Flood Control Rule Eyed for Weiser Areas

BOISE, Sept. 30 (AP)—Petitions are being circulated in the Weiser-Canyon region before the district can be organized, Kulp said. The proposed district would include lowlands along the Weiser and Little Western rivers. Both flood bridge areas for formation of a flood control district, State Reclamation Engineer Mark R. It now has 225 members in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Nevada, and Montana.

Bevan Scores Large Victory In Party Vote

MARQUATE, England, Sept. 30 (AP)—Aneurin Bevan topped the ticket in elections to the Labor party's policy-making national executive committee Tuesday.

Bevan headed the poll with 1,420,000 votes in the 1,420,000-vote contest. He defeated moderate Clement Attlee.

Among 10 candidates for seven disputed seats on the committee, Bevan headed the poll with 1,420,000 votes at the party's annual conference.

Five of his followers won reelection with him to seats representing local party organizations. However, the Bevanites remain heavily outnumbered on the committee, made up of representatives of the local organizations, trade unions, cooperatives and a woman's branch.

There was a setback for Attlee's moderates when Hugh Gaitskell, chancellor of the exchequer in the former labor government, failed to win the seats.

The Bevanites did not have it all their own way. At a closed session the delegates returned Bevan's rival, Herbert Morrison, to the executive committee.

Morrison was bumped off last year by the Bevanites.

\$100,000 Suit Is Filed Over Loan

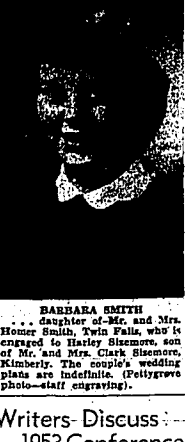

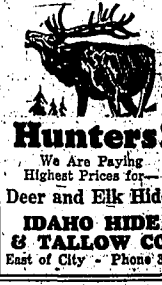

Big Fund Set For '54 Fight Against Polio

BOISE, Sept. 20—The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will devote 254 million dollars next year to polio prevention, the new "fourth front" against the disease, a four-state March of Dimes meeting was told Tuesday.

Joseph P. Nease, New York, national fund-raising director, said 19 million dollars would be spent for gamma globulin and 7 1/2 million for polio vaccine in field trials of the vaccine prove it superior to the vaccine he said the foundation also would aim at raising 11 million dollars for other purposes. He said production of gamma globulin would be doubled to enough for about two million youngsters.

He is checking only on families having more than one case of polio. He said Idaho would have had few such families this year.

At each household visited, he checks the condition of the affected members of the patients and gathers other information.

Part of Lavock's check in Idaho will be followed up 75 days later by a similar check by physical therapist Anna Swezey, who will report to him.

DETROIT, Sept. 20—New model automobiles rolling from the assembly plants during the coming three months should provide a stimulus to retail demand.

There is no question leading sales chiefs are counting on this when they say now car sales will remain at high levels during the remainder of the year. Similarly there is no question demand for many makes already has declined, forcing production cutbacks.

This raises an immediate question as to just what dictates demand

for new automobiles. Some leading sales authorities say people buy automobiles as long as they have present or prospective capacity to pay for them.

The fact there presently are more passenger cars in use than ever before, they say, does not reduce the potential new car market. Hundreds of thousands of motorists with cars only a year old will want new models, these experts assert.

They agree sales pressure to replace large numbers of one and two-year-old cars invites a piling up of used car inventories. Yet

they say the 44 million cars currently licensed in the United States include some 10 million that were built before World War II. Many of these are considered overdue at the junk pile.

Something like 3 1/2 million cars now are scrapped annually. But the industry cannot live on its replacement market alone. A market that would absorb even 4 1/2 million cars annually would find several companies operating at a loss.

New-model-stimulus, buying power, total car registrations and the total of over-age cars currently in use are things attracting management thought among the industry's top executives.

And this is so because the months ahead hold more uncertainty for the auto makers than any similar period for more than a decade.

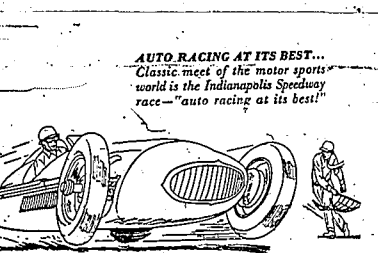

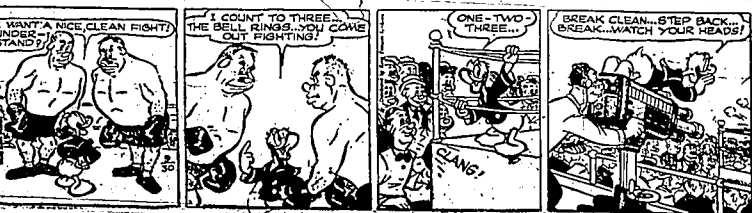

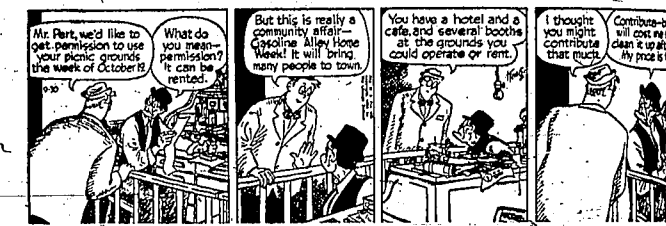

DENVER, Sept. 30 (AP)—Colorado officials think they've got a sure-fire promotion scheme with silver dollars as bait for new industries, but it may be illegal.

