private passenger automobile owned by a person under 25 years of age or driven by a youthful operator resident in the household or employed as a chauffeur, is classed either as 2A, 2B or 2C, whether the car is for business or non-business.

The least hazardous of the car risks where youthful owners or operators involved are the family car driven occasionally by a son or

daughter under parental supervision and the car owned or operated by a young married couple having legal custody of one or more children resident in the household. A young son or daughter, living at home usually will have use of the car under parental supervision. Frequently the youthful operator will have an older member of the family in the car.

In the case of young parents, the responsibility of caring for small children and the commitment to home that this usually involves substantially reduces the exposure and modifies the insurability factor generally recognized in youthful drivers.

Where the youthful car operators are not owners but are resident in the household or are employed as chauffeurs or where the youthful car owners or operators are married and have legal custody of one or more children resident in the household, such cars are classed as 2A.

Where persons under 25 years of age are the owners or principal operators and are married but without children, the cars are classed as 2B.

According to National Bureau statistics, cars owned or principally operated by unmarried persons under 25 years of age are the most hazardous private passenger risks; these youthful owners or operators typically lack parental supervision and the cars are driven frequently by other youths. Such cars are classed 2C.

Class 3 under the old plan remains unchanged under the new plan. This class still includes in-

dividually-owned cars used for business purposes with no operator under 25 years of age and also cars owned by corporations, copartnerships or unincorporated associations regardless of age of operator.

However, it does not include private passenger cars owned by farm family copartnerships or corporations.

Clergymen and Farmers
Private passenger automobiles owned by clergymen and farmers are not considered as being used for business purposes or for going to or from work and therefore such cars are regarded as non-business car risks. Farmers, under the new plan, receive rates about 20 per cent below those that would otherwise apply to their private passenger cars. At present they receive a discount of 15 per cent. Under the new plan private passenger cars owned by farm family copartnerships and corporations receive

U. S. Is Fast Going to Dogs; Laws Protecting Pooches Gain

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—This is national dog week, and if you don't get the idea, you—no, not the dog—may end up needing a lawyer.

For six every year goes by, there are more state laws and more judicial decisions around the country to protect the 22 million dogs in this country from people.

Almost every state, according to the Gaines Dog Research center, now makes it a criminal offense to kill a dog simply because he trespasses on your property.

Just this year Arkansas joined several other states in making it illegal to "dum" or abandon dogs along roads and other places.

In Maryland, you now can be fined up to \$500 and sent to jail for a year for the "unlawful killing, maiming, or poisoning of the dog of another person, or of exposing poison or ground glass with the intent that it shall be taken by dogs."

In Louisiana, not long ago, the state court of appeals ruled that the owner of a dog who runs into pedestrians while answering his owner's whistle is not responsible.

Dogs, the court ruled, have the same right as people to bump accidentally into pedestrians.

The California court of appeals has held that it is not the fault of a Great Dane if he bowls over a small woman in leaning on her.

Small women, the court ruled in effect, should know better than to let Great Danes lean on them.

In New York state, it is a misdemeanor to clip a dog's ears.

In New York city, you can be fined \$10 and-or sent to the clinic for 10 days for stealing a dog.

In Huntington, W. Va., last month, a man was sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$10 for kicking a puppy to death. The man said the pup nipped his son and himself, but

Trainmen Protest Idaho Dam Plans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has filed a protest with the federal power commission against granting Idaho Power company authority to build three dams in the Snake canyon area of Snake river.

President W. P. Kennedy said the Idaho Power plan is "inadequate and unsatisfactory." In his protest he said the Idaho Power dams would not furnish water for irrigation or storage for flood control.

Council Attacks "Military Press"

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—The National Council on Public Opinion today charged that "military press agents" are largely responsible for "the growth of military influence and control over public life."

It said in a 60-page report that "the chief purpose of military propaganda is to sell congress and the people on the armed forces and any policy they want to promote."

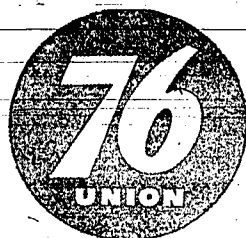
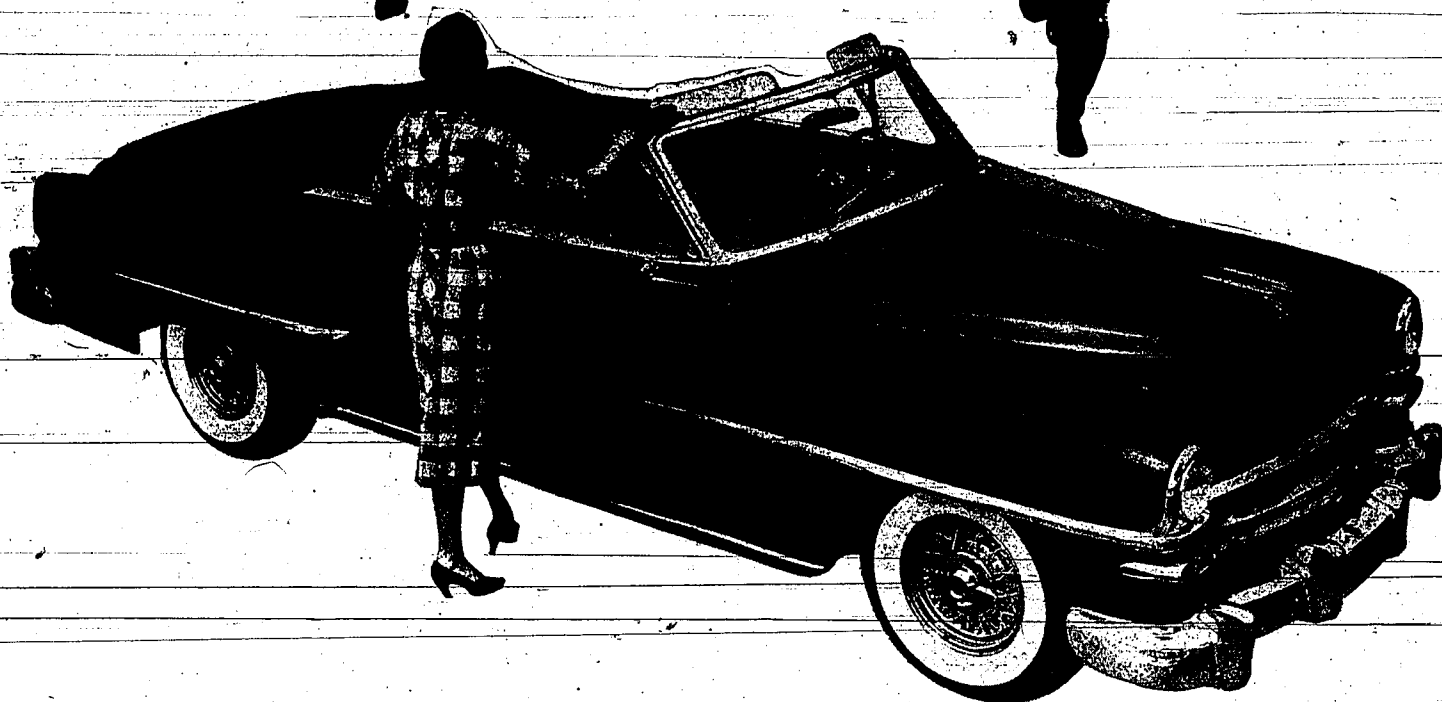