Lewis Cobb, state advertising department director, explained that some 40 silver dollars have been sent by registered mail to presidents of the nation's largest manufacturing corporations.

"The Colorado cartwheels" are enclosed with a note from Gov. Dan Thornton, asking that the industrialists visit the state and consider its potential in any plant relocation. A placard with the dollars explains they were mined, milled and minted in Colorado.

Even though Cobb said it has been more effective than was expected, with some 200 of the bus-

nessmen sending congratulatory replies, the Colorado constitution has a provision banning gifts of state money.

"We feel it is more of an advertising gimmick than a gift of state money," Cobb explained. Thornton disclaimed knowledge of the constitutional prohibition, but said, "If it's illegal, it'll be stopped."

Atty.-Gen. Duke W. Dunbar agreed the constitution bars gifts of state funds, but refused to give an off-the-cuff opinion whether the use of silver dollars in the advertising program was a violation of the provision.

Ideally, fuel elements must be removed from reactors because the atomic ashes, called "fission products," have accumulated in them. These "ashes" absorb neutrons and tend to choke the chain reaction so that it can be run. In the chemical processing plant, the fuel elements are dissolved and the uranium-235 is recovered so that it can be re-used. More specific in nature, but still adding to the overall fund of knowledge about reactors, is the submarine Thermal Reactor. It is the hand-bomb parent of the reactor that will power the first atomic submarine, the Nautilus. Construction crews still are working on another area, which will serve as the proving ground where a reactor to power aircraft will be tested. The first large contract for its construction was last spring.

Idaho Project Is Generating Answers To Questions of A-Power Applications

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 23—When the electricity from atomic energy lights the lights and runs the motors of your city? That question was asked at a conference on atomic power in Chicago recently. Participants included such persons as Dr. Enrico Fermi, Nobel prize winner in physics, Dr. Walter Zinn, director of Argonne national laboratory, and Dr. Charles A. Thomas, president of the American Chemical company. Their answers ranged from 10 years to 30 years, for large-scale economic production. This question of commercial power production from atomic energy has been discussed in recent months before a congressional committee; it is being studied by teams of industrial concerns; it's the subject of editorial in a half dozen types of publications. And while this discussion is being carried on across the nation, groups of scientists and engineers are working without fanfare on the step-by-step of southeastern Idaho on technical problems of the solution of which will go far toward proving the answer. They are working for such institutions as Argonne national laboratory, Phillips Petroleum company, Westinghouse and General Electric. They are working with Geiger counters and test-tubes and mass spectrometers. And the goal of their work is to find out more about the newest source of power, the nuclear reactor. Similar work is being carried out in a number of atomic energy commission laboratories in other parts of the nation. But at the national reactor-testing station in Idaho the AEC has built and is operating its largest concentration of experimental reactors. All told, four reactors and a chemical processing plant have been assigned to the reactor testing station. 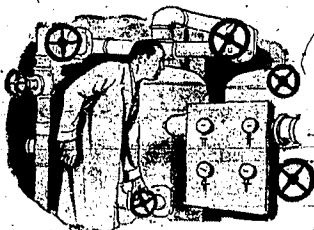

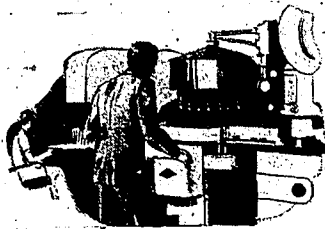

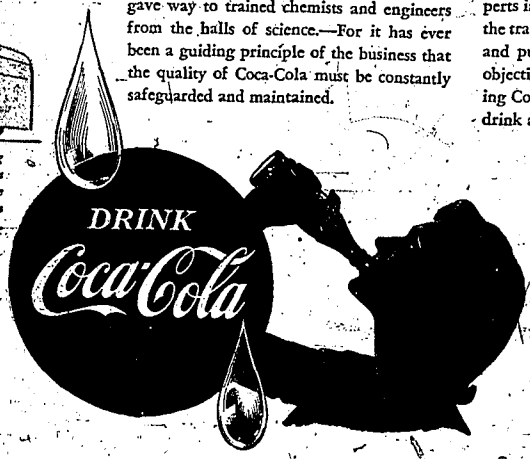
